Woman arrested in Fina robbery

A Big Spring woman has been arrested and charged with aggravated robbery. Meanwhile, police continue to search for a man involved in a separate robbery over the weekend.

According to reports, Lori Neel, 25 of 4204 Connally, allegedly walked into Fat Boy's Fina, 1506 East Marcy, Saturday morning, displayed a knife and demanded money from the clerk.

Neel reportedly fled in a white vehicle and the clerk wrote down the license plate number. Officers were able to track Neel down and arrest her.

In an unrelated case, a white male robbed the Texaco store at 801 East Interstate 20 Sunday afternoon.

"The suspect displayed a firearm, possibly a pistol, and demanded money from the clerk and they complied. He then fled

Amendment election coming in January

The issue of amendments to Big Spring's city charter may soon be put to rest.

After several attempts to bring several amendments to the voters a charter amendment election has been scheduled for Jan. 21, 1995, at which time the 11 charter amendments will come before Big Spring residents for their approval. The Charter Revision Committee, headed by former mayor Max Green, recently concluded a series of meetings that were designed to review the city's charter and to make recommendations that would bring the charter into compliance with state law.

Green said bringing the charter into compliance with state law is one of two reasons the charter is being amended. The

other reason is that the city nel policies and procedures. charter has not been updated since 1973 and the committee thought it to be a good idea to make some modifications to the charter so that it is up to date.

The Jan. 21 election will bring before voters 11 amendment proposals.

The longest and perhaps most complex of the amendments is amendment 8, which basically gives the Big Spring City Council the right to establish personAmendment 8 was the primary issue last spring when a special election was being considered.

Amendment 8 is a revision of Article VI., Section 5 - Disciplinary Hearing for City Employees. The amendment refers to complaints and disciplinary action.

The issue of a special election surfaced last March when it

HOUSTON (AP) - Among the problems facing the Texas Legislature next month will be the soaring juvenile crime rate.

In January, lawmakers are expected to come up with answers to curb the problem. In the works are plans to build more detention facilities for youthful offenders, lengthen sentences for more offenders, and lower the age at which many teen-age suspects can be tried as adults.

The crackdown will have the strong support of Gov.-elect George W. Bush, who made juvenile crime a major campaign focus.

Texas has dismal figures for its youth. One out of every four Texas children lives in poverty, and the state ranks third for teen-age pregnancy and seventh



Insurance requirements could up oil prices

NEW YORK (AP) - Gasoline and heating oil prices may get pumped up this month by a new federal law requiring oil tankers to carry more liability insurance, The New York Times reported today.

The law requires tankers to carry 10 times as much insurance as in the past. No tanker will be able to dock in the United States starting Dec. 28 unless it has demonstrated to the Coast Guard that it has the financial ability to carry hundreds of millions of dollars of liability

appeared that an election would have to be called to provide civil service protection for Big Spring police officers.

The wording to amendment 8. according to City Manager Lanny Lambert, was confusing and hard to understand.

In the past several city officials have disagreed with city employees over the issue of civil service saying that it is unfair to affirmative action and that the implementation of civil service is more expensive and unfair to cities.

Charter amendment 8 was created as an alternative to civil service with the police department, something the fire department has already adopted.

According to Green, amendment 8 will be easier to understand

He said, "We had the amendments ready to go for the May election, but amendment 8 got in the way. It has been simplified and I think it will be a lot easier to understand.'

Lambert said, "The amendments are the same ones presented last February.

•Amendment No. 1 - Article II, Section I: Boundaries. This amendment deal with the boudaries of the city and any changes that take place due to annexation.

•Amendment No. 2 - Article IV, Section 1a., 4, 6: City Government. This amendment refers to the powers of the mayor, the adoption or repeal of ordinances and resolutions, and a journal of the council's proceedings.

•Amendment No. 3 · Article IV., Section 14: City Government. This amendment refers to the general powers and duties of the City Manager.

•Amendment No. 4 - Article V., Sections 3 and 4: Elections. This amendment pertains to the

This amendment states the city attorney shall represent the city in the "municipal court," give advice to other city officers, attend the meeting of the city council, and perform such other duties as are usually incident to the office of city attorney, or that may be required of the city attorney by the City Council. The city attorney shall be appointed and/or dismissed by the City Council and shall receive such salary as may be fixed by the City Council.

•Amendment No. 7 - Article VI., Section 9a: Internal Auditor. Amendment No. 7 states that the Internal Auditor, if one is appointed, shall audit the accounts, the receipts and disbursements of the city and perform such other duties as are usually incident to the office, or that may be required by the City Council.

•Amendment No. 9 - Article VII: Taxation. Section 1 refers to the city having the power to levy ad valorem taxes; and Section 2, refers to the city's authority to levy occupation taxes and licenses; Section 3, refers to the levying of franchise tax; Section 4, regulation to tax lists, inventories, and appraisements; Section 5, annual tax levy; and Section 6 refers to the collection of taxes.

EL PASO, Texas (AP) - A woman has been charged with child endangerment after police found two-year-old twins had been left alone in a car for more than an hour in 37-degree weather.

The woman said she had babysitting the twins, a girl and a boy, and left the children in the car early Sunday while she drank at a bar, according to police spokesman Sgt. Bill Pfeil. The children were dressed only in diapers and T-shirts, police said.

Meredith Anne Campbell, 30, was jailed in lieu of \$2,500 bond late Sunday.

LUBBOCKs (AP) - Groundwater contamination at Reese Air Force Base is severe but should not hurt its chances of surviving the upcoming round of military base closures, federal officials said.

"There's a lot more of that (contaminated land) than people ever thought," said Steve Vincze, a spokesman for the U.S. House Government Operations Committee.

The contamination has made the properties harder to sell, which is contributing to lessthan-expected Pentagon savings from base closings, according to a study released last month by the General Accounting Office.

The GAO study cites severe environmental contamination as making it difficult to sell some former military land into private hands.

Kinnamon railed against dying in Sunday executon

HUNTSVILLE (AP) - Condemned killer Raymond Carl Kinnamon fought his executioners until the very end.

'I want everybody to know I'm not ready to go," he said shortly before dawn Sunday.

Then he tried to prove it, staging a 30-minute filibuster in an apparent attempt to talk his way out of a death warrant that called for his execution before dawn. He finally tried to slip out of leather restraints that kept him connected to two intravenous tubes carrying a solution of lethal drugs.

With a sister, niece and friend sobbing loudly, Kinnamon's death marked the end of one of the most bizarre executions in Texas in years.

"I've got a few things to say," Kinnamon said as witnesses filed into the death chamber about 5:15 a.m. CST.

Thirty minutes later, after thanking dozens of people, criticizing capital punishment, expressing love for his family and getting a drink of water from the prison warden, he was still talking.

"I can see no reason for my death," he said, then began squirming, lifted his head and shoulders and tried sliding his right arm from a leather strap.



NASA sting moves on to possible conflict of interest

HOUSTON (AP) - Fingerpointing by defendants in a NASA contracts sting has triggered an FBI investigation into a possible conflict of interest involving the Johnson Space Center director, The Houston Post reported Sunday.

The accusations against Carolvn L. Huntoon have yet to result in a finding of significant wrongdoing, the newspaper said in a copyright story.

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
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Prices down despite

bumper grain crop

HOUSTON (AP) — Low rice prices threaten to rub out gains made by the first bumper crop in Texas in three years.

Following two bad years, this year's rice crop is worth an estimated \$188 million, up about \$42.5 million from 1993.

But this year's prices didn't live up to early expectations, and have been below the \$9 per hundred pound break-even point.

Mail bomber strikes again

NEWARK, N.J. (AP) - The FBI says the "Unabomber" has struck again, mailing a package bomb that killed an executive days after he was promoted to general manager of one of nation's largest advertising firms.

Evidence links Saturday's killing of Young & Rubicam executive Thomas Mosser to 14 other explosions over 16 years, the FBI said. But the identity of the bomber and the reason why Mosser was targeted remain a mystery.

Since 1978, the serial bomber has killed one other person and injured 23 more. Mosser, 50, was the first victim who didn't work at a university or in the computer and airline industries, the FBI said Sunday.

"The components of the bomb, its construction, make us believe the bombs are linked," FBI agent Barry Mawn told a news conference.

One clue linking the attacks is that most of the bombs had components, designed to survive the blasts, stamped with the initials "FC," a member of the task force investigating the bombings told The Associated Press.

"It's my understanding that as many as 11 of the devices contained similar pieces," Salt Lake City police Sgt. Don Bell said in an interview Sunday.

A letter to The New York Times last year, believed to be from the bomber, identified 'FC" as an anarchist group. Investigators have concluded that "FC" represents an obscene phrase denigrating computers, The Times reported today.

the size of a videotape and addressed to Mosser. He was about to take his wife, Susan, and their two children out to buy a Christmas tree Saturday when he opened it.

The powerful explosion killed him, blew a large hole in the kitchen counter, and filled their house in the New York City suburb of North Caldwell, N.J., with smoke.

Mrs. Mosser screamed at the sight of her husband's bloodied body. Their 13-year-old daughter ran to neighbors' homes for help. The couple's 15-month-old daughter and a neighbor's child also were in the home, but not hurt.

Mawn said investigators don't know where the package was mailed from.

Most famous town in the world

The world is hearing about \zle, Texas.

You take the Jacksboro High way 199 northwest from Fort



Worth. you come to a town that still is like Texas once was. It's where kids ride before they walk and the breakfast hangout is Pat's Country

Kitchen. It's not fancy, but the tables have four legs and you don't get coffee with a plastic lid

Azle's one high school has a football team called the Hornets. They are pretty good.

The town is somewhere shy of 9,000 people, and everybody knows what everybody else is doing, but they all take the Azle News just to see who got caught at it.

So, here we have a town so tiny that when you plug in your electric razor, the street lights go dim. And yet, all over the world, at this moment, people are reading and talking about Azle, Texas.

They are reading about Azle in Hawaii and Latin America, in the Far East and the Near East. Because Azle is 15 miles from Springtown, Texas. And in Springtown is where Gary Cottar lives. And because Gary Cottar, when he was younger, was a rodeo cowboy. He made his living on the circuit, roping. And Gary made his own lariat rope.

And other rodeo riders and ranch hands liked his justright-waxed-firm rope and began asking him if he would make another for them - then another and another.

Before Gary knew it, he was busy making ropes. First, he gave them away to friends, and then, he began selling them.

Even after he left the rodeo circuit for five years of education as a civil engineer, he still preferred making rope.

But with his engineering education, he was able to design rope-making machines. Soon, he needed an extra barn in back of the house for his

rope-making business.

And the barn that was 700 square feet is now 9,000, and his rope business is still expanding, turning out 60,000 ropes a year — mostly mail order — from ranch hands all over the world.

With five full-time employees and four or five high-schoolers during summertime, Gary Cottar is turning out polygrass ropes, which champion calf ropers call the best anywhere.

Making a good roping rope is a 21-step process that takes six to eight weeks to complete.

The Cottar Rope Company then packs these world-famous ropes for safe delivery all over the world by wrapping them in newspaper. In the daily newspaper published down the road in Azle.

And that's how it is that at this moment, people in Brazil, **Argentina and British** Columbia, and people in Spain, Hawaii and Timbuktu, are unwrapping their roping ropes and reading about the most famous little town in the world Azle, Texas.

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GROZNY, Russia (AP) - WithRussia's military might bearing down on it, Chechnya agreed to negotiations with begin Moscow over who will control the breakaway province.

Chechen Finance Minister Timaz Abubakarov said on Sunday that he and eight other officials would meet today with Russian representatives in Vladikavkaz, the capital of the neighboring region of North

Ossetia. The Chechen foreign minister had previously ruled out peace talks. But Chechnya's hand was forced by Russian troops, backed by jets and helicopters, who rolled into the region on Sunday.

The decision to dispatch tens of thousands of soldiers was an enormous gamble for Russian President Boris Yeltsin. Some legislators even suggested impeaching him.

Yeltsin will face even greater pressure if Russian troops become bogged down in fighting. But apparently he hopes to force the Chechens to make concessions without resorting to full-scale war.

Elders surprised not angry over firing due to remarks

WASHINGTON (AP) - Dr. Joycelyn Elders said today she was surprised at her firing, but she did not back down from statements that cost her the

post of surgeon general. "I really felt that all of the comments I made were true ... I don't feel that I should start second-guessing myself today," Elders said on NBC's "Today' show.

President Clinton demanded **Elders' resignation Friday after** learning that she had told reporters at an AIDS conference Dec. 1 that masturbation should be discussed in schools as part of human sexuality.

"I really think I was talking about teaching children about, you know, that nothing terrible will happen to them if they play with themselves," Elders said today. "I was talking about information."

TOKYO (AP) – A bomb exploded Sunday on a Philippines Airlines flight carrying 292 people, blowing a two-foot hole beneath the passengers' feet and setting the ceiling on fire. One passenger was killed and six were injured.

Passengers put out the fire with their blankets, Japanese radio said.

The Boeing 747, with 272 passengers and 20 crew aboard. made a safe emergency landing about an hour later at Naha airport on Okinawa in southern Japan. It had been on its way to Tokyo from Manila and Cebu in the Philippines.

Several hours after the explosion, a caller claiming to belong to Abu Sayyaf, a Muslim fundamentalist group responsible for numerous bombings and kidnappings in the southern Philippines, telephoned The Associated Press in Manila and claimed responsibility.

"We explode one plane from Cebu," the anonymous caller said. He said the group planned to target more airplanes.

Airline spokesman Angel Sambo in Manila said he could not comment on the claim.

Police identified the man killed as Haruki Ikegami, 24, of Japan, who had been working in the Philippines.

A police bomb disposal team froze a bag found near the Ikegami's seat and removed it for X-rays, but the results were not immediately known, Sonsho Nakadate of the Okinawa Prefectural Police said.

A passenger quoted by Japanese radio said the explosion blew a hole in the floor under seats in the center of the plane, near an exit door. One passenger got caught in the hole and had to be helped out by a flight attendant, the passenger said.

Some burning material flew to the ceiling, starting a fire, but passengers put it out with blankets, the radio report said. Most of the injured passengers suffered burns from the explosion.

The plane had 272 passengers and 20 crew aboard.

Free trade zone prospect leaves officials upbeat

MIAMI (AP) - The prospect of mammoth free trade zones in the Western Hemisphere and Asia has U.S. officials talking of a new era of prosperity and opportunity awaiting future Americans.

That was the message they hoped to convey at the conclusion of the weekend's 34-nation Summit of the Americas, coming less than a month after the **18-nation Asia-Pacific Economic** Cooperation group summit in Indonesia.

Much like its Asia-Pacific counterpart, the Miami summit, with President Clinton serving as genial host, endorsed the goal of a regional free trade agreement that will have lasting consequences if it comes to fruition.

Serbs find new ways to thwart U.N convoys

SARAJEVO, Bosnia-Herzegovina (AP) — In their latest slap at the United Nations, Bosnian Serbs shut down key humanitarian aid convoys, hijacked a fuel shipment and tried to keep the U.N. commander out of Sarajevo.

U.N. armored personnel carriers will no longer be allowed to escort aid convoys through Serb-controlled areas of Bosnia, the Serbs said. Aid workers say they cannot work without U.N. protection.

"I think this is just another way of making life difficult for the U.N.," Lt. Col. Jan-Dirk von Merveldt, a U.N. spokesman in Sarajevo, said Sunday.

The Serbs, who control 70 percent of Bosnia, lifted restrictions on most of the 200 peacekeepers they had been holding hostage, the United Nations said. But they continued harassing U.N. forces.

Too much flying, possible blood clots

WASHINGTON (AP) - Frequent fliers, take note: Dan Quayle may have gotten blood clots in his lungs from too much jetting around, but that's probably a rare occurrence that most passengers can ward off with a little fidgeting.

"I can see the 'Saturday Night Live' skit where everybody on a plane gets up to walk around at the same time," joked Dr. Elliot Chaikof, a vascular surgeon at Emory University. "But that's the right advice: Move."

The condition that hospitalized the former vice president for a week, called a pulmonary embolism, isn't that rare. Every year, some 600,000 Americans develop a blood clot in a leg that then travels up to the lungs.

Doctors don't really know why some people get emboli and others never do. Most at risk are people who are over 40, overweight, have congestive heart failure and, for some reason, have cancer.



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



Hunter education class slated for Dec. 17-18

A course in hunter education has been scheduled for Dec. 17-18 from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. at the Big Spring Chamber of Commerce.

According to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, if you were born on or after Sept. 2, 1971 and you are 17 or older. you must successfully complete a hunter education course to hunt in Texas. However, anyone may take the course, and all are encouraged to attend regardless of requirements.

The course is open to adult and youngsters and will include instruction in rifle, shotgun, handgun and primitive sporting arms handling and safety; outdoor responsibility and ethics; laws and regulations; wildlife conservation and identification; hunting traditions; field care of game: and wilderness first aid and survival," said Boyce Hale, area hunter education instructor.

The minimum age of certification is 12. Students 12 years of age or older successfully completing the course will be issued a hunter education certificate from the TPWD. Those less than 12 will receive a certificate of attendance but must take the course again after turning 12 for proper certification.



DALLAS (AP) - Texas Rangers officials reportedly are worried about their slugging leftfielder Juan Gonzalez, who has added considerable weight and bulk during the off season.

 The Dallas Morning News reported in Monday editions that Gonzalez's weight has climbed from 221, when the Rangers played their last pre-players' strike game Aug. 10, to a current 253 pounds.

Gonzalez, 25, told the newspaper that the weight gain came from off-season weight lifting and is concentrated in his upper body.

However, Rangers officials say that Gonzalez could become muscle-bound if he bulks up too much.

Gonzalez said that he undertook the weight training program because he felt weak when the players' strike stopped play.



has got some kids who can hit the outside shot, and I've got some kids who are strong inside.



Regardless, McDonald said to expect another hard-fought game between the two teams.







Man's mouth a reminder of smoking's toll

DEAR ABBY: I'm writing as a follow-up to your column on the Great American Smokeout. Many

that I had cancer of the tongue. During the course of a year, 1 had cobalt radiation, iridium implants twice, plus two major surgeries to remove my tongue and left jaw. Due to the expertise of my surgeon, almost 17 years later, I am here to write this letter.

As a result of my smoking, I have no sense of smell, and I lost about 90 percent of my ability to taste. I have one-half of a lower jaw, no teeth (although I do have an upper denture), and it takes me an hour to eat an average meal.

What has kept me going? Positive thinking. Also, I have become a health nut, and if I told you how many vitamins I take daily, you wouldn't believe me. I walk two to five miles a day, rain or shine.

Because of me, nearly 100 people have quit smoking. All it took was for them to take a look into my "gorgeous" mouth.

To those who continue to smoke two packs or more a day, try to imagine what it's like to have no tongue! Keep smoking and you may find out! - HOWARD SINGER, HOLLY-WOOD

DEAR HOWARD: Thank you for the powerful warning you sounded by sharing your experience. It also gives me a chance to warn my readers about another tobacco-related pitfall.
