



Washington, D. C., July 13 .- By a vote of 55 to 28 the Uni ed States Senate today unseated William Lorimer, the junic senator from Illinois and declared his title to his seat invalid. The end of the long fight to oust the senator came after s days of protracted debate in which Senator Lorimer himse had occupied the floor for three sessions, making an impassio ed defense of his election

The final vote was on the resolution offered by Senator L of Tennessee, declaring the Lorimer election by the Illinois le islature in 1909, invalid. The adoption of the Lea resolution carried with it the senate verdict that "corrupt methods, a practices were employed in the election of Wm. Lorimer," ma ing his effection invalid.



appointed superintendent; of the Confederate Home at Austin, which position he held at the time of his death.

TEXAN CRITICISES PRESIDENT FOR "BUTTING-IN" ON LORI-MER CASE.



Declares That Attitude Is Violation o Spirit, If Not Letter, of Constitution.

By Associated Press Washington-July 15 .- Senator Bai ley attacked Precident 'Taft roundly on the floor of the Senate today for his attitude in the Lorimer case, which the Texas senator characterized as "officious and meddlesome." He referring to the president's expression on the case in pro-convention speeches and letters to Col. Roosevelt.

The Texas senator was speaking on his resolution of vesterday, declaring that any altempted interference in sonatorial contests by the presiden constituted a "violation of the spirit, if not the letter of the constitution and ought to be severely condemned." Senator Bailey said:


Executive interference in a contest in this body is so manifestly improper that it must seem very improbable if the facts did not prove beyond the question of a doubt that the president did use his influence in the case recently before the Senale."

Mr. Bailey declared he had purpose ly postponed presenting his resolu tion until after the Lorimer vote and said his contention that President Taft had no right to interefre and appreciated he should not interfere was made evident by Taft's endeavors according to his letters, to keep his activities secret.

"In God's name, has the Senate reached such a state of degration; Boiley cried, "that the presiden must summons senators to the White House to urge them to discharge theil duty under their oath of office ?" Ba lev declared that the clause in Taft's letter suggesting to Col. Reosevelt that he withhold his "Outlook" article on Lorimer lest such senators as Bailey who were intent on keeping Lorimer in the Senate might term it outside interference, was an intima tion that he (Bailey) would not vote according to the law and evidence but on the ground of outside inteference. The Texas senator suggested that he had been singled out because Roosevelt entertained "an ancient prejudice" against him.

"I want proved that he slandered me," added Bailey, "and when 1 denounced him, as I now intend to de nounce the present president, he coupled his hands in horror.

"None held him higher than the present president, but I have lived long enough to see him ransack the record of the war department to convict Roosevelt of a guilty falsehood." And he seems to have succeed-When the president penned that






