OIL MAN DIES SUDDENLY

L. SOLINSKY FOUND DEAD IN HIS ROOM AT TERMINAL HOTEL SUNDAY NIGHT.

Apoplexy Believed to Have Been the Cause—Deceased Prominent in South Texas.

L. Solinsky, manager of the Wichita Falls Oil and Gas Company and a prominent oil operator from Beaumont, where he had lived for thirty years was found dead in his room at the Terminal Hotel at about 4:30 o'clock Sunday night. Mr. Solinsky had not been feeling well for several days and became worse yesterday afternoon and at about 4 o'clock was assisted to bed. Later when an attendant went to his room to see if any service could be rendered, Mr. Solinsky was found lifeless. Dr. Everett Jones was immediately called, but all efforts to revive signs of life failed.

Death is believed to have resulted from apoplexy.

The body was removed to E. G. Hill's undertaking parlors and prepared for shipment to Beaumont, where it was taken for burial this afternoon.

Mr. Solinsky was about sixty-eight years of age and was one of the prominent oil operators in South Texas. He came here several months ago and organized the Wichita Falls Oil and Gas Company which leased the Avis ranch, nine miles east of town where a derrick has been erected and the arrival of machinery shipped from Beaumont is being awaited before drilling operations start.

NO NEW TRIAL FOR FLETCHER

FORMER CHARLIE, TEXAS, MAN SENTENCED TO HANG ON FRIDAY, FEBRUARY 23.

APPEAL NOTICE IS FILED

Lawton Star—Sunday.

Sentence of death was Saturday afternoon passed upon Jesse Fletcher convicted of the murder of Jesse Barlow, by Judge J. T. Johnson. The date of the execution was set for Friday, February 23, 1912, between the hours of 8 and 10 a. m. Notice of appeal was given by attorneys for the defense and 90 days was granted in which to file in case made. Fletcher's only hope lies with the court of appeals of the governor of the state, for commutation. Sentence was pronounced in the following terms:

"It is therefore ordered, adjudged, decreed and sentenced by the court that the defendant Jesse Fletcher is guilty of the crime of murder as charged in the amended information in this cause and as found by said jury and that the said Jesse Fletcher for said crime by him committed be executed and hanged by the neck until he is dead, dead, dead, and may God have mercy on his soul; and he shall be hanged between the hours of 8 and 10 o'clock a. m., of Friday, the 23rd day of February, 1912."

Arguments for a new hearing were heard by the court and denied. The defense in presenting their motion placed Mrs. Shields upon the stand and the jury and witnesses having been assigned quarters at her hotel. She testified that a portion of her hotel was set aside for the use of the jury, that seven rooms were occupied, all opening into a common hall. That two jurymen slept in each room, one carrying a key to the same. The defense argues this a separation of the jury, and that it would have been an easy matter for jurymen to leave the rooms.

Attention was also called to the fact that one of the jurymen, Laughlin, had expressed the opinion, before being called for service as a jurymen that "the old devil ought to be hanged." The jurymen had admitted when examined as to qualifications that he had

Decisions in Texas Courts Concerning Oil Leases

Omission from Description—Drilling Well in Good Faith.—In an action of trespass to try title to a piece of land on which an oil well had been drilled it appeared that the owners of certain oil lands had executed a deed which, by a mistake of the description, had excluded one-third of an acre intended to be conveyed. After the death of one of them, the grantee drilled an oil well on this excluded portion which the undisputed testimony showed to have exhausted the oil. It was held that a transfer of the omitted land could not be established on the theory of an oral sale for two reasons: (1) After the death of one of the grantors, title by oral sale could not be perfected, by erecting improvements on the land and (2) the well being exhausted of the oil it was not in any sense an improvement of the land.
