RECEIPTS BREAK ALL RECORDS

DECEMBER RECEIPTS AT LOCAL POSTOFFICE LARGER THAN ANY MONTH IN HISTORY OF OFFICE

Total Receipts for Tracember Were \$4071.79; For the Year \$38,237. Six Years Record.

A gain of sixteen per cent in receipt: at the postoffice in December, 1911. over the corresponding month in 1916 shows that Wienita Falls has more than beld her own despite the two years of drouth, for everywhere the postel receipts are taken as an index to business conditions.

Not only was there a galu in re cepits for the last month of the year but the receipts for the whole year show a substantial increase over the preceding year, the gain for the year being over three thousand dollars.

The receipts for the year total \$38. 437.50 compared with \$\$35,098.59 in 1910. The December receipts in 191 were \$4,071.79 compared with \$3,505.2 in 7910, a gain of 566.59 or more than sixteen per cent. The recepits las month were not only larger than De cember a year ago but were the great est for any month in the history o the postoffice.

* Annual postal receipts since 1906 are a good index to the growth of the city and show a steady increase. The as follows: 1906 \$11,598; 1907 \$10 **788**; 1908 **\$21,437**; 1909 **\$28,891**; 191 \$25,098; 1911 \$38,237.

COMPULSORY INSURANCE FOR PUBLIC EMPLOYES

New Liw Effective in Mssachusett Pro idea Retirement Pay for State Employe.

Boston, Mass., Jan. 1.-The first retirement system for State employe te be established in this country was ptit into effect in Massachusetts to day. The new system, which was cre ated by an act of the legislature lasyear, is not in reality a pension sy: tem, but a plan for compulsory assis insurance for public employes.

Heretofore State nensions have bee raid only to special classes, such a teachers, policemen and firemen. I is now undertaken to grant retiremen payments to practically every persoon the pay roll of the Commonwealt' whether employed in the direct se vice of the State or the metropolita district service, who regularly give his whole time to that service. Ce tain high officials are excluded, suc as the governor under special acts.

The retirement fund is made up i part of State contributions, with as sessments upon the employes amoun ing to not less than 1 and not morthan 5 per cent of their wages, as th anministrative board, headed by th State treasurer, shall determine. Th funds are to be placed at interes with a semi-annual compounding, an when a person retires the amount tha the fund will yield is equaled by a cor cribution from the State. The total of the annuity or pension is not t exceed half of the wages pad at th time of retirement, but it shall in p case be less ban \$200. Employes ma retire at the age of sixty, and the must retire at seventy. Employes wh have served continuously for third five years may retire or be retired gardiess of age.

NEW YEAR'S RECEPTION

ANNUAL APPAIR AT THE WHITE HOUSE ONE OF THE MOST BRILLIANT IN HISTORY.

Pleasing Than at Handshaking Today

Washington, D. C., Jan., 1 .- The House, which for nearly a century has answered as the curtain raiser of the Washington season, was held function as brilliant and spectacular as in any previous year. The recepexecutive mansion swung wide for all the world. All the people whether of aigh or low degree, were welcomed and afforded the opportunity personally to greet both the President and Mrs. Taft. Thousands embraced the opportunity.

The distinguishing feature of thi reception was the extraordinarily arge number of newcomers among the foreign diplomats. The represenatives of the foreign powers were as isual given precedence. The Austrian ambassador. Baron Hengelmuller who is the dean of the diplomatic orps, was absent, being unable to ils place at the head of the line. He s now on his way here from Europe. Other notable absentees among the foreign ambassadors and ministers vere M. Jusseran, the French am cassdor, and the Minister Loudon of be Netherlands, both of whom left

The notable newcomers among the oreign diplomats included George Bakhenties, the new mahassaodr rom Russia; Dominicio da Gama, the new Brazilfan ambassador: Dr. Carlo L. de Penna, the new minister from Truguay; M. Havenith, the new minster from Belgium, and Ricarde trias, the new representative of the lepublic of Panama.

A full half hour was given over to he reception of the diplomats, and he scene as they passed through the led and Blue rooms to the East Room vas a most brilliant one.

Following the diplomatic corps, the nembers of the Supreme Court of he United States, headed by Chief ustice White, were received by the resident and Mrs Taft. ENGLAND HURRIES TROOPS TO PERSIA

British Cruiser Lands Infantry in Consequence of Attack on Consul.

Bushire, Persia, Dec. 31.-The Brit ish Government has lost no time in sending troops to Persia. It was the expressed intention of the Governmen' to increase the number of Indiar troops employed in Southern Persia to protect the British consulates and the rade routes. Quick action, however was considered necessary by the re cent attack near Kazeron by Kashga' ribesmen on the British Consul, W. A Smart, while being escorted to hir post at Shiraz by a detachment of In dian Sowars. The British protected cruiser Fox arrived here last evening and landed 169 men of the Indian in fantry against possible contingencies Further details have been received

COMPENSATION FOR EMPLOYES

POSTAL OFFICIAL WOULD ENACT LAW COVERING INJURIES SUSTAINED IN DUTY.

Report Says Cost in the Cities, In cluding Collection Expenses, Was

Nearly \$33,000,000. Washington, D. C., Jan. 1.-The en actment of a law to compensate all postal employes, including the letter

carriers, for injuries sustained in the line of duty, but not attributable to their own negligence, is urged in the annual report of C. P. Grandfield First Assistant Postmaster General submitted to Postmaster General Hitchcock yesterday.

There were in operation June 30 last, 59,237 postoffices of all classes n the United States. The postal city lelivery service is now in operation n 1,541 cities, serving more than 46, 100,000 people, and on the 42,000 rural routes 20,000,000 people receive mail. This leaves a considerable por tion of the American people, most of whom reside in towns and villages the report declares, "without any form of free delivery service, and unier the present laws there is no way by which the department can relieve

this inequality." The cost of free delivery in cities, including collection expenses, was nearly \$33,000,000, or more than 18 per cent of the gross revenue of the city delivery offices.

Mr. Grandfield calls special atten tion to the fact that during the last fiscal year "the gross revenue of the lepartment more than equaled the expenditures and the postal service is ince 1883."

"In two years," he adds, "the enormous deficit of \$17,500,000 has been turned into a surplus." The o \$237,879,824, the expenditures to vented a heavy loss. \$237,648,927, leaving a surplus of \$219,118 after deducting \$11,799 ac count of loss of postal funds by fire

and burglary. The operation of the law which pro wides for the promotion automatically of clerks in postoffices has brought about a condition, says Mr. Grandfield that ought to be remedied immediate ly since there are now 237 officer where the salary of the assistan postmasfer is actually less than that of the clerks under him.

FIERCE FIGHT IN PROGRESS

REVOLUTIONISTS ATTACK HAN KOW WHICH IS OCCUPIED BY IMPERIAL TROOPS.

IMPERIALISTS ARE PLEASED

They Believe As Result of Attack They May Ignore Result of National Convention.

Pekin, Jan. 1 — An army of tour thousand revolutionary troops atacked the city of Hankow vesterday evening. An imperalist army estimated to number thirty thousand men occupied the city. A flerce fight is

now in progress According to a report current the government circles, the leaders of the imperalists are delighted at the outbreak of hostilities, as this will give them an opportunity of avoiding the result of the National Convention agreed to by the executive of the imperial court, and by representatives to the peace conference at Shankhai By the terms of the agreement the delegations from all the provinces of China are to meet and decide the future form of government for China and imperalitis are of the opinion that the National Convention is liable to culminate in the victory of the Republican party.

Hankow was the scene of severfighting between the two armies on several occasions before the recent armistice was decided upon.

Of course the first day of 1912 will be Monday. April and July follow suit. February and August will start on Thursday March and November come in on riday. May will be the only month leginning on Wednesday; June will start on Saturday; Septem-ber and December on Sunday; October on Tuesday.

Almanac makers and people whose specialty is measuring time and "unwinding the eternal dances of the midnight sky," tell us that the length of daylight differs according to its location. Thus, New York's longest day is fifteen hours. London has sixteen and one-half hours. Spitzber-gen has three and a half months. Quito on the equator has its day

and night equally divided.

Reduced to simple numbers, we say that all years contain three hundred and sixty live days. And unless one is a time specialist one would say that all years begin the first day of January. It depends on what kind of year is considered. The lunar year for example, has three hundred and fifty-hour days, eight hours, fortyeight minutes, and thirty-six seconds In this year the moon makes a jour ney around the earth twelve times As you will readily see, the lunar year is eleven days shorter than the solar year. The Jews make their calculations on this year. It is their period of time. They undertake to correct this defect by adding a thirteenth month of thirty days every third year; but this does not bring their year up to the solar, by three days. Those the compute by solar time say that it consists of three hundred and sixty five days. The exact time is three hundred and sixty-five days, five hours, forty-eight minutes and forty-six seconds. The result of this showed a long time ago that every four years civil time became faster than solar time by the amount stated. To be exact this as only a small faction of e man who is a sticker for s little hairs will tell you this little bit figured up considerably in the course of centuries. After twelve hundred years of this time had been consumed an Italian astronomer Aloysius Lilius, discovered that the error amounted to ten days. That is, civil time was ten days before the


