TO TRY PHYSICIAN FOR WIFE MURDER

Oregon, Ill., Jan. 10.—Intense interest is manifested in this section in the approaching trial of Dr. Harry Edwin Webster, the young Chicago physician who is charged with having murdered his wife and thrown her body into a lonely ravine in the southwestern part of this county on September 16, last. It is expected the case will come to trial in the Ogle county court next week, though the defense will make a hard fight for a continuance.

Webster's case is one of the most interesting in the criminal annals of northern Illinois. The young man was reared in this section and his youth held forth every promise of a bright future. His ambition to secure a medical education was fulfilled through the assistance of his parents and sisters, who denied themselves in order that he might have the money necessary to go through a Chicago medical college.

The victim of the murder, Mrs. Besie Kent Webster, is said to have been the third wife of the young physician. In 1904, at Racine, Wis., he is said to have married Miss May D. Gaff, a young Chicago woman who later divorced him for desertion and cruelty. A year ago this month Dr. Webster married Miss Zoe Varney of Cedar Rapids, Ia. The same week according to the facts brought to light by the police investigation, he secretly married Miss Besie Kent, a young nurse whom he met in the Chicago hospital in which he was serving as an interne.

His love for his second wife, Mrs. Zoe Varney Webster, is believed to have furnished the motive for his desire to rid himself of the third wife. His term of service as an interne was about finished and it was his intention to join his second wife and establish himself in the practice of his profession.

On the morning of September 16, he is alleged to have lured Mrs. Besie Kent Webster away from Chicago on the pretext that he wished her to meet his parents who resided near the town of Dixon. Arriving at Dixon the couple drove away in an automobile and that was the last time the young woman was seen alive. Some days later her body was found concealed in a ravine. The victim had met death through a knife wound in the back of the neck which the medical examiners declared could have been inflicted only by a person having a knowledge of surgery. There was evidence that the young woman was drugged before she was killed.

The discovery of the body led to the arrest a few days later of the husband of the victim. Following his arrest Dr. Webster is said to have admitted the murder, but later he denied that he had made any confession. In view of the strong evidence against him it is generally believed that the defense will make a plea of insanity.

Brothers, 200 Years Dead, Are Summoned to Court.
The sons of William Penn will be solemnly summoned to appear in the common pleas court in Philadelphia in the case against R. W. Birdsell for ground rent. The Penn brothers, John and William, have been dead 200 years.

When they fail to answer, judgment will be recorded against them. It is all the result of necessary legal red tape growing out of an oversight in 1769, when the state wiped out the Penn ground rents.

PALATIAL HOTEL OPENS IN NEW YORK CITY

New York, Jan. 10.—With the opening today of the new Vanderbilt Hotel another was added to the long list of palatial hosteries for which New York is famous the world over. The hotel, which is of the skyscraper type, occupies the site of the old Vanderbilt residence at Thirty-fourth street and Park avenue.

So far as the exterior of the building is concerned it closely resembles their structures of the same general class, but inside the hotel is said to set a new high mark for costliness and luxury. The interior fittings alone cost three-quarters of a million dollars. In every salon of the hotel there is an oil painting copy of some old master. The rugs and carpets cost about \$200,000 and the furniture is all of the new glass top pattern, with satin or linen scarfs beneath the glass.

The structure is declared to be absolutely fireproof. There is not a bit of wood in the construction. The bedroom floors are all concrete and the baseboards are marble. The doors, window frames and sashes are steel. There are no wall papers used in the decorations, the corridors being all of stone, and the walls of the rooms painted and paneled.

The owner of the building is A. G. Vanderbilt. He is not interested in the management of the hotel, though he has reserved one entire floor for the use of his bride and himself when they are in the city.

Fads and Fashions

New York, Jan. 8.—The extensive use of furs is by far the most striking feature of the present day fashions. Paris has decreed that fur is to be used even more lavishly this season than last and this command is being unprotestingly obeyed. The use of velvet, chiffon and silks combined with fur assures a winter of rich and becoming costumes. Fur trimming appears on the richest satins, velvets and brocades, adorns the flimsiest laces and tulle and may even be noticed upon the flowing negligee.

If one can afford to be extravagant, a coat suit of fur would not be conspicuous. Mole skin or baby lamb will be the fur chosen for this costume, but if grace is desired other material must be selected. There are, however, models in which the supple furs are used in considerable quantity and with very good effect. These are combined with velvet, satin or chiffon of the same tone in color which offsets the contrast in material.

Sometimes a soft dull blue, rose or violet is introduced to relieve the neutral tone. Any of these colors harmonizes exquisitely with the taupe. A handsome suit of this class had a short-waisted coat, buttoned straight up the front to the throat, a close fitting peplum was slashed up to the girdle on the left side where a large buckle of dull blue cloth embroidered in silver finished the girdle. The same coloring and material appeared upon the collar, cuffs and buttons. This coat was worn over a dress of taupe velvet and chiffon with touches of blue and silver about the bodice. A deep band of moleskin lined the bottom of the skirt.

There are delightful models of taupe satin trimmed with black velvet or black and white combinations of any material. Usually this is applied in bands, being far too expensive to be used lavishly. A frock of black velvet and satin had a real lace collar edged with ermine. This was an exceptionally successful dress. Bands of ermine are often used on evening frocks, but a dark fur usually proves more effective. On the deep purple and mulberry velvets skunk is used in great profusion. Mole skin also combines well with these velvets.

Furs are not only used for entire toilettes, coats, capes, neck pieces and for trimming frocks and bodices, wraps and coats but are equally popular as trimming in millinery. Both the long and the short haired varieties are in use. Skunk is perhaps the most popular. Imitation seal is frequently seen, and ermine and mole are much used; in addition to real seal on high class models. Skunk and opossum are employed in wide and narrow bands, the narrower bands being used like a fringe on the edge of the brim and to outline the edges of loops or donkey ears of velvet, lace, maline, etc. Frequent use is made of a narrow roll of skunk, opossum, mole or ermine around the crown, with a flat bow of the same fur at one side of the crown.

Not only are small turbans and close fitting hats shown in fur of all kinds, but large trimmed models are entirely covered with one of the short-haired furs. In the very large picture shapes are crown and upper brim are covered with seal, moleskin or ermine, while the under brim is faced with velvet, silk maline, lace or some such material.

A French model with broad brim and low, round crown had the crown and upper side of the brim covered with imitation seal, while the under brim was faced with cerise colored velvet. Gold roses with cerise velvet hearts formed the only trimming. Many models are shown with crown of fur and a flange of the same edging the brim. In addition to such furs as seal, mole, beaver, ermine, skunk, opossum, fox, lynx, etc., the more novel furs like raccoon, leopard skin and civet cat are also being employed.

Fur, combined with gold or silver lace, is an attractive combination. Velvet hats show the crown covered with gold lace, or an edge of lace will be applied on either the upper or the under side of the brim, while a band of fur may be passed around the crown and edge loops of velvet ribbon or ears of heavy lace, velvet, satin or other material.

The white or ecru lace which is used for hats is usually of the heaviest variety, such as Macret, Venice, Irish, etc., while the black laces are favored in the lightest varieties, such as Chantilly and the shadow laces. A large French model in black velvet had a flounce of black shadow lace gathered around the base of the crown, permitting the edge to fall over the brim. Around the base of the crown was a narrow strip of skunk while a second strip encircled the upper side of the brim midway between the crown and the edge. At the side was a bunch of black paradise aigrettes.

There is a return to favor of the heavy weight of lace or net and its variations. Cream and ecru shades prevail, and about an equal proportion of light and heavy laces are seen in the combination. Lace will be used for the best evening dresses. Several tones will be used together as well as several kinds of lace. Blond lace in half heavy meshes will be worn. A most lovely evening Princess gown recently seen was made with the top of cream maline lace. The tunic was an extension of the same, and this was over a flesh pink Chantilly lace, which in turn was put over a black chiffon skirt. Everything was in points. The tunic was cut in points finished with tassels, and the train fell in two points at the side and had black tassels. Imitation laces are now made with such perfection of skill as almost to equal the design and make best adapted to your needs.

Irish crochet and filet lace waists, or crochet combined with hand embroidery, have been worn with the dressy velvet suits. These waists are quite a departure from the all over Irish crochet models previously seen, as the filet and French embroidery on batiste are used in about the same proportion as the crochet in working out the garment. These combinations are most effective, as the designs are worked out in a way to show off the different patterns to the best advantage. Other novelty lace waists for wear with the two-piece suit have a cutaway coat effect beginning at the side-front. Dresden ribbon in suit colored frequently finishes off the revers, belt and cuffs.

Stray Topics From Little Old New York

New York, Jan. 8.—During the week after Christmas three men wanted by the authorities for various misdemeanors surrendered to the police of this city. Whether it was the opening effect of Christmas thoughts which awakened their conscience or some other reason which prompted them, is not known, but it is a strange coincidence that the three malefactors surrendered, for the sake of their minds, within a few days from Christmas. The first to give himself up was Andrew McConnell, founder of the "Universal Science," who had shot his wife at Ocean Grove, N. J., a few days before. The man, who is evidently insane, was divorced from his wife in July and shot her because he believed she was conspiring to have him placed in an insane asylum. His wife was not dangerously wounded.

The next one to surrender was John Felding, former cashier of the Northwestern Gas, Light & Coke Co. of that city, who walked into police headquarters the other day and confessed that he had stolen \$4000 of the company's money in August of 1910. He said that his conscience troubled him so much that he could not sleep and was unable to find any peace of mind at any time.

The third to surrender was a young man who had been implicated in a murder in this city in February, 1908, had been arrested at the time and placed under bond, but had jumped his bail and left the city. Troubled by his conscience, he telephoned to the nearest police station and asked that an officer be sent to the saloon where he was at the time to arrest him. He was promptly accommodated.

Within the next few weeks the loop on the Long Island City plaza of the Queensboro Bridge is likely to be completed, and the Third Avenue surface cars will then run from Manhattan across the new bridge into Long Island City and return by way of the new loop. Bridge Commissioner O'Keefe has set January 15 as the probable date for the completion of this work, and officials of the Third Avenue line say they are ready, and on short notice will put the new line into operation. This will be the first direct transit between Manhattan and Queens ever put in operation.

The recent identification of several burglars in this city by means of fingerprints which they wear incautiously to have behind them has evidently taught a lesson to other members of their profession. There have been several burglaries here lately, the perpetrators of which were cautious enough to wear gloves so as to leave no fingerprints which they might be identified. If the bur-

Fifty-seven men who were chosen to various offices in Bergen County, N. J., at the last election will not be allowed to serve because they failed to file with the county clerk a certificate and oath of their election expenses, as demanded by the new election-law. Not only will the offices be vacant, but the men who had been neglecting their duty under the law

may even be indicted and tried for their offence. The list includes a number of rather prominent officials, but most of them are men who had been elected for minor offices.

And still they come. Martin Beck, head of the Orpheum circuit of vaudeville theatres in the middle and far West, has made the announcement that he is going to build a magnificent new playhouse in the heart of New York's theatrical district. Negotiations for the property, which is on the corner of Broadway and Forty-seventh street have already been concluded. The new structure, it is stated, will cost about \$5,500,000 and is to be equipped as a first class show house.

According to complete figures compiled in the office of the Interborough Rapid Transit Company for the six days of the week proceeding Christmas the company carried on its elevated and Subway lines a total of 11,952,282 passengers. This absolutely beat all records for any six days in the history of the company, not excepting the days of the Hudson-Fulton celebration, when the city was crowded with strangers. It is quite remarkable that, although the capacity of the various lines was taxed to the very limit, there were practically no blockades at any time and the number of accidents insignificantly small.

CORN NOT NECESSARY AS A HOG FEED

Wichita Falls, Texas, Jan. 10, 1912.

To the Editor of the Times
On January 4th there appeared in "The Corn Belt Farm Daily" of St. Louis an advertisement signed by a gentleman whose address is Wichita Falls, offering lots of 200 or more fine pigs and giving as his reason— "Loss of corn crop reasons for selling." Yesterday we received the following letter from Mr. J. W. Allison, Ennis, Texas, one of the celebrated hog raisers of Texas.

"The day is long past when the loss of a corn crop means disaster to any feeder in the cotton belt, for in meal and hulls he has got a better hog feed than corn even at the price it commands in good crop years. Let him make a mixture of 100 lbs. Cotton Seed Meal \$1.60 100 lbs. Cotton Seed Hulls .50 100 lbs. Corn chops 1.50

300 lbs. Mixed Feed - \$3.60 or if they can be bought as cheap or any cheaper he can substitute for the corn chops a rice bran, wheat bran, middlings or oats. Wet this mixture thoroughly and let it sour. At the time of feedings thin to about the consistency of buttermilk, and give the hogs all they can clean up. This makes the cheapest, safest and best ration for hogs in the world, and will give more growth, fat, lean meat and better pork than any amount of corn and at less cost. If he don't believe it, send him down here and I'll show him the hogs eating every day, only I use rice bran instead of corn chops. Of course he would like to sell 50 pound pigs at \$4.00 each—so would I, but not because we have no corn, but because I get meal and hulls, and by the use of it can grow better pigs and cheaper pigs than any corn raiser can."

It can be seen from the foregoing that no hog raiser in this section should give up because of the corn crop failure, in fact he has a better hog feed in meal and hulls even if he had a good corn crop.

Why the Price of Everything Has Risen

By Professor CHARLES GIDE of University of Paris

The cause of such universal effects must also be UNIVERSAL, and what is more universal than GOLD as a recognized instrument of mutual exchange, common to all people?

The output of gold, which was only 500,000,000 francs (\$100,000,000) in 1882-3, is at present two milliards and a half (\$500,000,000), and during the last twenty years over THIRTY MILLIARDS OF FRANCS (\$6,000,000,000) IN GOLD COIN HAS BEEN PUT INTO CIRCULATION. This amount represents only one part of the total output, another good share having gone into the vaults of the banks as a guarantee for paper money issued.

THE ONLY REMARKABLE THING IN THE PRESENT CASE IS THAT, OWING TO THE GREAT DEVELOPMENT OF INDUSTRY AND EXCHANGE, PRICES HAVE ONLY INCREASED FROM 20 TO 25 PER CENT, WHILE THEY MIGHT HAVE INCREASED TENFOLD HAD THE AMOUNT OF CURRENCY NOW IN CIRCULATION BEEN PUT ON THE MARKET A CENTURY AGO.
