The city will finish that project in the next couple of weeks. A big "thank you" to all of the city workers involved in the project. We have had a couple of meetings with an investor and contractor out of Clovis, working on the possibility of condos or twin homes being built on that property. We are positive that this will happen in the future but at this time no specific agreements have been made. We are still in the discussion process. 3) Police Department: Police Chief Mooney was busy along with all police officers. There were 85 warnings and 38 citations issued. There were 7 arrests made in June. Overall, there were 200 calls made to the police department requesting service from policemen on call at the time. Chief Mooney and all of the officers do a great job for the citizens of Friona.

1) Water: We asked our city engineer to perform a study on Friona's water supply and give us a good estimate on how many years supply we have. After an extensive study we know today that we have a water supply of approximately 40 years. The city council will be making some decisions on Friona water and I will inform you as those decisions are made.

The city is asking for bids to replace the top of the north water tank. It is in need of repair and plans are to replace the top around October. More information to come in the future on our water supply. In June we pumped 25,323,100 gallons of water. We sold 21,491,000 gallons of water and billed 4) Municipal Court: Judge Campbell was also very busy. There were 81 new cases filed in June and 33 trials by judge. There was \$8,406.47 collected in fines for June. The motto is, "You do the crime, you will pay the fine." Judge Campbell is working hard on getting all of the fines collected and issuing warrants for arrest if not paid. Thanks to Judge Campbell for her dedication.

5) Volunteer Fire Department: They were called out 7 times in June for fires. These were small fires that were handled very quickly. Thanks to all of the volunteers that are there when we need them. They do great work.

6) EMS: The ambulance was called out 19 times in June. There were six calls made to 911 and 11 calls for transfers. The other two calls were non-transfers. There was \$9,558.23 trons visiting the library in June. Darla Bracken and all of the staff do great work in servicing the citizens of Friona. We will continue to support Darla and the needs of the library.

8) Prairie Acres/Heritage Estates: There are currently 45 residents at Prairie Acres and 12 residents at Heritage Estates. Billy Ray Johnston and Staff have done a great job keeping the home a great place for our family members to call their home. We will continue to support Billy Ray and his needs to make Prairie Acres a great place for our family members to live. 9) Patricia, Chief Mooney, and I met with the American Red Cross to begin our planning on getting some approved Red Cross facilities designated in case we have a catastrophe like a tornado. We had good participation from four area churches that have training to all volunteers so we can be ready to act and know what to do and where to go when needed.

We will designate a storage place to hold approximately 200 cots, blankets and accessories so we will be able to quickly respond to ones needs. Once this process is completed we will inform and educate all citizens of Friona on what facilities will be available and where to go for shelter, food, and water. We are excited to team up with Red Cross and get this plan in place. We want to thank them for their cooperation and assistance in this endeavor. I would like to take this opportunity to thank Patricia Phipps and what she does for the city of Friona. She does a great job and we are very fortunate to have a City Manager that is very knowledgeable and makes good decisions for "you" the citizens of Friona.

more citizens (taxpayers) leave it does not take an economics professor to figure out that at some point they will be underfunded.



# Sneak It In

"I just don't have time." One of the biggest reasons we don't add fitness to our daily routines is busy lives. The ultimate goal is not to be a Shape or an Iron Man magazine model; the goal should be physical fitness. Being physically fit means to be in a state of health and well-being and is defined as the body's ability to function efficiently and effectively in work and leisure activities, to resist disease and to react to emergency situations. Blood pressure, heart rate, weight, girth measurements, body composition and oxygen consumption should be within healthy ranges.

"Melanie, you aren't listening to me... I don't have time!" I hear ya, but I'm gonna keep pressing you to find some time during your day for mini workouts. Why? Because I've learned firsthand how much better you will feel, how much more energy you will have, and how much stress you can burn off with exercise. I want you to have these things! So here are some suggestions to sneaking in exercise in your day:

- Ten minute walk before work or right after breakfast, ten minute walk at lunch and another ten minute walk after dinner. Maximize those walks--carry hand weights and while you walk do biceps curls, triceps extensions, lateral/front raises, shoulder

presses, lunges and squats.

- Commercials are golden! Pick three or four exercises (cardio, upper body, lower body, and an ab move). They could be pushups, lunges, squats, crunches, planks, Burpees, jump rope, any kind of strength training exercises, stability ball exercises, resistance band exercises, etc. During commercials, hop up outta that easy chair and do 8-12 reps of each one. In an hour, you will have gotten in at least 20 minutes of exercise. Add that to your ten minute walks-and boom!-you've basically got an hour of exercise in for the day.
- At work, park as far away as possible from your door. Keep some hand weights at your desk, take one minute every hour and do some arm exercises. (You may feel goofy at first, but once your coworkers see your guns start to pop out, it won't feel so goofy!)
- In your chair, you can march in place, do leg extensions, and ankle circles all while working at that keyboard.



# **USDA gives CRP sign-up results**

Vilsack announced that the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) will accept 1.7 million acres offered under the 45th Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) general sign-up. The Department received nearly 28,000 offers on more than 1.9 million acres of land, demonstrating CRP's continuing appeal as one of our nation's most successful voluntary programs for soil, water, and wildlife conservation. Under Vilsack's leadership, USDA has enrolled nearly 12 million acres in new CRP contracts since 2009. Currently, there are more than 26.9 million acres enrolled on 700,000 contracts.

"For 27 years, lands in CRP have helped to conserve our nation's resources and played a part in mitigating climate change," said Vilsack. "American farmers and ranchers continue to recognize the importance of protecting our nation's most environmentally sensitive land by enrolling in CRP. As the commodities produced by our farmers and ranchers continue to perform strongly in the marketplace - supporting one out of every twelve jobs here in the United States - it is no surprise that American producers continue to recognize the importance

Agriculture Secretary Tom of protecting our nation's most environmentally sensitive land by enrolling in CRP."

> In addition to today's announcement, over the last four years, USDA has set aside significant acreage under CRP's Continuous enrollment programs to target habitat conservation on especially important lands. For example, in March, 2012, President Obama dedicated 1 million acres of CRP to Continuous Enrollment Programs to conserve wetlands, grasslands and wildlife.

This year, farmers and ranchers have already offered more than 370,000 acres under Continuous CRP signup, a figure that is impressive given that the lack of a Farm Bill extension last fall jobs. meant that CRP enrollment only reopened this spring in May. Lack of a comprehensive Farm Bill this year has resulted in uncertainty for achieving further enrollment objectives under continuous CRP. CRP is a voluntary program that allows eligible landowners to receive annual rental payments and cost-share assistance to establish long-term, resourceconserving covers on eligible farmland throughout the duration of their 10 to 15 year contracts. Under CRP, farmers and ranchers plant grasses and trees

in fields and along streams or rivers. The plantings prevent soil and nutrients from washing into waterways, reduce soil erosion that may otherwise contribute to poor air and water quality, and provide valuable habitat for wildlife. In 2012, CRP helped to reduce nitrogen and phosphorous losses from farm fields by 605 million pounds and 121 million pounds respectively. CRP has restored more than two million acres of wetlands and associated buffers and reduces soil erosion by more than 300 million tons per year. CRP also provides \$2.0 billion annually to landownersdollars that make their way into local economies, supporting small businesses and creating

In addition, CRP sequesters more carbon dioxide than any other conservation program in the country, and also reduces both fuel and fertilizer use. Year-

ly, CRP results in carbon sequestration equal to taking almost 10 million cars off the road.

USDA selected offers for enrollment based on an Environmental Benefits Index (EBI) comprised of five environmental factors plus cost. The five environmental factors are: (1) wildlife enhancement, (2) water quality, (3) soil erosion, (4) enduring benefits, and (5) air quality.

# **Ogallala Aquifer Initiative Widely Used** by Farmers to Improve Water Application

LUBBOCK, TEXAS, July 18, 2013 -No one has a greater stake in conserving water than those who depend on it for their livelihood, and Texas farmers and ranchers on the Panhandle and South Plains regions are no exception.

Four years ago, in response to declining water levels of the Ogallala Aquifer, the Natural **Resources Conservation Service** (NRCS) in Texas launched the Ogallala Aquifer Initiative (OAI) program in an effort to assist producers in addressing water quantity and quality concerns. The initiative has helped landowners improve irrigation systems and enhance the economic viability of cropland located above the aquifer. It also can offer opportunities to convert to non-irrigated production.

"The Ogallala Aquifer Initiative provides farmers and ranchers with technical assistance and financial assistance

to support water and energy savings through proven conservation programs," said Mark Hall, NRCS Farm Bill program specialist in Lubbock. "More producers in Texas are applying advanced irrigation water management technologies to monitor crop demand and prevent overwatering."

Currently, over 151,000 acres are enrolled in the initiative for more than \$23 million.

OAI is administered through the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP). The Gruhlkey brothers, a young farming trio from Deaf Smith County, have built their operation to almost 2,000 acres. They recently obtained funding from the OAI to convert 100 acres from row water irrigation to a micro subsurface drip system.

"The program provided the resources to help us install the best system for water use and efficiency. Our reward came at

harvest with 240 bushel corn in one of driest years on record. In a normal year with 18 inches of rain, I might be able to save 20 percent on water use with this system," said Braden Gruhlkey.

Through the combination of using low energy precision spray application on center pivot sprinklers and no-till and strip till methods, the Gruhlkeys' have reduced evaporation, conserved soil moisture, maintained ground cover, prevented soil erosion and improved air quality.

The Gruhlkey brothers produce corn, cotton, wheat, sorghum seed and sorghum silage. Braden said they plan to install more drip irrigation systems because drip irrigation offers them a tool to grow crops with less water and input costs.

With Texas currently experiencing one of the worst droughts in history, producers like the Gruhkeys are accelerating water savings of the Ogallala Aquifer. .




