






YEARS OLD TODAY

Sketch of the Career of Iowa's Asple ant For the Presidency

Washington, D. C., Feb. 15 .- Birthday congratulations were a order to day for the latest of the Republican

Cummins, United States Schitor from lowa. Senator Cummins was born sixty-two years ago in the town of Carmichaels, Pa. In early youth he followed his father' trade of carpentering and with the money thus earned he was able to take a two years' course at Waynesburg College. After leaving college he worked for several years as a railroad surveyor. He must have been a pretty good man at the business for he was offered position as chief engineer of one of the Western railroads. But the future senator had already determined upon the law as a profession and

at the age of twenty-three he laid aside his tripod and became a studen! n a Chicago law office. Mr. Cummins did not become a res

lent of the State that later was to nake him governor and United States enator until 1878, when he removed rom Chicago to Des Moines and formed a law partnership with his brother. Before many years had passed he had established his reputation as one of the ablest lawyers in the Hawkeye State.

Ten years after his arrival in lows Mr. Cummins was elected to the State legislature. He was elected as an independent candidate, which was not a very common thing in those days. He voted with the Republicans on all matters, excepting prohibition He was a believer in high license, as a more practical temperance meas ure than prohibition, and subsequent legislation seems to have approved his judgment, for high license with local option now appears to be the settled policy of Iowa

When John H. Gear, known as the "grand old man" of the Republican party in Iowa, was nearing the end of his long career in the United States senate, Mr. Cummins became a candidate for the toga. He was unsuccessful, but he came within three votes of election and established his place among the foremost leaders of his party. In 1901 he came out for the governorship. It was Cummins against the field. He stumped the State and won in the convention o 1.600 delegates by a majority of eighteen. He served his first tern and was re-elected. During his ad ministration and under his leadership the reform movement made great headway in Iowa. As a candidate for a third term, with "Reform" as his campaign slogan, he swept the State with an old time majority that made him master of the party.

In 1908 Mr. Cummins was elected to serve out the unexpired term of William B. Allison in the United States senate. He was re-elected to the full term the next year. When the tariff agitation was renewed ce 980. after he entered the senate. Mr. Cummins stood up and said things which started what became known as the 'Iowa idea." The idea meant a re duction of tariff on monopolized pro ducts. La Follette and others took up the idea and made much of it, but it was Cummins who originated it. Close friends and admirers of M: Cummins believe that the "progressive" movement, as the "lowa idea" has come to be known, may sweep the Senator into the White House They believe that on a show-down he could poll greater strength among the progressive Rephblicans than Senator La Follette. The Cummins policy in regards to the leading issues of the day may fairly be defined as a mean between the views o President Taft and those of Senator La Follette, a little more advanced than the former and at the same time not so radical as the last named. ACTS Senator Cummins believes in reform but he does not believe that the prop er way to remedy the existing condi tion of things is to destroy the cor porations and make war on the rail oads. In a speech delivered before the Roosevelt Club_ in Denver some ome 16 years ago he expressed his views on Britte the subject of reform as follows: "Do not fear the title of reformer but put the true meaning upon the word. The reformer who destroys is the enemy of mankind. The reform er whose cry is "march on" is the benefactor of his race. In a country like ours, whose foundation stones were laid by the hands of patriots, and whose structure is cemented by the blood of heroes where justice and equality have been the watchwords of ur commanders, what we need is not revolution, but evolution. We need reformers who recognize that what we have is good, but that it may be better; men and women who de vote their lives not to tearing down, but to building up."
