PROPERTY OWNERS ARE ENJOINED

JUDGE MARTIN ISSUES RESTRAINING ORDER AGAINST BAWDY HOUSE OWNERS.

NEW METHOD INVOKED

If Offenders Continue Operation They Will Be Arrested for Contempt of Court.

Injunction proceedings have been restored to by City Attorney Householder in an effort to cope with the social evil as it exists in the "Flats." A few days ago Mr. Householder went before Judge Martin in the district court and secured an order restraining a score or more property owners and keepers of bawdy houses from "keeping, being concerned or being interested in keeping or aiding and abetting in keeping, or renting houses or permitting their houses to be used as bawdy houses."

Violation of this order will bring the offenders into contempt of court and they will be brought summarily before Judge Martin who will hear the contempt proceedings and assess what penalty he may think the offense deserves.

W. J. HAYNES DIES FROM WOUNDS

S. B. PARKER, FORT WORTH AND DENVER FREIGHT CONDUCTOR CHARGED WITH MURDER

TRAGEDY LAST NIGHT

Trouble Growing Out of Water Bill Said to Have Been Cause of Killing

Trouble growing out of a water bill of trivial amount resulted in the killing Wednesday night of W. J. Haynes, manager of the Haynes cotton gin and for a number of years a well known citizen of Wichita Falls, has placed S. B. Parker, a freight conductor on the Fort Worth and Denver, behind bars in the county jail under a charge of murder.

Haynes died at about one o'clock this (Thursday) morning at the Wichita Falls Sanitarium as the result of bullet wounds fired by Parker at about eight o'clock Wednesday evening. The shooting took place on the front porch of Parker's home at 510 Lamar street, where it is reported that Haynes had gone to demand that Parker apologize to his (Haynes) wife for language alleged to have been used by Parker in her presence.

Parker has declined to make any statement concerning the shooting until he has talked with his attorney who had not been employed this morning. Haynes immediately following the shooting told Sheriff Randolph that he had gone to Parker's house to demand an apology to his wife as before stated. He said he knocked on the door and made known the purpose of his visit. Parker, he said, told him he believed he could whip any man in town, to which Haynes said he differed. The fighting then started. Haynes told Sheriff Randolph and repeated the same story to others that Parker struck the first blow. He then hit Parker, and Parker struck him again, and then he pushed Parker back upon the porch and the latter drew his revolver and fired two or three times. Haynes fell to the floor of the porch and was carried to his own home where physicians, who were summoned, saw at once that his wounds were serious and he was removed to the Wichita Falls sanitarium.

Examination there disclosed the fact that he had been shot in about the center of his body, the bullet passing through the lower end of his breast bone clipping off a piece of cartilage from one of the lower ribs where it joined the breast bone. The bullet ranged slightly to the left and evidently passed through the pleural cavity and possibly a portion of the lung. Another bullet entered the iliac region just above the line of the left hip and came out at the side.

Three shots in all were fired from a thirty-eight calibre, short barreled revolver, and one of the shots evidently missed Haynes entirely, or two bullets entered the same hole at the side, as this wound was more than twice as large as the one in the middle.

Haynes retained consciousness almost to the moment of his death, and never gave up hope, although he was told that he was dying. Half an hour before his death when the doctors saw that he was sinking and could not last long, he was told that he had only a few minutes to live and was asked to make a statement, he said:

"I went to Parker's house. Parker struck me first (I was on his porch) with his fist. Then he hit me back. He talked, and then he shot me. I don't know how many times, two or three, then I fell to the floor and they came and got me."

In reply to the question "Who shot you," he answered "Parker," and later said that Parker's initials were "S.B."

ENGINE ROLLED DOWN MOUNTAIN

IT FELL THROUGH ROOF OF BANK BUILDING AND KILLED SIX PERSONS

BUILDING IS DESTROYED

All Occupants Either Killed or Injured in Accident This Morning

By Associated Press. Bingham, Utah, Feb. 15.—(Bulletin)—A locomotive attached to an ore train coming down the mountains jumped the track above this city today and breaking loose from the cars rolled down the mountain side and crashed through the roof of the Bingham State Bank, killing six persons and seriously injuring several more.

The locomotive struck the building with awful force and it was completely demolished. Every person in the building was either killed or injured.

RAILROAD OFFICIAL SERIOUSLY INJURED

C. H. Hurdleston, Division Superintendent, Probably Fatally Injured at LaGrange Today

By Associated Press. LaGrange, Texas, Feb. 15.—C. H. Hurdleston, division superintendent of the Katy, was probably fatally injured this morning when a switch engine here dashed into his inspection car. The car was badly demolished. Hurdleston's foot was severed from his leg and was found still in the shoe in the wreckage. Physicians say he has a chance for recovery. H. D. Brice and William McElroy were also seriously injured.

DAY COMES HERE TO ANSWER CHARGE

Former Secretary of Chamber of Commerce Returns to Answer Charge When He Learns of Indictment

F. H. Day, former secretary of the Chamber of Commerce against whom an indictment was returned by the grand jury at its recent session charging him with embezzlement, walked into the district court room yesterday afternoon and told Judge Martin that he was ready to answer the charge against him. Judge Martin set his bond for appearance this morning at \$500. This morning he gave Mr. Day more time in which to prepare for his trial and his bond was increased to \$1000 which was furnished by R. E. Huff, president of the Chamber of Commerce and J. A. Kemp, one of the leading members of that organization. The case continues on the docket subject to call.

DARING ROBBERY IN NEW YORK CITY

BANK MESSENGERS HELD UP IN HEART OF BUSINESS DISTRICT—\$25,000 TAKEN

THEIR TAXICAB WAS SEIZED

Driven To Spot Where An Automobile Was Waiting Into Which The Robbers Sprang

New York, Feb. 15.—Two messengers of the East River Bank were robbed of twenty-five thousand dollars at Church and Rector streets in the heart of the downtown business district this forenoon. The messengers were in a taxicab when two highwaymen sprang into it, badly injuring both messengers and escaping. They got fifteen thousand dollars in five dollar bills and ten thousand dollars in hundred dollar bills. There were three of the robbers. As the taxicab was passing along Church street skirting the Old Trinity church yard, one sprang into the chauffeur's seat, pressing a pistol in his overcoat pocket against the chauffeur's side, forcing him to drive rapidly without outcry. The other two sprang inside the taxi belaboring the messengers, William Smith and Frank Wardell over the heads with their revolvers. Smith, who is sixty years of age was bleeding and almost unconscious. Wardell was painfully hurt. At Park Place the highwaymen jumped from the taxi, carrying the money in a tin box and like a flash jumped into a big black automobile, which was apparently awaiting for them and the maze traffic quickly swallowed up their machine.

DR. SUN YAT SEN HAS RESIGNED

NANKING IS MADE CAPITAL

New President Was Chosen By a Unanimous Vote of the National Council

By Associated Press. Nanking, Feb. 15.—Dr. Sun Yat Sen has resigned the presidency of the Republic of China. His resignation has been accepted by the National Assembly on condition that he and his cabinet remain in office until his successor is elected. He resigns in favor of Yuan Shi Kai.

YUAN SHI KAI ELECTED

Nanking, Feb. 15.—Yuan Shi Kai this afternoon was unanimously elected president of China by the National Assembly, succeeding Dr. Sun. The assembly has declared Nanking the provisional capital.

SEN. CUMMINS 62 YEARS OLD TODAY

Sketch of the Career of Iowa's Aspirant For the Presidency

Washington, D. C., Feb. 15.—Birth-day congratulations were in order today for the latest of the "Republican presidential aspirants"—Albert Blair Cummins, United States senator from Iowa. Senator Cummins was born sixty-two years ago in the town of Carmichael, Pa. In early youth he followed his father's trade of carpentering and with the money thus earned he was able to take a two years course at Waynesburg College. After leaving college he worked for several years as a railroad surveyor. He must have been a pretty good man at the business for he was offered a position as chief engineer of one of the Western railroads. But the future senator had already determined upon the law as a profession and at the age of twenty-three he laid aside his tripod and became a student in a Chicago law office.

Mr. Cummins did not become a resident of the State that later was to make him governor and United States senator until 1878, when he removed from Chicago to Des Moines and formed a law partnership with his brother. Before many years had passed he had established his reputation as one of the ablest lawyers in the Hawkeye State.

Ten years after his arrival in Iowa Mr. Cummins was elected to the State legislature. He was elected as an independent candidate, which was not a very common thing in those days. He voted with the Republicans on all matters, excepting prohibition. He was a believer in high license, as a more practical temperance measure than prohibition, and subsequent legislation seems to have approved his judgment, for high license with local option now appears to be the settled policy of Iowa.

When John H. Gear, known as the "grand old man" of the Republican party in Iowa, was nearing the end of his long career in the United States senate, Mr. Cummins became a candidate for the toga. He was unsuccessful, but he came within three votes of election and established his place among the foremost leaders of his party. In 1901 he came out for the governorship. It was Cummins against the field. He stumped the State and won in the convention of 1,600 delegates by a majority of eighteen. He served his first term and was re-elected. During his administration and under his leadership the reform movement made great headway in Iowa. As a candidate for a third term, with "Reform" as his campaign slogan, he swept the State with an old time majority that made him master of the party.

In 1908 Mr. Cummins was elected to serve out the unexpired term of William B. Allison in the United States senate. He was re-elected to the full term the next year. When the tariff agitation was renewed soon after he entered the senate, Mr. Cummins stood up and said things which started what became known as the "Iowa idea." The idea meant a reduction of tariff on monopolized products. La Follette and others took up the idea and made much of it, but it was Cummins who originated it.

Close friends and admirers of Mr. Cummins believe that the "progressive" movement, as the "Iowa idea" has come to be known, may sweep the Senator into the White House. They believe that on a show-down he could poll greater strength among the progressive Republicans than Senator La Follette. The Cummins policy in regards to the leading issues of the day may fairly be defined as a mean between the views of President Taft and those of Senator La Follette, a little more advanced than the former and at the same time not so radical as the last named.

Senator Cummins believes in reform but he does not believe that the proper way to remedy the existing condition of things is to destroy the corporations and make war on the railroads. In a speech delivered before the Roosevelt Club in Denver some years ago he expressed his views on the subject of reform as follows:

"Do not fear the title of reformer, but put the true meaning upon the word. The reformer who destroys is the enemy of mankind. The reformer whose cry is 'march on' is the benefactor of his race. In a country like ours, whose foundation stones were laid by the hands of patriots, and whose structure is cemented by the blood of heroes where justice and equality have been the watchwords of our commanders, what we need is not revolution, but evolution. We need reformers who recognize that what we have is good, but that it may be better; men and women who devote their lives not to tearing down, but to building up."

Among the first things to be arranged is for the dates, and it is an important matter so far as Childress is concerned that no dates in Southwest Oklahoma conflict with the Childress date. Mr. Jeffries will be instructed to act for the Childress Racing Association, and what contracts he enters into will be ratified by the association. It is to be hoped that he will arrange matters that Childress will have an extra large string of horses at the meeting next July.

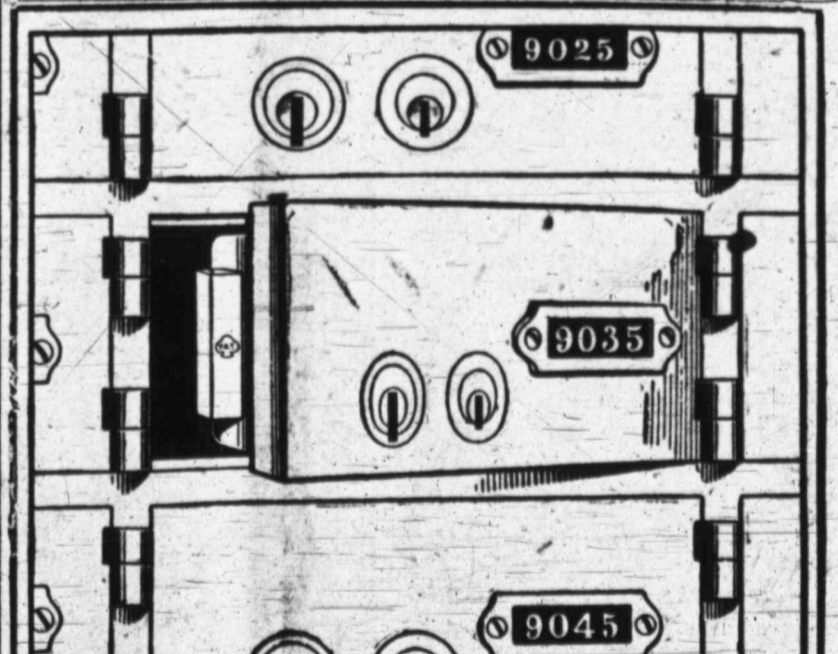

We're always losing something. This time it is our 1912 edition of the Texas Almanac, presented with the compliments of the Dallas News. It's going to be hard digging to edit the Times without it on our desk.

Plant trees and get ready to have a pretty lawn. Nothing enhances the value and attracts more attention than a well-kept lawn.

Senator Culberson has come out in favor of Wilson for president, while Senator Bailey says that if it becomes necessary he will campaign the State against Wilson. His opposition to the New Jersey Governor, it seems, is based on the fact that Wilson looks with favor upon the initiative and referendum, and the Senator says that is populist doctrine.

Of course, Texas needs many things, but nothing more than laws that criminals will have respect for. So long as we, the people, continue to elect men to fill the judgeships who seem to take more pride in picking out flimsy technicalities upon which to base reversals of verdicts in lower or trial courts, those who are murderously inclined in heart or mind will be willing to take a chance and resent the

slightest kind of an insult by taking life. It is deplorable that such a feeling should exist, but the fact that it does, and that it is encouraged by opinions handed down by the higher courts is sufficient to warn the people that the best place to begin a reform is to elect men to those positions whose opinions will have the effect of making the criminal convicted in the lower court feel that it is no longer certain he can get a reversal of his case.

Congressman Morris Sheppard has withdrawn from the senatorial race, and has issued the following letter to the Democrats of Texas, giving his reasons therefor: "I have decided to withdraw from the senatorial race. The strain of the triple task of looking after my congressional work, my fraternal work and the senatorial race, has overtaxed my strength to such an extent that I do not feel equal to the burden of the campaign about to begin. To my friends in every section of the State I return my heartfelt thanks for assurances of support. I shall retire to private life at the close of my present term in congress, with only the most pleasant memories of a decade in the public service."

This leaves the race between Randall and Wolters, both antis. Nither will prove entirely acceptable to the pros, and here's hoping Cone Johnson will get into the race.

Judging from a front page article in the Austin Tribune, the people of that city are just now beginning to get their's under the new fire insurance law, and rates have been advanced beyond all reason, right in the face of the fact that Austin people have taxed themselves to the limit in meeting the requirements of fire insurance companies in providing for better fire protection. There may be nothing in the law that is bad,—it may be good, but the men appointed by the State to construe the law seem to be more inclined to favor the insurance companies than they are to do the right thing between the people and the companies. In other words, those who have been appointed to construe the law seem to have been selected with a view of construing it in such a way as to bring disgust of the law and thereby force its repeal. It might not be a bad idea to repeal the law. It is either that, or elect people to fill State offices who are in sympathy with State laws, and who will use their best efforts in the way that it is intended—for the protection of the people, instead of a club with which to hold them up and exact extortionate, unfair and almost unheard of profits for insurance companies.

WHITE MEN DEMAND "JIM CROW" GALLOWES

Chicago, Ill., Feb. 14.—Four white men, alleged murderers, condemned to be hanged here Friday, demand a Jim Crow gallows for a negro who also is to pay the penalty of the law for murder. Every one of the white men objects to the forfeit of his life on a scaffold that holds the death drop of a black man.

The negro is Thomas Jennings, convicted on "finger print" evidence of killing Clarence Hiller, a railroad freight clerk. The white men are Ewald and Frank Shblawski, Phillip Soemmerling and Thomas Schultz, found guilty of murdering Fred Guelzow, a truck farmer.

A scaffold has been arranged so that three men may be hanged at a time. This means either one or two white men will die simultaneously with the negro. The condemned men are fighting for precedence in the execution and against a final hour association with a negro.

Double guard was placed today upon the five prisoners. Practically all hope of executive or judicial intervention has been abandoned by the men, although their cases will be considered again by the State Pardon Board today.

With only four more days apparently to live the men spent the greater part of today visiting with friends and joking among themselves. Through the jesting however, worry was evident. They were hoping against hope that their sentences will be commuted.

PATRICK HENRY'S DECLARATION

Candidate For Nomination As Representative Outlines His Platform

To the Democrats of the 101st legislative district: In announcing as candidate for the nomination as representative, in the July primary, I am not unmindful of the importance attached to my such position, and if elected, it shall be the whole of my purpose to act sincerely and honestly in every instance, and I will unreservedly support the issues as outlined in my platform which follows:

1st. If elected I shall favor and support any reasonable revision or modification of the present criminal laws of our State, whereby it shall be made impossible for the guilty to escape on technicalities. Justice demands that it shall be an easy task instead of a difficult matter to convict the guilty and vindicate the innocent.

2nd. I shall favor and actively support a measure submitting to the people of the state an opportunity to drive the licensed liquor traffic from our State.

3rd. I shall heartily favor an immediate adoption of a law closing the saloons over the State from 7 p. m. until 7 a. m.

4th. I shall favor any measure that might be presented that shall have for its purpose the elimination or modification of the evils and hardships thrust upon the people through the power of the licensed saloon and its accessories.

5th. I shall favor raising the scholastic age from 17 years to 21 years, in order that the young men and women of both the country and the city, that have to work a portion of their time, might get their just dues from our public school fund.

6th. I shall actively prepare and present a reasonable plan whereby a boy under sixteen years of age, who transgresses the law will be treated with as a boy in his formative period of development, instead of as a hardened criminal. Why should we not spend our tens of dollars in an effort to make a real man of the boy, who goes wrong early in life, instead of spending our hundreds of dollars to imprison him a few years later and make a beast of him?

7th. I shall favor the revision of our prison code, in that we shall recognize in the criminal, in prison, a man that will be turned back into society after his term is finished, and that the efforts of the State shall not be just to lock him up, but to use this opportunity also as a means to try to make a substantial citizen of him. I shall have more to say about this as the campaign progresses.

8th. I shall favor amending the election law so as to prevent fraudulent payment of poll taxes and to further protect the purity of the ballot.

9th. I shall favor a law limiting amounts to be spent in campaigns and requiring publicity both before and after elections.

10th. I shall favor all laws that will advance the interest of the farming and agricultural industries of the State.

11th. I shall be loyal to any honest effort that might be desired by the people in this district in securing any legislation that might effect us locally.

12th. I shall be glad to commit myself at any time upon any issue that might arise in this campaign.

TO PIPE GAS FROM MORAN TO ABILENE

(Abilene Reporter)

Clem A. Bouite, Commercial Agent of the Southwestern Telephone and Telegraph Company, with headquarters here, while in Cleco a few days ago, met up with one of the promoters of the pipe line from the Moran gas field to this city, and learned from him that they would have the construction of the line into Abilene well under way now in a very short while, and expected to be piping natural gas into this city by next fall.

The pipe line is already built into Albany, the county site of Shackelford county, and now the company, capitalized at \$200,000, proposes to start the line from Moran to Putnam and then strike a direct line for Baird and Abilene.

It is said one of the big oil companies own the gas wells at Moran and claims to have enough natural gas at that place to supply all of West Texas, both for fuel, power and lights.

As yet no proposition has been made Abilene and we give the item for what it is worth. They will likely have to make some arrangements with the local gas company to distribute their products for this, this company having the franchise, etc., for this city.

If the project is feasible and practical, and an abundant supply of natural gas can be obtained, it will be a great thing for Abilene.

A deal was completed yesterday through the real estate firm of Marlow & Stone by means of which W. R. Belcher of Eldorado, Okla., purchased from W. M. 

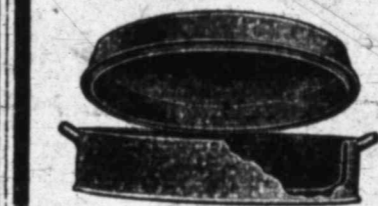
