

Copper Company Will Drill With Rotary-Citizen's Company to Start Drilling Soon Special to The Times. Childress, Texas, March 9.—Repre entative business men, of Childress this morning raised \$10,000 as a bonus to be paid to the first company that will bring in an oil well. The condition being that the well must be located within seven miles of Childress and produce 100 barrels per day for thirty days, pumper or flowing. The Copper Company will begin erecting a derrick Monday. The Orient Drilling Company have the contract. The derrick will be 88 feet high and the contract calls for 3,000 BALING leet. A\*rotrary will be used. The Citizens Development Co., will egin drilling sometime this month. They will contract for 3,500 feet.

#### SOUTHERN POINT OF NATION

The most southern point of main-land territory in the United States is on a sharp bend of the Rio Grande river about 20 miles southwest of Brownsville. The government official survey shows that its latitude is 25 legrees and 9 minutes, which places it below the most southern part of the peninsula of Florida, but not as far south as Key West. The spot is marked by a group of picturesque Mexican ranch buildings with their thatched roofs. Growing upon the land are groves of wild paim trees which lend to the beauty of the tropical scene. The distance between Brownsville and the mouth of the Rio Grande in a direct line is approximately 22 miles, but the river has so many curvatures that its course between the two points covers 110 miles, according to the survey of the international boundary commission, which is composed of the representatives of the United States and Mexican governments. Before the river empties intothe gulf it makes a sharp bend to the south, and this rounded peninsula forms the most southern mainland of the country. Most of the territory between Brownsville and the Rio Grande's mouth is covered by a dense winderness of chaparral. The soil is of primitive richness, caused by, the periodical deposits of silt from the stream's overflow. Owing to the inaccessibility of the little Mexican ranch, which holds the distinction of marking the most southern spot, the place has been visited by very few mericans.

#### WHERE MANITOU SPEAKS

A familiar landmark near Hayton. Wis., is the old "Council Elm" that stands at a bend in the Manitowood river a short distance below Hayton. The Pottawotomie Indians who once occupied this region regarded the tree with awe and veneration, believing it endowed with special attributes by the Manitou or Great Spirit. Under a its shade all important councils of the tribe took place. As a meeting place for representatives of the different northwestern tribes who wished to enter the Pottawotomie territory, it must have witnessed some strange scenes. Each spring and fall all the Pottawotomie clans were wont to gather at the spacious camping ground near the tree. For days the beating of drums, the chanting of barbaric songs and fantastic dances occupied the attention of the savages. Among the many Indian legends concerning the tree one of the lew that has survived is to the effect that the Manitou speaks to his people in the rustle of its leaves and the sigh of the winter wind through the bare branches.

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
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#### MULE AND BEAR FIGHT DUEL



their respect toward me with a gentlemanly attitude, and in appreciation of said consideration by them and conjunction with my husband's unusual sensibleness and absence of evil thoughts, I am glad to repeat the same sentiments expressed by my co-writer. However, I contend that advanced age is not an essential to be obtained before a woman of firm character may enjoy the companionship of men with impunity.





Billie Keeler made in Washington in 1895, when he and I were playing together on the Baltimore Orioles.

The game was close-and we needed games because Boston was giving us a hard fight for the pennant. We had the game won by one run in the ninth inning. In those days the Washington club, although a tail-ender, al ways gave us the fiercest fight of any of the clubs, the natural rivalry between the two cities stirring them up to fight us to a finish. In that ninth inning a runner was

on third and two were out. Bucky Freeman hit the ball on a line toward the right field bleachers, and hit it so hard that at the crack of the bat It sounded to me like a home rununother victory for Washington and second place for the Orioles.
