

Bovina petitions alcohol election

declared Parmer County dry and it has remained the same ever since. Parmer is one of only 13 counties in the state In 1939, the county clerk of Texas still not selling al-

cohol, Venable said.

Venable started with an application to petition voting Precinct 201, which covers the town of Bovina. The application required ten signatures and a legal notice to be printed in the local newspaper. The notice can be found in the State Line Tribune, August 15, 2013 issue. The application states, To legalize: The legal sale of all alcoholic beverages for off-premise consumption only. He said Precinct 201 has 784 registered voters and the percentage of signatures required for the petition to be processed is 55.3. As of this date, 101 voters have signed the petition. It has been turned in to the County Clerk to verify that each signer is in fact a registered voter of that precinct. However, because of some legal timing issues out of his control, this item will not be on a ballot for voting until May, 2014.

Venable says beginning January, 2014, he will be out campaigning for votes before election time. "My purpose is certainly not to ruin the town of Bovina or the county, but to benefit from the tax revenue that would be kept in Parmer County," he said.

apparently the affordable care act ain't

A couple of local folks have asked me why I haven't written more about the Affordable Care Act, a/k/a Obamacare. Folks often give me suggestions for this column.

The simple answer about Obamacare is I don't know what to write about. Does anyone who might read this know enough about what is going to happen with Obamacare to write about it? I didn't think so.

On the other hand there is a mountain of information, mostly negative, floating around about this healthcare monstrosity. Mrs. Pelosi's famous statement, "We have to pass the bill to find out what is in the bill" is coming true isn't it?

Little by little we find out more about the damage that will be done as the government attempts to take over the healthcare industry. Here is a little about what I know or hear.

The President made a lot of promises about keeping your doctor and keeping your insurance and your costs would go down. He also said if you don't comply you will be penalized and fined. Lot of businesses and individuals have figured out it is cheaper to pay the fine than buy insurance.

The government is counting on millions of young, healthy Americans to buy health insurance through something called an exchange marketplace. All of that money is supposed to help pay for older unhealthy Americans. Can you visualize the young healthy Americans lining up on October 1st to buy health insurance? I can't either.

October 1st is supposed to be the first day of the insurance exchange marketplaces where

you can call and get yourself a really good deal on health insurance. Not going to happen from what I read. Also heard a few insurance companies will not participate in the exchanges so how good will exchange insurance be.

To help you out, the government is spending millions to hire people to promote Obamacare. Some of those hired are being called navigators. We received a press release with the subject, "New resources available to help consumers navigate the Health Insurance marketplace."

The Health and Human Services (HHS) Department will award \$67 million to Navigators and recognize more than 100 organizations as Champions for Coverage. Consumers can learn about and enroll in coverage later this fall through HealthCare.gov.

Isn't that cool. They pass a huge law then pay people to peddle it and explain it. Should that indicate it was a bad law to start with? Here is what a Navigator will do, according the HHS:

"Navigators are trained to provide unbiased information in a culturally competent manner to consumers about health insurance, the new Health Insurance Marketplaces, qualified health plans, and public programs including Medicaid and the Children's Health Insurance Program. The Navigator funding opportunity announcement was open to eligible private and public groups and people who are self-employed who met certain standards to promote effectiveness, diversity, and program integrity."

Had enough yet? There is much more.

Navigators will do all of the stuff mentioned above with only 20-30 hours of training. It has also been said the navigators will not be eligible for health insurance in their new job. Don't know if that is true.

The department (HHS) launched 24-hoursa-day call centers to answer questions in 150 languages. Really? 150 languages. They have also recruited groups called Champions for Coverage, businesses and groups pitching in to help consumers understand the coming options for quality affordable coverage. Some Champions for Coverage named are the AMA, LULAC, NAACP, National Baptist Convention, and the National Partnership for Women and Families. You can be a Champion for Coverage, visit http://marketplace.cms.gov/ help-us/champion-apply.html.

Many organizations have been exempted from participating in Obamacare. The first mandate for businesses to comply was January 1, 2014 but the President moved the date to January 1, 2015, after the mid-term 2014 elections.

By now you don't' know any more about Obamacare than you did when I started a few paragraphs ago. That was my point in not writing about it in the first place. It is just an opinion but it looks like the Affordable Care Act aint' gonna be affordable for many Americans. The IRS will be in charge of making sure you have adequate health insurance. Sleep well.



The Chieftain cross country team at Meet the Chiefs Night.

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


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DPS to increase DWI patrols

The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) will increase DWI patrols from August 19 - September 9, which includes the Labor Day holiday weekend. DPS troopers will focus DWI patrols in high-risk locations at times when alcohol-related crashes are most frequent. The enhanced patrols that target impaired drivers are funded through a grant from the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT).

"Keeping Texas roadways safe for all travelers is a vital concern for DPS, and these increased patrols are designed to save lives by getting intoxicated drivers off the road," said DPS Director Steven McCraw. "The Department urges drivers to mark the Labor Day holiday responsibly by utilizing safe driving practices and not drinking and driving."

During the Labor Day enforcement effort last year, DPS troopers made 1,879 DWI arrests, and approximately 503 of those were the direct result of the increased patrols. Last year during this same time period, DPS enforcement also resulted in 24,779 speeding citations, 3,890 seat belt/child safety seat citations and 4,062 no insurance tickets. In addition, troopers made 1,238 fugitive arrests, 895 felony arrests and 889 drug arrests during routine patrol operations.

DPS offers the following tips for safe travel during the Labor Day holiday:

- •Don't drink and drive. Designate a driver or take a cab.
- •Eliminate distractions, including the usage of mobile devices.
- •Buckle up everyone in the vehicle it's the law.
- •Slow down especially in bad weather, construction areas and heavy traffic.
- ·Slow down or move over for tow trucks and police, fire and EMS vehicles stopped on the side of the road with emergency lights activated - it's the law. Starting Sept. 1, the law also applies to TxDOT vehicles.
- •Don't drive fatigued.
- ·Drive defensively, as holiday travel may present additional challenges.
- •Make sure your vehicle is properly maintained before your trip begins.

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Buff Up Your Brain

So we know exercise is good for your body, but what about your brain? Since school starts next week, I thought this would be a good time to emphasize how beneficial exercise is for a student's brain. Plato recognized the importance of the mind-body connection, "In order for man to succeed in life, God provided him with two separate means, education and physical activity. Not separately, one for the soul and the other for the body, but for the two together." With the pressure for students to pass mandatory state tests, we have begun to cut physical activity out of the school day. Interestingly enough, more time in the classroom does not equal better test scores. Emerging research is showing that fitness and regular physical activity are linked to enhancement of brain function, memory and cognition.

Researchers from the University of North Texas recently presented a study that having a healthy heart and lungs may actually be one of the most important factors for middle school students to make good grades in math and reading. The Chicago-area school district of Naperville has gained national attention for their approach to physical education, and the results of their program in relation to academic performance are astounding. For example, one group of student volunteers at Naperville nearly doubled their reading scores by participating in a morning exercise program. I'll share more about Naperville

in next week's article. They've stepped out of the box, and the results are worthy of our attention.

How does exercise encourage your brain to work at optimal capacity?

- Nerve cells multiply strengthening interconnections and protecting them from damage
- Greater blood and oxygen supply to the brain
- Improved development and survival of neurons
- · Increased brain neurotransmitters

How do these things taking place at the cellular level translate to the classroom? Students are essentially prepped to learn:

- Their senses are heightened
- Focus and mood are improved
- They are less fidgety and tense
- Classroom behavior is better
- They feel more motivated and invigorated
- The ability of different parts of their brains to work together is improved

No longer in school? You need to set aside your own time for PE because you can reap the same brain benefits. Dodgeball doesn't count... But do get out there and move. Walk, jog, bike, swim, garden, do aerobics, lift, golf without the cart. Get in some brain-boosting power every day with exercise.

AgriLife says 'get it in writing'

Beef producers entering into a lease contract for grazing, use of breeding bulls or other business activities are advised to have a written agreement, according to a Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service agricultural law specialist.

Tiffany Dowell, an assistant professor and agricultural law specialist with AgriLife Extension in College Station, told beef producers at the recent Texas A&M Beef Cattle Short Course, a written lease provides protection to both parties.

"Some of you may not think you need a written lease, but you will wish you had one if there is ever a problem," she said. "Additionally, in order to be legally enforceable, any real estate lease for a year or more has to be in writing."

Dowell advised to have limits in a lease. For example, if you lease property, Dowell said to be clear on what you are leasing.

"If the lease is for grazing and you want to reserve hunting rights, you need to have that spelled out," she said. "If the landowner wants to reserve the right to go in and inspect anything, then the landowner has to specify that in the agreement."

Additionally, a pasture lease should specify which tracts are included in the agreement. agreement.

"A legal description is good, but you may want to include additional information as well," she said. "For example, if you want to lease a specific pasture, but not the peach orchard in the back of the property, you need to spell that out."

The lease should also include provisions specifying who is responsible for maintenance items such as pasture shredding, fence repair, barn maintenance and other items that could become issues.

For cattle producers leasing bulls, Dowell advised to include liability issues in the you have taken a first crack agreement. For example, if a bull is injured during the time that he is being leased, it is a good idea to have provisions in the agreement to handle that situation.

"One term to consider when leasing out a bull is whether it might be prudent to require a monetary deposit from the lessee that will be returned upon the bull's safe return at the end of the lease."


Finally, Dowell said there should be inclusion of penalties and consequences for late payment in the lease

"There should be a set penalty for late payment," she said. "These provisions can be drafted in a variety of ways. For example, you could have a set late fee of so much for each day, and once the fees add up to a certain amount, the lease will terminate."

Overall, Dowell said it's a good idea to have a lawyer review the agreement.

"Prior to taking it to your lawyer, you can do some things that will save you some money," she said. "For example, if you go online there are sample leases that will help you draft an agreement. Once at it, then take it to a lawyer for review. The lawyer will not have to start from scratch and will likely bill less hours to simply review and revise."



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
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
