Kid Fish Sunday



Friona, like most small towns, has always had a rental shortage. Not all residents who transfer into Friona want to buy a home and rental units are often scarce or unaffordable. That situation is about to change thanks to the efforts of the Friona Economic Development Corporation (FEDC) and Cargill Meat Solutions.

Cargill has been in the forefront of the housing dilemma. With near 2,000 employees at the Friona plant, most of the employees commute to cities such as Clovis, Hereford, Dimmitt, and Amarillo. Cargill feels more of their employees would live in Friona if housing was available. Several months ago the

FEDC purchased most of a city block in Friona bordered by 6th and 7th Streets between Ashland and Woodland. The lots were bought for \$35,000 from Whaley family heirs. Plans were to seek out a builder willing to invest in apartments on the property.

Last week Cargill reimbursed the FEDC the \$35,000 for the property and announced an agreement with a builder from Clovis to construct up to 32 apartment units on the lots. The builder will be allowed to begin construction on the land even though he does not own it. An agreement will allow the builder to begin construction and once he has fulfilled a specified number of units the FEDC will deed the land over. Friona Mayor Rick White, Cargill's training manager, conceded that the "free land" was an incentive to attract a qualified builder to the project.

Cargill believes the apartments will attract employees who currently commute to the Friona plant to move to Friona. It was stressed, however, that the apartment units will be available to rent to the public, not just for Cargill employees. If this project is successful, Cargill says the builder will consider additional construction projects in Friona. Groundbreaking for the ven-

ture will be held within the next couple of weeks.



Council will talk budgets and tax rates

The Friona city council will meet in regular session Monday September 9 at 6:30 p.m. in council chambers at 619 Main St. All council meetings are open to the public.

Most of the agenda will pertain to budgets, tax rates, general funds and sinking funds. Here are some of the items to be discussed and/or approved.

A public hearing will be held to open the meeting regarding the proposed city budget for fiscal year 2013-2014. Approval

of the 2013-2014 budget for the Friona Economic Development Corporation will be considered. Adoption of the city budget, adoption of a \$0.8250 tax rate per \$100 valuation to support the city general fund, municipal government, Texas interest and sinking fund, and considering the accounts payable and financial statements make up a majority of the agenda.

Other items to come before the council include appointments to the FEDC board, changing the

next meeting to October 21, a police department report, closing city hall September 30 for year end procedures, and consider a variance for a mobile home to be placed at 311 W. 3rd requested by Antonia Diaz.

The city's 2013-2014 fiscal year runs from October 1, 2013 to September 30, 2014. Items related here are on the tentative agenda and subject to change. The official agenda is posted at city hall 72 hours prior to the meeting.

Dear Parmer County Producer: The USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) and the Soil and Water Conservation Districts (SWCDs) are inviting the public and any agencies with an interest in conservation issues to participate in a Local Work Group (LWG) meeting that will be held September 1 1, 2013 at XIT Recreational Center - 215 North St. Bovina Texas.

The purpose of the public meeting is to receive input from farmers, ranchers, local agencies, organizations, local agricultural leaders, businesses and other individuals that have an interest in natural resource concerns. Input received will allow the LWG to identify and prioritize the resource concerns that need to be addressed for eligible practices and ranking for county based funding.

Recommendations provided by the LWG meetings will be reviewed by the State Technical Advisory Committee (STAC) to help implement conservation programs offered by NRCS. Through stake holder meetings, the public is given an oppomlnity to help local conservation leaders set natural resource concern priorities in their counties.

Health Insurance Marketplace Questions?

Beginning Oct. 1, hundreds of thousands of Texans will be able to buy health care coverage from private insurance companies through an online marketplace set up by the federal government.

Because it's new, the Health Insurance Marketplace has prompted some questions, so let's briefly go over the most common ones in hopes of clearing up any confusion about the program.

Whom does the marketplace help?

The uninsured. If you have health insurance through either your employer or a government program like Medicare or Medicaid, you needn't concern yourself. The marketplace is meant mainly for individuals who want to buy health care coverage on their own for themselves or their families.

The marketplace simplifies your shopping for coverage by letting you make side-by-side comparisons of health plans. You'll get a clear picture of what benefits you'd get and what premiums and deductibles you'd pay. Then you can enroll in the plan that best fits your needs and budget. It all can be done online, at www. healthcare.gov.

Yes. Insurers can't deny you coverage because you have a medical issue, such as cancer or diabetes. Nor can they charge you more than they would someone who's in good health. And once you have insurance, the company can't delay your treatment. Your medical care begins immediately.

What does the marketplace's health insurance cover?

All the health plans provide a package of 10 essential benefits, including emergency services, hospital care, lab services, prescription drugs, doctor visits, preventive care, rehab services and maternity care. Some plans offer additional coverage, such as for dental or vision care.

The benefits are similar to what's typically covered in an employer-provided plan. That's a significant point. Until now, individual insurance policies haven't always offered such an array of services.

How do the health plans vary in cost?

Some marketplace plans have lower monthly premiums but charge you more

you shop for a plan.

How does someone shop for insurance in the marketplace?

You'll fill out an application and find out how much you can save on monthly premiums and out-of-pocket costs. Most people who apply will qualify for lower costs of some kind. Specific information about the health plans available in your area will be posted at www.healthcare. gov by Oct. 1.

Where can someone go for help in applying for coverage and enrolling?

You can get help online (www.healthcare.gov), by phone (1-800-318-2596) or in person. There will be people trained and certified to help you understand your health coverage options. The website and toll-free call center can direct you to the benefit counselors in your area.

Insurance agents and brokers can also help you with your application and health plan choices.

When can someone shop and enroll, and when does coverage start?

Open enrollment runs from Oct. 1 through March 31, 2014. Health plans and prices will be available by Oct. 1. Coverage starts as soon as Jan. 1, 2014. What if someone doesn't have coverage in 2014? The new health care law requires people who can afford it to take responsibility for their health insurance by getting coverage or paying a fee. With insurance, you have peace of mind. Without it, you bear the full brunt of any medical bills, which could land you and your family deep in debt.

Why would a healthy person need insurance?

Though no one plans to become sick or hurt, most people eventually need medical care. Three days in the hospital run, on average, \$30,000. Fixing a broken leg can cost up to \$7,500. Having health care coverage protects you from those unexpected medical expenses.

Can someone with a medical condition buy insurance?

out-of-pocket when you require care. Other plans charge higher premiums but cover more of your medical expenses. You'll decide how you want to balance your premium costs with your out-ofpocket costs.

For example, if you see your doctor often and take a number of prescription drugs, a "platinum" or "gold" plan may work better for you. If you don't, a "silver" or "bronze" plan may be more practical. You'll see the differences in premiums and out-of-pocket costs when

Panhandle Parables Wouldn't it be nice



The early reports are giving yields in the mid-20 to upper 20 ton per acre range as far as yield. Some fields are coming back 30 plus tons per acre. Quality of silage report is also coming back good with

large ear size and a good fill in those ears.

This report is much better as compared to the last largely in part to some very beneficial rainfall which we received throughout the early parts of the summer. Silage harvest should continue on into October with some changing over from chopping corn to chopping sorghum silage as it progresses andgets ready for harvest. With the current weather pattern many of these choppers should continue at a very rapid pace.

Stress-Good or Bad?

By Melanie Gallman Braun

I am still reading SPARK-The Revolutionary New Science of Exercise and the Brain by John J. Ratey, MD. Chapter Three is devoted to stress. Dr. Ratey explains stress as a threat to the body's equilibrium. He says that stress is a challenge to react, a call to adapt; and that stress is essentially an emotional echo of the underlying stress on your brain cells. He explains that all activities, i.e., learning French, meeting new people, or moving your muscles, make demands on your brain and all are forms of stress. As far as the brain is concerned, stress is stress--whether it's learning French or exercising--and the difference is in degree.

Mild stress can actually be very good for you because it is inducing an adaptive response in your cells. Just like breaking down a muscle cell during exercise and letting it recover makes your muscles stronger. Same thing applies to nerve cells in the brain. Chronic stress never allows the body to recover. Staying too long in this state can lead to full-blown mental disorders such as anxiety and depression, as well as high blood pressure, heart problems, cancer and even break down the architecture of the brain.

How does exercise combat the effects of stress? Dr. Ratey says,"... that the brain activity caused by exercise (as a mild stressor) generates molecular by-products that can damage cells, but under normal circumstances, repair mechanisms leave cells hardier for future challenges. Neurons get broken down and built up just like muscles-stressing them makes them more resilient. This is how exercise forces the body and mind to adapt." You can liken this stress and recovery to that of vaccines on the immune system. "Just keep in mind that the more stress you have, the more your body needs to move to keep your brain running smoothly." - Dr. John Ratey, MD







Chiefs battle hard but lose to Stratford

It was 140 degrees on the ladio Garcia took a handoff, artificial turf at Dick Bivins Stadium for the 4:30 p.m. kickoff. As in most first games of the season, the Chieftains and Stratford Elks battled the heat, first game jitters, turnovers, and rookie players. After a scoreless first quarter, Friona scored on a 24-yard touchdown pass from Mason Loflin to Brad Stowers to lead 6-0. (The Chiefs missed on three extra point attempts and have yet to find that dependable kicker.)

The Elks scored twice and took a 14-6 lead into halftime. Early in the 3rd quarter the Chiefs uncorked an 84yard touchdown pass from Loflin to Jose Zamudio. On the ensuing Elks possession they fumbled, Friona recov-

spun away at the line and raced 54 yards for a touchdown. The Chiefs led 18-14. But on the next possession the Chiefs had a 3rd and 18 when the Elks defense chased Loflin into the end zone and he was flagged for intentional grounding, giving Stratford a two-point safety. The Chiefs still led 18-16. Stratford returned the Friona free kick to the 35 and four plays later the Elks led 22-18. The Elks scored again in the 4th quarter to win the game 29-18.

The Chieftains recovered three Elks fumbles but Loflin was sacked six times and threw three interceptions. He completed 7 of 26 attempts for 142 yards and two touchdowns. Passes were completed to Dallin Woods, 1 for 4

yards; Brad Stowers 2 for 27 yards and a TD; and Jose Zamudio 3 for 108 yards and a touchdown.

The Chiefs managed only 84 rushing yards, split with Omar Ramos 2 carries for 5 yards; Stowers 6 for 11 yards; and E. Garcia 5 for 76 yards. Loflin carried 4 times for minus-8 yards. After the game Coach Prokop told the Amarillo Globe News, "The biggest thing was our failure to run the ball. We're not good enough to make mistakes like muffing punt formations or having a back go the wrong way. The kids played hard and I'm proud of them for that."





After enduring a long battle with pulmonary fibrosis waiting for some time in Dallas, Joe Shultz received a lung transplant last weekend. His wife, Jerre, has also been dealing with an array of health issues related to her battle with cancer years ago. Pervasive health problems have drained the couple's financial resources and they're facing new challenges as Joe seeks to recover from surgery and hopes for good results

from the transplant.

The Shultzes have exhausted virtually all of their financial resources during the prolonged medical ordeal.

The couple have extensive connections to the Summerfield community. Joe Shultz has been involved in numerous community activities over the years. He served as chaplain for King's Manor Methodist Retirement Home for several years, was associated with a local funeral home for a time, and was the official bean and barbecue sauce cook for numerous King's Manor Founders Day barbecue dinner events, as well as the stew cook for functions at King's Manor.

Jerre Shultz has shared her musical abilities in the community and is a past organist for First United Methodist Church of Hereford.

"I got married on September 19, 1975, and started at Deaf Smith 10 days later," Higgins said. "Been here ever since."

The Higginses have two children. Son Jeff and his wife, Hollie, live in the Dallas area and have two daughters, Campbell, 4, and Ellyse, 2. Daughter Cathy and her husband, Brent, live in Hereford and also have two daughters, Callie, 5, and Charleigh, nine months. The Higginses attend the First United Methodist Church in Hereford and have been members for 38 years. (Is there a pattern here?)

Higgins has seen several changes during his time at the cooperative and his years in the warehouse. The materials used in construction of line when he first started were mostly wooden poles and crossarms. Now there are fiberglass and steel poles and fiberglass crossarms. Instead of the "glass" or porcelain once used for insulation, there is now a polymer material, which is lighter and easier to work with.

One thing that hasn't changed is the yearly inventory of material, still counted by hand. "One of the good things to come along has been computers," he said. When he first started, computer screens were 9 inches and displayed only in green. Whereas most invoices now are computer-generated, they used to be handwritten and ordered by phone, he said.

Dan's retirement plans include traveling to see family and to visit his Army buddies. He is just going to go when and where he wants to go, and enjoy life, he said, adding that he also has a honey-do list to catch up on.

At a reception with employees, board members and former employees in attendance, Dan was honored for his hard work and dedication-and received some good-natured ribbing. He was presented with a gift as an acknowledgment for his years of service. He reminisced about his years at the co-op and the good people he saw come and go.







