Arzullia at the Wichita Theater Tonight



The unusual spectacle of a beautiful young woman clamy sleeping, oblivious of the hundreds of curious eyes that gazed upon her, created something of a sensation on Indiana avenue today. The central figure of the mysterious proceedings is Arzullia who has lain in a state of suspended animation in the Foosehe and Lynch drug store window since four o'clock yesterday, placed there by Albertus, the Hypnotist, to be restored to her normal senses by the latter as one of his impressive demonstrations at the Wichita Theatre tonight. While still in this death like trance Arzullia will mystify still further with her remarkable ability as a pre-visionist and spiritualist.

She arrived in this city recently from Denton, where last Friday night

the entire performance was staged at the expense of the State of Texas for the benefit of the State Normal College students. Arzullia is one of the most celebrated women spiritualists in the United States. She is the only theatrical entertainer ever accorded the honor of a professional appearance in the White House at Washington, where she appeared Easter Monday, 1908, by special invitation of the President and gave her marvellous performance before all of the members of the cabinet and their wives as well as the members of the foreign embassies. Lyman B. Gage, ex-secretary of the United States treasury, headed an investigation with the object of determining whether or not Arzullia was a fraud, and after a detailed study of the case, it was decided by the com-

mittee that she was a genuine spiritualist. Gage is the head of the spiritualists in this country, and has a nation wide reputation. Associated with her is Albertus, one of the world's most famous hypnotists.

On account of the many fakes which have appeared here hypnotism has not gained many supporters in this city, but at last a real hypnotist has arrived in town, and people will be given an opportunity to see for themselves whether or not the performances of Albertus are a fake. He will give performances each night at the Wichita Theatre during the balance of this week, and seats are on sale at the present time. The prices are ten, twenty and thirty cents.

MAN'S QUICK WIT BEAT SOCIALISTS

A TELEGRAPH OPERATOR DID RIGHT HING AT PSYCHOLOGICAL MOMENT.

USED STARS AND STRIPES

Incident That Turned Tide in Milwaukee Occurred at Last Non-Partisan Rally.

Milwaukee, April 9.—It was a quick witted unexpected coup which went far to beat the Socialists in the municipal election last Tuesday. The trick, a device sprung without an instant to plan a course of action, was responsible for setting the town on fire with the issue of the American flag against the red banner of Socialism.

The issue of the campaign was in doubt on Saturday night, when the non-partisan final rally and grand roundup was slated to be held in the Auditorium, with its seating capacity of nearly seven thousand persons. All of the non-partisan candidates were on the platform, and preparations had been made to prevent an expected Socialist effort to break up the meeting. The non-partisans received word that the Socialists planned to fill the first six rows of the Auditorium, and when Congressman Cary, defeated aspirant for the non-partisan candidacy for Mayor, rose to speak the Socialists were to rise and march out, in an effort to lead the non-partisans to believe that Cary supporters planned to bolt the ticket.

The non-partisans, however, learned of the plan and filled the first six rows with loyal supporters and the Socialist demonstrators, nearly one hundred in number, were forced to take seats elsewhere. At the cue of the Cary speech, however, the Socialists rose and turned to march out as arranged. Unfortunately for their plans, however, as they rose Mr. Cary had just said, "Let's haul down the red

flag from the city hall and hoist the Stars and Stripes." Just as he spoke these words, by a remarkable coincidence, a gust of wind from an open window caught the folds of a huge flag in the platform drapery and floated it out over the platform, as though hung from a flagstaff.

Seeing the possibilities, with the Socialists marching out at the moment the American flag was thus doubly emphasized, one of the Alderman candidates, George T. Grace of the Ninth Ward, a newspaper telegraph operator, leaped for the front of the stage and yelled to the leader of the band to start the "Star Spangled Banner."

This completed the inspiration of the waving flag on the stage, and in an instant nearly seven thousand persons in the audience were singing the National hymn, while the Socialists, under their original plan to leave the hall when Cary spoke, were filling out, and by this quick move of starting the band the Socialists were placed in the position of insulting the flag. The newspapers caught the hint so promptly that by Sunday forenoon a tiny American flag was the badge of the non-partisan supporters, and there were not enough flags in the city to supply the demand.

By this chance the issue of the two flags was raised and on election day the homes of non-partisans were by common consent decorated with the flag to a greater extent than was seen even on flag day. The result was that the election showed a gain of only 2,500 socialists over two years ago, while the anti-Socialist vote showed an increase of 11,000.

3 STATE CONVENTIONS AT SAN ANTONIO SOON

San Antonio, Tex., April 10.—Three state conventions will be held in San Antonio during the next three weeks and each will bring several hundred visitors to the city. The Supreme Convention of the Praetorians will be held April 11, 12 and 13, bringing here all the supreme officers and delegates and a regiment of companies of its drill teams from various cities of Texas. The Modern Order of Praetorians is distinctively a Texas institution, an insurance society on fraternal lines, with head offices in Dallas, where its splendid fifteen-story building is one of the progressive landmarks of that city.

The Fifth General Session of the Conference for Education in Texas will be held here April 19 and 20 and promises to be one of the greatest educational gatherings ever held in the state.

One of the most important meetings of the year will be the annual convention of the State Bankers' Association, May 7 and 8, which will bring here several hundred bankers from various parts of the state, and also many prominent financiers from the north and east.

Condition of Texas State Banks. Austin, Texas, April 10.—Following is a condensed statement of the condition of State banks of Texas at the close of business, February 20, 1912: From December 5, 1911 to February 20, 1912, the capital of state banks and trust companies of Texas increased \$1,092,000.

The total capital of all banks and trust companies in the state at the close of February period is \$24,612,500 and surplus and undivided profits are \$6,793,119.00, an increase in surplus accounts of \$542,246.90 and a decrease in undivided profits of \$222,729.00.

Loans and discounts increased in the same period \$4,477,652, while deposits increased \$384,702. The total reserve on demand deposits is 45.6 per cent, and the cash reserve is 11.9 per cent.

REVELATION CAME NOT TO PATIENT FAITHFUL

Kansas City Star. All day the revelation came not, but the faithful were patient, and did not trouble the prophet at his meditations. That's the way the ancient chronicler would have given you the news of the annual conference of the delegates of the Reorganized Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints in Independence yesterday. Joseph Smith, the president of the church, was present at the afternoon session of the conference, but no word of his was given to the delegates. There was no symptom of disappointment shown in the great crowd of delegates, who have come from all parts of the United States and Canada; many of them for a sight and a word with the prophetic head of their church, and the son of its first prophet and founder. "We don't expect anything until it comes. What is ordered shall be. No man knows the will of the Lord." That's what one delegate said when asked of the "revelation." It was shooed several times by delegates standing in small groups in front of the Stone Church at the close of the afternoon session. One said: "We have seen our leader again and are faithful." Those men have come great distances to the conference; they look like sober business men. Among the younger delegates is to be seen the kindest curiosity and sympathy for the older heads of the church, especially those who have carried its banner to far lands as missionaries, and retain that excitable, impassioned manner of address more as a habit than anything else. An interested group stood around Elder E. C. Briggs of Lamoni, Ia. He is an old man with a flowing, patriarchal beard. He was the first missionary sent to Utah in the early '50s by the reorganized church. At that time, perhaps, he was like sending coals to Newcastle. Elder Briggs soon was arrested on the streets of Salt Lake City by the Brighamites for distributing a handful of tracts. Sentiment ran high at the time, and he suffered in jail for a long time, it is said. Yesterday a delegate asked him where the Bible first mentioned the word "Mormon." The answer was ready and came quick: "Noah was the first to use the word, but I'll have none of him, for he was a polygamist!" A reporter called at the home of Joseph Smith on Short Street soon after his return from the conference. W. R. Dexter, the prophet's secretary, answered that his employer was very busy and could see no one. Joseph Smith, a man almost blind and deaf, a sufferer, and 39 years old,

Nashville, Tenn., April 10.—"The Soils of the South" was the subject discussed before the Southern Commercial Congress last night by Milton Whitney, chief of the Bureau of Soils, Department of Agriculture. The address dealt with the extent of the tillable soils in the Southern States, the uses to which they are adapted, the labor necessary for their proper development and the relation of capital to this development.
In the course of his address Mr. Whitney stated that there are nearly 480,000,000 acres of productive soils in the South, of which there are idle

particular soil type be recognized and understood and applied to the purpose for which it is best adapted.
A considerable portion of his address was devoted to the relation of capital to the development of soil resources, the speaker expressing his belief that if the "great constructive bankers and lawyers" could be interested in this subject some way for capital to aid in this development would be found to the betterment of the individual and the nation."

COST OF DYING HAS INCREASED

While the higher cost of living has long been an accepted fact; it was not until yesterday that figures were available on the higher cost of dying. This developed in the commissioners' court when bids were received for pauper funerals for the next twelve months. During the past year the county has paid \$8.50 for burying paupers, but the lowest bid submitted for such work for this year was \$12.45. The contract was awarded to E. G. Hill at that figure.
In this connection, a comparison with the cost of pauper funerals in other counties may be interesting. Bexar county pays one cent each for pauper burials and McLennan county pays one-half cent. In these counties the undertakers get sufficient advertising to enable them to do the work at this nominal figure and the holding of the county contract also results in their getting considerable profitable business.
