

TAFT IS THE WINNER

Roosevelt Leaders Practically Concede President's Victory in Pri-

Concordia, N. H., April 23 .- Victory n the Republican Presidential priimar les in New Hampshire practically was conceded to Taft tonight by Roose-velt leaders, including Gov. Bas. Returns received at the Roosevelt headquarters from 202 of the 290 cities and towns gave Taft 380 delegates and Roosevelt 234 out of a total of 811 in

the State convention. The Roosevelt leaders conceded the Firist District to Taft, but claimed incomplete returns showed a Taft lead there. Gen. H. M. Baker, chairman of the

Taft League, said tonight: "The returns received up to 11:00 o'clock show that President Taft has carried the State and both Congres sional Districts by substantial major ities. The victory is complete."

Gov. Robt. P. Bass, who practically directed the fight for Roosevelt in the State, said after admitting probable "The campaign had to be different

from that of an election, and consider ing that the organization in the cities was opposed to us almost unanimously. the result is very satisfactory. The campaign consolidated a large numbe of men of the political faith in regard to progressive ideas and clean politics. They will stick together and will be heard from again."


