Adult immunization program at PMC Sep 26

Parmer Medical Center is excited to announce a new community education program they will be offering starting this month. The programs will be held every other month and whenever possible, will be offered in English and Spanish at no cost to the community. Adult immunizations will be the topic for the September program and Don Nicholson with the Texas Department of State Health Services will be the speaker.

Measles outbreak in Texas, Whooping Cough at levels not seen since 1950's. A NEW Flu from a third world country is on the horizon. We've all seen the headlines, but we don't always recognize what that means to us as individuals.

We see the need and sometimes the requirements for children to be vaccinated. When we become adults we tend to forget getting immunized is a lifelong, life-protecting job. Each year in the United States, vaccinepreventable diseases claim the lives of 500 children and approximately 50,000 adults.

Many adults don't even realize they need to get vaccines. Adults often don't get vaccines because they don't think they need them, they are worried about how they are going to pay for them and they typically haven't been encouraged to get them.

But they need to — influenza, pneumococcus, hepatitis B, cervical cancer, shingles and whooping cough are all adult diseases that can be prevented by vaccines.

As we get past that prime of life, our bodies start slowing down. The body's ability to fight off infections deteriorates and we tend to be a little sicker a little longer. Sometimes the resistance to diseases we had as children wanes or expresses as an outbreak we thought we would never have again. An example is if you had chickenpox as a child, that virus is in your system and may breakout as Shingles.

Adults and seniors need to be aware also that some diseases affect them as a minor inconvenience, but to expose children to that disease could be deadly for them. Whooping cough, for some adults is a lingering cough and mild fever, but to an infant; it could be deadly.

There are people who get on talk shows and spout incomplete or false rumors. Who do you believe? The talk show host whose ratings depend on sensualized information or the dedicated team of professionals who have made a life's work of protecting us against disease, and provided mankind extended life due to vaccines. Please join us in the conference room at Parmer Medical Center on September 26th to hear the facts related to adult immunizations. The first program will be at 2:00pm and offered in English. The Spanish version will begin at 3:00pm.

Talk with your healthcare provider about which vaccines you need and when you should be vaccinated. They know you and your bodies needs the best.

Clovis builder plans new apartments for Friona

As in all small towns, Friona has long been lacking in rental housing. Over the years Excel/Cargill has lobbied for rental housing to accommodate some of their 2,000 employees. It has been a challenge to teachers and coaches who accept positions with Friona ISD. Investors have been reluctant to commit to new construction.

Through the efforts of the Friona Economic Development Corporation (FEDC) and the city and Cargill, a new apartment project is about to become reality. Commercial Construction Services Inc. (CCS, Inc.) of Clovis, operating as Jillian Homes in Clovis, has reached an agreement to

construct a three building, 72-unit apartment complex on the block bordered by 6th and 7th and Ashland and Woodland Streets.

The FEDC purchased the lots on the block from the Whaley family for part of an agreement to attract a builder, allowing construction to begin without the builder having to purchase the land. Eventually, once certain building requirements are met, the land will be deeded to the building company. The actual construction will be done by 2 R Lucio General Builders, LLC of Clovis, headed by Ruben Lucio.



Letter to the Editor

Congressman Randy Neugebauer (R-TX) praised the passage of H.R. 2775, the No Subsidies Without Verification Act. The bill passed by a vote of 235 to 191.

In July, the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) announced that the government would no longer verify that each applicant for the exchange subsidies is actually qualified for assistance. Instead, the administration would rely on the honor system and sample audits to "protect" the integrity of this new \$1 trillion entitlement program.

"If the government doesn't verify who qualifies for subsidies, taxpayers could end up handing out \$250 billion in fraudulent payments," Neugebauer explained. "This bill simply says that no payments can be made until the government has a functional system in place to verify eligibility."

"The potential for fraudulent subsidies joins a growing list of problems with the President's health care law, including higher costs for consumers, security concerns with patients' data, and job cuts by employers," Neugebauer said. "I'll do everything in my power to defund and repeal this law entirely."

Mass Shooting at the Washington Navy Yard

I am shocked and saddened by the shooting at the Washington Navy Yard this morning. While many details are still unclear, we do know that at least a dozen people lost their lives in this act of senseless violence. Dana and I are praying for those who were lost and their families, friends, and colleagues.

Defunding Obamacare

Last week, I joined 42 of my colleagues as we introduced a bill to fund the government for the next year while delaying and defunding Obamacare. H.J.Res. 62, the Stability, Security and Fairness Resolution, authored by Congressman Tom Graves, protects savings from the sequester and prioritizes funding for veterans and national defense. This legislation is being offered as an alternative to a proposed Continuing Resolution, or CR, that would fund the government until mid-December of this year. The current funding for the government expires on September 30th. Unless we pass an extension of that funding, the government will shut down on October 1st.

I am concerned that a government shutdown could damage our economy, and most importantly, would be harmful for our troops. We risk cutting off pay for military personnel or death benefits for families of soldiers killed in the line of duty until the government reopens at end of a shutdown.

We must do everything we can to defund Obamacare and protect patients from higher costs and reduced health care services, while doing our best to keep the government open. That's why I'm joining Rep. Graves on an alternative solution—one that keeps the government open, and takes every possible action to delay and defund Obamacare until we next vote on spending and appropriations. It's an approach that is favored and endorsed by many prominent conservatives, who want to see real progress on defunding Obamacare. Action Item: The Next Step on the Farm Bill

This week, the House will be voting to reform nutrition programs in the Farm Bill. In July, the House decided to split the Farm Bill between farm programs and nutrition assistance (SNAP). We were able to save taxpayers nearly \$14 billion from farm programs by improving efficiency, consolidating programs, and moving to a more market-oriented framework for support. Now, we'll vote on a package of reforms that save taxpayers \$40 billion by reducing waste and abuse and closing loopholes in the food stamp program. I'm pleased, because the legislation has many of the reforms I proposed in the SNAP Improvement Act in April. It also enforces work requirements for able-bodied adults without children. These work requirements are designed to help families become independent of the food stamp program. I think we're making substantial progress to reduce waste and refocus our nutrition assistance on families who truly need help supplementing their grocery budget.

PUBLIC NOTICE Brief Explanatory Statements of Proposed Constitutional Amendments Special Election November 5, 2013

Proposition Number 1 (HJR 62)

HJR 62 proposes a constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to provide by statute for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of all or part of the market value of the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of a member of the United States armed services who is killed in action, as long as the surviving spouse has not remarried. An eligible spouse who later qualifies a different property as the surviving spouse's residence homestead could be authorized by statute to receive an exemption from ad valorem taxation in the same amount received for the first qualifying homestead during the last year in from ad valorem taxation due which the surviving spouse re- to their location in this state for ceived the exemption.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of all or part of the market value of the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of a member of the armed services of the United States who is killed in action."

Proposition Number 2 (HJR 79)

HJR 79 proposes a constitutional amendment to repeal the constitutional provision requiring the creation of a State Medical Education Board and a State Medical Education Fund, neither of which is in operation. No new loans have been made from the fund by the board in more than 25 years, and the board currently has no appointees and receives no program funding.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment eliminating an obsolete requirement for a State Medical Education Board and a State Medical Education Fund, neither of which is operation-

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of part of the market value of the residence homestead of a partially disabled veteran or the surviving spouse of a partially disabled veteran if the residence homestead was donated to the disabled veteran by a charitable organization."

Proposition Number 6 (SJR 1)

Water Implementation Fund as a special fund inside the state treasury and outside the General Revenue Fund. Money in the fund would be administered by the Texas Water Development Board (TWDB) and would be used to implement the state water plan, as adopted by general law, by TWDB.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the creation of the State Water Implementation Fund for Texas and the State Water Implementation Revenue Fund for Texas to assist in the financing of priority projects in the state water plan to ensure the availability of adequate water resources."

Proposition Number 7 (HJR 87)

HJR 87 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow home-rule municipalities to adopt charter provisions authorizing the filling of vacancies in the governing body by appointment, but only when the remainder of the vacant term is less than 12 months. > The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing a home-rule municipality to provide in its charter the procedure to fill a vacancy on its governing body for which the unexpired term is 12 months or less."

Proposition Number 8 (HJR 147 and SJR 54)

HJR 147 would repeal the Texas Constitution's maximum tax rate for a Hidalgo County hospital district; the maximum rate is currently set at 10 cents per \$100 valuation. This rate is lower than the maximum tax rate allowable for hospital districts in all other counties in the State (75 cents per \$100 valuation). The repeal of the constitutional cap would authorize hospital district tax rates in Hidalgo County equal to the hospital district tax rate laws applicable to all other Texas counties.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment repealing Section 7, Article IX, Texas Constitution, which relates to the creation of a hospital district in Hidalgo County."

Proposition Number 9 (SJR 42)

SJR 42 would expand the potential sanctions that the State Commission on Judicial Conduct can issue following a formal proceeding. This constitutional amendment would allow the Commission to issue an order of public admonition, warning, reprimand, or a requirement to obtain additional training or education in addition to the Commission's current authority to issue a public censure or recommend removal or retirement of a judge.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment relating to expanding the types of sanctions that may be assessed against a judge or justice following a formal proceeding instituted by the State Commission on Judicial Conduct."

0g Trans Fat

What doesn't taste better with butter on it? Well, maybe pickles and cantaloupe... The good news is a healthy diet must include a certain amount of fat, and we must consume certain kinds of fat for optimal functioning; the bad news is butter isn't the best option and should be used sparingly. But you knew that already, right? What are the different kinds of fat and which ones should we include in our diet? We'll discuss these questions over the next several articles. Today, we'll talk about the bad boys: saturated fats and trans fats.

Fats are just one part of a larger group of substances called lipids. Most of the fat we eat is in the form of triglyc- change the way our cell memerides. Triglycerides can be further distinguished as being saturated or unsaturated. Saturated fats are generally solid at room temperature-butter and lard, for example. Other foods that are high in saturated fat are cream, whole milk, many cheeses, beef, coconut oil and palm oil. Yeah,-insert " big bummer" here-these foods taste great, but they also increase our risk for heart disease by raising LDL-cholesterol levels. (More about cholesterol coming soon.)

Trans fats are rigid, just like unsaturated fats; however, these fats rarely occur in nature. Back in the late 1800's food manufacturers wanted a fat that could be produced cheaply and abundantly from vegetable oils, could be sold in a solid form and would resist going rancid. A process called hydrogenation was developed.

Hydrogenation makes liquid fats more solid at room temperature which makes them easier to mold or shape into food products. Think spreadable margarines and pie crusts that keep their shape without crumbling. Research has shown that trans fats are more detrimental than saturated fats because they branes function and reduce the removal of cholesterol from the blood.

What to do? Watch your saturated and trans fat intake; you don't have to eliminate these fats completely, enjoy them sparingly. Healthier options are plant based cooking oils like canola, olive or soybean oils, margarines and shortenings that contain no trans fatty acids, and low-fat foods. Also, a warning here-- "partially hydrogenated oils" contain trans fats. Check your labels!


Chiefs lose at River Road 14-12

The Friona Chieftains traveled to Amarillo River Road for their second game of the season. The Wildcats are a 3A team and both teams were looking for their first win.


