Senate Increases Appropriation. Washington, D. C., May 2.—Carrying eight million, sixty-four thousand and ten dollars in addition to the house appropriations the rivers and harbors bill aggregating more than \$200,000,000 has been agreed to by the Senate Committee. The increases include \$63,000 for a waterway between the Brazos and Matagorda Bay, Texas.

URGES DISPENSARIES FOR CONSUMPTIVES

Austin, Texas, May 2.—Mrs. O. B. Colquitt has sent a letter to every county judge advocating the establishment of free dispensaries and the employment of visiting nurses for the sick. Mrs. Colquitt also urges the establishment of County Hospital with special and separate provision for the care of consumptives. In discussing this matter, Mrs. Colquitt said: "The care of consumptives and other persons suffering from any contagious or infectious illness in hospitals is the best way to prevent the spread of tuberculosis and all communicable diseases. The Texas Anti-Tuberculosis Association, of which I am president, will devote its rights to the work of securing County Hospitals and Dispensaries with visiting nurses serving in connection in every county of the State. I hope that county judges will take up this matter at once and give it serious consideration, and act for the benefit of their people."

Dear Sir: Because of my deep interest in the welfare of our people, I submit the following suggestions to you. There are some persons in every county who need medical attention and treatment, and who can not always afford to pay a physician. A few counties have provided for such persons a free Dispensary and Clinic where the county physician, assisted by volunteers from among the local physicians, attends to the needs of persons applying for treatment. The value of the work of the Free Clinic and Dispensary can be more than doubled if a visiting nurse, or a woman without hospital training, but some aptitude for nursing, is employed, to visit patients in their homes, to advise and assist them and to instruct members of the family in the care of the patient, and especially to teach the necessary precautions to be observed to prevent the spread of contagious or infectious disease, if the patient is afflicted.

Room for a Free Clinic and Dispensary and the nurse's office can generally be found in the county court-house, and no expense for such quarters is contracted. The only expense would be for the home visitor's salary, medicines and some money for relief of indigent persons; \$100 a month should cover all of this expense, and I am sure the people of your county would gladly bear this expense, as this sum could not be spent in any more beneficial way.

I also wish to suggest that some provision be made for hospital care of the sick of your county. Will you not give serious thought to the establishment of a County Hospital? A beginning could be made by the erection of a small building on the grounds of the county poor farm, but separated from the farm by a fence, so that no one need hesitate about accepting treatment for fear of being considered a pauper. Our sick friends deserve our best thought and care

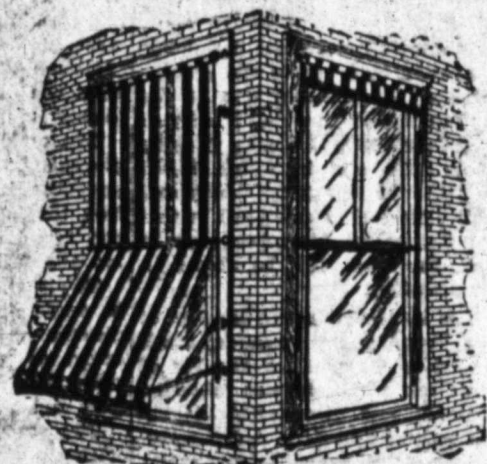

The ballot should not be forced on women, but if they want it they should have it, and the matter of who shall give it to them should be decided by themselves. Generally speaking, the laws, or many of them, are manifestly unfair to women in most of the states, and should be changed. In this state, for instance, a woman with property in her own name cannot dispose of it without the consent of her husband; if she and her husband are not living together, it is difficult for her to manage her affairs in the event the husband is disposed to make trouble. If she has money to her credit in the bank, the husband, though living apart from her, can prevent checking on the account. To that extent, women are discriminated against in our laws, and unless those who are opposed to woman suffrage can see the injustice of such laws and amend or change them, they may expect the agitation for woman suffrage to be kept up. That the sentiment is gaining in strength there can be no doubt, and at the present rate of gain, if not interfered with, in less than ten years every state in the Union will be a woman suffrage state.

The result of Tuesday's presidential preferential primary election in Massachusetts seems to have been a rather mixed-up affair. Both Taft and Roosevelt get consolation from it. The returns show that Taft carried the State over Roosevelt by a majority of about 6000, while the Roosevelt delegates-at-large defeated the Taft delegates-at-large by even a greater majority, and had Roosevelt been so disposed he could have claimed the eight delegates-at-large, together with the ten district delegates, which would have given him 18 in all, or split the delegation even with Taft. But the ex-president, in order, we suppose to be consistent, has renounced all claims to the eight delegates-at-large, and wired them that inasmuch as a majority of the people of Massachusetts has expressed a preference for Taft, they should vote the eight votes for the State-at-large for Taft. This leaves Roosevelt with only the ten district delegates, and gives to Taft 28. As for the Democrats, the vote was very light, but Clark was the favorite, though the delegates-at-large elected favor Gov. Foss for president, and are pledged to vote for him at the Baltimore convention. The Clark delegates-at-large ticket, headed by Georgia Frederick Williams, was badly defeated.

The campaign lie started to the effect that Gov. Wilson sent a telegram to Booker T. Washington, the negro educator, counseling Washington and expressing confidence in him at the time Washington was caught in the act of peeping through the keyhole into a room in an apartment house occupied by a white woman, and was severely beaten by the white man who detected the negro in the act, has brought forth a prompt denial from Mr. Wilson. Such under-handed campaign tricks, put afloat just before an election may accomplish the object intended—that of driving a few votes from Wilson to some other Democratic candidate, but the white man who consents to the slander of another white man in such a manner as that is not entitled to any more respect than the negro who was caught peeping into the room of a white woman. Wilson is a Southern man by birth, and the effort to cause Southerners to believe he would stoop to such a dirty trick as sympathizing with such an offense will and should fail.

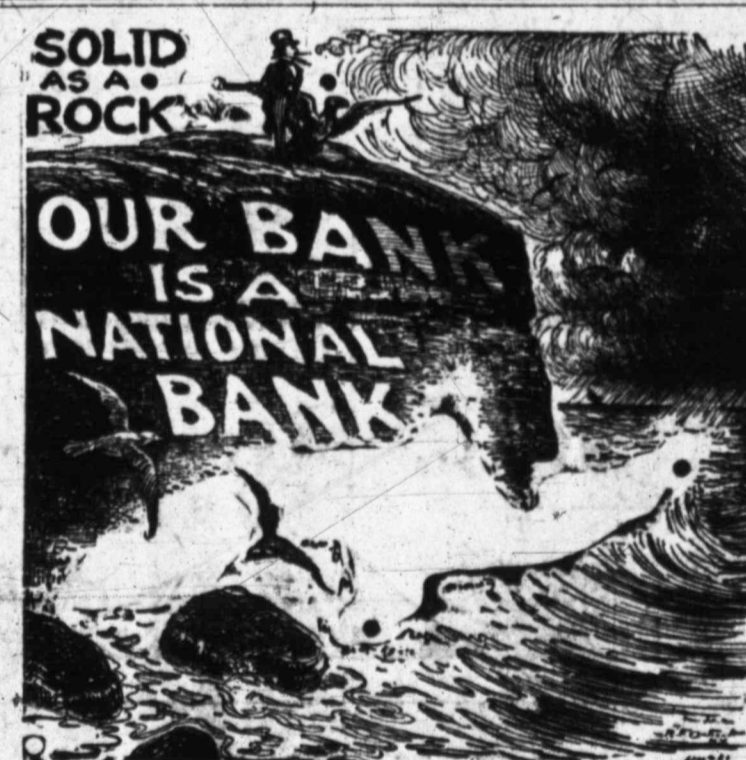

Edward Cassidy and other officers of the Socialist party of New York, under whose auspices a big parade and meeting were supposed to be held, in attempting to explain how it happened, said:
"The tearing down of an American flag was not the fault of the Socialist party. It was done by men in the ranks of the Industrial Workers of the World. The Socialist party will, in a few days, officially repudiate this meeting."
Flag is Trampled in Seattle.
Seattle, Wash., May 2.—In a Socialist May Day parade here a man reached out from the crowd of spectators, tore a red flag from its staff, rushed into a saloon and escaped. Another man threw an American flag into the street and jumped on it. He was knocked down by bystanders, who seized his flag and waved it from the curb at the paraders as they passed. The stolen flag was of silk and valued at \$50.
The announcement that the revolutionary Socialist and Industrial Workers of the World would march with the red flag drew a great throng to the place where the parade assembled. At the head of the line was an amateur band. Then came a number of women and then two men, one carrying the red flag and the second the American flag. The Mayor had refused permission to parade without the Stars and Stripes.
No arrests were made.
200 Socialists Hold Parade.
Duluth, Minn., May 2.—Behind red flags and headed by a band, 200 Socialists paraded the business streets of Duluth and held a meeting at which fiery addresses were made denouncing social and industrial reforms.
The parade was the largest of its kind ever held in Duluth. American flags were carried ahead of the red ensign.
