POOR MAN MADE AUTO POSSIBLE

FERNAND FOREST INVENTOR OF EXPLOSION ENGINE, IS SADLY IN WANT.

FRANCE MAY COME TO AID

Government's Attention Has Been Called To His Case and Help May Be Forthcoming.

(By William H. H. Simms, Paris Correspondent of the United Press.) Paris, May 13.—Least he did in want an appeal has been addressed to the French government to come to the aid of Fernand Forest, the inventor of the explosion engine.

All over the civilized world silent automobiles roll in princely luxury, thanks to the explosion engine. The aeroplane is a possibility and in actual fact, because of this same machine-submarine, is propelled by it at least one great line flying through seas...

Forest has a large family and his home is typical of the very poor mechanic, which the inventor is. While thousands are reclining luxuriously in their \$5,000, 50-horse-power, motor driven chariots, this humble workman plodding to his daily toil, dodges these cars, the engines of which he invented. A more perfect sample of the irony of fate could not be found.

President G. DuMourier, of the Association of Small Fabricants and Inventors, has appealed to Senator Raymond, president of the Committee on Military Aviation, to use his influence in securing some sort of financial recognition, by the government, of Fernand Forest's great work. It is an open secret that France is going to reply to a large extent, in the next war on her aeroplanes. Newspapers have been engaged for weeks raising a fund by popular subscription for the purpose of presenting aeroplanes to the army. Several newspapers each have headed their own lists by the donation of three aeroplanes. Public schools have donated machines; the Paris working girls are raising a fund for another. In short the country is aviation-mad while the man who invented the explosion engine, without which the aeroplane would be worthless, or still a dream of the future, is totally ignored, materially, a poverty-stricken mechanic.

As far back as 1881 one of Forest's first explosion engines was given a place in the Museums of Arts and Metiers here. Since then the engine has changed somewhat its outward form, but the principle remains identically the same. Still it was only after waiting a full 30 years that the inventor was given the slightest official recognition for his boon to mankind; and this was the rather hollow glory of a Knighthood in the Legion of Honor. This would not fetch him and his large family meat and bread and clothes and a roof.

These are some of the things DuMourier points out to the government. He urges that Forest be recompensed in a manner similar to Philippe Lebon d'Humbersin, Daguerre, Graham Bell, Gramme, and others. A dirty brown mongrel dog, named Battalion, is the first of his kind to receive a Morocco medal and a sergeant's stripes for distinguished services in action. He belongs to the 22nd Colonial Regiment, now at Hyeres, just returned from Africa.

Some two years ago, while troops were embarking aboard a transport at Toulon, bound for Morocco where trouble with the natives was cooking up, two mongrels, much the worse for abuse, slipped aboard and became stowaways. The canines, evidently, had framed it since soldiers and pets...

On his collar now are a sergeant's stripes, officially bestowed upon him along with the "Morocco medal," given to soldiers who have deported themselves, under fire, in solitary fashion.

Battalion is more than yever the pride of the regiment. An outcast and a stowaway when he left Toulon, he now struts through the streets, when on leave, a returned hero.

POLICE COURT SYSTEM SEVERELY ARRAIGNED

Nashville, Tenn., May 13.—The police court system was severely arraigned before the Southern Sociological congress by Philip Weltner of Atlanta, general secretary of the prison association of Georgia. He termed the whole system a mad juggernaut by which those prosper who of all persons ought to suffer. "As at present administered," he said, "a police court is good for but two things—cash revenues and convict labor. The ordinary police court may be likened to a quack doctor dispensing a dose, distinguished from a treatment. And the dose is inflicted, regardless of the offender's conditions or circumstances. Go into a police court in one of our large Southern cities and you will sometimes see one hundred and fifty cases tried in a day. The judge has no time for individual cases. He has in most cases only the arresting officers to look to for assistance and this man is usually interested only in establishing his case."

He suggested that a system of record cards for offenders and an effective system of probation officers be inaugurated. "Stop dealing with the case and begin dealing with the individual," was his message.

Prison reform was the subject before the congress and Mr. Weltner created the police court as the bottom round.

"The indeterminate sentence and probation system" was the subject of Professor C. S. Potts of the University of Texas. "The indeterminate sentence theory," he said, "based incarceration on an entirely different ground from the present doctrine that the amount of guilt connected with such crime could be determined and suitable penalty attached. It starts with the fundamental proposition that the criminal must be restrained because his conduct has proved him dangerous to society. Nothing but a long period of instruction and training under the closest observation by experts in criminology can determine when he will be ready to return to society."

"No prisoner should ever be released until he has learned some occupation by which he can earn a living and the prison management should find him employment and turn him over directly to a responsible employer." Tom Flinty Jr., of the Dallas News, claimed the lease system in the South in the military or reconstruction governments, the false notions now by that system being in part responsible for the slow movement in reform in the section.

Paul J. Bernhardt of Atlanta gave the prisoners' side. Professor G. W. Taylor of Vanderbilt University discussed the purpose of imprisonment. W. H. Estes of Montgomery told of conditions in Alabama.

FATHER AND SON UNITED.

Electra, Tex., May 13.—"Where is George O'Hare?" was the question put out by the Oil City Daily Derrick on Tuesday of last week by the request of his son, who had been separated from him for many years. The son was 'Ray' E. O'Hara, of Dewey, Oklahoma. He wrote the Derrick asking it to help find his father. The Derrick containing the request reached Electra and Wichita Falls Thursday afternoon and before eight George O'Hara, the father, had read the son's request and wired him suggesting that he come on at once. Mr. O'Hara expects his son tomorrow or next day. The father has been in the Panhandle territory the past three months, where he has leases upon several thousands of acres of prospective oil territory. In talking with Mr. O'Hara the Derrick's correspondent learned that some six or more years ago the boy, who was in school, became restless and wanted to leave school, but the father objected and insisted that he keep up his studies, which he did for a while, but one day he was missing, and from that day until his letter appeared in the Derrick, the father had not heard a word from him. The father went to the California oil fields, where he remained for a number of years, coming to the Electra field some three months since.

### TEXT OF LIGHTFOOT'S RECENT STATEMENT

Attorney-General Gives Details of Organization of Leading Oil Companies in Texas.

Below is published the full text of the recent statement of Attorney General Lightfoot with reference to the oil companies. The substance of this report appeared in The Times of Sunday.

"Some time ago during the conflict between stockholders of the Waters-Pierce Oil Company for the control of that company, articles were printed in which it was insinuated that the injunction against the Waters-Pierce Oil Company doing business in Texas was being violated.

"From other quarters the statement was made that the Magnolia Petroleum Company, which is the successor in Texas to the Security Oil Company and Navarro Refining Company, was either owned by the Standard Oil Company or controlled by it through ownership of bonds or other securities of the Magnolia Company. Because of these rumors we deemed it our duty to make a thorough investigation in order that the facts might be ascertained and proper action taken to enforce the judgment of our courts if it should be found that there was any truth in either statement.

"The representatives of the Pierce-Fordyce Association and the Magnolia Petroleum Company laid before us their stock books, contracts and every matter pertaining to the ownership of the property and the management of their business. I have on file in my office the names of every stockholder and the amount of his interest in each company. I have copies of all documents showing the settlement with the Waters-Pierce Oil Company for its property in Texas and every transaction relating to the purchase of the property now held by the Magnolia Company. I have the voluminous record of all the testimony taken at the recent hearings had at St. Louis, the careful examination of which has just been completed. The records show that the Pierce-Fordyce Association is a partnership in the nature of a joint stock association. It is not a corporation. H. Clay Pierce and S. W. Fordyce own a large interest. There are a great number of the leading citizens of Texas who own an interest in the association.

"The Magnolia Company is owned in the same manner. It is not a corporation, but a partnership or joint stock association owned by individuals in New York and Texas, John D. Archbold and H. C. Folger being the principal owners. My records affirmatively show that neither the Waters-Pierce Oil Company, nor the Standard Oil Company, or any other corporation connected with either, have any interest whatever in the property, stock, bonds or other securities of either the Pierce-Fordyce Oil Company or the Magnolia Petroleum Company. Both these companies are operated by their owners and officers independent of any corporation and in competition with each other.

"A careful examination of the testimony recently taken at St. Louis does not justify or support the sensational reports sent out by newspaper correspondents in St. Louis. The indignities coming these properties have furnished proof of their bona fide ownership and seem to be doing all in their power to observe the laws of Texas. There is no law in this state which prohibits any individual or partnership from doing an oil business, notwithstanding the fact that the individuals may have been former stockholders of an oil corporation. Henry Clay Pierce, John D. Archbold, H. C. Folger or John D. Rockefeller, or each or all of them, might move to Texas tomorrow and erect an oil station in every county if they chose to do so, and there is nothing in our laws to prohibit it.

"Nothing was disclosed by our investigations tending to show that either the Pierce-Fordyce Oil Association or the Magnolia Petroleum Company was doing other than a lawful business in this state. The owners of these properties evinced every desire and seemed to be making every effort to comply with both the spirit and letter of our laws, realizing that any violation would be followed immediately by the full penalty of the law. Nevertheless this Department will continue its vigilance and should any departure be made by either company, prompt action will be taken.

"Instead of one company doing the marketing business in oil in this state, as was the case a few years ago, four large companies and a number of small ones are now engaged in that business. Doubtless others will spring up and Texas now enjoys more competition in the sale of oil than any other state in the Union.

"In addition to this investigation we also made others which may be of much value to the Department and the state in the enforcement of our laws."

## LIFE IN INDIA



PRIMITIVE NATIVE LIFE IN INDIA

**A** WRITER in the Weekly Scotsman directs the attention of his countrymen to the misconceptions of the average Britisher about India—its size, its climate, its geography, and so on. When it is known you are coming out here, he writes, some fond mother will tell you that her boy is in India, "you'll be sure to call to see him," or perhaps she may ask you to take out a parcel she may ask you to take out a parcel that her boy may be in Madras and you may be bound for a station in the north, a thousand odd miles away.

He agrees that India is hot, but avers that in a country of so vast an extent there are many varieties of climate. On the plains in cold weather (November, December and January), it can be bitterly cold at night. Even the days can be cold, though it is always warm in the sun. The normal temperature of the day for the Allahabad district during January averages about 60 degrees, while the minimum temperature on the grass fell to about 20 degrees. On the other hand, in May and June it is hotter than one likes, the temperature in the shade ranging up to 120 degrees, or even higher.

To take the climate of what is now called the United Provinces, and referring only to the districts on the plains, the hot weather begins, say, in March, and gradually gets hotter as the days go on. The "loo," a hot dry wind from the west, blows all day long, usually dying down in the evening. Advantage is taken of this, and the door and window frames on the west side of the bungalow are filled up with screens of khas khas, a sweet smelling grass. This is kept wet, and the hot, dry wind blowing through it, comes into the house fresh and cool.

**Dust and Rain Storms.** During the hot weather there are occasional dust storms—the high wind swirling the dust along so that it is often impossible to see more than a few yards—and these are as a rule followed by a few drops of rain, and nearly always by at least a slight fall in the temperature. To be caught out in a dust storm is a matter of considerable discomfort, the sandy grit being dashed in one's face, finding its way down one's neck and into one's ears. There is also the danger of falling trees, uprooted by the force of the storm. Into the bungalow also the dust finds its way through every crack and cranny.

Towards the end of June, when everything is dry and scorched and dusty, one begins to look longingly for signs of the rains. They are due at this time. They often begin with quite theatrical effects, clouds banking up for a day or two, followed by a crash of thunder, the flash of lightning, and a torrential downpour. This is a tremendous relief after the fierce, dry heat of the preceding weeks. The khas khas screens are taken down. The loo will not blow any more. Myriads of insects and frogs start their infernal choruses. Dried up tanks fill up with water and, strange to say, at once have fish in them. Dry baked ground and places inches deep in dust in a few days' time are bright with the brilliant green of new grass. The trees are cleansed of their dusty coating, and vegetation springs up quickly all around. The temperature drops, and while it is raining it is pleasantly cool, comparatively speaking. Should there, however, be a long break, say for a week or ten days in August, that will be far the worst time of the year—hot and steamy and stifling.

**When Life is a Burden.** The best years are those when the rains are fairly evenly apportioned throughout July, August and September, slackening off in the latter month, and with a few showers in October, this both for comfort and for the crops in general. If no rain falls for a week

or two, the damp, steamy heat is almost unbearable. The skies are a clear blue, and the sun beats down with added force. Should the rainfall be more than the average, the air gets so damp it is impossible to keep things dry. One's bedding and clothes are damp, mold grows on your boots, your books, etc. In the rains there is a regular plague of insects, flies and other obnoxious creatures. The flying white ants come in their swarms, but luckily, their visitation is chiefly confined to the first day or two of the wet weather. But there are many other varieties, and at night, when the lamps are lit, all doors must be carefully screened with wire gauze or "chickas" (blinds made of split bamboo).

This period of rainy weather ceases about the end of September, and by October the weather is cooler. There is a keenness and a nip in the morning air that is very refreshing. The evenings are cool also, and the smoke of the natives' fires begins to hang low in the air. The pungent reek from burning ladders tells of gardens that are being tilled up for the approaching season. After this a few months' good weather, bright sunny days and cold nights, a shower or two about Christmas, and then the hot weather will again be on you.

In India the number of one's servants always surprises a newcomer, and tends to give the misleading idea that a life in the east is one of unworldly luxury. In a country, however, where caste systems and prejudices prevail, it could hardly be otherwise. For an ordinary small household the necessary servants would be, say, a bearer, who could look after his master's clothes and do other work about the house, and, if a Mohammedan, possibly wait at table. An ayah would attend a lady or children. There would be a rihngar, or table servant; possibly a boy to help to wash the dishes and attend to the latrine; and a cook, who will also do the catering. There will be a "sweeper," who does the dirty work generally, and a "chickie," or water carrier, will be required in places where water is not laid on. For the stables, there will be a syce or groom for the horse, a "grasscut" to fetch grass for it, and for those who do not drive themselves, a coachman. In the garden there will be a "mull," or gardener, with assistance coolies, according to the size of the ground cultivated. Possibly water is not laid on to your bungalow, in which case a pair of bullocks will be required to draw water from the well for the garden. You will require the services of a dholee, or washerwoman, and some families keep a dholee or tailor, in regular employ. Finally, a chowkidar, or night watchman, completes the array.

Life in the hot weather is usually of a much less formal character than in cold weather. From the end of March on till the rains break, it is a common habit for people to have their beds carried out into the compound at night and sleep in the open air away from the house. This is much cooler, and one thus gets a much more refreshing sleep.
