ADVERTISERS ARE AT DALLAS

ENORMOUS INCREASE IN ASSOCIATION'S MEMBERSHIPS IS SHOWN BY PRESIDENT.

CONTEST FOR 1913 MEET

Delegations From San Francisco, Baltimore and Toronto Striving Strenuously for The Honor.

By Associated Press. Dallas, Tex., May 20.—The membership of the Associated Advertising Clubs of America has increased nearly 70 per cent in the past year. This was the announcement made in the annual address of President George W. Coleman in his address at the opening of the business session this afternoon. The increase is from 5776 to 9781. Mr. Coleman suggested that advertising is opening a great field of usefulness for women who appreciate the enormous influence on the home.

The Toronto "Kitties" who have attracted visitors here from all over the Texas coast, the convention slogan today. It is "Ladies' flags."

Among the addresses delivered this morning was one by Julius Schneider of the Chicago Tribune, on the subject, "Kissing Good by Favor."

Schneider treated the general subject of newspaper advertising, pointing out its defects and advantages, alluded to the change of national advertisers to the newspapers, showed that advertising is highly developed, but that the retailers are without efficient organization in their advertising departments, and suggested that there are signs that this error is being discovered and corrected. He said that "chief of the fundamentals governing every phase of successful advertising is to know your public," and developed this thought cleverly and concretely. He then took up the practice of the department stores and showed wherein they are deficient and their advertising policy "falling into a rut."

He made a clear analysis of the proportion of the people who are likely to be susceptible to advertising influence, and emphasized the necessity of knowing this before advertising is attempted, and put stress upon the desirability of giving advertising managers scope to originate and develop their constructive ideas. He dealt with some features of ordinary department store advertising that seemed to him to be faulty, such as the attempt to make advertising "balanced" the undue use of superlative adjectives in price-making, the overworking of advertising men, "copying a style that does not fit," etc.

He proceeded to say that these things "are trivial matters when viewed in the light that they are simply the details which prove the great and glaring fault of most big retail advertising. This great and glaring fault is inefficient administration due to inefficient expenditure of money and the fault of the merchant behind the adman who refuses to pay for an organization fitted and able to employ and get the best results from every even of profit."

It would be interesting to note the changes in the advertising of a house that had the new and foreright to take this stand. To note in how short a time it would develop a tone of strength and assurance and find it possible to cease its interminable jangling of the changes on its bargains and its job lots. To note the spread of its influence among men and more of the different classes in the community. To witness the awakening of the public's responsive chord in wider circles, like the ripples from a stone cast into the water. To see supremacy developed from mediocrity and increased profits keeping pace with increased volume.

Three kinds of retail advertising organizations to my mind seem desirable and necessary:

1st. Proper organization, an appreciation of the sphere of the advertising department of America's big stores.

2nd. Organization of the retailers in each community for the purpose of working with the national advertisers for mutually profitable results through national campaigns in local newspapers.

3rd. Organization of the small retailer or specialty shops to give him as good an advertising service as his big and overshadowing department store competitor.

MESSRS. REID AND HEATH TO BUILD WAREHOUSE.

W. A. Reid and Harley Heath have let the contract for the erection of a large brick warehouse on Peach street just across the railroad tracks from the Peoples' Ice plant. The building will have a basement thirty-two by eighty feet with concrete floor and will be modern and as nearly fireproof as it can be made.

When completed the building will be occupied by Mr. Heath who will do wholesale grain, hay, feed and produce business, handling packing products, poultry and eggs.

DUFF-GORDON IS GIVEN SEVERE EXAMINATION

Attorneys Probe Deeply Into Peer's Conduct On Life Boat When Titanic Went Down.

London, May 20.—When the British Titanic inquiry was resumed today, Sir Cosmo Duff Gordon was subjected to a bitterly hostile examination into his conduct following the sinking of the vessel. The attorney who appeared on behalf of the third class passengers asked Gordon if he had suggested that the boat go back. Receiving a negative reply, the attorney asked:

"You saved your lives and left the others to drown?"

The peer's attorney objected, saying, "Do you think it is fair to ask such questions?"

The attorney for the Dockers' union called attention to the difference between Gordon's evidence and that of other passengers. The latter had said that both women and men rushed to the boat, while Gordon insisted that his story, that he had been waiting for the dock for some time before asking permission to enter the boat, was correct.

"The possibility of offering help was never thought of," asked the attorney. Gordon admitted this.

OKLAHOMA BAPTIST CONVENTION ADJOURNS.

By Associated Press. Oklahoma City, May 20.—The Baptist convention adjourned today. The last business was a protest against the use of any public funds in any way to promote sectarian interests and against those in any institution supported by public funds of any denomination, symbol, garb, etc. of any denomination.

SENATE REPORT AGAIN EXONERATES LORIMER

Majority Recommends that Former Judgment Be Held Final—Ten Votes Bought, Minority Says.

By Associated Press. Washington, May 20.—The case of Senator Lorimer of Illinois whose election was said to have been brought about by corruption was today placed before the Senate for final action. The majority of the special committee reported that all rules of law, judicial, procedure and justice required that the Senator's former judgment be held conclusive and that there was no new and substantial evidence discovered on the re-investigation, his election being "the logical result of existing political conditions in Illinois."

The minority reported that the evidence at the second inquiry was broad or more far reaching than the former and established that at least ten of the votes for Lorimer were corrupt. The report reviewed the legal authorities to show the first investigation should be taken as final. The majority rejected the version of Clarence Funk of a conversation that he had with Edward Hines, a Chicago lumberman, just after Lorimer's election. It was during this, Funk claimed, Hines asked for a \$100,000 contribution to a \$100,000 Lorimer fund. The majority report said Mr. Funk's testimony stood uncorroborated.

PURCHASE OF BYWATERS' TRACT REPORTED TODAY

Four Hundred Acres West of Electra Said to Have Been Bought By Producers.

Much interest is felt by oil men over the report that the Producers Company has purchased the lease of the Bywaters tract of something over 400 acres west of Electra. It is rumored that \$100,000 was paid for the lease although this report has not been confirmed. Whether this much was paid or not the price is believed to have been a good round sum, and the fact that the Producers Company has paid a big sum for it, gives confidence to the belief that there will shortly be important developments on the west side of the field.

COMMISSION UPHOLDS RATE ON PIG IRON.

Washington, May 20.—The Interstate Commerce Commission held today in deciding the case of the New Orleans board of trade against the Louisville and Nashville railroad and others that the present freight rate of \$3 per gross ton on pig iron from Birmingham to New Orleans was not unreasonable or discriminatory.

Wichita Falls squirrels who have already been out report a good crop of young squirrels, but the thickets are now thick with hunters and there is a man almost to every squirrel.

After the mulberry season the squirrels will be immune from wholesale slaughter until fall when the pecan begins to ripen.

CONSPIRACY TO DEFEAT WOLTERS IS ALLEGED

Houston Candidate Claims Effort to Prevent His Election, Even if He Gets Plurality, is Made.

Dallas, Tex., May 20.—Jake Wolters, candidate for the United States Senate, today gave out the following statement:

"To the Democrats of Texas: Months ago I said that if I did not receive the highest number of votes cast in the democratic primaries to be held July 27th, 1912, for Senator, I would withdraw and urge my friends in the legislature to vote for that man who does receive the highest number of votes. That pledge still stands. My purpose was and is to afford the demagogue an opportunity to elect a United States Senator by direct vote, just as they do all other officials in Texas from constable to Governor. I challenged my opponents to make a like pledge. This they have declined to do.

It was urged that Representatives and Senators should obey the instructions of the democrats of their respective districts by voting for that candidate who receives the highest number of votes in their respective districts. I recognize the face of the duty of a representative to obey the instructions of his immediate constituency and readily assented that I would not find fault with any candidate for the legislature who took this position. I would suggest that in order to prevent the possibility of electing a dark horse or some man to the United States Senate whose candidacy had not been submitted previously, getting two dummies and a pipe is the hitting pitcher, with a double and a triple.

RICHESON NOW WAITING CALMLY

ASSURES WARDEN THAT HE WILL NOT BREAK DOWN AT THE LAST.

TODAY MAY BE HIS LAST

Believed Execution Will Take Place Tonight—Relatives Not to Visit Him at All.

By Associated Press. Houston, May 20.—A desire that the last hours of his earthly existence might come speedily was apparently the dominating thought in Richeson's mind as he arose today.

"I will be ready when you want me," he said to Warden Burgess last night when that official visited him. "Do not worry, I shall not break down."

He bore up well during his last Sunday on earth. He was even cheerful as he sang with the chaplain. Several times he repeated his favorite quotation "Sometime we'll understand." It was not until late that he fell into a full sleep.

"I have so little time to live and so much to say that I want to talk, talk, talk," he said.

No relatives will console him in his last hour or pay him a farewell visit. His aged father in Virginia is too feeble to stand the ordeal. His New York sister said it was her desire not to have her last thought of her brother in his condemned cell. His brother, Douglas Richeson, of Chicago, although in the city today declared last night that he would not go to the prison today but would remain until after the execution to attend to the disposition of the remains. It is thought Richeson will be executed soon after midnight.

STOLEN HORSE FOUND BUT THIEF ESCAPES

Sunset Officers Looked Into Muzzle of Gun While Man They Wanted Beat It.

Officers at Sunset got possession of a horse for which the one stolen from F. M. McKinley here about ten days ago had been traded, but the thief evaded capture. L. P. Huddleston is the man charged with the theft and the Montague county officers are hot on his trail.

Yesterday the officers at Sunset received a tip that the man they wanted was at the home of his brother near that place. Two of them started to get him. Arriving at the home of his brother one started in the front yard while the other stood guard at the back. The officer who started in the front yard was stopped by a door being slammed in his face and locked. In the meantime Huddleston's brother got the drop on the officer on the outside with a double-barreled shot gun and Huddleston himself bolted out the back door and escaped into the bushes. The officer who had started in the front yard started around to the back of the house and he too was held up by Huddleston's brother. Both looked into the muzzle of the shot gun while the man they had come to capture ran to cover in the bushes.

A horse was found for which Huddleston had traded the one that had been stolen from Mr. McKinley. An effort will be made to find where the trade was made.

DISTRICT CONVENTION OF REPUBLICANS HERE

Will Make Nominations for Congressman and Effect Reorganization of Committee.

At a meeting of the Republican congressional committee of the Thirtieth district at Henrietta last week it was decided to hold the district convention to nominate a candidate for congress from this district in Wichita Falls. The district committee will also be reorganized at the same date. The selection of a candidate for congress is relatively unimportant as the candidate will have no chance of election but the reorganization of the committee is of some importance as the committee may have something to say concerning the distribution of patronage in case a republican president is elected next fall.

At the district convention at Henrietta to select two delegates to the national convention last week instructions were given for Roosevelt, W. H. Featherstone and Robert Hill were the delegates named.

NO COMPROMISE SAYS ROOSEVELT

"I'LL BE THE COMPROMISE CANDIDATE MYSELF" HE SAYS IN OHIO.

DENIES DARK HORSE TALK

Only Platform He Will Agree To Is One That He Has Written Himself, He Says.

By Associated Press. Cambridge, O., May 20.—Roosevelt said today he would resist any compromise at the national convention. "There can be no compromise," he said. "Some of our opponents are saying nothing but Taft nor I can be nominated. I'll name the compromise candidate. He will be me."

"I want to call your attention to something that amused me very much in a Zanovese paper there is an advertisement signed by the Taft candidates for delegate, as follows: 'If you believe in a dark horse in order to take the load of controversy off the party and give it a clear road to victory, we can and will be glad to serve you.'

"No Roosevelt delegate is saying anything like that. The other day a certain gentleman representing financial interests that are supporting Taft although on pleasant terms with me, said about what these two said. He said:

"We know Taft can't be nominated and we want to know if you will consent to a compromise candidate and platform."

"I replied that I stand for myself as the original candidate and as the compromise candidate and as for the platform we will accept a compromise by taking the whole platform."

COBB URGES TEAM-MATES TO KEEP ON WITH GAME

Both President of League and Owner of Team Standing Pat on Strike Matter.

By Associated Press. Philadelphia, Pa., May 20.—Ty Cobb the suspended center fielder of the Detroit baseball team over whom the players struck on Saturday, this afternoon appealed to the strikers to return to the game without him. This followed a similar appeal from President Navan of the Detroit club for the men to stand by him. He told them they were still members of the Detroit team and had not yet jeopardized their positions.

In an interview President Johnson said he had told Navan he must send Cobb home as he would not be reinstated until the matter is thrashed out. "The players must submit to punishment. I told him; this probably will be a fine. I like Navan's attitude. He was very firm and expressed himself strongly on the strike."

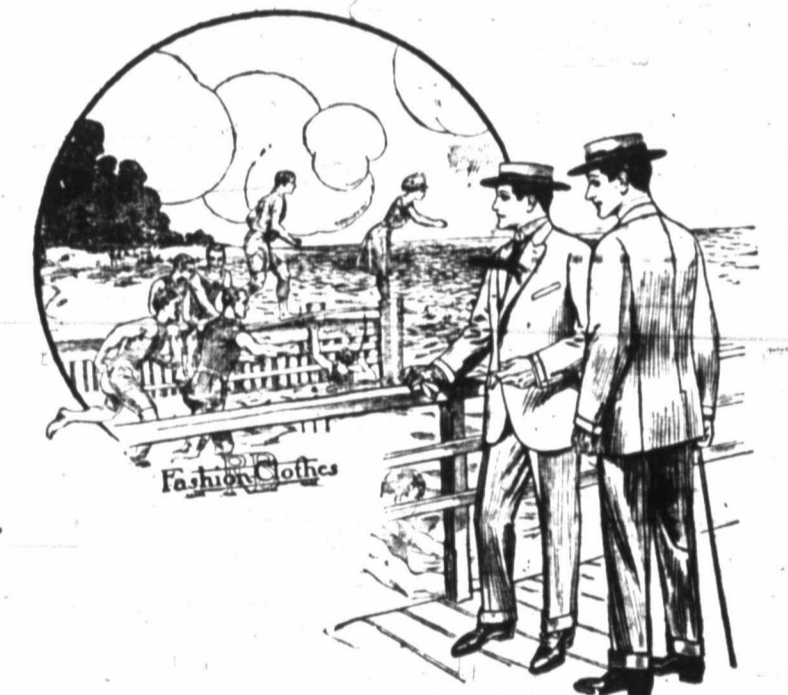

REVELATION OF GOD TO MANKIND

TWO CONGREGATIONS HEAR SERMONS AT M. E. CHURCH, SOUTH SUNDAY.

TAKES LESSON FROM PAUL

Protracted Meeting to Continue During This Week With Services Twice Daily.

Two congregations, morning and evening, which packed the great auditorium and all the balconies in the First M. E. church, South, heard Dr. Hill yesterday, as he discussed the question of God's revelation of Himself to man. The text was 1st Corinthians, second chapter and verses 9 and 10: "Eye hath not seen, nor ear heard, neither hath it entered into the heart of man, the things which God hath prepared for them that love Him; but God hath revealed it unto them by His spirit."

Dr. Hill said, in part: "When the Apostle Paul came from Athens to Corinth, he was not unaware of the many difficulties to be encountered in that great New York of the ancient world. He knew that his message would be rejected by some because it was not eloquent enough; by others because it lacked that logical consistency so important from the Greek standpoint; and by still others because it was unaccompanied by miracle or other signs and wonders. To all his critics his answer was the same; they were not in a position to judge correctly concerning his message of salvation. However wise and prudent they might be in regard to worldly matters, they were as incapable of discerning spiritual things as a blind man would be to pass upon distinctions in color or a deaf man to decide a case involving harmony of sound."

"His first proposition is, that the natural man—the man of eyes and ears and bodily senses merely—can not apprehend divine truths, since such truths are spiritually discerned. His next proposition is, that the mind, the heart, the seat of the affections and the imagination, is unable to search out and apprehend spiritual truth. The preacher called attention next to the way in which the truth in the spiritual realm was revealed. After stating that in order to a revelation there must be something to reveal, some one—a personality—as a revealer, and some one—also a personality—to whom the revelation is made. It was argued that as God was a spirit and a personality, His communication with man—another personality—must necessarily be spiritual, for bodily senses can only cognize bodily forms; and therefore, the things that

God hath prepared for them that love Him are revealed unto them by His spirit.

It was next pointed out that whatever the revealer may have to reveal a revelation is limited in its extent and power to the capacity of the personality to whom it is revealed; and that in God's revelation to men, He is limited to those who love Him. To listening love the universe is resonant with the ministry of the unseen; while the eye of trust and affection sees beauty and glory, which to the indifferent and the unloving are but pictures objectively visualized of their own subjective unloveliness. The pure in heart, and only they, see God, and even that vision of deity is enjoyed by means of the spiritual eye.

"We live and move and breathe in the realm of spirit, as our bodies are encased in the atmosphere about us; but contact with the unseen world, and especially with the spirit of God, can only be enjoyed by those who remove the hindrances to such contact and permit the inflow of spiritual life to play upon the soul. The chief and all-comprehensive hindrance to this spiritual discernment is selfishness, which is the tap-root and original source of every kind and character of sin. Hence, the need, the absolute and indispensable need, of repentance before faith—trust—in Christ can be exercised, and without which no spiritual experience can be realized in the consciousness of men. It was next pointed out that this spiritual revelation was a present reality. God "hath" revealed it. It is not stored away in some treasure house of the world to come. It is a present blessing, a present reality. Heaven and hell are states as well as places—especially states. The loving, trusting soul in spiritual contact with the great source of peace and life might be hurled down to the nethermost hell, but would rejoice in the consciousness of divine love amidst the fiery, buffeting waves of damnation. On the other hand, the soul that knows not God, that hates His church, despises the offers of His Son, and sneers and scoffs at the beautiful, the true and the good—such a soul, upon the sunlit hills of eternal glory, would feel and realize the pangs of the second death."

The meeting will continue during the week. Services at 9:30 to 10:30 in the morning and from 8 to 9 in the evening. BOY PROPHET NOW IN PARIS

FIFTEEN YEARS OLD. IS HAILED AS FORERUNNER OF NEW WORLD SAVIOUR.

MYSTERY OF DRESSMAKER

Poor Working Woman Brings About Some Wonderful Cures—Frog-Swallowing is Englishman's Feat.

(By William Phillip Simms, Paris Correspondent of the United Press.) Paris, May 20.—Kishnamurti, the Hindu prophet, regarded by many theologians as the precursor of the ultimate Master, has come to Paris. But 15 years of age, more than a year ago he wrote a book entitled, "At the Feet of the Master," which has been translated into many tongues and is said by some to be inspired.

The home of the lad is in Adgar, India. His presence in Paris as the forerunner of the Messiah, the Teacher who is to give the world its long expected moral transformation and usher in the Millennium, is in confirmation of the prediction of Mrs. Annie Besant, the American woman, who, in an address at the Sorbonne last June declared a profound change in the life of humanity was soon to arrive. The change would follow the appearance of the Master who would establish a new religion.

Undoubtedly, Alcyone is of genuine intelligence. Though but a boy, he presides over meetings of his elders at the Societe de Theosophie with rare skill and authority. He is the head of a new order, or religion, which he started over a year ago and which now numbers more than 5,000 members. About 700 of these are in France.

The new Prophet is eager for Western knowledge. He will soon enter Oxford, England, where he expects to study for six months. He declares the future will see a new culture in which will mingle the learning of the East and the West. He prophesies a new continent for these people, a new Elysian Fields, to spring up in the Pacific Ocean as Atlantis, according to legend, once existed, then disappeared in the Atlantic. He and his followers say the Bogoloff Islands, whose appearance in the North Pacific was accompanied by seismic disturbances, are the nucleus for this great land. In 20 months, 1,071 earthquakes have been felt in that portion of the Pacific.

Mlle. Camus, a poor dressmaker living in the squalid quarters of Montmartre, according to her followers, is a worker of miracles, and cases of the blind made to see, the lame to walk and the sick to become well again, are commonly spoken of as the direct result of her intervention.

The girl does not claim any power for herself. She says she is a disciple of Father Anthony, who 10 years ago, founded a religion in Jenappes, Belgium. He is hailed by his followers as the manifestation of the second coming of the Messiah.

At her lodging Mlle. Camus is known only as a poor working girl who has to earn her living with her needle, by working early and late. But she finds time to work her "miracles," and "cures" her patients being the very poor of her quarter. When asked to speak of some of her miracles, the girl looked astonished.

"It is very simple," she said. "A sick person comes to me and I ask him or her to think of Father Anthony. I think of him also. Then go to sleep and feel all the pain of the sick person. Gradually I take possession of the pain and draw it gradually from the sufferer. Then I conquer the pain in me and disperse it. I can feel it when the cure is complete. But I have nothing to do with the cure. I am only servant of Father Anthony, the Regenerator of Humanity."

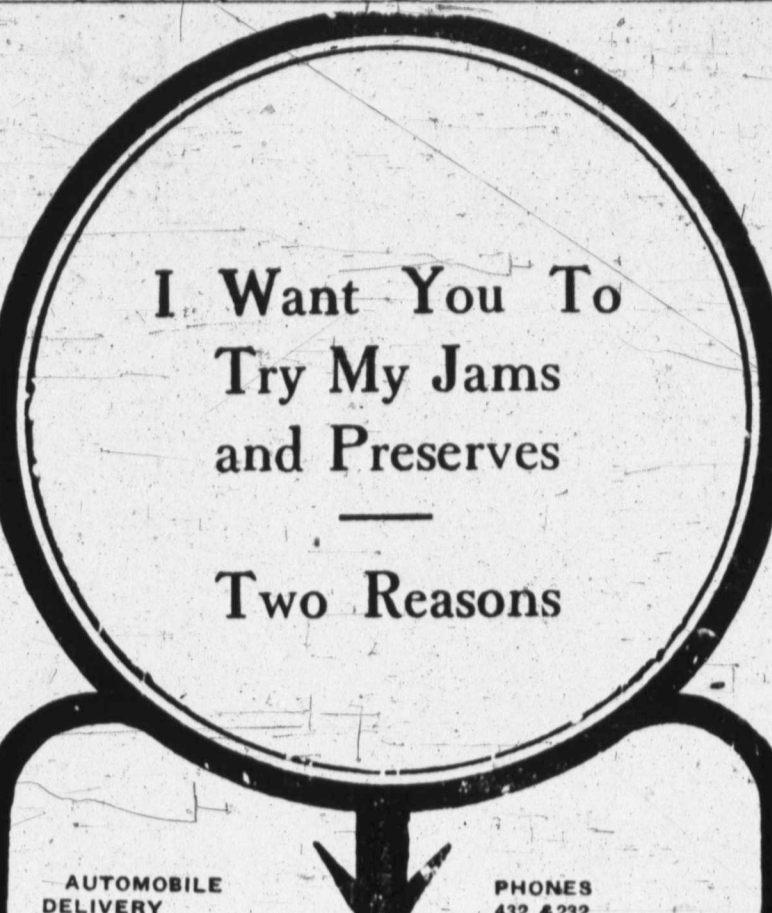

In the city, business is just a little dull, but it is different in the country. Everybody is busy making preparations to harvest the biggest wheat crop ever produced in this section of Texas.

Wichita Falls failed to land the 1913 State Press Association, but is in line for the 1914 meet. Until then the press boys will never know just what a good time they missed by not voting for Wichita Falls for the 1913 meeting.

It might be well for all candidates for office to remember that it will be necessary for them to file with the county chairman by Saturday, June 15, a written request to have their names appear on the ticket to be voted at the primary election on July 27th. With this request must be given the age, occupation and postoffice address of the candidate. On June 17th, it will be the duty of the county executive committee to hold a meeting for the purpose of determining how and in what order the names of candidates shall appear on the ticket to be voted, and estimate the cost of holding the primary, assessing each candidate his proportion of same. In this county, it is thought that it will be necessary to raise about \$200 for that purpose.

Women's Suffrage Is an Epoch Making Movement

By JANE ADDAMS, Hull House, Chicago

IT does not require a social philosopher to draw attention to the fact that our age is characterized by an almost UNIVERSAL ATTEMPT TO ENTER INTO GOVERNMENT ON THE PART OF THOSE HITHERTO WITHOUT THE FRANCHISE.

In spite of the number of American women who will vote for the next president America has not led in this as it did in two previous movements for the advance of democratic government. It certainly led in the worldwide effort at the end of the eighteenth century on the part of the middle class to represent their own interests directly in national parliaments. It was characterized by two dramatic revolutions, one in America and one in France, neither of them without great bloodshed.
