

## 500 CARS FOR ALFALFA CROP

### NORTHWESTERN GETS READY TO HANDLE HEAVY SHIPMENT FROM OKLAHOMA

## HARVEST IS IN PROGRESS

### Tipton Has Already Loaded One Hundred Cars and Frederick Has Sixty Ready To Ship

The Wichita Falls & Northwestern has placed an order for 500 freight cars for immediate delivery to be used in the movement of the big alfalfa crop from Oklahoma points.

The harvest of the first crop is now at its height. The dry weather has been very favorable for the harvest and the quality of the first cutting is excellent. The movement of the first cutting will probably exceed 1500 cars and before it is out of the way the second cutting will come on.

Tipton heads the list in shipments of this crop a hundred cars already having been loaded. Sixty cars had been loaded at Frederick Wednesday evening. F. M. Kell, who returned from Tipton yesterday reports that 16 cars were being loaded at that place yesterday.

## FORT WORTH BOYS WILL COME TO LAKE TO CAMP

### Other Associations Unable to Accept Invitation for This Summer, But Coming in 1913.

Preparations have been about completed for the summer Y. M. C. A. Camp in which the younger members of the associations of Fort Worth and Wichita Falls will take part. The camp will be held at Lake Wichita, beginning June 10 and lasting until June 18.

It had been planned for Sherman, Dallas and other associations to come her this year, but these had already progressed too far with arrangements to camp at other places and were unable to change their plans. However, practically all of them have agreed to come here next year and there is little doubt that the summer of 1911 will see a boys' camp at the lake participated in by members from Wichita Falls, Dallas, Fort Worth, Sherman, Denison, Gainesville, Childress and possibly some Oklahoma points.

The camp will cost the Fort Worth member \$9 apiece and the Wichita boys \$8 each. No boys over 18 years of age will be admitted. Secretary Anderson of the local association, who originated the general camp idea, is hard at work on the details.

## PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH UNION AGAIN SOUGHT.

Seattle, Wash., May 24.—The United Presbyterian general assembly voted unanimously today to hold the next meeting in Atlanta, Ga.

It was explained to the delegates that the general assemblies of the Presbyterian Church in the United States and the Southern Presbyterian Church would meet in Atlanta and that with the three sessions in the same city the plans for union might be worked out. A telegram was received from the chairman of the committee on church union appointed by the general assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States asking the appointment of a similar committee by the United Presbyterians. The assembly adopted a resolution that "a committee of conference be appointed to meet with a committee from other presbyteries to ascertain what a practicable basis of union may be found."

## NEW YORKERS BETTING ON REPUBLICAN RACE.

New York, May 24.—Prospects for a thrilling race, a wide latitude in betting and promise of the best "field" that has been entered in a "presidential handicap" have finally awakened New York's betting spirit and it is reported today that money is being freely offered as to whether Taft or Roosevelt or a dark horse will be the Republican choice.

## PANHANDLE PROSPECTS DECLARED PROMISING

### Judge J. H. Barwise Says Outlook for Wheat is Excellent—Iowa Park Conditions.

Judge J. H. Barwise, Sr., returned last night from the Panhandle, where he has been on business for the last two weeks. While absent from this city he visited Amarillo, Hartley, Texline and a number of the chief cities in that section of the State.

Regarding the outlook for a good wheat and oat crop in the Panhandle this season, Judge Barwise said this morning that in his opinion prospects were never better, and that the farmers in the section of the State from which he has just returned are regretting the fact that they did not plant a large acreage in grain.

Judge Barwise said that at the present time wheat stands in the fields at a height of from two to two and one-half feet, and that although the farmers believe that a rain would make the yield much larger, he thinks that without rain, the average yield of wheat in the Panhandle this year will total from fifteen to twenty-five bushels per acre.

J. F. McQuatters who has planted a large acreage of wheat between this city and Iowa Park, thinks that a rain without the next week or ten days would insure for this county one of the largest wheat crops in its history. His wheat at present is almost three feet high, and has not yet begun to head. He expects to trash any amount over fifteen bushels without further rain.

It seems that the farmers throughout this entire immediate section are of the same opinion as Mr. McQuatters. Three car loads of binders consigned by the National Harvester Co. to the Avis Hardware Company were recently unloaded here, and have been purchased by the farmers, and numbers of thrashers are being placed in condition preparatory to the harvesting of the wheat and oat crops. Many farmers who have not large acreages of wheat are preparing to engage in the thrasher business.

## WILSON WARNS JERSEY VOTERS

### SAYS UNINSTRUCTED DELEGATION PLAN IS PART OF EFFORT TO DEFEAT HIM

By Associated Press. Trenton, N. J., May 24.—Gov. Woodrow Wilson today issued an address to the voters of New Jersey in which he explained why he did not take the stump to ask for their votes at the coming primaries, and attacked his opponents who have organized against him and placed on the party ticket a full set of uninstructed delegates to the National convention. The New Jersey Governor is the only candidate for the Presidential nomination openly seeking votes in the primary.

After announcing his candidacy, Wilson says: "I was unwilling to canvass the State for your votes; I have spoken frequently in the past few months in other States because my friends thought I ought to make myself personally known there. But that should not be necessary in New Jersey. You know me. For 18 months I have served as Governor with a full sense of the responsibilities you have placed upon me. My platform and record are known and nothing I could say on the stump could make them better or worse. What is happening within the Republican party and a very unedifying sight it is, but what is happening in this State within the Democratic party is not so obvious.

"It is being done very secretly because it is being done by Mr. James Smith, Jr., former United States senator who knows no other way of acting in politics and has no suggestion to make to the voters which he can venture to make in public. The men he has induced to offer themselves as candidates to represent New Jersey in the convention wish to be sent on the 'without instruction' plan. What concerns us and makes the matter very much larger and more serious than the mere incidental question of whether I am to be nominated is the fact that this is Mr. Smith's attempt to re-establish his control over the Democratic party and put himself once more in position to make the Democratic party the partner of the old Republican machine in serving the special interests."

## LOCATE MISSING MAN IN OKLAHOMA

### G. R. GROUNDS IS FOUND NEAR WEATHERFORD, TRAVELING ALONE ON FOOT.

## WILL BE RETURNED HERE

### Had Been Absent for Several Days, Causing Friends and Relatives Much Alarm.

Word was received in this city at a late hour last night that G. R. Grounds, the man who so mysteriously disappeared from his home a few days ago and of whom no trace had been found since, had been located in Oklahoma, near Weatherford, a city about two hundred and fifty miles from this city and situated on the Rock Island railroad. Information that Grounds had been located was contained in a telegram sent to Dr. Duncan of this city.

According to the telegram, it seems that Grounds was attempting to make his way to the home of a sister who lives near Weatherford, and that he was proceeding on foot and alone. It is believed that his mental condition was very doubtful, and there was abundant evidence that he had been wandering around for several days unbalanced, as no reason for his having left home can be ascertained.

Soon after receiving yesterday evening's telegram, Dr. Duncan wired back for additional information, but up to this afternoon had received no answer. It is thought that Grounds will be sent back to this city at once, however.

## TRYING TO SAVE WOMAN FROM DEATH IN CHAIR

### Effort Being Made to Prevent Carrying Out of Sentence of Italian Murderers.

Boston, Mass., May 24.—Hundreds of women in Massachusetts are working to prevent the death penalty on Mrs. Lena Cusumano who with Harry Manselotti is sentenced to die in the electric chair during the week of June 2 for the murder of Mrs. Cusumano's husband. If the death penalty is inflicted she will be the first woman in Massachusetts to die in the chair.

## WOULD REQUIRE BANKS TO GIVE INFORMATION.

Washington, May 24.—Determined to answer the deft of Robert L. Fryer, president of the Fidelity Trust Company of Buffalo, N. Y., who refused to give information to the money trust investigators of the House, Representative Pujo, chairman of the House Banking and Currency Committee, announced that he would press his compulsory bill before the Senate.

The bill, which has passed the House, gives the investigators unlimited authority to command information from National banking institutions. State banks, such as the Fidelity Trust Company, would be compelled to answer if it held securities of any National institution.

## 800 TO 1000 LOST BY INSURRECTOS IN FIGHT

### Official Report Made to President Madero Gives Heavy Casualties On Rebel Side.

Mexico City, May 24.—President Madero last night received the details of yesterday's battle, the report placing the number of rebel casualties at 800 and 1,000 dead and wounded. Part of the artillery which was lost at Rellano in the previous battle was recaptured.

After the artillery battle had been in progress for seventeen hours, the enemy began a flank movement against the federal's right which was opposed by a brigade of infantry aided by batteries of mountain artillery and rapid fire guns. This engagement was entirely outside the Rellano zone and resulted in the complete dispersing of the rebel flanking column. A cavalry detachment 1,200 strong finished the combat, carrying out a flanking movement which drove the enemy from their positions.

## OIL VALUATIONS CAUSE PROTESTS

### LAND OWNERS AND LEASE HOLDERS PREPARE TO FILE THEIR OBJECTIONS.

## "CONFISCATORY" IS CRY

### Commissioners Contend Figures Cover Only Fair Market Value of the Leases.

The county commissioners Thursday completed their valuation of lands and leases in the oil field at Electra for purposes of taxation and County Clerk Reid today is sending out notices of the amounts assessed to the owners of the leases and lands together with notice of a hearing on June 5th at which cause may be shown why the assessments should not be made at the figures named.

Although only a few of the lease holders have as yet learned the assessments fixed by the commissioners' court, it is apparent that there will be a storm of protests. Some declare they will be glad to sell their leases at the price assessed and say the assessments are confiscatory.

In making the assessments the commissioners fixed the values on what they believed to be the fair market value of the leases. Where the owners of the land on which the leases were held retained one-eighth or any other percentage of the oil and gas rights the value of such was added to the agricultural value of their land.

## RIOTING IS RESUMED IN BUDAPEST STREETS

### Strikers Refuse to Obey Orders of Leaders—Casualties in Thursday's Fight Are Heavy.

By Associated Press. Budapest, May 24.—Fighting has been renewed in the streets today between strikers and the police, who are aided by troops. A great mob disobeyed their leader's orders to return to work and began the wrecking tactics that marked yesterday's conflict. The strike, precipitated by Count Pina's election to the speakership of the house, was called off at midnight by Socialistic leaders. They were unable to control their men. About 50,000 comprising half of the factory men of the city marched through the streets. The list of casualties yesterday was six killed and 160 wounded, 100 seriously.

The origin of the outbreak was entirely political, due to the dissatisfaction of the socialists with the prospects for getting universal suffrage, which was rendered more remote by the election of Count Tisza, the bitter opponent of the extension of the franchise.

In the lower house there were scenes of great disorder. Opposition members violently protested against the arbitrary action of the president and demanded a suspension of the sitting—a demand which Count Tisza curtly refused. Previously Count Tisza had definitely announced his attitude when he said:

"Even if fifty persons are shot down in this I shall not suspend the sitting."  
Finally the opposition moved for a secret sitting to discuss the riots and the motion carried. Francis Kosuth, leader of the united opposition, then appealed to the government for consent to place electoral reform before the army bill, so as to restore peace.

Count Apponyi demanded that the sitting be closed, but the president refused saying parliament could not behave like a hysterical old woman. After considerable angry discussion the house adjourned.

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## SAYS BURNETT DEFENDED SELF

### TOM PICKETT WAS EYE-WITNESS TO THURSDAY'S SHOOTING AT PADUCAH.

## ALLEGED THREATS MADE

### Trouble Between Two Men Was of Several Years' Standing, According to Reports.

Constable Tom Pickett returned last night from Paducah, Texas, where he was with Col. Burke Burnett when the latter shot and killed Farley Sayers in the Goodwin Hotel there yesterday morning.

Mr. Pickett went up with Mr. Burnett to the latter's ranch in King county last week to look at some horses and had spent the week there. Yesterday morning they drove to Paducah in Mr. Burnett's automobile to take the train. Mr. Pickett to Wichita Falls and Mr. Burnett to Fort Worth. They reached Paducah at about 9:30 o'clock. Upon their arrival several citizens there told Mr. Burnett in Mr. Pickett's presence that Sayers had been in town buying cartridges and saying that he was going to kill Burnett. They did not know, however, that Sayers was in town. At about 11:45, says Mr. Pickett, Mr. Burnett suggested that they wash up for dinner. They went to the washroom, Mr. Burnett being in the lead. Entering the wash room they found three men there. One of them whom Pickett afterwards learned was Sayers, reached in his pocket as if for a gun, but Burnett beat him to it and before he could draw fired. Sayers fell to the floor dead with a bullet through his heart. Fearing more trouble, Mr. Pickett, says he drew his own gun and covered the other two men who broke and ran out the door.

He said the shooting caused wild excitement in the hotel. When the body of Sayers was searched by the coroner a revolver was found in his side pants pocket on the right side. It was reported at Paducah that two revolvers were found on Sayers' body but Mr. Pickett says he saw only one.

The revolver with which Burnett shot Sayers was a 45-caliber Colt. Two days before the killing, Pickett reports, a farmer named George rode twenty miles to warn Burnett that Sayers was exhibiting a gun and was saying that he was going over to Burnett's ranch and kill him. For several days before the killing some news

## CUBAN TROUBLE NOT YET ENDED

### NEGRO INSURGENTS STILL MAKING DEPREDATIONS IN PARTS OF ISLAND.

## FIGHTING CRAFT ON HAND

### Both English and American Navies Represented, Prepared to Protect Individual Interests.

By Associated Press. Havana, Cuba, May 24.—Two stores in the village of San Marcos in the vicinity of Guantanamo belonging to the Fidelity Company, an American concern were pillaged by a band of rebels today. The negroes carried off all the stock as well as eight horses and \$500 in cash. The Cuban cruiser "Cuba" has reached Guantanamo with reinforcements of infantry and artillery, as well as arms for the local volunteers.

The British protected cruiser "El Pomene" arrived today and exchanged salutes with the fortress at Havana. Rumors are current that the "El Pomene" has come for the purpose of insuring on fullest protection for British subjects and property in Cuba.

The Cuban government declares it has not received any further news from the province of Oriente and that reports from other sections of the island indicate complete tranquillity prevails. The government announces the insurrection has failed completely and that the government will be speedily able to restore order. The press generally approves of the action of Washington in sending warships.

So far there has been only one small skirmish between regulars and insurgents in the vicinity of Santiago, the latter being dispersed with a loss of one man killed and one wounded. It is feared in Oriente the government may not be able to control the situation. The number of armed bands, according to general report, is rapidly increasing and the character of the country is such as greatly to impede the movements of the regular troops, who are likely to find much difficulty in forcing the insurgents to risk a decisive action.

Up to the present there have been practically no depredations committed on American properties in Oriente, but some cases of fields belonging to Spaniards are reported to have been burned. Many mills have ceased operations. All the provinces except Oriente seem to be tranquil. There is difficulty in determining conditions in the latter province, where the estimate of insurgents in arms varies from 400 to several thousand. This is due to the government monopoly of the telegraph lines, which practically excludes messages.

The American minister, Arthur M. Beaupre, unofficially informed Senator Sanguly, secretary of state, of the determination of the United States to send the transport Prairie with 700 marines aboard and the gunboat Paducah and Nashville to Guantanamo. Mr. Beaupre gave the explanation that this action was taken in the friendliest spirit toward the Cuban government.

Secretary of the Interior, Laredo Bru said: "We regard the action of the American government with the utmost satisfaction as a political expression of friendship."  
Throughout the province of Oriente a condition bordering on panic prevails and the whites are taking refuge in the cities. A number of American refugees have arrived in Havana. The Ultimata Hora prints a statement purporting to come from a secret agent of the government indicating that the government has evidence that the insurrectionary movement has been instigated and is being financed by the editor of a Cuban newspaper and a former consular representative.

Negroes Capture Town

## 200,000 AT FUNERAL OF DENMARK'S LATE RULER

### Body is Laid to Rest Among Tombs of Predecessors—Crowds Throng Streets.

By Associated Press. Roskilde, Denmark, May 24.—Among the tombs of his predecessors the body of King Frederick VIII of Denmark was buried this afternoon. Two hundred thousand mourners thronged the streets.

## \$55,000 WORTH OF OIL FROM WELL IN ONE DAY

Gusher in Mexican Field Said to Hold World's Record for Production. Figures Are Given.

Mexico City, May 24.—An oil well that is capable of producing in one day a crude product valued at \$55,000, which is more than the president of the United States formerly received as annual salary, is well worth being given a leading place in the list of the world's natural phenomena. In the Potrero del Llano field, situated about 100 miles southeast of Tampico, Mexico, is a well of the gusher type which is pronounced by oil experts to be the largest producer known in the world's history of that industry. It has demonstrated that it is not only capable of producing 110,000 barrels of oil for one day, but that it can keep up that performance for an interminable duration; at least, it kept it up for three months without the slightest decrease of output and during the period it ran wild it flooded a big scope of country with the fluid. It was tested, after being throttled down for several months to a flow of about 25,000 barrels daily, and the gauge showed that it still retained its original output of 110,000 barrels daily.

Based on a value of only 50 cents per barrel for the oil the well is capable of producing a revenue of \$55,000 daily or \$20,975,000 in one year. The proved capacity of the Potrero del Llano well is more than 40,000,000 barrels of oil per annum.

There is no theory connected with this statement. Practical oil men

who witnessed the performances of the monster say that there is every reason to believe it will be able to keep up its 110,000 barrel daily production for a much longer period than one year. It ran uncontrolled for three months and of more than 10,000,000 barrels of oil that it shot high into the air during that period only 2,600,000 barrels were saved. During that whole three-months day and night shifts of the most expert oil machinery and equipment men in the United States were busy trying to bring the roaring, pulsating giant under control. These trained mechanics tried every known device in their efforts to stop the enormous flow. Finally a great steel valve, with a strength capable of withstanding 2400 pounds pressure to the square inch was placed upon the mouth of the well by means of powerful equipment. Even then the valve could be only partly closed. The cost of harnessing the well and the construction of storage reservoirs was upwards of \$500,000. It is stated Lord Cowdray of London, England, who is at the head of the Pearson syndicate, which owns this wonderful well, spent several weeks on the ground personally directing the difficult task of bringing the giant under control.

Then the reports reached the outside world of the enormous capacity of the well they were discredited by many leading oil operators and scientists. It was in order to satisfy a party of 15 or 20 of these skeptics that the dangerous risk of opening up the well to its full capacity was taken some time after it was brought under control. These men traveled all the way from the United States for the special purpose of viewing the giant in action. They were taken to Potrero del Llano from Tampico, and

when they viewed the throttled gusher which was then doing 25,000 barrels daily under the restraint of the enormous valve they openly expressed doubt of its reported capacity.

"Just to convince you gentlemen, I will open her up," said the representative of the Pearsons who had accompanied the party.

Turning to the foreman of the gang of Mexicans that was working nearby he ordered:

"Turn the valve wide open."  
The command was obeyed. It took but a minute to manipulate the machinery which controls the heavy valve. Instantly the heavy pressure of gas began to assert itself. The loud humming noise that attended the first flow of oil quickly grew into a deafening roar. The ground for a mile around shook and trembled as the solid column shot into the air. It mounted up, up until it reached a height of 491 feet above the ground. This column of oil spread to a diameter of three to four feet soon after it left the 8-inch casing. The spectators fled from the well and before they could reach places of safety they were drenched with the oil spray. For twenty minutes the gusher belched forth its product unrestrained.

SHIPPING OF ALFALFA BEGINS AT FREDERICK.

(Frederick Leader)

Sixty cars of alfalfa have been shipped from Frederick since the marketing of the first cutting began, a week ago. The cars average ten tons each, which makes a total of 600 tons shipped from Frederick, up to yesterday morning. The price started in Monday at \$11. A big crop is being cut all over the state, and the glutting of the market caused the price to drop to \$9 in Frederick yesterday morning. The hay is of good quality. Huge wagon loads of it are constantly being brought to town, and much more is yet to be marketed. Tipton, which is in the center of an alfalfa country, has shipped more than Frederick.

The first cutting of alfalfa is the advance guard of a bumper crop of grain and hay for Tillman county, if indications may be taken to mean anything. There is considerable complaint of need of rain for oats and cotton, but wheat and corn are doing nicely, and the alfalfa farmers have been made glad by the dry sunny days, to give them an opportunity to cut and cure their hay.

It matters not to us what disposition John Jacob Astor made of his millions in his last will, the fact remains that when put to the true test he died like a brave man should want to die. Let's not measure a man by any other standard than that of honor, and when measured by that standard Astor was found to be of full length. Everyone, who has the right sort of energy, can accumulate wealth, but it is not everyone who can make up his mind to die rather than live at the risk of losing his honor.

Reports from Ohio yesterday say the law which prohibits the hauling of the voters to the polls prevented many of the farmers from voting. The state was benefited by such a class of men remaining away from the polls. When a man has to be hauled to the polls he is not enough interested in the welfare of his state and country to cast an intelligent vote.

Florida ought to have a similar law, not for the farmers but for the cities where automobiles and carriages are furnished to the voters to go to and from the polls.

Give us a higher order of politics, and let the voters be men with convictions of their own.—Pensacola (Fla.) Journal.

Any election that cannot create sufficient enthusiasm in the ordinary voter to induce him to slide, if necessary, at least a half block on his stomach in order to reach the polling place, is no election worthy to take notice of. Only those who think should vote, and as a rule the kind who have not the power of thought are the ones who expect their friends and neighbors to give them a sort of joy ride to the polls. There is such a law in Texas, but little attention is given it.

The Herald stands for a greater remuneration and less representation, when it comes to the election of another legislature. The State Legislature is already unwieldy and the compensation a legislator receives, is not sufficient to induce the best men at all times to seek the place. There are only two kinds of men who can afford to go to the Legislature, one is the young man who is ambitious and who is seeking political preferment to use the position as a stepping stone, and the other is the fellow who has an axe to grind.—Weatherford Herald.

Of course there is another class of fellows who run for the Legislature but the above writer was too kind hearted to mention them. But at the risk of criticism and of probable personal assault we believe we will indulge ourselves and mention the third class—it is the fellow who isn't fit for anything else and, having tried everything else and, having tried to conceive the idea that he must be cut out for a legislator.—Gleburne Review.

### GENERAL LEE'S MAGNANIMITY.

The following is from the paper of Jefferson Davis in the North American Review:

"After the close of the war, while I was in prison and Lee was on parole, we were both indicted on a charge of treason; but, in haste to get in their work, the indictment was drawn with the fatal omission of an overt act. General Grant interposed in the case of General Lee on the ground that he had taken his parole and that he was, therefore, not subject to arrest. Another grand jury was summoned and a bill was presented by inserting specifications of acts. General Lee was summoned as a witness before the grand jury, the object being to prove by him that I was responsible for certain things done by him during the war. I was in Richmond, having been released by virtue of the habeas corpus. Lee met me very soon after having given his testimony before the grand jury, and told me that to the inquiry whether he had or not, in the specified cases, acted under my orders, he said that he had always consulted me when he had the opportunity, both on the field and elsewhere; that after discussion, if not before, we had always agreed, and therefore he had done with my consent and approval only what he might have done if he had not consulted me, and that he accepted the full responsibility for his acts. He said he had endeavored to present the matter as distinctly as

he could and looked up to see what effect he was producing upon the grand jury. Immediately before him sat a big black negro, whose head had fallen back on the rail of the bench he sat on; his mouth was wide open and he was fast asleep. General Lee pleasantly added that, if he had had any vanity as an orator, it would have received a rude check. "The evident purpose was to offer to Lee a chance to escape by transferring to me the responsibility for overt acts. Not only to repel the suggestion, but unequivocally to avow his individual responsibility, with all that, under existing circumstances, was the highest reach of moral courage and gentlemanly pride. Those circumstances were exceptionally perilous to him. He had been indicted for treason, the United States President had vindictively threatened to make treason odious; judicial seats were held by political adventurers; the United States Judge of the Virginia district had answered to a committee of congress that he could pick a jury so as to convict Davis, or Lee, and it was under such surroundings that he met the grand jury and testified as stated above. Arbitrary power might prevent justice and trample on right, but not turn the knightly Lee from the path of honor and truth."

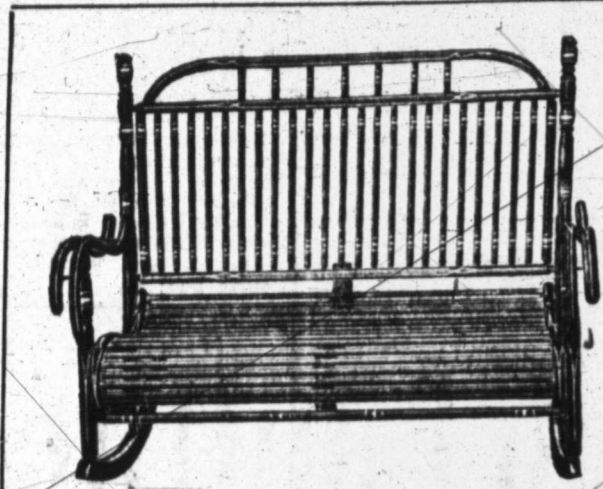

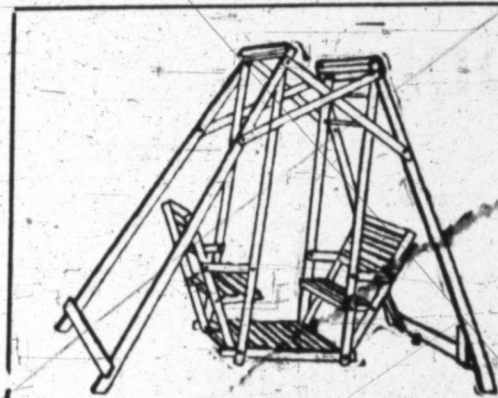

### MUCH HEROISM ATTEND FLOOD IN LOUISIANA.

New Orleans, May 24.—Conditions in camps where thousands of Mississippi flood refugees are gathered are excellent, according to a statement prepared for the Associated Press by John M. Parker, who returned to New Orleans this morning from a two months' experience in the inundated districts of Mississippi and Louisiana. As a plantation owner, Parker was a large loser from the floods. Parker began his story with a narration of the break in the levees

which flooded thousands of the rich acres of the Mississippi delta. "The water's roar was the first warning of the breaches," said Parker, "and it was only a few hours later that the tide was sweeping through houses then the next day, only the roofs were to be seen. "Planters were well aware of the dangerous situation and almost without exception had issued orders 'save lives first, then save whatever else you can.' The result of that order was that not a single person out of the 6,000 directly affected lost their lives."

### REVOLUTION IS ON IN SPITE OF SET BACK

By Associated Press. Orozco's Headquarters, Jiminez, May 24.—Gen. Orozco today declared the revolutionary party in Mexico had not suffered as a result of his defeat at Reilano yesterday by Gen. Huerta's forces. Scarcity of ammunition, the superior artillery fire of the federals and the intolerable heat made it necessary to cease fighting, he says. The rebels did not disband nor retire in disorder, but stood valiantly in their positions until ordered to turn from the battlefield. Gen. Orozco arrived here today, making this town his headquarters, while the vanguard of the army is at Corilitas. "I do not consider this as indicative of the overthrow of the revolution," Gen. Orozco said, "we shall keep on fighting and in the end we shall win. Guerilla warfare will not be resorted to, as has been stated by enemies of the revolution."

The rebels today prepared for a resumption of the campaign. All cannon were saved. The rebel loss is placed at not more than one hundred.

Bachimba, 46 miles south of Chihuahua probably will be the scene of the next combat. The fighting is slowly growing close to Chihuahua. Many bridges were burned by the rebels and if they move further north beyond Machimba to Ortes the destruction of a bridge there will delay the federals.

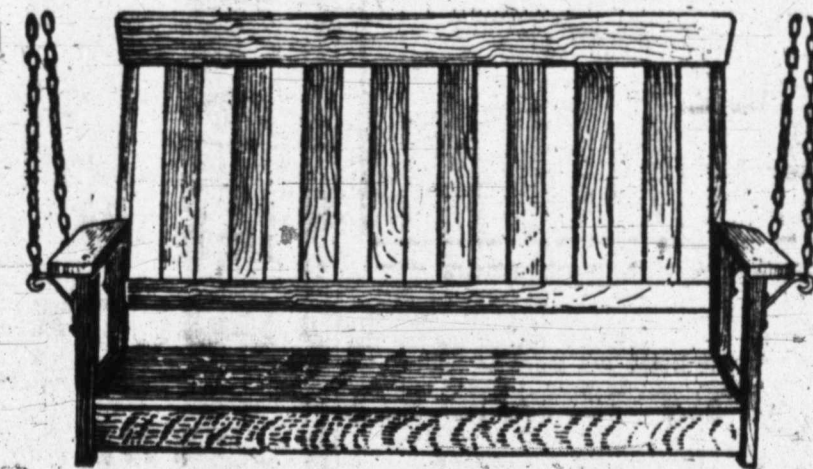
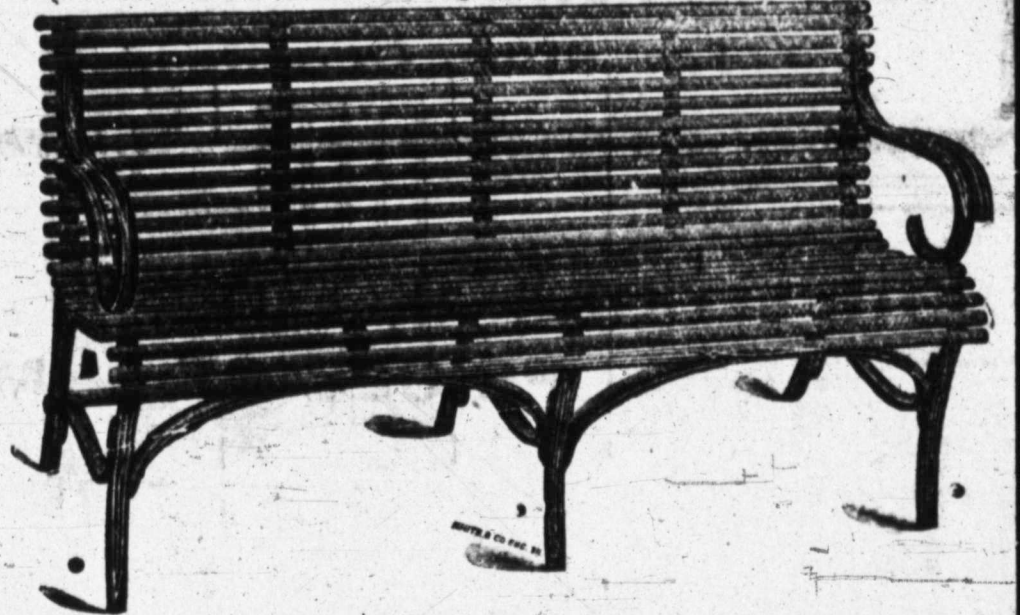

EXPLOSION KILLS A FAMOUS NOVELIST.

Niagara Falls, N. Y., May 24.—Arthur Stringer, one of the best known and most talented novelists in America, was killed and his beautiful wife, formerly known as Sylvia Howland, the actress and their two-month-old baby girl were fatally injured in an oil stove explosion in their home here.

Mr. Stringer was heating some milk on the stove for the baby. What caused the explosion is not known, but it was heard by people in neighboring houses, and a number of persons ran into the Stringer house. All three were on the floor of the kitchen. The wife and baby were stunned by the force of the explosion and their clothing was ablaze. Mr. Stringer had been instantly killed. At the Memorial Hospital it was said there was practically no hope of saving the lives of Mrs. Stringer and her baby. Both were so badly burned as to be almost unrecognizable.

Things First"—defining and locating the Kingdom of God, and how and when to seek it. He quoted from Paul, defining the Kingdom as "not meat and drink, but righteousness, peace and joy in the Holy Ghost." In locating the Kingdom, he quoted Jesus: "For the Kingdom of God cometh not with observation; neither shall ye say, Lo here, or Lo there; for I say unto you that the Kingdom of God is within you." Directing as to how this Kingdom of God should be sought, he quoted that familiar scripture: "Seek the Lord while He may be found; call upon Him while He is near." After cataloguing the hindrance to the seeking of the Kingdom, as the love of money, of fame and of pleasure, he quoted from Isaiah: "Let the wicked forsake his way, and the unrighteous man his thought, and let him return unto the Lord, who will have mercy upon him, and unto our God who will abundantly pardon." He used the illustration in the parable of the Pharisee and the Publican to show the two attitudes that different classes sustain to God—one, the Pharisee, that of pride and boastfulness, self-satisfaction and contempt of others; and the other, that of the Publican, who felt the burden of his sin and turned to God, throwing himself absolutely upon His mercy.

RIOTING IS RESUMED IN BUDAPEST'S STREETS

Meanwhile a deputation of workmen waited on Premier Lukacs and offered to stop the rioting if the men were permitted to hold an open-air mass meeting. The premier replied that he could only permit an indoor meeting. Thereupon, Count Aponyi and others sent an appeal by telegraph to the emperor in favor of universal suffrage so that a revolution might be prevented. The socialist union, apparently fearing further bloodshed, called off the strike, which was originally intended to last four days.
