

## BACCALAUREATE SERMON HEARD

REV. J. P. BOONE PREACHES TO HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATES AND THEIR FRIENDS

## LARGE CROWD IS PRESENT

Special Musical Program is Rendered—Pastor Delivers Inspiring Message to Young People

A crowd that filled the First Baptist Church to its capacity heard Rev. J. P. Boone preach the baccalaureate sermon to the senior class of the Wichita Falls High School yesterday morning, a short program being rendered before the beginning of the sermon.

The program which began at 11 o'clock, was as follows: Doxology; Invocation, Rev. J. P. Boone; Hymn; Scripture Reading, J. B. Jones; Prayer, W. W. Brown; Anthem—"Oh, Come Let Us Sing," Choir Announcements, Prof. J. B. Jones and Rev. J. P. Boone; Hymn; Offering; Solo—"By the Waters of Babylon," C. H. Hendry; Sermon, Rev. J. P. Boone; Solo, "Remember, Now Thy Creator," J. W. Bradley; Benediction, Rev. J. P. Boone.

The text of Rev. Boone's sermon was taken from Mark 8:35. "For whosoever will save his life shall lose it; but whosoever shall lose his life for my sake and the Gospel's the same shall save it."

The pastor expressed his appreciation of the honor afforded by an opportunity to say a word to such a company of young men and young women, who so soon are to be graduated from the high school. His point of view was that it was fitting that a sermon be preached on such an occasion, because the purpose of every church and school in the country that are worthy of the name is the same.

There is a verse at the opening of the Bible, he said, that should be written over the entrance of every school and church in the land. It is that old sentence: "Let us make men."

Continuing he said: "Those words express the purpose of every school, every church and every man. It is not simply to teach this branch or that branch of learning, however important the subject may be, but to make men. It is not simply to discover some new sky or decipher some old palimpsest, or inscription; but to make men. This is the object of every church as well as of every school. They are to make men, and school and church their efforts together in this endeavor, to make men of clear head and stout heart and strong will; men of understanding, information, and resolution; men who know how to love devotedly, and hate determinedly, and act promptly and grow forever."

"The importance of this occasion has led me to select a most important theme, it is 'Your life.'"

"The past century is known as a wonderful century. Thirteen of the great inventions and discoveries were made during the last one hundred years, and only seven were made in all preceding centuries. It is not for new facts have been discovered during the last seventy-five years than during the previous seventy-five hundred years. The question pressing upon all our religious and educational leaders today is this—have we made our men as fast as we have made our machinery? In other words, have we advanced in knowledge of how to fashion men and women as rapidly as we have advanced in knowledge of how to make machinery? Is the man who stands behind the loom today as great an advance as is the loom of itself? Is the man who owns the automobile as great an advance as is the machine itself?"

"One of the great ideas of today is conservation. The last ten or fifteen years has seen a great awakening of the conscience and of the economic sense of the Nation. We are insisting now upon husbanding the natural resources of the land for ourselves and for our children, who are to come after us."

"But life is being poured out like water in our Nation; and when the most costly thing in the world is being wasted, it is time for us to awaken to discover the need of husbanding our moral resources. It is a fact that there is a many sided waste of our spiritual goods."

"Men hesitating over their duty, sidestepping the great decisive crises of their lives, issuing the resolution of which alone can make character and enable a man to serve his God and the world, are every day heard of in numerous instances and in many places."

"We as teachers and preachers must study the problem of why it is that so many lives are lived at a fraction of their possible potency, and why men are content to tie themselves to transient enterprises when great and enduring causes are calling for life. Christ laid down a principal here. The higher welfare of man can be secured only by an submitting to the lower. The person who makes it the decisive question to save his life for himself and keeps aloof from Christ shall lose it. This is an inevitable result. Self indulgence as against the claims of Christ shall be fatal. Whosoever shall save his life in the lower sense or that pertaining to himself will inevitably perish."

"The New Testament pours out its scorn on the smooth indulgent life because it cannot connect men and

women with the real springs of strength and power. No man was ever made without some resistance in his life. All strength in life comes by pushing against opposition. If you desire that your higher life be saved, then lose your lower life.

"But you may say, what is meant by losing one's lower life? I will endeavor to explain. It is not merely the actual surrender of physical existence; it is not a reference to the martyr on whose bleeding brows the crown of life is placed; but there is a daily losing which is required from all Christian people and is as hard or harder than the brief and bloody passage of martyrdom. No man possesses himself until he has given himself and his life to Jesus Christ. Only when we have passed the reins into His hands can we coerce and guide the fiery steeds of passion and of impulse. Notice the remarkable expression of scripture when it speaks to those who believe in the acquiring of their souls. You are not your own masters until you are Christ's servants; and when you have promised yourselves liberty you have become the slaves of corruption. If you would own yourselves, give yourselves to Christ."

"Fling your whole being, your wealth, your activities, and everything which you possess into Christ's hands, and they will come back to you in possessions for this world and in the world to come."

The speaker took up the subject "A personal submission." He explained its meaning and in the course of his remarks said: "The comets that career about the heavens need to be caught and tamed and bound to peaceful revolution around some central sun or else they are wandering stars to whom is reserved the blackness of darkness forever. We are like the comets, we must bound our lives to Christ in order to attain the highest degree of success in this and the world to come. Those who have enthroned Christ upon the sovereign seat of their wills have lost their lives. They can say, 'I live not, but Christ liveth in me.' Then and only then," said Rev. Boone, "they have the deepest sense of the world lost their lives."

The pastor discussed the sacrifice entailed by a complete submission. He said that it would be absurd for Christ to make his claim of submission if it were not for one thing. His unique claim in His solitary sacrifice. "He who has died for us, and He only has the right to require the unconditional and absolute surrender of ourselves to him. Sir James Y. Simpson who gave to the world chloroform, said in response to the question, 'What is your great discovery?' 'That I have a Savior.'"

Following yesterday's sermon, the commencement exercises of the senior class will be held in the Wichita Theatre tonight.

## ADVANCE GUARD IS AT HOUSTON

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE HOLDS FIRST MEETING TODAY—WILL HEAR CONTEST.

## DELEGATES' SLATE MADE

Includes Culberson, Sells, Cone Johnson and Tom Ball—Convention Meets Tomorrow.

By Associated Press. Houston, Tex., May 27.—The Democratic State executive committee met this afternoon, announced a committee of three consisting of Nat Henderson of Wichita Falls, Miles Crowley of Galveston and C. D. Page of Bastrop to report on temporary roll of tomorrow's convention. No other business was transacted.

Late this afternoon it was conceded that the following would be assigned places as delegates at large to Baltimore: Senator Culberson, M. M. Crane, Cato Sells, Cone Johnson and Col. Tom Ball.

The platform fight began very cautiously today. On one side were the Bailey-Culberson-Walters forces and on the other the Ramsey and Wilson supporters. The Bailey-Culberson-Walters forces are aiming to prevent friction as much as possible. The aim of the Wilson and Ramsey men seems to be that this movement should not go so far as to leave the convention without a strong platform.

There are rumors that the initiative, referendum and recall might not be incorporated in the platform. It was reported that the Wilson and Ramsey people had not yet made a program upon which both could agree. A movement was started for T. W. Gregory as the Wilson candidate for National committeeman. This movement was reported to be strong and would weaken the chance of Cato Sells for the position.

By Associated Press. Houston, Tex., May 27.—There have been reports that the Wilson men in the Democratic State convention tomorrow might attempt to give a preference to the statewide prohibitionists as delegates to Baltimore. A Wilson leader, however, stated that this was a rumor within the limits of possibility because it would be a useless move by the "state-wideners," for the reason that a large number of Wilson majority at the State convention are prohibitionists.

This predominance, the Wilson leaders say, is temptingly attractive for the selection of pros, making it unnecessary for them to raise the issue. It is by no means certain the pros would have tried to raise the liquor question.

Eighteen of the thirty-one members of the State executive committee arrived in Houston today to noon, including Chairman Sheb Williams. The committee held its first meeting this afternoon. The first business is to appoint a sub-committee on credentials to make the temporary rules.

At 8 o'clock tonight the full committee met to hear the report of the sub-committee's report on temporary rules and on the four contests from Lavaca, El Paso, Fannin and Duval counties. The Duval county contest was between two Harmon delegations. That of Lavaca county was between Wilson and Harmon. In Fannin and Duval counties the contest was between Wilson and Clark.

After hearing these reports the State executive committee will adjourn until tomorrow morning, awaiting the action of the Wilson caucus tonight. It is predicted the State committee will ratify without protest. It had been thought that the executive committee might recommend for temporary chairman some one not in full sympathy with the Wilson adherents, and accordingly someone was sought, but the chairman's position that to the victor belongs the spoils, means that the committee will acquiesce in the choice of those who will be in control of the convention and recommend Hon. Richard Mayes of Corsicana, who will receive the convention's majority vote at least. The majority of the members of the State Democratic executive committee are not in accord with the majority of the convention, hence the supposition that an antagonistic attitude might be assumed by it in fulfilling the customary procedure of recommending the temporary chairman. Quite a bit of favorable comment was heard by Chairman Williams' position, though it is quite unreasonable to assume that the "steam rollers" will run any less surely because of it.

It is generally understood that Dick Mayes will be the Wilsonite choice for temporary chairman and that Hon. Cullen Thomas of Dallas will assume the gavel as permanent chairman.

There isn't the barest possibility of the plans of the Wilsonites misapprehending for they have more than 624 votes. Ordinarily there would be 624 votes in the convention, but as eighteen or twenty counties failed to hold conventions and elect delegates, the voting strength of the convention will be hovering around an even 600 and this reduction of the convention's strength is favorable to the supporters of Governor Wilson.

Then it might as well be taken for granted that any convention absentees will reduce the strength of the minority rather than the majority, for the

## REBELS' AMMUNITION SUPPLY RUNNING SHORT

This County Blamed and Feeling Runs High Against Americans—Orozco Mobilizing Forces.

By Associated Press. Chihuahua, Mexico, May 27.—The rebels are rapidly running out of ammunition and feeling against the United States for preventing importation of arms runs high. In the rebel zone lack of ammunition is one of the principal reasons why the rebels have retreated before the advancing federals. Nearly 250 miles of territory has been evacuated along the Mexican Central by the rebels.

Orozco arrived today and is mustering his men in an effort to check the federals at Machiba. The federals are thought to be near Jimenez. The rebels have about 6000 men in this vicinity.

## CLAIMS \$1000 REWARD OFFERED BY RAILROAD

Charles P. Yeary has filed suit against the Denver & North Western for the collection of the \$1,000 reward offered by the defendant company for the arrest of the persons who caused the wreck of the Fort Worth & Denver passenger train at Bellevue last October.

Yeary at the time was associated with a detective agency in this city and alleges that he found men he could have proved were responsible for the wreck but for the interference of the defendant company.

## ALLEGED WRONGFUL LEVY CAUSES FILING OF SUIT

City National Asks \$6500 Damages From Four Defendants—Adding Machine Basis of Case.

The City National Bank has filed suit against R. T. Pickett, N. P. Blakemore, Orr Bentley and J. M. Blakemore for \$6500 as damages for the alleged wrongful and malicious levy on a Burroughs adding machine owned by the plaintiff company. The value of the machine is placed at \$500 in the complaint and the bank alleges that its reputation was damaged to the amount of \$5,000 by the alleged wrongful and malicious levy.

## NO INTERVENTION LIKELY IN CUBA

WASHINGTON OFFICIALS INFORM GOMEZ THAT NONE IS INTENDED.

## WILL GUARD INTERESTS

President Taft Indicates Purpose of Department in Sending Marines to Island.

By Associated Press. Jersey City, N. J., May 27.—President Taft today sent a message to President Gomez of Cuba saying he would not intervene in Cuba.

By Associated Press. Washington, D. C., May 27.—Feeling assured that President Gomez has understood the purpose of the American government in dispatching the large naval force now on its way to Key West, the State Department after having instructed American Minister Bayard to make plain to the Cuban government the purpose of the movement has now left to the discretion of Col. Karmany, commanding the marine force on the cruiser "Prairie" and due at Guantanamo tomorrow, the extent to which the marines shall be employed.

It is believed that as soon as President Gomez is made aware of the fact that there is no sinister purpose behind the movement of the naval vessels and their commanders will do nothing more than see their forces to prevent injury to American lives and property he will no longer object.

President Taft today replied to President Gomez' telegram of yesterday heralding the attitude of the United States toward Cuba. The message follows: "I am sincerely gratified to learn of your government's emphatic action. This government's motive in sending ships to Key West was merely to be able to act promptly in case it should unfortunately become necessary to protect American life and property by moral support or assistance in the Cuban government."

President Gomez' message of protest was as follows: "It is my duty to say so serious a resolution alarms and hurts the feelings of a people who love and are jealous of their independence." He said after reciting that he had received from United States Minister Beaupre a note informing him that the Washington government had ordered a gunboat to Nipe bay and a strong naval concentration at Key West in anti-position of possible eventuality and it is in event that the Cuban government was unable to protect American property, it was the intention to land forces for that purpose.

President Gomez says the government is doing its utmost, having within four days sent 2,000 troops by land and sea to crush the rebels in Oriente, and in that short time having restored order in all parts of the island with the exception. He also says that 9,000 rifles with ammunition have been distributed to loyal citizens and that the government is prepared to flood the small section with rifles and revolvers.

"I appeal to you," he continues, "as a loyal friend of Cuba, respecting her rights; that you will be convinced that this government is capable and sufficiently supported by the Cuban people, to deal promptly with a few unfortunate and misguided persons without reason or flag."

"If you understand these conditions you will perceive that it is not the part of a friendly government to come back." It is the general report that the early sown wheat will make a fairly good yield whether there is any more rain or not but the late sown wheat and oats are needing rain badly and the yield is being cut down every day that it remains dry. It is believed, however, that a good rain would revive the crop so that even the late sown wheat and oats would make a good yield.

## NICARAGUA'S REQUEST FOR MONEY REFUSED.

San Juan Del Sur, Nicaragua, May 27.—In response to Nicaragua's importunities for money for the payment of debts, the United States government in a forceful note suggests that the Nicaraguan government oblige its partisans to disgorge claims which were paid to them after the revolution, amounting to millions of dollars. It is pointed out in the note that these reimbursements could be used to liquidate the claims approved by the mixed commission and for the redemption of paper currency.

## ESTIMATED LOSS \$75,000

Origin is Unknown—Many Valuable Books and Records in Library Destroyed.

By Associated Press. College Station, Texas, May 27.—The main building and library of A. & M. College were destroyed at 2 o'clock this morning by fire, the loss being estimated at \$75,000.

The origin of the blaze is unknown. It started on the third floor of the main building, and destroyed that structure and the library before it was checked.

No one was injured, though there were several narrow escapes. In the library a number of books and records of great value were burned.

The main building was the oldest structure on the campus. This is the third fire at the college within a year, previous conflagrations having resulted in destruction of the dining hall and one of the dormitories.

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## News From the Oil Fields

### SUMMARY OF WEEK'S ELECTRA OPERATIONS.

The Oil City Derrick publishes the following summary of last week's Electra activities:

The Electra field completed during the past week 10 oil wells and one dry hole. The producing wells had a combined production of 579 barrels. The Corsicana Petroleum Company's Red River-Cross Brown lease No. 14, struck oil at 961 feet and is good for 40 barrels. No. 15, same lease, 521 feet, 50 barrels. Same company's Sheldon lease, No. 6, 844 feet, 85 barrels; J. R. Brewer lease, No. 4, 1,092 feet, 20 barrels; No. 24, Putnam lease, 345 feet, 70 barrels.

Russell & Flannigan's No. 1, J. A. Fisher lease, is estimated at 35 barrels. The calibre of this well is somewhat of a question, as the cup on the valves do not last long enough to pay for putting them on, hence a steady run cannot be had. The owners are contemplating installing a working barrel, with a solid plunger in order to obviate the cutting out of the cups and the delays resulting therefrom. The well has made several small flows and its size may be very much underestimated.

The Producers Oil Company's No. 30, J. W. Stringer lease, at 551 feet is making 20 barrels and No. 6, G. E. Skinner lease, 1016 feet, 150 barrels. No. 5 on this lease, which was a high pumper at 1,027 feet is being drilled deeper and is now 1,225 feet, or 20 feet lower than No. 6, and is no better than it was before. This shows the spotted condition of the field. Next comes the same company's No. 14 on the Clint WoodsAllen lease, 1,010 feet, 50 barrels.

Another producer is Benson & Little's old No. 1 on the Douglas lease, which had been a light pumper for many months and which has been drilled deeper and is now making 6 barrels in the 1,085 foot sand.

The lone dry hole was the Producers Oil Company's No. 1 on the Beat lands, block 255, about five miles north of the pool. It was drilled to a depth of 2,680 feet and abandoned.

The Pure Oil Company's test on the Michael Reids lands, about three-quarters of a mile north of the pool, is 1,860 feet and is still without oil. Gas and is beginning to cause owner of leases in its neighborhood considerable uneasiness. Some whose rentals will be due during the next 10 days or two weeks are in a brown study whether to pay up or return the leases.

### WILD CAT OPERATIONS COVER WIDE SECTION

It is getting to the point where it is a mighty poor town in Northwest and West Texas that hasn't a derrick or two somewhere in the neighborhood. Recently a company was organized at Coleman, another at Memphis in the Panhandle and a third is said to be under way at Wellington on the Panhandle branch of the Wichita Falls & Northwestern.

Carl Benson has returned from Electra, Texas. He states that the Benson well on the Douglas lease, which was drilled nearly a year ago and produced from 75 to 100 barrels a day for months from the shallow sand has been drilled to the 1,080 foot sand and is now doing 75 barrels a day from that formation. It is his intention to later produce from both of these sands and ultimately to let the lower sand which is known to be saturated with the oleaginous fluid. The Benson well at Thornberry, mid way between Petrolia and Electra, is now down 1,200 feet. Mr. Benson is confident this will be a good paying well when the lower sand is tapped.—Independence (Mo.) Reporter.

### PEOPLE'S GAS RIGHTS SOLD TO LONE STAR

(Petrolia Roundup) The People's Oil & Gas Company have sold the gas rights on their lease in the Lockridge tract to the Lone Star Gas Company.

This included the big gas well that was drilled in by them some time ago and we understand the consideration were \$100,000 above the expenses of drilling the big well.

The company still retains all its rights on the lease and have started another well about 1,000 feet north east of the big gasser and the rumor is also that when the People's Oil & Gas Company taken over this lease a few months ago they agreed to drill a well to the depth of 1800 feet and as gas was struck at about 1700 which blew out making it impossible to go deeper, they were forced to drill an other hole to fill their contract. Hence the new location.

The Wichita Oil & Gas Company have let the contract to R. C. Sanders for another well on the Lockridge farm, this location is about one thousand feet east of the People's big gasser.

A rotary rig will be used by Mr. Sanders in drilling this well and several of the old time Petrolia boys who have been in Electra for the past few months will do the "rough neck" stint.

### ABANDON STINE WELL AT 3536 FEET DEPTH

The Stine well six miles east of Petrolia was abandoned by the Producers Company last week at a depth of 3536 feet as a duster and the casing is being pulled, says the Roundup.

This is the deepest well ever drilled

in this field and is second to the deepest well ever drilled in the State. The wild cat well drilled by the same company near Halsell in the south part of this county, three years ago, is said to be the deepest one, being 3980 feet.

### MEXICAN YOUTH'S CASE GOES TO WASHINGTON.

Austin, Texas, May 27.—The fate of Leon Cardenas Martinez Jr., the Mexican youth under death sentence for killing Miss Emma Brown, an Austin girl, near Pecos last summer, will soon be in the hands of the United States Supreme Court. Presiding Judge W. L. Davidson of the Court of Criminal Appeals granted a writ of error to the Federal tribunal and approved the bond which goes with it. As soon as the citations in error are served on T. C. Weir, the Sheriff of Taylor County, who now has the young Mexican in custody, and Sheriff Cornelious Brown of Reeves county, where the killing occurred, and the proper returns made, the papers in the case will be forwarded to Washington and the court of Texas will be done with the notorious case, for a time at least.

The bond filed was in the sum of \$750. The instrument was signed by Martinez himself and by B. Melard Reio, L. Gonzales and Amador Delgado of Bexar county, and approved by the presiding judge.

As a preliminary to the granting of the writ, which was issued by D. H. Hart, clerk of the District Court of the United States in the Western District of Texas, here attorneys for the defendant filed their necessary petitions together with an assignment of error. The writ maintains that the trial of the defendant was unfair and that his sentence was violative of the fourteenth amendment to the United States Constitution and the law of the Nation, in connection with the treaties between this Government and Mexico. It violated the constitutional amendment by depriving the defendant of liberty without due process of law, contends the writ.

Associate Judges Harper and Pennington wrote in the disposition of one feature of the case while back that they considered that no Federal question was involved. The issuance of a writ of error, however, is by Federal statute wholly within the province of the chief Justice of a State court of last resort.

## Morocco is France's Most Difficult Colonial Problem

By Associated Press.  
Paris, May 27.—Morocco looms up as France's most difficult colonial problem. That is saying much, for France's experience is perhaps only second to that of Great Britain.

The recent savage massacre of French military officials at Fez at the very moment when France was establishing a protectorate was a powerful indication to the French of the difficulties to be met and conquered before the wild Moorish tribesmen to whom war is a diversion can be made over to peaceful and successful children of France.—At once was seen the need of appointing an experienced and capable hand to take the helm of the tremendous work of protectorate organization.

This man, France believes, has been found in General Hubert Lyautey, who has achieved a reputation as a skillful, untiring officer and an ardent organizer and leader of men. General Lyautey was born at Nancy in 1854. He passed rapidly through the various grades of military education and became a captain in 1882. Later he went to Indo-China as Chief of Bureau of the Resident General, and there he met the famous General Gallieni, who later took him to Madagascar. General Lyautey did some fine work in pacifying and organizing the districts in the south of that island. Later service in Tunis and Algeria was followed by the appointment as commander of the 10th army corps of France. He has written much, both on the colonial service of the army and upon the social development of the military officer. A recent study of the latter question created great interest in military and lay circles. Emperor William of Germany was so struck by the tone of the article that he wrote to the author to congratulate him and at the same time to take issue with him on several points.

Once the picturesque Arabs become devoted to France, it is believed that France will find in them a superb addition to her colonial army. Moulay Hafid, the sultan, thinks this is true, but he warns France that the process of courtship must be slow and cautious. Above all, the Muslims in Morocco must be left unhindered and uninfluenced in their religious beliefs and practices. Any encroachment by missionaries or others, will, he thinks be disastrous to French interests.

The attitude of Moulay Hafid himself is a puzzle. He declares himself very anxious to abdicate, saying that he wishes to travel and to give up all authority which, after all, he says, he does not possess, since the French have taken it all from him; but the French insist on the Sultan remaining in nominal power. They realize that the Moors without a ruler would be sheep without a shepherd. General Lyautey, who becomes Governor, or more properly, Resident General of Morocco, is above all a tactful man. He is certain to do all things to keep the Sultan's good will and not to offend the Moors by thrusting upon them the customs of civilized Europe.

An extraordinary case of superstition which recalls the days of Salem witchcraft, is reported from the Alpine village of Noirmont in the Canton of Berne, Switzerland. The peasants there accused an old woman who was living alone of possessing the evil eye, and of making their cattle ill. They blamed her also for various other local misfortunes. In vain the aged woman pleaded her innocence. The peasants chose a "delegate," who was instructed to "cast out the devil" from her. The man, on meeting the aged woman on the roadway, beat her severely. Later he was arrested and sentenced to two months' imprisonment.

Some conception of the world craze for picture post cards may be had from figures which come from Switzerland. In the year 1911 in Switzerland there passed through the post offices 110,000,000 cards of every kind though chiefly illustrated. This was an increase of 8,000,000 over the preceding year.

Don Jaime the four-year-old son of the King and Queen of Spain, who was born deaf and dumb, is progressing satisfactorily at Fribourg, Switzerland, where for some time he has been under the treatment of Professor Henri Reymond. The boy prince is now, as the result of an operation, commencing to articulate some words and hear some sounds. The Swiss treatment will be continued indefinitely until the boy's senses are completely normal.

Among the many exhibits of sculpture at the Salon of the Society of French artists is one that possesses especial interest. It is the statue of the Canadian historian Francois Xavier Garneau, and is the work of Paul Chevre, one of the passengers who was saved from the wreck of the Titanic. The work was completed and sent to the Salon the day before Chevre sailed on the ill-fated steamer to attend the inauguration of his bust of Sir Wilfrid Laurier at Ottawa.

The enormous picture which the veteran artist, Jean Paul Laurens exhibits at the same Salon is probably the largest ever painted since Veronese's Wedding Feast of Cana. The government allotted to him an immense shed in the state stone yard which had formerly been used by the Baptists and his assistants to execute

certain pieces of the Statue of Liberty now in New York harbor.

The picture represents the Court of Love held by the Troubadours at Toulouse May 3, 1324 and is intended for the capital at Houlouse.

### FORT WORTH PLANNING BOYS' CAMP AT LAKE.

(Star-Telegram)

Eighty Fort Worth boys all members of the Young Men's Christian Association, will camp on the banks of Lake Wichita, near Wichita Falls, from June 10 to 18.

Preparations for the outing are being made not only in this city, where the boys reside, but in Wichita Falls as well. George Saam, physical director at the "Y" here, will be in direct charge of the youngsters on the week's trip. He has had much experience in this kind of work and expects to give the youngsters the full benefit of it.

To assist Saam in conducting the camp, a leader will be supplied for every eight boys. The leader will be expected to know enough about the woods and out of door life in general to get along anywhere. He will be expected to have moral seal enough to be a quickening character and must like boys well enough to sacrifice himself for them, to live with them and to lead them for a fortnight. These leaders can't be mere attendants or play masters.

Speaking of the camp, Director Saam says:

"The boys may learn something of the craft and wood-cunning of the Indian in his at homeness in the out of doors; something of the self-reliance, observation, honor and service to others spirit of the Boy Scouts; the swimmer's power of lungs and heart and confidence in and on the water, an understanding of himself as an animal in the elements and as a man in his association with others."

"In this camp like many others the boy adjusts himself to a new life. Many of them are away from home and mothers for the first time. He sheds his babyhood. He is away from his own snug room and sleeps in the open tent. The night noises appeal to a new self in him that he never knew before except in part. He leaves off the nursery and becomes self-reliant and self-dependent. He decides what he will wear for the day himself and the system of honors to the best kept tent inspire him to keep himself and his quarters clean and trim.

"He is a little homesick at first. Perhaps this is one of the first chapters in making a man of him. There is nothing like camp life with a crowd to reveal a boy's weaknesses and peculiarities. Some of these he is soon made to see as idiotic and his selfishness is shamed or hammered out of him.

"The camp is more than a picnic or holiday excursion. It is a school of life with the welcome lesson in every swim, game, tramp, camp fire and stary night. First aid, resuscitation, handling of a boat, setting up a tent, building a camp fire, are some of the lessons for the boy in camp. Besides these, he learns to read the story of life's propagation and growth of nature in bush and bird and the influence of the woods, religion which exists among creatures in God's solitude and close to nature."

## NEWS LETTER FROM LONDON

CAN JEW BE PREVENTED FROM SERVING AS CHIEF JUSTICE, IS QUESTION

### BLACK SHIRT IS IN FASHION

Wearing of One in Theatre Attracts Much Attention—Other News From England's Capital

London, May 27.—The recent ill health of Chief Justice Lord Alverstone has given rise to speculations in regard to his probable or possible successor and added interest has been given to the discussion by the question of the eligibility for the wool-sack of Attorney General Sir Rufus Isaacs, who is a Jew.

There is good authority for saying that the Attorney General's religious faith does not exclude the wool-sack from the range of his ambitions. Premier Gladstone, in introducing his Religious Disabilities Bill by which Roman Catholics were to be made eligible for the Lord Chancellorship, emphasized the fact that there were no legal obstacles to the office being held by a Jew, by a Mohammedan, by a Buddhist or a Hindu.

A telegram to the Fishing Gazette has announced the mysterious and complete wiping out of the trout and perch fishery of the Friendly Anglers' Society on the River Colne. None but a fisherman could appreciate the calamitous nature of the news, for within a few hours 5,000 magnificent trout and as many fine roach were lying dead on the surface of the river and three years of careful planting by the members of the society had come to naught. The fishery had just developed into one of the finest in the kingdom. Chemists are now busy analyzing the water in an effort to discover the nature of the poison which must have killed the fish.

The remote suburbs of London are growing, but the metropolitan district proper is rapidly becoming depopulated according to the rate returns of the London County Council. Every year the percentage of empty houses grows larger. John Burns, president of the families are leaving the central London boroughs at the rate of 13,000 a year. London in population has apparently reached its high water mark.

The premiere of a play here this week was enlivened by the presence in an orchestra stall of a man whose dress clothes were set off by a jet black shirt, properly starched and fashionably frilled. When he rose with the rising of the lights after the first act all of the white shirts in the stalls followed him as if he had been the proverbial black swan. He wore a white collar and a white stock tie and a white waistcoat, but unlike others, who have attempted sartorial novelties, he wore the usual black instead of a white duck coat and trousers. No one recognized the mysterious wearer and fashionable London is wondering if his presence was due to an attempt to introduce a new fashion in evening dress.

Henry Prather Fletcher, United States minister to Chili, who stopped in London on his way to Washington, is enthusiastic over the possibilities of the West Coast of South America and declares that the opening of the Panama Canal will bring unprecedented prosperity to that territory.

He says that the business men of Chili are fully alive to the advantages which will accrue to them. The Chilean government is already planning to subsidize a line of steamships which will take advantage of the new trade routes which the canal will create. So strong is the feeling of optimism in the country that various industries are already beginning to boom in anticipation. This is especially true of the nitrate fields, which expect to profit greatly by the shortening of the route to the great central valley of the United States.

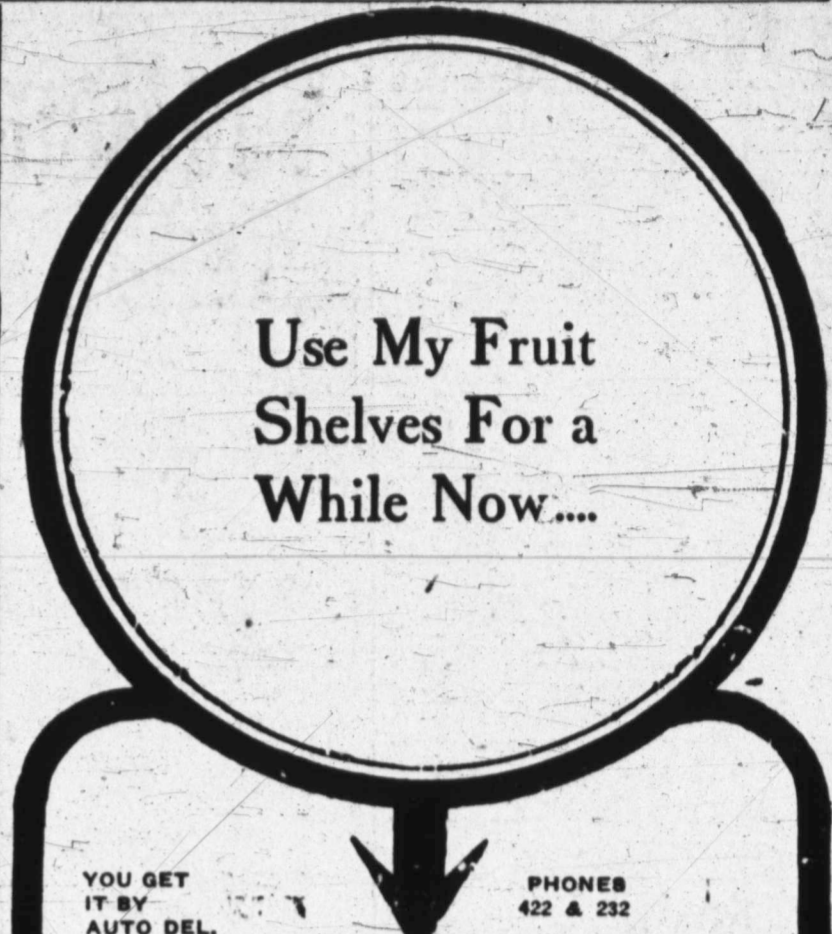

WILL ROOSEVELT BOLT.

New York World. Is Mr. Roosevelt planning to bolt if he is not nominated at Chicago? Will he have himself nominated by a convention of his own?

His assertion at Dayton that "of the delegates already elected, without counting the contested delegates, I have more than 500," and that he is confident of nomination on the first ballot, would have no more significance than the usual ante-election claims but for the threats he made elsewhere.

Of course, the nomination for President at Chicago is "mine." Mr. Roosevelt has declared that he is the one man for the job. Of course, "the people are for him." Mr. Roosevelt decided that himself last February before he accepted the invitation of the seven little Governors to come out into the open against Mr. Taft, and ever since he has been working tooth and nail to induce the people to approve his decision.

It is no longer merely as a candidate that Mr. Roosevelt appeals to his party. He assumes the tone of a dictator. A month in advance, although over 200 delegates are yet to be chosen, he notifies the convention that he will be nominated on the first ballot and that any other action will be plain fraud.

### THIRTY MILLION IN INDEMNITY RUMORED.

Panama, May 27.—According to the Cartagena newspaper, El Provenor, negotiations between the American minister at Bogota and the Colombian government have resulted in an arrangement whereby Colombia and the United States acknowledge the sovereignty of Panama. Furthermore, Colombia according to the same authority will receive \$20,000,000 indemnity and the United States obligates itself to intervene and settle definitely the boundary between Panama and Colombia and to procure a loan of \$70,000,000 for Colombia. The arrangement, the paper adds, must be approved by the congresses of the United States and Colombia.

NORTHWESTERN SERVICE INTO WOODWARD BEGINS. (Woodward News) The Wichita Falls and Northwestern is now running trains from Wichita Falls through Woodward, north to Supply. On Tuesday morning at 10:40 the first passenger train came in, bearing the express and mail coach, three passenger coaches, etc. On the train were 129 passengers, not including the following officials of the road: Frank Kell, vice president and general manager; W. E. Hocker, director; Dick Sullivan, superintendent; Ed Carver, stock superintendent and M. M. Cooke, chief engineer. Besides the passengers referred to the express coach was well filled with shipments of all kinds. The American Express Company will operate along this road, which gives Woodward two express companies the other one being the Wells Fargo which operates over the Santa Fe. This train is now coming in daily on schedule time. It arrives at 10:40 a. m., and leaves for Elk City at 11:40 arriving there at 4:55 p. m. Connection can be made there at 6:00 p. m. with the Rock Island for Oklahoma City, arriving about midnight. This gives a day run into Oklahoma City. At Elk City connection can also be made with the Wichita Falls train, which leaves at 6:55 a. m., and arrives at Wichita Falls at 1:10 p. m. The train north to Supply will run as usual, leaving Woodward at 7:00 a. m., and returning at 11:00 a. m. This train is gradually providing service north to Supply as the road is ready for use. Plainview—Two hundred and seventy-five acres will be planted in Mexican beans near this city. This is the first attempt to plant this crop on a large scale in this county and the result of the experiment is being looked forward to with much interest by truck growers in this vicinity. San Angelo—July 2nd has been set for an election to vote on the issuance of \$70,000 worth of good roads bonds.

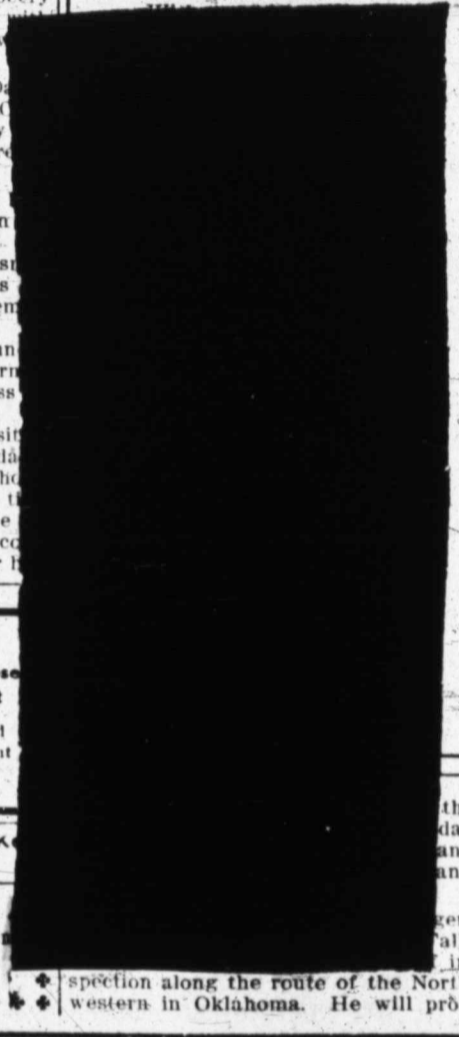
