S. M. FOSTER FOUND DEAD

BULLET HOLE IN FOREHEAD, DIS-TRICT ATTORNEY'S BODY IS DISCOVERED.

Had Not Been Well For Some Time. Funeral Is To Be At Ladonia, Texas.

The dead body of Hon. S. M. Foster, district attorney for the Thirtieth fudicial District, was found by the porter of the building in his office on the second floor of the Kemp and Kell building at about seven p'clock this morning. The body was lying in a reclining chair. A bullet hole almost in the center of the forehead and a thirty-two-caliber Harrington-Richards revolver grasped in the right hand that hung over the arm of the chair, mutely told the story of his

The porter at once notified Dr. Mark Moore who had just reached his office in the building. A glance at the body was enough to tell Dr. Moore that it was beyond the aid of any earthly physician. Smoke from the shot that ended his life still hung in the room and the body was still warm indicating that the shot had been fired only a few minutes before the discovery of the body by the porter, who had gone into the office to clean up the room. Death had been instantaneous as there were no evi-

GETS 990 VOTES ON 46th BALLOT AFTER UNDERWOOD AND FOSS QUIT--CLARK MEN RELEASED

New Jersey Governor Takes Decisive Lead On Early Ballots When Illinois Delegates Join His Camp-No Nomination Yet Made for Vice-President---Adjourn-

Baltimore, July 2:- Receiving 990 votes on the forty-sixth ballot, Governor Woodrow Wilson of New Jersey was nominated for president of the United States by the national democratic convention early this afternoon.

The convention adjourned until nine o'clock tonight without nominating a vice-president.

of Heavy Federal Loss Not Confirmed-Rebels Moving Toward Sonora

By Associated Press Agua Prieta, Mexico, July 2.-A tachment of rebels, believed to be part of the force that was sent north from Bachimba to effect an entrance into the State of Sonora for the main rebel army already has clashed with government troops according to advices reaching here today.

Latet reports indicate that fighting is still in progress between 250 federals and about 500 rebels at Daviste, about eighty miles southeast of here. The latter are believed to be the vanguard of Orozco's army, retreating from Chihuahua. One thousand federals have left Colonia, Morelos, forty miles west of Daviste, to reinforce the government troops. It is known that three federals were killed and many wounded have been brought to

At the San Diego ranch, thirty-five miles south of Daviste, fighting is reported in progress. General Bulle, leading a force of fifty Yaqui Indians on their way to join the main federal column north, were ambushed and almost annihilated by the rebels.

The final break to Governor Wilson as the nomince for president of the United States came in the democratic national convention this afternoon at the beginning of the 46th ballot. Wilson had received 633 votes in the 45th ballot, with only 7251/2 necessary to nominate.

Senator Bankhead of Alabama quickly withdrew Underwood. Senator Stone of Missouri on behalf of Champ Clark released all Clark delegates, at the same time saying that INDIANS REPORTED TO HAVE Missouri would vote for Clark to the end.

Mayor Fitzgerald of Boston withdrew Gov. Foss from consideration. By this time it was apparent Wilson would win on the 46th ballot and the convention was in an uproar, delay-

Fitegerald of New York, a congressman, spoke from the platform presenting the view of New York delegation under the fast changing condition and moved Woodrow Wilson's nomination by acclamation. The convention rose en masse as New York's spokesman made the motion. A frenzy of cheers swept the floor and galleries. Delegates stood on their chairs and waved hats and flags. Senator Reed of Missouri objected to the nomination by acclamation and the roll call went on because of other objections to suspending and making the nomination by acclamation.

HEAD OF WORLD-WIDE SUNDAY SCHOOL WORK

Twenty-one years ago as a business an of Syracuse, N. Y., was standing in the vestibule



of a partially finished church, in a rear room which a Sunday school was being conducted, his attention was attracted to a number of young men waiting outside to walk home with the girls at the close of the session. In a

spirit of friendliness the gentlemen pproached the group and said: "Come on, boys! If they won't have

us in their class, let us start one of our own!"

Catching the spirit of the occasion, 8 young men responded and, following the leader, they crowded under the scaffolding to the auditorium of the church. The place was littered with dirt and plaster, but the backs of several pews were wiped off with old sacks and perched upon these, while heir leader stood on a front seat facing them, they listened to a lesson story of the Christ child.

The man was Marshall A. Hudson, a prosperous crockery merchant, and the little band of young men that gathered in that partially finished church on that eventful day represented the beginning of the Baraca Bible class, the largest Sunday school organization in the world today.

The Baraca work grew so rapidly that inquiries as to how to start and conduct classes went to Mr. Hudson from all the states. His home in Syracuse became such a Mecca for visit-ors that finally, in order to do the work he felt he must do for a worldwide spread of the movement, he moved a mile out of the city, and today his home, "Windemere," is a center of influence, equalled in reach and potentiality for the advancement of the church, by few private residences in the world. He has brought over 800,000 men and women into the Sunday school for organized effort and systematic Bible study. In every state there are state secretaries and a na tional organization has held 15 annual conventions. The work has spread to foreign lands, and the literature is now printed in Italian, Japanese and Spanish, In China Japan, India, New Zealand and Australia can be found many Baraca classes bolding char ters in the world-wide union.



BELIEVES BORDER SITUATION LIKELY TO BECOME SERIOUS

Austin, Texas, July 2.—Captain Fred A. Logan, commander of the Dallas battery, who as detailed in Saturday's dispatches was detailed by the adjuant general's department to proceed to El Paso in connection with the border situation, - has not only reached there, but he has made a report to the adjutant general's de-partment, the text of the report, however, was not made public. That it is serious, however, is evidenced by the fact that it was disclosed that there is no longer any doubt but that the Dallas battery is to be sent to El Paso.

It came to light today that 100 military cots, two military ambulances and other military accoutrements have already been shipped to El Paso. This consignment is expected to reach there tomorrow The battery, it is understood, had orders to stand in immediate readiness to leave for the border city. The only thing which will prevent the battery from moving will be a'ssurances from President Taft to the governr that ample protection will be afforded Texans on this side. Thus far, as far as can be learned, no posttive assurances have been received.

Exports and Imports. Washington, D. C., July 2.-During 1911 Texas exported merchandise to the amount of \$269,537,937 and imported a total of \$14,945,541. Duties to the amount of \$1,348,339 were collected on the imports. The total imports into the United States during 1911 were \$1,527,266,106, while the exports during the same period were \$2,049,320,199.



In 1911, Texas oil fields produce 8,632,888 barrels of crude oil valued according to reliable statistics/ 1 \$5,939,526, or an average price of ap proximately 69 cents per barrel. I 1910 the output was 8,603,862 barrels showing an increase of 29,026 barrels for 1911. These figures include only the oil that was marketed, and do not take account of that consumed of the fields for fuel. The state ranks sixth in oil production, being only exceeded by the states of California Oklahoma, Illinois, Ohio and West Virginia. In 1905, when Texas re-corded the largest yield, 28,136,189 barrels, we held second place, California alone having a greater of production. During the stateen years since the production of oil first be-came a part of the industrial life of the state, there have been produce 155,530,508 barrels which brough \$73,350,711, or an average of forty eight cents per barrel.

Texas has been in the oil produc tion column since 1896, when the de velopment of the Corsicana field firs started, but it was in 1901 when th industry received its great impetu by the discovery of the remarkable gushing well at Spindletop, near Beaumont, when the first oil wel known as the "Lucas" begun to flow at the rate of 70,000 barrels per day This record was without a precedent in this country and during the few years following the discovery, the industry developed to remarkable proportions in that section as well as other parts of the state, and a city


