
The menu will be turkey and dressing, creamed potatoes and gravy, green beans, homemade bread, cranberry sauce, relish plate, desserts, tea and coffee.

Early voting open October 21-November 1

The November 5 election in Parmer County will be for nine state constitutional amendments. Early voting is now open until November 1 at the County Clerk's Office in Farwell. A special early voting opportunity will be available in Friona October 31 at Friona Interbank. Voters are reminded that a voter registration card and a valid photo ID are now required to vote in Texas.

The nine voting precincts in the

county have been consolidated into four voting locations for the November 5 election: Precinct 1 at Calvary Baptist Church in Friona; Precinct 2 at EMS Building in Bovina; Precinct 3 at Farwell Community Center; and Precinct 4 at Lazbuddie Methodist Church. Your voter's registration card denotes your precinct in the upper right portion of the card.

Here is a brief summary of what each amendment would do

as printed in the Amarillo Globe News Sunday October 13: Proposition 1: It would autho-

rize the Legislature to grant the surviving spouse of a member of the armed services who was killed in action a property tax exemption of all or part of the surviving spouse's residence homestead if the surviving spouse had not remarried.

Proposition 2: It would eliminate an obsolete requirement for a State Medical Education Board and a State Medical Education Fund, neither of which is opera-

tional.

Proposition 3: It would authorize a political subdivision in the state to extend the number of days that aircraft parts that are exempt from the ad valorem taxation due to their location in this state for a temporary period may be located in this state for purposes of qualifying for the tax exemption.

Proposition 4: It would authorize the Legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation of part of the market value of the residence homestead of a partially disabled veteran or the surviving spouse of a partially disabled

veteran if a charitable organization donated the residence homestead to the disabled veteran.

Proposition 5: It would apply to homeowners 62 and older and would require the prospective reverse mortgage borrower and the borrower's spouse to complete financial counseling before using a reverse mortgage for a home purchase.

Proposition 6: It would allow the Legislature to withdraw \$2 billion from the Economic Stabiliaztion Fund, better known as the Rainy Day Fund, to begin funding the state's 50-year water plan.

Proposition 7: It would authorize a home-rule municipality to provide in its charter the procedure to fill a vacancy on its governing body for which the unexpired term is 12 months or less.

Proposition 8: It would create a hospital district in Hidalgo County.

Proposition 9: It would expand the types of sanctions that may be assessed against a judge or justice following a formal proceeding instituted by the State Commission on Judicial Conduct.


Ted Renner





Know Where You Are?

If you don't know where you are, how do you know where to go? In your fitness quest, that can be a tough question to answer. Fitness assessments are one way of pinpointing "where you are". (Makes you feel like you are in PE, huh?) Psychology literature tells us that humans use a belief known as positive illusion when we evaluate ourselves.

Positive illusions are unrealistically favorable attitudes we are called on to rate ourselves. Positive illusions may cause big problems when a change is needed simply because we think we are at a "better" place than we really are. As far as fitness goes, assessments can help you find where you realistically "are." You can then gauge your progress and decide if what you are doing is working or if you need to take another path to hit your fitness goals.

Remember the five components of fitness? Ok, here's a refresher... They are cardiovascular endurance, muscular endurance, muscular strength, flexibility and body composi-

tion. There are fitness assessments for each one of these components. And truly, they are not like having to run a 10K-- they are simple, quick or interpretations we use when and require minimal equipment. (And the whole PE class isn't gonna be watchin'.) I'll discuss assessments for each fitness component over the next several weeks.

To get a head start, walk a mile this week and time yourself. You can walk outside or on the treadmill; don't just stroll, push yourself. Next week's topic will be cardiovascular endurance, and we'll see where you are "at." RE-MINDER-if you haven't been exercising and/or are under a doctor's care, get a green light before doing exercise that is out of the norm for you.


Lions Club News



The next meeting of the Noon Lions will be Thursday November 7 at Headquarters Restaurant. We are always ready to welcome new members so come visit.


