
Squaw volleyball playoff

Car seat event big success!!

The Healthy Baby Coalition of Parmer County, Parmer Medical Center and the Texas Department of Health and Human Services teamed together on October 22nd to make Parmer County a safer place for children. A free car seat inspection was offer in the hospital's employee parking lot.

Certified technicians worked with each family to instruct them on how to assure their child was fitted properly in their car seat and that the car seat was installed properly in the vehicle. Each family received 20-30 minutes of one-on-one instruction from the technicians who answered questions and assured that each child was safe in their family vehicle.

In addition, DSHS provided 20 car seats that were distributed free to parents who did not have a seat for their child or whose current car seat was considered unsafe or not appropriate for the age of the child. Overall, 29 children were assisted.

We sincerely apologize to the families we had to turn away due to running out of seats and/or time. Parmer Medical Center is sending one of their staff for the required training to become an inspector. We will then be able to hold these events more frequently. Publications: Livestock impact on the aquifer

water use of the livestock industry in the southern Ogallala Aquifer region have been completed by Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service specialists.

Water use in the Southern Ogallala Region has greatly exceeded the recharge rate for the past several decades, leading to a steady decline in the aquifer, said Dr. Steve Amosson, Regents Fellow and AgriLife Extension economist in Amarillo.

This decline and water use in the agricultural sector had many stakeholders questioning whether the economic benefits to the regional economy justified the agricultural operations water use, Amosson said.

"Our studies of the livestock sector in the region are outlined in the three publications covering beef, swine and

the direct water use - consumption and cleaning - of these industries have minimal impact on regional water resources, but the indirect water use via the feed consumed is or can be substantial.

"On the other hand, these industries are providing billions of dollars of economic activity and tens of thousands of employment opportunities in the region," Amosson said.

The objectives of the study, supported by the federally funded Ogallala Aquifer Program, is to evaluate the impacts the various agricultural sectors are having on the Ogallala Aquifer, both in water use and economic impact, he said.

Contributing to the studies are Dr. Bridget Guerrero, former AgriLife Extension program specialist and now a

professor; Dr. Ted McCollum, AgriLife Extension beef cattle specialist in Amarillo; and Dr. Ellen Jordan, AgriLife Extension dairy specialist, Dallas.

The region is semiarid, primarily dependent on the Ogallala Aquifer for water. The aquifer stretches from the Dakotas to the southern plains of Texas and comprises approximately 174,000 square miles. The Southern Ogallala Region is defined in this study as the 97,000 square miles of the aquifer from the northern border of Kansas to just north of the Midland-Odessa area and includes portions of five states.

The region consists of 19.7 million acres of cropland and more than 6.4 million acres enrolled in the Conservation Reserve Program; the rest is pastureland. Of the cropland, 7.3 million acres are irrigated and 12.4 mil-

Three publications analyzing the dairy," he said. "Our findings indicate West Texas A&M University assistant lion acres are dryland. The primary in 2010. irrigated crops grown in the region are corn, wheat, cotton and sorghum.

Sparse population and favorable environmental conditions have made this region a popular place for confined livestock operations, Amosson said. Cattle feedlots first appeared in the 1960s and grew steadily until inventories stabilized over the last decade. In 2010, cattle on feed topped 4.9 million

The same conditions that attracted feedlots have more recently attracted swine operations, dairies and associated businesses, Amosson said. The swine industry had 338,000 head in 1989, grew rapidly in the 1990s, and had 3.4 million hogs in 2010. Dairy cows in the Southern Ogallala Region increased more than 11-fold, from 41,500 head in 1990 to 453,200 head

Interestingly, he said, the study results suggest that any expansion of the livestock industries in the region will have minimal impact on water resources while increasing economic activity and employment opportunities, since the region is already grain deficit.

Amosson said the next publications in the series will focus on water use and economic benefits of feed grains, small grains and cotton production in the region.



How Did You Do?

In last week's article, we talked about fitness assessments. I challenged you to do the one-mile walk test to evaluate your cardiovascular fitness level. How did you do? Check the charts below.

Didn't do the one-mile walk test? Here's the deal... The goal of the test is to walk one mile as fast as you can. Ideally it is done outside (an indoor facility is fine; too, you just have to know how many laps make a mile). The treadmill is ok, but it may skew the results a little because the belt keeps you at a constant speed--it doesn't adjust to your natural inclination to speed up and slow down. If you haven't been active in a while (routinely exercising or walking 15-20 minutes several times a week) or are under a doctor's care, get an ok before doing the test.

Are you satisfied with your score? Surprised? Wanting a do-over? If you aren't where you want to be, no worries! You can easily get there. It won't happen in a week, but if you choose a cardio program and stick with it, you'll be surprised at how quickly you can progress. Yeah, the stick-with-it part is the most challenging and most important part. Get started by choosing something you like to do. Walking, jogging, running, aerobics, biking, spinning, elliptical work—any activity that involves the large muscles of your body moving rhythmically and elevates your heart rate counts as cardio. If you choose something you don't like or dread, you won't stick to your exercise routine. Aim to get in at least 30 minutes a day three times a week and optimally, on most days of the week.

If you are just starting out, go slow and work up. Three ten minute sessions give you about the same benefits as one 30-minute session. Not sure what to do? Feel free to give me a call-I can help you get started. Sometimes all you need is to ask a few questions and to get some suggestions.



Yet we step out in faith trusting that the One who has brought us to this great divide will see us to the other side.

The leaps of faith come in various distances from Grand Canyon crossings to mere steps up a curb, but the key is not the size of the leap but the faith in which it is pursued. So whatever you may be facing, face it with faith for without it—it is impossible to please God.







Fall Lawn Care

By Benji Henderson - CEA

As we are getting deep into the fall of the year across Parmer County many homeowners want to put their yards to bed for the winter. Care of your lawn in the fall is as important as in spring and summer. Regular care is the key to an attractive and healthy lawn through the fall and winter months. Here are few things you can do to help your lawn survive the winter and recover vigorously in the spring.

Fertilization: Fall fertilization is the key to prolonging fall color and promoting early spring recovery of the lawn. It helps produce a dense turf that resists winter weeds. Fertilizer used in the fall should be higher soil.

in nitrogen and potassium and lower in phosphorus. Grasses fertilized this way have shown greater survival during winter months than those fertilized with high phosphorous.

Watering: When your lawn goes dormant during winter months, it is important to remember the grass is living and needs moisture for survival. During the winter, if it doesn't rain for several weeks, then the lawn should be irrigated. Irrigation before a hard freeze is helpful in reducing freeze injury to the grass. It takes much colder air temperatures to lower the temperature of a moist soil than that of a dry
