LARGE CROWD IS PRESENT

Nearly All Candidates Are Represented At Gathering and Much Oratory Abounds

The inefficiacy of dynamite as a rain-producer was again demonstrated last night in Iowa Park when after three hours of oratorial pyrotechnics by a large covey of candidates, the skies remained clear and there was no precipitation. The failure, however, is said to be due to the initial lack of humidity in the atmosphere, rather than to the ineffectiveness of the bombardment.

By Associated Press. New York, July 26.—Deputy Police Commissioner Doughetry prepared to give the third degree to Frank Cirofishi whom he says is none other than "Dago Frank" one of the slayers of Herman Rosenthal. Cirofishi was taken into custody late last night along with his "girl" Rose Harris and man named Abraham Lewis. All had been smoking opium and hours of questioning by the commissioner Dougherty failed to secure definite information from him, for the fames of the drug still befuddled his brain and he rambled in meaningless phrases.

He mumbled that he knew nothing of the shooting but admitted that he knew Horowitz otherwise known as "Gib the Blood" and that he knew Louis Rosentharg of "Lefty Louis" both of whom are wanted as slayers of Rosenthal.

The confession of William Shapiro the chaffeur of the murder car has supplied the commissioner and District Attorney Whitman with many missing pieces of evidence. Commenting on the progress made Mr. Whitman said:

"I am certain now that every man that had a part in the slaughter of Rosenthal will be brought to justice for from having no case at all three days ago I could get indictments against four or five today if I had

BEING DEPLETED

DESERTIONS REDUCE OROZCO'S JUAREZ FORCE TO A COR-PORAL'S GUARD

BLOCK EVACUATION

Only 300 Troops Remain in Border City-Other Forces Are Now Badly Scattered

By Associated Press.
Juarez, Mexico, July 26.—Three rebel commanders here and a generous sprintkling of colonels today find themselves with a command of only three hundred men, one hundred in each general Gen. Onozco, commander in chief of the rebels in conference here with visiting generals Carvarero and Salazar, is confronted with a curious problem. If he does not hasten his long delayed and threatened evacuation of Juarez be may be unable to evacuate with other than himself and his staff. His army here is rapidly dwindling to a corporal's guard. He has an army but it is scattered over Northern

Chihuahua and Eastern Sonora. It is discovered that more men have been sent out of Juarez than ordinarily planned and added to this there is a steady desertion of men who are laying aside the rifle for a section hand's shovel on an American rallway. Since the army came to the border, desertions have been numer ous and the men are recruited by employment agencies and shipped in to Arizona, New Mexico and Kansas.

All of this disturbed Gen. Orozco as he smoked his morning cigarette The federal army which three times has defeated the rebels is coming slowly from the south and helter skelter over the Chihuahua state line rebels are hurrying on the newly planned campaign in Sonora. The stimate of the number of rebels renaining in Juarez has caused some consternation although, it is known that no federal force of any consequence is near and the smallness of the rebel garrison here will make possible a hasty departure.





In this petition the practices of the transfer men were termed a "nuisance" and it was signed by practically all the business houses on the west side of Ohio avenue between Seventh and Eighth

OF THE HOME FILTERS.

WARNING AS TO CARE

As there are several cases of typhoid fever in the city, I think it would be well to warn the public how to take the proper care of filters in the home. good stone filter is one of the best protections that one can put in the nome to prevent disease that is conveyed by water, but from inquiry I have not found a single one that is being properly used They are a menace instead of a protection, as now used by the majority of the people as they give sense of protection that does not ex-

I do not know that the city water is infected, and I am of the opinion that it is not, as very few case have occurred among the users of the city water. But Lake Wichita has a large shed in which is situated two small towns besides a great number of farm nouses, and a single case of typhoid ever on the water shed, if not properly lisinfected may infect the lake after rain. There is always a possibility infection arising from this source, hat the City Water Works People canot prevent. I do not believe the city equires a bacterial examination of the water, and while the Water Works Peo le use the best method of purifying his class of water yet there are a few erms left in the water. It is not the bject of this article to criticize any one but to instruct the public in the use of the household filter. There are several good makes handled by different hardware merchants of this city.

A filter, to be of any use, should have a stone core through which the water passes to the center where it leads to a drain pipe. The filter stone should be taken out each morning and cleaned, then boiled for five minutes. It would be best to have two stones so that the freshly boiled stone might be sunned each day, and if one will take this precaution they will have a pure water, as it takes the typhoid fever germ four days to get through a good stone filter. So by boiling the filter stone every morning one can have pure water even if it is infected. This is simple precaution, but an absolute safe one if you have a good filter, and one that the public seems not to know anything about.

UNDERWOOD BELIEVES HOUSE AND SENATE CAN EASILY GET TOGETHER.

LIKE BILL TAFT VETOED

Passage in Senate is Effected By Combination of Democrats With Progressives.

By Associated Press. Washington, D. C., July 26.—The Senate's unexpected passage of the La Follette wool bill presents a situation upon which Majority Leader Underwood of the House thinks the two branches can agree. He said today he thought there would be little difficulty in reaching a compromise. In this event a bill almost identical with the one Taft vetoed on August 17, 1911 is again likely to go to the White House in a few weeks.

The sudden termination of the wool tariff fight came as the climax of a day full of surprising events. The Democratic bill for a revision of the wool tariff was technically before the senate. The progressives voted for Senator Cummin's substitute, the rates of which were slightly above those of the Democratic bill. They were defeated 14 to 57. Then Senator Penrose came forward with a compromise measure considerably higher than the Democratic bill but which regular and progressive Republicans believed they could agree upon.

Led by the defeated Senator Cummins who said he would accept the Penrose bill as a compromise-"as a step in the right direction"-all but three of the Republicans railied to the measure and it was adopted by the narrow margin of 34 to 32. This took place in committee of the whole. The amended measure then passed into the senate proper. In the meaninte Senator La Follette, who, with Senators Clapp and Kenyon, had joined the Democrats in voting against the Peurose substitute, saw an-opportunity to again pass his bill of 1911 which President Taft had vetoed. There was a quick rally of progressive forces and the La Follette bill was introduced as a substitute for the already amended bill. It became the substitute for the Democratic House bill and as such the Senate finally passed it 47 to 20.

The progressives who joined with the Democrats in adopting the La Follette substitute were: Borah, Bristow, Clapp, Crwaford, Cummins, Gronna, Kenyon, La Follette, Poindexter and Works.



WRITES DEATH STORY AS HE SEES CHILDREN DIE

Chicago Man Locks Self In-Room With Little Ones Then Opens Gas Jets

Chicago, July 26.-Prostrated with grief over the murder of her two bables and the suicide of her husband, Mrs. Rudolph Uhlman, 1619 South Grove avenue, Oak Park, will be unable to testify at the inquest to be held today and may even lose her reason as a result of her loss.

Driven insane by the failure of his invention to bring him a million dollars, Rudolph Uhlman locked himself and his two children, Rudolah Jr., 5 years old and Julia, 3 years old ma. I am getting weak also. My in his laboratory, turned on the gas and died with his bables.

For nearly three hours the father watched the death struggles and made notes describing in detail how the little children laughed, cried, know what I am writing. The pencil fought for life and finally became unconscious. He described his own feelings and condition until the pencil fell from his hand, and he, too,

was dead. Mrs. Uhlman, the mother, returned from a visit with a neighbor, heard that her husband and children were ill and at a hospital, and became almost crazed with grief. Hourslater she was told of their death and was placed under guard to restrain her from injury at her own hands. She may not recover.
