ARDMORE FIRST IN SECOND HALF

SECURES RIGHT TO PLAY DRILLERS IN THE POST SEASON SERIES.

HARD SLEDDING IN SIGHT

Ardmore Has Been Wichita Falls Goal-Getter in Almost Every Series Between the Two.

By winning yesterday at Denison, Ardmore secured the right to play Wichita Falls for the pennant honors of the Texas-Oklahoma league, being now assured of first honors for the second half of the season. Even if Ardmore should lose the remaining three games and Sherman should win all hers, the Cubs would still lack half a game of the leadership.

Wichita Falls goes to Ardmore today and will play this afternoon, tomorrow and Sunday. Arrangements for the post-season series will be perfected while the team is at Ardmore and it is possible that some of the play-off contests will be scheduled in this city.

The Drillers made it two out of three at Bonham yesterday, winning by a score of 7 to 3. Jones and Russell were the opposing pitchers.

Ardmore has given Wichita Falls harder games throughout the season than any other team. Even in the first half of the season, when Ardmore finished fourth, she won a majority of the games from the Drillers and Wichita Falls has not taken more than three or four games from the Oklahomaans all season. This means that it is not going to be easy to capture final honors, but the fans here have ardent hopes.

Condition of Texas Cotton.
New York, N. Y., July 26.—The splendid condition of the Texas cotton crop and the heavy acreage planted is one of the most important factors in the cotton market, and the optimistic reports from the Lone Star State have had largely to do with sending the price of cotton down three and a half cents lower than this date last year. Texas is a world factor in price-making of agricultural products and the rapid settlement and increasing yield of its rich agricultural lands keeps the bulls and bears guessing. Texas planted 10,927,000 acres of land in cotton this year and the condition of the crop, taking the state as a whole, is four points better than last year.

OBJECT TO HACK ORDINANCE RECENTLY PASSED BY CITY COUNCIL

ALLEGED DISCRIMINATION

Are 'Shown Petition Which Inspired Ordinance—No Action Taken' On Protest

A committee of transfer men comprised of Messrs. White, Crawford, and Parrish appeared before the city council last night to protest against the hack ordinance recently adopted.

They said the ordinance looked to them like discrimination against men who were trying to make an honest living, in that while the transfer men were limited to certain spaces where they might stand on the streets, others were permitted to leave their automobiles and buggies anywhere. They said bankers and doctors and other made a practice of leaving their vehicles standing in the streets half a day at a time, while transfer men never remained in one place that long. Mr. White and Mr. Crawford said they kept telephones which would be useless to them in the hack ordinance was enforced. They believe the transfer men should be allowed to stand anywhere that the business houses in front of which they stood did not object.

In answer to these representations the transfer men were shown a petition presented before the hack ordinance was drafted in which council was asked to take action to prevent the transfer men from standing in front of their places of business. In this petition the practices of the transfer men were termed a "nuisance" and it was signed by practically all the business houses on the west side of Ohio avenue between Seventh and Eighth streets.

Council took no action upon the protest of the transfer men.

As most of you know the salary of this office is very small paying from \$200 to \$250 a year, but it is not for this salary that I am seeking re-election as commissioner.

Having lived in this section for 22 years and having helped develop it, and further believing that we have a good country and a bright future before our city, I take a personal pride in seeing the country developed and all kinds of improvements made, chief among which good roads are a factor in setting up the country.

I am familiar with county affairs and believe that county business should be run in a business like manner and on a business basis for the people pay the bills and are entitled to value received for the money they pay as taxes. I have probably made mistakes but with the knowledge and experience gained through acting as county commissioner I believe that I am better equipped than ever to fulfill the duties of this office to the satisfaction of the tax payers and for this reason I am asking for your vote.

Two years ago I promised the people that if elected I would organize a road outfit and do permanent road work. With the consent of the commissioners court I purchased tools, teams and equipment for this commissioners' road precinct and also a road outfit was purchased by the commissioners' court for the west end of this county. These outfits together with material and all expenses connected with building roads have been paid for out of the tax money received each year and today there is a balance of \$13,000 left in the road and bridge fund.

There are ten main roads leading from Wichita Falls in various directions. Seven of these roads we have graded, drained and built new bridges to the precinct line. The remaining three roads which lead to Henrietta, Petrolia and Seymour we

WARNING AS TO CARE OF THE HOME FILTERS.

As there are several cases of typhoid fever in the city, I think it would be well to warn the public how to take the proper care of filters in the home. A good stone filter is one of the best protections that one can put in the home to prevent disease that is conveyed by water, but from inquiry I have not found a single one that is being properly used. They are a menace instead of a protection, as now used by the majority of the people as they give a sense of protection that does not exist.

I do not know that the city water is infected, and I am of the opinion that it is not, as very few cases have occurred among the users of the city water. But Lake Wichita has a large shed in which is situated two small towns besides a great number of farm houses, and a single case of typhoid fever on the water shed, if not properly disinfected may infect the lake after a rain. There is always a possibility of infection arising from this source, but the City Water Works People cannot prevent. I do not believe the city requires a bacterial examination of the water, and while the Water Works People use the best method of purifying this class of water yet there are a few germs left in the water. It is not the object of this article to criticize any one but to instruct the public in the use of the household filter. There are several good makes handled by different hardware merchants of this city.

A filter, to be of any use, should have a stone core through which the water passes to the center where it leads to a drain pipe. The filter stone should be taken out each morning and cleaned, then boiled for five minutes. It would be best to have two stones so that the freshly boiled stone might be sunned each day, and if one will take this precaution they will have a pure water, as it takes the typhoid fever germ four days to get through a good stone filter. So by boiling the filter stone every morning one can have pure water even if it is infected. This is a simple precaution, but an absolute safe one if you have a good filter, and one that the public seems not to know anything about.

COMPANIES ASSESSED FOR SUPPORT OF BOARD.

Austin, Tex., July 26.—The annual collection from the fire insurance companies doing business in Texas for the maintenance of the state insurance board was completed today. The collections amounted to \$14,719.76.

Under the law creating the board, all fire insurance companies doing business in Texas are assessable, an amount not exceeding \$25,000 for the support of the board. The board was not in operation for all of last year, and this year's assessment amounted under the law only to that expended by the board during the previous twelve months.

Handle Factory Planned.

Baumont, Texas, July 26.—Through the efforts of the Chamber of Commerce, a handle factory has been secured for this city. Representatives of the company will visit this city shortly to investigate the proposed site and to make arrangements for raw material. The factory will employ about fifty hands and will invest approximately \$50,000 in buildings and yards.
