POSTAL REGULATIONS A GREAT BIG PUZZLE

Diversity of Rules and Seeming Inconsistencies Are Rather Numerous.

In the conduct of a department which is greater in size and volume of business than that of any institution within its borders, the United States has adopted some peculiar as well as stringent regulations, in its postal mail service. For queer and seemingly inconsistent regulations, the postal service of our Uncle Sam seems to take first honors with all ease. Not even the rules of the railway companies of the various states, within themselves a veritable encyclopedia of puzzles, have anything on the rules of the postal service. They are as complicated as the regulations of a school for young brides watched over by a set of old maids, or as easy of understanding as a Chinese laundry ticket, to the average American.

The young attache of the service has as much to learn as the aspirant toward leadership of New York's east side. He enters the service with a good grade made on examination, and a feeling that soon he will be capable of solving the parcels post question, or relieving the postmaster-general when that gentleman desires an afternoon off to play golf, or whatever kind of game he plays. Two weeks afterwards he feels like the little boy who has been spelled down in the Saturday afternoon spelling bee by his best girl. In other words, he's up in the air.

Gradually he learns that no one ever quite masters a complete knowledge of the regulations of the department. With this knowledge comes a desire to learn just what he is compelled to know to hold his job. Of course, if he is normally bright, his knowledge is not afraid to work. He finally manages to stick and to learn this infinitely small portion of the department's regulations. If he doesn't like the work and hasn't the pull, sooner or later he seeks another vocation. At any rate, he has the greatest respect or contempt as the mould of his nature dictates for the man or men capable of compiling so complicated a set of regulations.

A postal attache of the local office, one who has grown gray in the service, attempted an explanation of some of the more peculiar rules: For instance, drop a letter in the Wichita office, addressed to some foreign country, on which the sender has failed to place postage. The mistake will be safely carried to its destination, but the recipient will be made to pay double postage to receive it. Drop the same sort of letter, without postage, in the office addressed to a point in the United States. Does Uncle Sam convey the missive to its destination, taking a chance on getting paid for carrying it? He does not. Instead the person to whom the letter is addressed is notified by a postal card that a letter is held at such and such an office, awaiting the proper postage. If he or she wants it they can send a two-cent stamp to the office where the letter was posted. If the two cents is not forthcoming, the letter is held for a certain length of time, and finally finds itself in the Washington dead letter office.

Yet if a two-cent stamp is placed on a first-class package, requiring larger postage, the parcel will be forwarded to destination—and delivered to the person for whom it is intended on payment of the postage required.

Another peculiar fact has made it possible to send a package to Germany as cheap as you could send it to Chicago. Four pounds is the limit of weight handled by the United States postoffice. To send such a parcel to Chicago from Wichita would require 64 cents postage. Yet to send it to Germany would require only 48 cents postage. This has resulted from the United States having to accept foreign rates when he conveys matter to those countries.

Uncle Sam's postal regulations are also drafted along business lines, that is, to get all you can out of an article. For instance, the ordinary letter shrinks in transit. That is, a letter requiring four cents postage at point of mailing will sometimes require only two cents postage at point of destination. For this reason letters on which postage is due are always weighed at the point of origin. Many are the other regulations termed peculiar by the average citizen, but peculiar or otherwise, Uncle Sam seems to have gotten together a set of regulations having as their aim the speedy, safe transit of the mail.

Crystal City—During the month of June the farmers in this section shipped to outside markets, twenty cars of watermelons, one thousand cars of alfalfa, one hundred cars of kafir corn and about five thousand pounds of honey. The country is in fine condition now and a bumper crop of cotton and corn is assured.

Goliad—Several business blocks and residences are under construction here at the present time; among the most important are the First National Bank building, \$35,000; Levi Baker residence, \$10,000 and the Petrus Slack Apartments which will cost \$35,000.

Athens—The shipments of fruit from here this season, have eclipsed all past records. Over 400 cars have been shipped and all available means of transportation are being used to carry the fruit to the cars.

son's proposed platform will have as much chance of getting by at San Antonio as well a cold bottle at a German picnic.

The political weather man can be safe in forecasting unusual heat in San Antonio next week when the State Convention meets.

Employment awaits Texas-Oklahoma league players in the watermelon fields at Burk Burnett—where men who can heave, toss and catch the big water-melons for loading for shipment are wanted.

The two big glass factories will start operations next month. Also cotton pickers will go into the fields to gather the biggest cotton crop ever grown in Wichita county. Whoop-er-up for Wichita Falls.

Colonel Jake Wolters spent \$15,340 as campaign expenses and was defeated, while Morris Sheppard only spent \$4,425 and won. So it will no longer do to say that the man who spends the most money wins in an election contest.

New York City averaged one murder a day for the month of July. In that respect, New York City has Dallas bested. The best that Dallas so far has been able to do is an average of about one murder a week for the year.

Tomorrow, Oklahoma holds her State Democratic primary. Senator Owen and Ex-Gov. Haskell are contesting for the senatorship, and the fight is just about as warm as the senatorial contest in Texas was, with the chances apparently favoring Owen, the present incumbent.

Mrs. Grace the Atlanta woman tried and acquitted on the charge of attempting to kill her husband, is a beautiful woman, judging from her pictures, and she did not even have to swear to her story to make the jury (composed of men) believe that she was telling the truth. Grace's only comment on the verdict was that it was pretty rotten.

Attorney General Lightfoot doesn't see any fun in running the attorney

general's office without money so has tendered his resignation to become effective on September 1, the first day of the new fiscal year. Governor Colquitt's appointee will be handicapped in his conduct of the office through the governor's spite in vetoing the appropriation made by the legislature.

Wichita county farmers regard with jealousy the attempt of towns along the Northwestern in Oklahoma to toll off the laborers for the broom crop harvest, just at a time when they are looking forward to the biggest cotton crop ever grown here. However, they are hoping that the broom crop will be out of the way before cotton picking time. Plowing for wheat, the harvest of the feed and corn crops and cotton picking are going to leave the farmer few idle days this fall.

The rain of yesterday was heaviest at Burk Burnett and at other places in the county than here, where it only amounted to about one-half inch, but the one which fell this morning, and which seems to have been general was much heavier. Cotton crops were beginning to need moisture, and now that it has come, there seems hardly a doubt but that the cotton crop of Wichita county in 1912 will be the largest ever produced in the county. The acreage is much larger and the condition of the crop is much better at this season of the year than ever before.

The steam roller to be used at San Antonio next Monday is not of the same pattern that was used at Houston, but judging from the way some counties have instructed their delegates, it is not yet settled who will run the machine. For instance, while such counties as Dallas and Tarrant voted for Colquitt, the Ramsey people captured the precinct conventions and sent solid Ramsey delegations to the San Antonio convention with instructions to vote for Colquitt, but on all other matters, such as selecting state committee men, making the platform, etc., will be at liberty to vote as they see fit.

The wholesale merchants of Dallas have granted and agreed to refund railroad fares to customers that purchase up to a certain amount of goods, without regard as to who they trade with, the only restriction being that the customer shall take the precaution to get a certificate from the house he purchases his stock, giving the amount purchased, and if the purchase equal the amount stipulated, the purchaser is given an order for the money he has been out in making the trip to and from Dallas. This arrangement brings to Dallas thousands of dollars of trade that under other circumstances would go to St. Louis, Chicago or some other wholesale center. If the wholesale people of Dallas find it profitable to do such a thing in order to bring them a greater volume of trade, why would it not be a good scheme for the retail merchants of Wichita Falls to form such an organization and do likewise? It strikes the Times that it would bring much trade to Wichita Falls that now goes to the wholesale and retail houses in larger cities. At one time such an organization was started in this city, but for some cause or other was never put to the test. The Times would like to see it started again, and this time carried out.

### CONE JOHNSON AT BALTIMORE.

Yesterday's democratic national convention, at the period of wildest disorder, found its master in Cone Johnson of Texas. He was the unquestioned oratorical hero of the day, eclipsing even Bryan in his dominance over the audience. \* \* \* Cone Johnson took the platform while the disorder was at its height, and a moment after that quietness reigned. Tall, lean, rather classic of features, and with a voice like a bell, his first words won the crowd and his next compelled respect. \* \* \* Johnson's power over the crowd grew as his effort developed. The voice rang clear, the tall, slender frame awayed dramatically as the periods rounded out, the face lighted up with intense conviction. When he reached his peroration and hurled at the audience the alignment of battle as he saw it, they rose to their feet in roaring, spontaneous cheers.—Rock-bridge, (Va.) News.

Cone Johnson's voice will again be heard at the San Antonio convention, and if the Democrats of Texas follow his advice there will be further fighting among Democrats. He has offered or pointed out the way in which that can be done, and there is evidence that it will be adopted.

## Petroleum Production In the United States

The petroleum production in the United States in 1911, according to final figures compiled by Dr. Day, the Geological Survey statistician, surpasses its own record made in 1910 by an increase of nearly 11,000,000 barrels and reached a total of 220,449,391 barrels. In 1910 the output was 209,557,148 barrels. The total production of the world also surpassed all previous records, amounting to over 345,000,000 barrels, and of this the United States produced more than 63 per cent. The value of this enormous output of oil in the United States for 1911 was \$134,344,752, the average price being 59.3 cents per barrel. The increase for the year was caused principally by the gain in California, which was by far the largest producer, its output being over \$1,000 barrels. Another factor in the increase for 1911 was the discovery of oil at Vinton, La., and the comparatively new Caddo field in Louisiana also grew in importance. A find of high-grade oil at Electra, in northern Texas, was another notable event of the year.

### PRINCETON TO OPEN A FARM

University Will Provide Students Means to Work Their Way Through College.

Princeton, N. J.—The Princeton university authorities announce the opening of a large farm property near the college, which will provide any student who is not afraid of toil with the means of working his way through college. Plowing has begun and there will be steady work all through the summer-vacation.

It is calculated that students will be able to earn \$2 a day. The land will be tilled on a socialistic, democratic basis, the laborer obtaining the entire product of his toil. The tract available for student labor will be increased as rapidly as students apply for work. The soil will be devoted to truck farming and the crops will be sold to the college commons and to various Princeton eating clubs.

President Hibben says that the idea has been adopted to rid Princeton of the name of being a home for the sons of rich men.

### RULES AGAINST KANGAROOS

United States Experts Rule Tiny Animals at San Francisco Are Deer.

San Francisco, Cal.—Eight tiny tame kangaroos less than 12 inches tall and yet full grown have been held as undesirable aliens by experts of the department of agriculture on the ground that they are deer. They have heads like deer. The animals are the property of K. N. Painter of New York, who, with his wife, arrived on the Tenyo Maru from the Orient. He bought them in Singapore, where they had just arrived from Australia.

"There are no animals like them in the country," said Painter. "The law was passed with intent to protect our domestic stock from intestinal complaints common to Asiatic furred animals."

Child Slid Down Pipe to Furnace. Altoona, Pa.—While looking for his mother's thumb, Morris, the two-year-old son of Robert Templeton, stepped into a hot-air pipe this week and slid down to the furnace. His mother, frantic with fear that he had been roasted alive, tore down the pipe, and found that the child had saved himself by making a wedge of his arms.

Exonerated for Death. Springfield, Ohio.—A jury acquitted Pearl Elder, white, charged with manslaughter for the killing of James Sanford, a negro, alleged paramour of Elder's mother, September 25, 1910.
