County Commissioners meeting

Parmer County Commissioners met Tuesday November 12 at the courthouse.

In an earlier meeting commissioners voted to outsource county payroll. That vote was rescinded because of state regulations governing payroll distribution. All county employees now are required to have a bank checking account for direct deposit of payroll.

A report on wind farm activ-

ity was given by James Scott of Scatec. He indicated that construction of wind turbines in the northeast part of Parmer County is proceeding and should be in full swing by 2015.

Panhandle Community Services advised commissioners that they had limited funds available to assist needy folks with utility bills this winter but some funds are available. Bill Dannheim, Veteran Services

Officer for the county, said he also had funds available to assist needy veterans.

Commissioners appointed Kirby Burch of Lazbuddie and Tom Ware of Bovina to the Parmer County Appraisal District board of directors. Sheriff Randy Geris is submitting a plan to receive grant money from the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission to equip Sheriff Department vehicles

with in-car computers and ticket writers.

The filing period for county offices is now open from November 9 to December 9. Those planning to run for office will need to file with either County Republican chairman Elizabeth McLellan or County Democratic chairman Robert White. The primary election will be held in March and the general election in November.

The Last Election: Friona lost the county seat bid

Once in awhile someone not well versed in Parmer County History will ask why the county seat is in Farwell. One can read Parmer County histories published in 1974 and 1981 to find the details of the move from Parmerton to Farwell in 1907, and one can hear many "legends" passed down through the generations concerning this election.

The purpose of this article is to document the story of the last election when citizens of Friona petitioned to move the county seat to Friona. Interestingly the election took place 95 years ago this Thanksgiving on November 28, 1928. Depending on ones point of view, you can be thankful the citizens of Friona tried to get the county seat moved to a more cen-

tral location, or you can be thankful that even though they tried, they failed.

The election is well documented in the Friona Star beginning with the October 19, 1928 edition when a headline reads, "VOTERS WANT ELECTION FOR COUNTY SEAT". A petition calling for the election was signed by over 300 citizens of the county and presented to County Judge E. F. Lokey who granted the election which was to be held on Monday, November 26.

The November 9 edition proclaims, "CHAMBER OF COMMERCE TALKS OVER PROPOSITION OF MOVING COUNTY SEAT TO THIS TOWN". Apparently the main reason for the movement was that the county was

going to spend \$30,000 to build a jail. Friona residents reasoned that a jail could be built in connection with a court house in Friona on land deeded free to the county.

In the November 16 Star, a headline reads, "County Seat Election Will Be Held Wednesday, November 28". An article states that anyone living in the state and county the limit of time set by the state law and who has paid the poll tax for the year can vote. In the same edition a letter from the Friona Chamber of Commerce supports the moving of the county seat and makes the case using facts with monetary amounts showing there will be no need to raise taxes. It is signed by F. W. Reeve, J. A. Blackwell, F. L. Spring, and J. W. White.

There is also an article from the

State Line Tribune quoting an article published by the Clovis Journal. The article lists reasons why the change to Friona would not benefit many. The November 23 Friona Star includes a full page listing of reasons why the county seat should be established in Friona. There is even an architectural drawing of what the proposed court house would look like in Friona.

However, the Friona Star Friday, November 30 edition proclaims, "Friona Loses County Seat Removal Election by 207 Votes." A total of 1252 votes were cast. Friona received 628 votes and Farwell 624, but the removal of the county seat required a two-thirds majority... thus the 207 figure. In a separate front page article there is a statement regarding the teamwork and

effort required to have a system of voting that "worked so perfectly that it is thought there was not a single voter that was not reached by some part of the system during the day, and each part worked in perfect harmony with each other part."

The previous quote is a testament to the citizens of Parmer County and their willingness to work together to have a fair election. Notice there is no mention of a particular party affiliation or labels or name calling involved. And most interesting of all are some quotes from citizens under "Just Remarks". The following are two of them: "What I've learned and the fun I've had in this county seat contest is worth lots more than it cost," AND "Sure would like to have got the court house, but I have no regret."

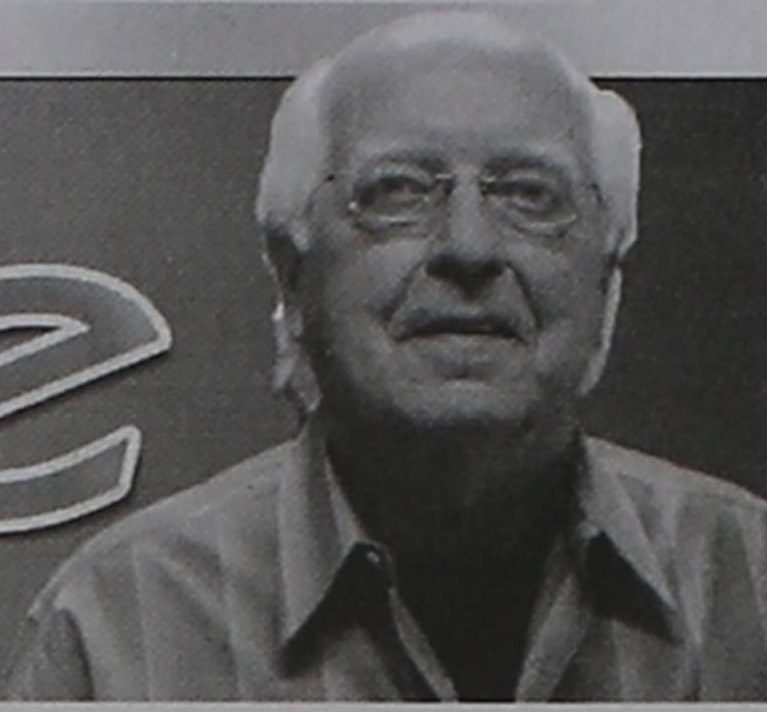

a hug for delia

Delia Samarron Jackson was buried today. She was 41. She leaves behind her husband Billy, 10-year-old daughter Megan, and many relatives, friends, and co-workers. Delia graduated from Friona High School in 1990, married Billy in 1996, and was a Certified Nurse's Aide at Parmer Medical Center.

In her obituary the family said she "loved to take care of people and loved to hug them." My sister, brother, and I can attest to that. We received many hugs from Delia during our mother's numerous stays in the hospital.

Over the course of almost three years mother spent many days at PMC. My sister came from Burleson to sit with mother at the hospital.

My brother Rick spent days and days sitting with mother. It was during this time that we grew to know Delia. And yes, she always had a hug or two for each of us.

No doubt many folks in the community had the same experience. You couldn't have a patient in the hospital without sooner or later knowing Delia. We all grew to depend on her to tend to mother, who because of her age and illness, alternated between a sweet angel and a cantankerous old lady. The moods didn't seem to phase Delia. No matter mom's mood Delia always had a smile and a hug and an encouraging word.

She took vital signs, brought the food tray, rushed down the hall to get mom to the bathroom, gave her show-

ers, changed the bed sheets, and admonished mom when she didn't eat enough. "Go find Delia" became a phrase our family used often.

One day when I went to the hospital Delia and my mother were deep in conversation. Don't know what they were talking about but I'm sure mom was imparting her wisdom about life. Delia loved to talk but she could also be a good listener.

On Thursday, October 31, when Delia woke up that morning, she had a brief spell of not knowing who or where she was. A scan at the hospital discovered a tumor at the base of her brain. She underwent brain surgery Monday evening and while recovering she suffered a stroke that left her on life support with no

chance of recovery.

Saturday, November 9, she was taken off life support. Delia was an organ donor. Within hours of her death Saturday evening her heart was transplanted in a recipient in Houston. Her lungs, kidneys, and liver went to others. Her brother Richard Samarron told me that Delia potentially saved five lives through her organ donations and she would be happy about that.

Sometimes along the way we meet people with whom we build a trust and connection and lasting friendship. For my family, Delia Jackson was one of those people. We are better off for having known her and will always remember her as a friend.

Hugs Delia. Rest in Peace.

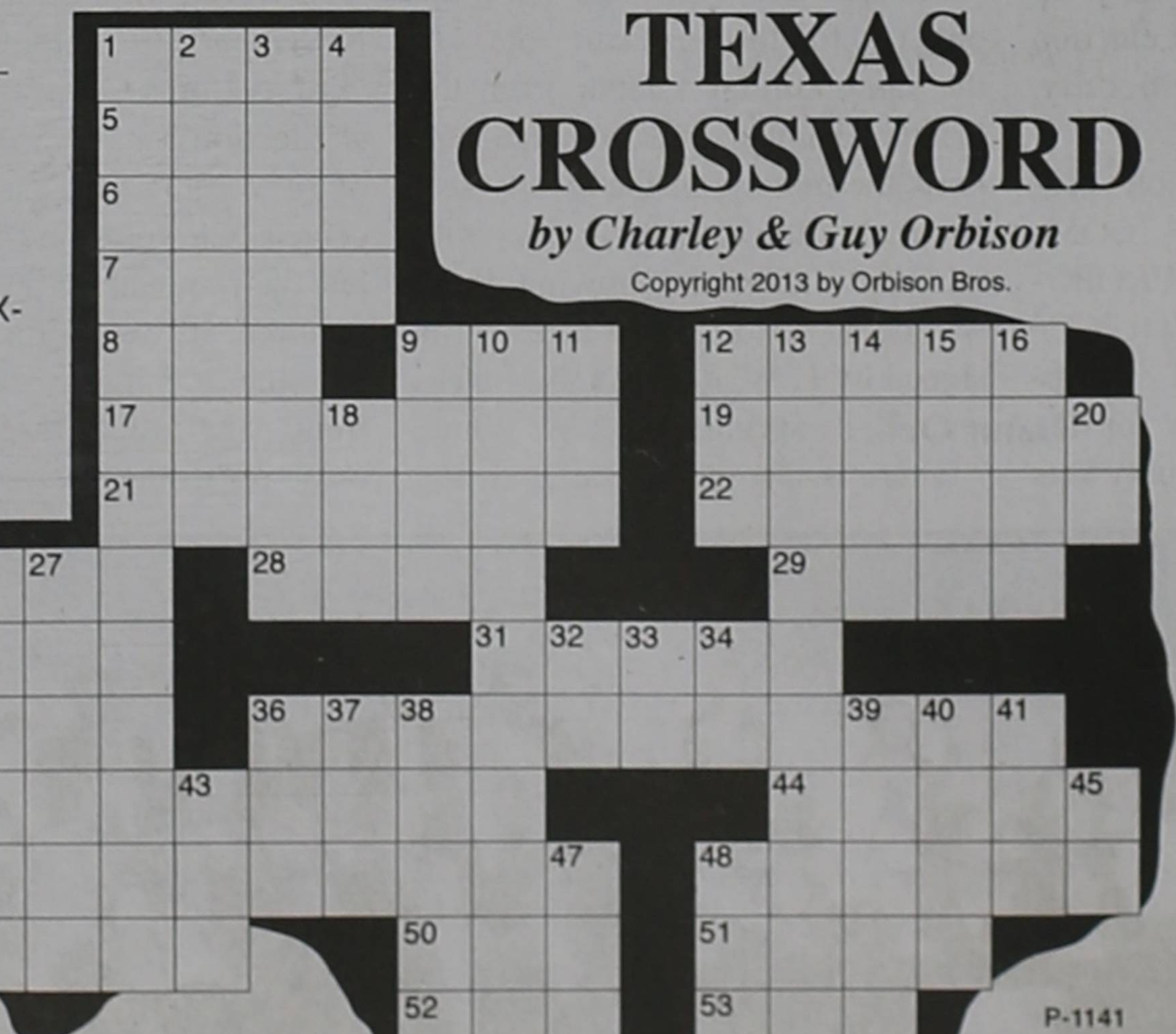

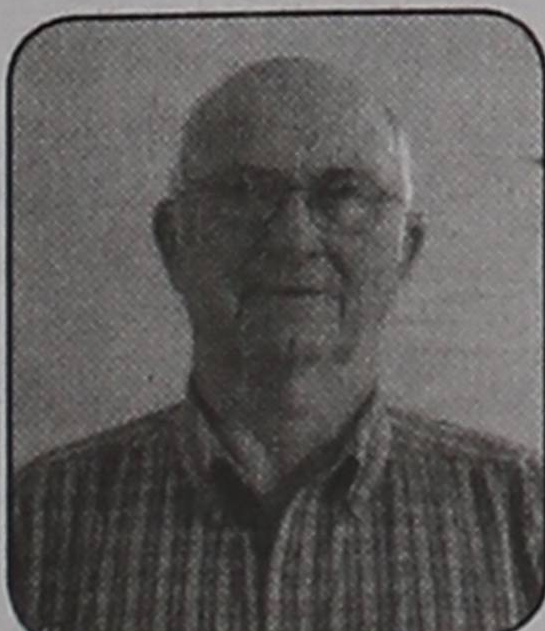

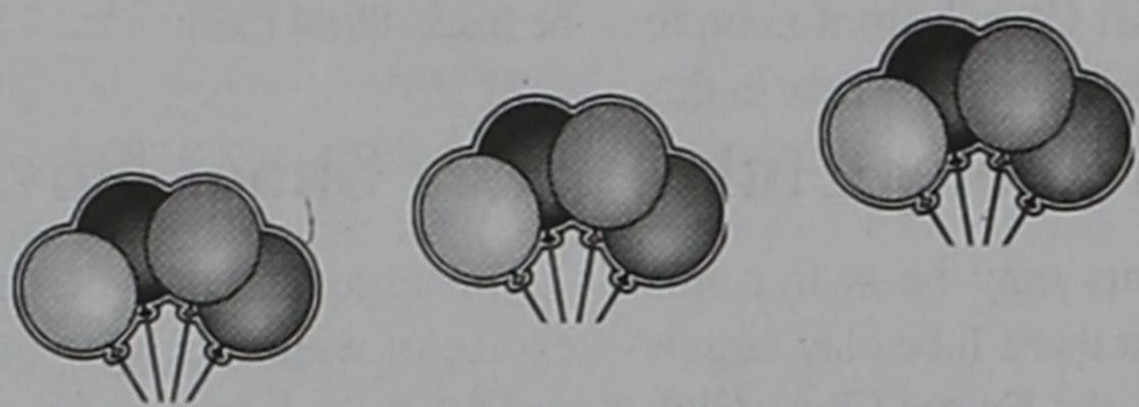

Weight vs Weight?

Pop Quiz... What are the five fitness components? I know, but I really want you to know these. They are cardiovascular endurance, muscular endurance, muscular strength, flexibility and body composition. We are discussing ways to assess your fitness level. The first component we talked about was cardiovascular endurance. If you did the one-mile walk test, I have the charts posted on my Facebook pages, Melanie Gallman Braun and Fitness Dynamics with Melanie. Or, you can go to, http://www.sparkpeople.com/resource/fitness_articles.asp?id=1496&page=2 to check your results. There just wasn't room to print them with the article in that week's Star.

So what is body composition? Well, it is the amount of fat in your body compared to the amount of lean mass such as muscle and bone. There are several ways to measure body fat. Underwater weighing, dual-energy x-ray absorptiometry (DXA) and the Bod Pod are the most expensive and the most involved processes, but are also the most accurate in determining body fat. They are usually not an option for the average person.

The more practical methods are skin-fold measurements and bioelectrical impedance analysis (BIA). The skin-fold method involves "pinching" a person's fold of skin at various locations on a person's body with a caliper. The measurements are then entered into a formula resulting in a body fat percentage. The BIA method is the easiest way to measure body fat. Some of you already have bathroom scales that give

you a body fat percentage--this is the BIA method. There are also BIA handheld models.

The BIA devices send a very low level electrical current through your body (you don't even feel it). Water is a good conductor of electricity and lean body mass is made up of mostly water, so the rate at which the current travels through your body is a good indication of lean body mass and body fat. All methods are estimates.

The American College of Sports Medicine guidelines state that a range of 10-22 percent body fat is acceptable for males and a range of 20-32 percent is acceptable for females. Body fat percentages within these ranges suggest that you have less risk of developing diabetes, high blood pressure and even some cancers. Bottom line--your weight, in regard to good health, is not nearly as important as the composition of that weight.

Survivors include a son, Denny Cole; a grandson Brandon Cole; daughter Shawn Smith and husband Anthony Smith;

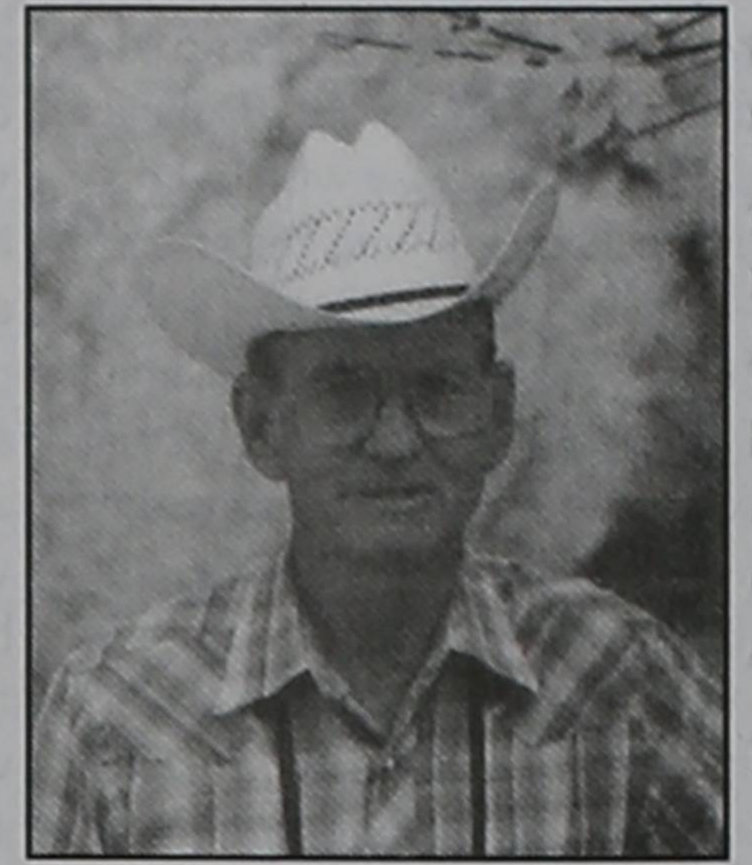
granddaughter Keely Smith and grandson Cole Smith; and many nieces and nephews.

Chiefs end season 49-39 over Dimmitt

The Chieftains went into the final game of the season looking for their first win and avoiding last place in district. Both the Chiefs and Dimmitt Bobcats came into the game with 0-4 district records, playing for pride.

The Bobcats had a 17-14 lead after one quarter but the Chiefs managed to pull ahead 21-20 at the half. Led by leading rusher Ediladio "Eddie" Garcia, the Chiefs scored 28 second half points and held Dimmitt to 19. The Chiefs amassed 467 rushing yards plus 68 passing for 535 total offense. For Dimmitt, they

managed 415 offensive yards, 171 rushing and 244 passing. But Eddie Garcia was the star of the night. All he did was carry the ball 21 times for 305 yards and 5 touchdowns. He had touchdown runs of 63, 4, 88, 8, and 49 yards. Brad Stowers pitched in with a 54 yard TD run and QB Mason Loflin ran for a 29 yard TD. Juan Martinez, who had never played football but was recruited by coaches for his soccer kicking abilities, was good on 7 of 7 extra point attempts. Loflin completed only 3 of

11 passes for 68 yards to Dal-lin Woods, Brad Stowers, and Antonio Adame. Loflin had 59 rushing yards on 6 carries and Stowers had 93 yards rushing on 3 carries.

On defense Antonio Adame had 9 solo tackles and 4 assists, Abel Palacios had 6 solos and 7 assists, and Edgar Guerrero was credited with 5 solos and 4 assists.

Now coaches and fans will anticipate the biennial UIL district realignments that will be announced the first of February, 2014.

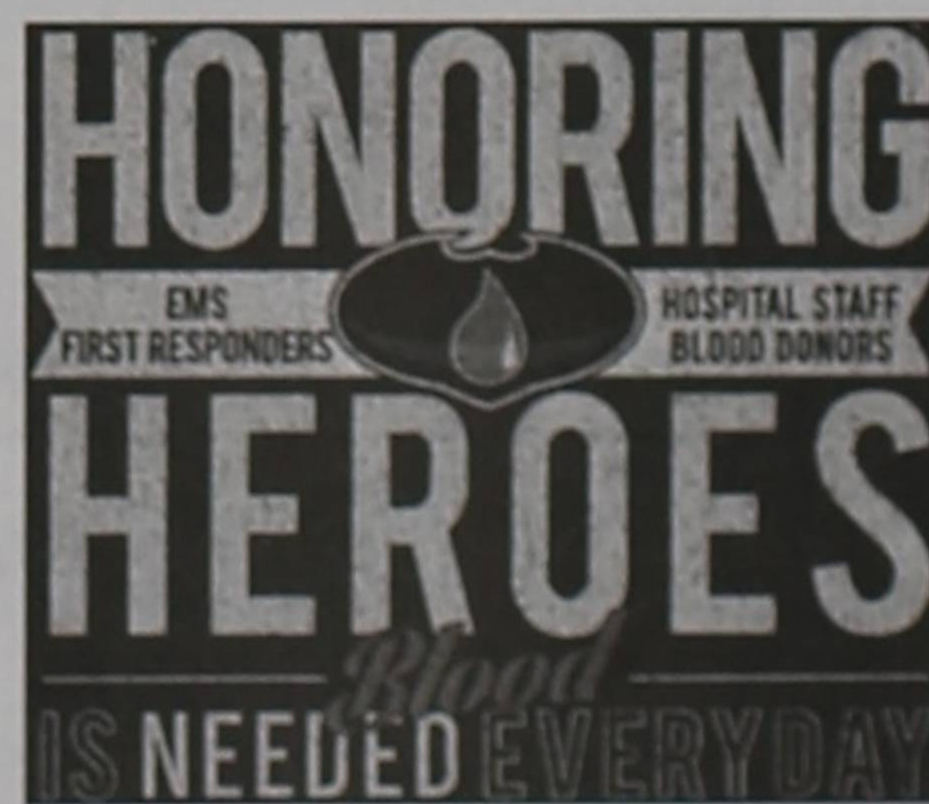

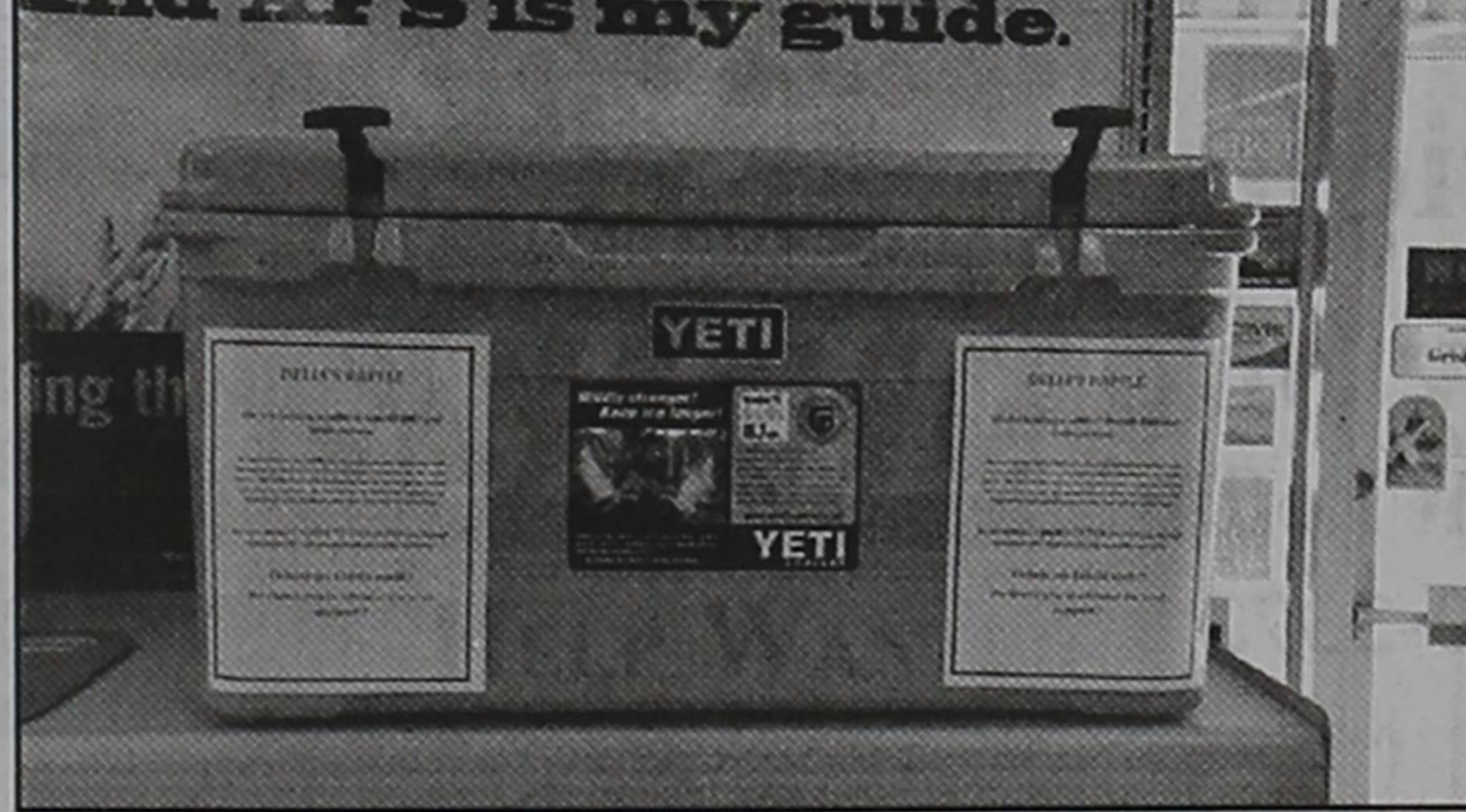

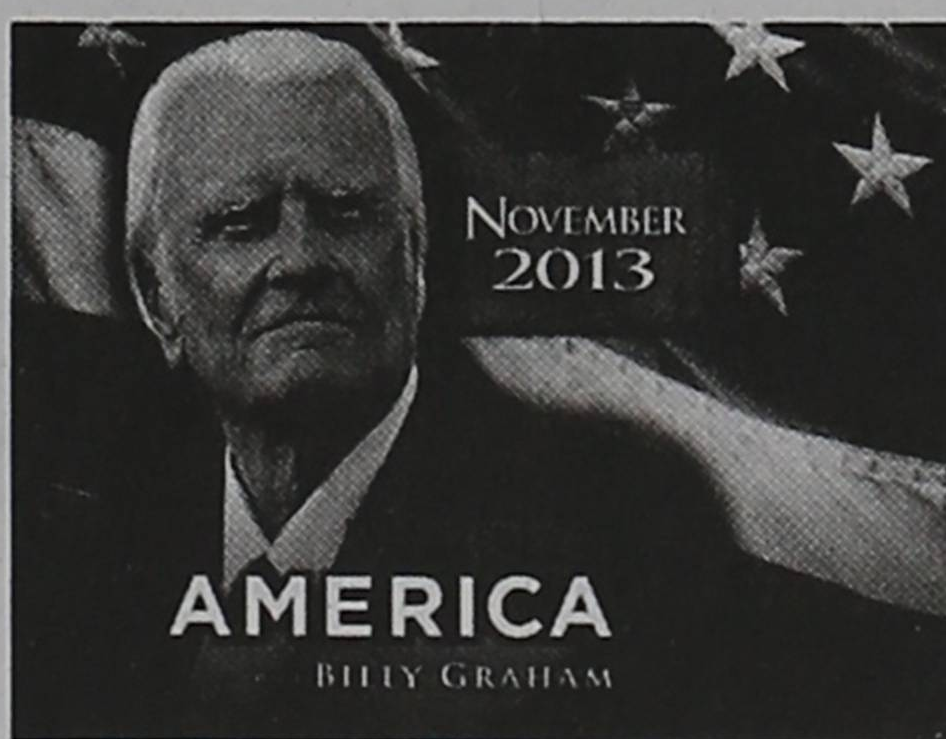
