### HAYS' CONDUCT IS CRITICISED

IMPROPER CONDUCT CHARGED AGAINST ASSISTANT SEC-RETARY IN REPORT

### WILSON

Hay's Conduct Denounced As Repugnant to a High Sense of Honor ad Integrity.

By Associated Press. Washington, D. C., Aug. 19.-The investigation of the Department of Agriculture's connection with the Florida Everglades drainage project ended today when the House of Rep resentatives' committee on expendi tures in the Department of Agriculture submitted to the House its findings in majority and minority re ports of its members.

The conduct of Assistant Secretary Hays of the Agriculture Department whose relations with former drainage engineer J. O. Wright were the sub ject of especial attention by the committee, was declared in a majority report presented by Chairman Moss Democrat, to have been not in har mony "with proper standards of offi cial propriety if not official rectitude." The minority report made by Representative Sloan, of Nebras ka. Republican, asserted on the oth er hand that the "unstable" majority conclusions were "more of a charge Vagainst the mental capacity and hon esty of the committee members' than against Assistant Secretary Havs.

The majority report was signed by Chairman Moss and Representatives Flood of Arkansas, and Doughton of North Carolina, Democrats. The minority report was signed by Representative Sloan of Nebraska, who stated that Representatives Higgins of Connecticut, and Madden of Illinois, approved it. All are Republi- dition was improved. 



Judging from the great number of fruit jars now being sold, the canned goods merchants are not going to enity for the next year. Nealy every family is taking advantage of the abundant peach crop, and the low price at which they are selling by putting up a year's supply.

The tariff bill on wool, vetoed the other day by President Taft, was identically the same bill he vetoed a year ago. His reason then for vetoeing the hill was that the law was framed before the tariff board had made its reports. So far as known that was the only reason given the people. His reason for vetoeing the bill the last time was that it would ruin the wool busi ness. The bill slaughtered by the president provided or imposed a duty of twenty-nine per cent ad valorem on wool, and a tax of forty-nine per cent on woolen cloth.

Texas cotton raisers have in Peter Radford, president of the Farmers Union, and Ben B. Cain, vice president and general manager of the Gulf, Texas and Western railway, two men who have proven by their unselfish acts that they are true friends to the cotton raiser. These two men, almost by Themselves have matured plans by which the cotton raiser is to be furnished money at the low rate of six per-cent on cotton held for market. By their act, millions of dollars will-be saved to cotton farmers. Heretofore, It has been no easy task to secure money with cotton as security, even by paying as high a rate of interest as 10 per cent.

#### ABOUT ALFALFA SOWING.

The Oklahoman publishers the fol lowing pointers about alfalfa growing. which will be of interest in view of the fact that a number of Wichita county farmers are plannin gto sow alfalfa this fall

Alfalfa should be sown during the next six weeks, according to the state's best authorities on this subject. So, if you haven't your land ready now, it a majority vote of the taxpayers thereshould be prepared just as soon as pos-

Land that will produce twenty-five or thirty bushels of corn an acre, provided the subsoil will allow root pen-

etration, and which does not overflow, will generally produce good alfalfa. Plow the land six to eight inches deep. Then double disc, setting the Then double disc, setting the weightin gdown to cause better pene-This process packs the fur ch moisture that otherwise

well with the harrow after disking, conserve the moisture after each rain and before sowing by har-rowing. Do this especially if the sow-ing does not follow closely after prep-aration of the land.

Do not sow until ther eis plenty of moisture in the soil to sprout the seed and support young plants until more rain falls. Sowing should be done beween August 20 and October 1.

Sow only clean, strong seed. Have the seed tested for germinating quali-ties; the experiment station at Stillwater will make the tests without

The sowing may be done with an ordinary wheat drill by cutting down he feed. Or it can be done with seed ers of other kinds. The important hing is to get an even distribution of eed over the field.

Don't sow too deep. Seed covered to an inch in depth is deep enough under ordinary conditions. Be particularly careful about getting the seed too deep n sandy soil.

Don't sow with any other crop. The alfalfa will have a hard enough time lone without fighting some other crop or moisture and food.
