Austin, Texas, Sept. 5.—The railroad commission today made public the report of Auditor Fitzgerald, showing the income and operating expenses of Texas railroads for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1912, as com pared with the previous fiscal year.

The Sunset Central and Missouri, Kansas & Texas lines show an immense decrease in income from operation and an increase in operating expense and a decrease in income. All other roads show an increase in operating revenue, an increase in operating expense and an increase in income from operation.

The Sunset Central and Katy lines showed a decreased income from oper ation of 37.3 per cent.

## PROHIBITIONISTS NOTIFY WATKINS

VICE PRESIDENTIAL CANDIDATE
TOLD OF NOMINATION BY CLIN-

## SPEAKER IS FACETIOUS

Says Taft Is Milk-Fed Elephant; Wilson a Lion's Whelp and Roosevelt a Big Wind

Ada, Ohio, Sept. 5.—Aaron S. Watkins was today notified of his nomination for the Vice Presidency by the Prohibition National convention. The notification speech was made by Mr. Clinton N. Howard, of Rochester, New York, who said:

"Taft is a milk-fed elephant with a broken tusk and a rubber trust trunk; Wilson is a lion's whelp, clean or tooth and claw, led by an ass; Roosevelti is a 'great and mighty wind,' which raises the dust and creates political astigmatism among the people."

"Aside from the fact that Mr. Taft is the candidate of his party, what claim has he upon the American people? What has he done to promote their life, liberty and happiness and to maintain their just rights against oppression; spoilation and damnaiton by the forces of greed, Mammon and drink that assail them?

"The whole record of his adminisration is a challenge to the American people. There is not one reason or justification for his re-election; for an unfit candidate of one's party should be the first call upon its members for the support of some other.

"No party was ever purged of its undesirable element or the evil forces that had captured it, by supporting a candidate that represents those elements.

"Perhaps not in the history of the Republic have the baser elements in a great political party been so well satisfied and so united in their support of its candidate as is true today of the nominee of the Republican party. That alone should condemn it to defeat.

"This may not be truthfull said of the Democratic party or its pre-entinent candidate, for the reason that neither party nor candidate has any immediate record in national politics to which it can point with pride. ### HAS 20 MINUTES SUNSHINE

There is a busy town of 500 inhab

tants in Colorado where the sun shines but 20 mirrutes out of each 24 hours. This town is River Portal. It is located in Gunnison canyon and is the point from which the great Gunnison tunnel was run that the waters of that river might be conducted to the deserts beyond the mountain range. The Gunnison canyon was steep, and precipitous and opposed great difficulties to the engineers who lought to divert its waters. These engineers cut a road in the solid rock of the canyon's side and at the foot of that road planted a town. This town was the headquarters for the spectacular engineering enterprise that they had in mind. In the town lived the working force which was driving the tunnel through the moun-

tain.

This town was perched upon the piece of ground at the foot of the great cliffs that was most nearly level. Even this spot, however, offered an opportunity of placing the dwellings only in an irregular way and one above the other. Here in the mountains has existed for four years a busy little village with all the elements of modern civilization brought with it into this isolation. In the picture Uncle Sam's public school appears as the highest building in the right hand background.

The strangest thing about this village is the fact that it has but 20 minutes of sunshine every day. This is due to the precipitous walls that rise on each side of the stream and shut out the rays of the sun. There is the brief period of 20 minutes between 11:20 and 11:40 when the sun peeps over the bluff on the one side of the stream and before its rays have been cut off by the high cliffs on the other side. This one short span of sunlight is all that these people of the canyon get year in and year out. Artificial light bills run high here.

### PLATINUM FROM RIVER BED



Our illustration shows Russians taking alluvial gravel containing platinum from the bed of a river in the Ural mountains. Russia supplies the greater part of the world's platinum, some forty tons of the precious metal being obtained yearly by the dredgers in the Urals.

## CZAR'S WARDROBE COSTLY

The czar of Russia is the European sovereign who spends most on his wardrobe. The tailor who makes his ordinary suits says the net annual profit from them is \$10,000, and the army tailor who is responsible for the uniforms and court dress makes \$15,000 a year. His majesty never puts on a suit more than three times, and each one costs about \$60. For slik hats the czar pays \$26, and \$10 a pair for gloves. Every year, it is stated, he

purchases a sable cape costing \$2,400. King George, on the other hand, is one of the most economical of living monarchs, allowing himself only \$20,000 a year to dress on. This sum is spent annually by the kalser on uniforms alone. The German emperor, however, pays very little attention to his civil wardrobe. He never pays more than \$35 for a suit, which he thinks nothing of wearing thirty times. The principal luxury in dress he allows himself is in neckties.

With the king of Spain the favorite article of dress is silk shirts, in which he always hunts, and of which he buys many dozens every year at \$30 each. The most frugal of all the crowned heads in the matter of clothing is the king of Norway, who spends no more than an ordinary well-to-do citzen.

The greatest land owner in the world is Sydney Kidman, a cattleman of Queensland, Australia, whose runs aggregate 50,000 square miles. This immense tract, greater in extent than the state of Pennsylvania, he admits is "larger than any one man should have." Kidman, when a boy of thirteen years, left his home at Adelaide to seek his fortune. He secured work as-a cowboy at five dollars a week. He finds the atmosphere of cities hard to breathe and is never so mappy as when traveling in a buggy across the huge tracts where he is monarch of all he survyes.

## How Hot Is Lava?

To ascertain the temperature of lava as it is emitted from a volcano has baffled many scientists. The Roman academy has just published the results of the investigations made by Glovani Platania during the eruption of Etna last year.

The eruption began September 10 and the scientist was unable to approach the mountain for ten days, when one crater was still in action. He camped as near as he could to this crater, close to a stream of lava flowing about a yard a second.

Using the new "telescope pyrometer," he got temperatures for the surface of the lava flow of all the way from 1,040 to 1,420 degrees.

A second series of observations, taken at a distance of a dozen feet, gave figures as high as 1,500 degrees. The estimates are that the incanlescent lava, as it comes directly from the crater, has a temperature not less than 2,200 degrees.

Hadley's Efforts in Vain, St. Louis, Mo., Sept. 5 .- The Missouri State Progressive convention today nominated a full State ticket, beaded by Judge Albert D. Norton, of the St. Louis Court of Appeals.

A debate was brought about by telephone statement Gov. Herbert S. Hadley to Progreman L. A. Ellis in w tate Chair the Governor said two or three Republican candidates had told him they would withdraw from that ticket should the Republican State Central committee demand that they adhere to the supporting of the entire State ticket. This statement was regarded as an effort by Gov. Hadley to bring about a fusion between the two parties on these nominations and this was bitterly resented by practically all of the delegates.

The matter of obtaining places on the ballots for the party's candidates also received attention. A report of a special committee of lawyers appointed at the session yesterday finally was adopted. This put forward three methods by which the desired result may be accomplished, through attested certificates from the convention, by application of the Progressive State committee, or through petitions signed by the electors of the State, The report provided that should all three fail, an attack should be made on the constitutionality of the State primary law.
