## Out of 2000 fires in other classes WHOLESALE BURGLARY IN NEW YORK CITY

Eight Floor Building Plundered and \$50,000 Worth of Goods Removed

By Associated Press. New York, Sept. 6.—One of the most thorough jobs of wholesale burglary ever accomplish in New York City was discovered shortly before daybreak this morning when the pobuilding in University Place by the sounding of a burglar alarm from the ninth floor.

When the police arrived, it was found that burglars had been through every one of the first eight floors, which were occupied by clothing manufacturers. They had gone through all the stock rooms and offices and had removed several truckloads of merchandise. It was impos sible to obtain an accurate estimate of the total loss, but the police believe it will reach \$50,000.

MAN'S WIFE AND WOMAN'S HUS-BAND PUT OUT OF WAY BY POISON AND THE AXE

Says His Soul Belongs In Hell and the Sconer He Is Hanged the Bet-ter He Will Be Satisfied

By Associated Press.

Sherveport, La., Sept. 6 .- "When I raised that axe to strike that sleeping man, I said to myself 'this will send your soul to hell,' that's where I belong and the sooner I am hanged the better I will be satisfied."

This was the statement of A. L. Watson who last night in a written statement confessed to the murder of C. C. Bailey at Metcalf, Louisiana, last Monday night, and who also confessed that as a result of a compact with Mrs. Bailey three months ago, he poisoned his own wife at Flanagan, Tex-

Mrs. Bailey, wife of the murdered man and mistress of Watson, also confessed and admits that she attempted first to poison her husband with strychnine bought by Watson and that she urged him to brain her husband with an axe after her attempt

at poisoning had failed. Watson who is 44 years old has secretary of the Men and Religion three daughters, one married and living at Jefferson, Tex. Mrs. Bailey has two children aged five and two years now living with her parents

near here. The plot had its inception three months ago at Flanagan where the Bailey and Watson families then resided. According to the confession of both, they agreed that Watson was to kill his wife and Mrs. Bailey was to kill her husband at the earliest possible moment, so they might be free to live together as man and wife,

Watson carried out his part of the program immediately, no suspicion being aroused over the manner of his wife's death at the time. Shortly after the death of Mrs. Watson the Bailey family came to Caddo Parish More than 250 cars of watermelons and Watson came with them, board-

## CAMPAIGN LIAR

Assistant Attorney General Lang Is Preparing Bill Which He Thinks Will Meet Situation

Austin, Texas, Sept. 6 .- Designed for the purpose of putting an end to the promiscuous circulation-ver bal or otherwise, of slanderous, false statements and "campaign lies" against candidates for office, from governor down to constable, Judge C. E. Lane, assistant attorney general, is preparing a bill to be proposed to the Thirty-third legislature. The proposed measure in its present state, is rather drastic, and makes it a misdemeanor for any person to wantonly circulate matter derogatory to the character of any candidate for office. By the word "wantonly," the assistant attorney general means any one making slanderous statements against such a candidate without first having taken the pains to ascertain whether such statements or accusations are true or untrue. The penalty propos ed for the violation of the act, should lice were called to a ll story loft it become a law, is a fine of not less than \$50 nor more than \$500 and by imprisonment in the county fail for not less than 30 nor more than 90


