Chicago, Ill., Sept. 12.-Aviator Paul Peck of Washington, D. C., holder of the American duration flight record, was killed in a fall with a biplane last night, while flying in a gusty wind. He attempted too steep ground the heavy engine crashed through the wreckage, striking him in the neck.

A gusty wind blew at Cicero field all day and Director Andrew Drew posted the customary warning to avia tors against going up. Peck, believing his small biplane would be fast enough to carry him through the choppy wind, went into the air in spite of the cantion. At about 800 feet altitude he started to come down in a spiral glide. Because of the unusually small span of the machine. Peck got into too steep a spiral, his aeroplane slid in toward the center of the vortex and he could not bring

it back.
His real difficulty did not become apparent until he was within 200 feet of the ground, He would have escaped with minor injuries, Director Drew and his technical committee declared, had it not been for the fact clared, had it not been for the fact that they kneel in prayer. RANDLETT TEMPORARY CAPITOL OF COTTON

Governor Cruce Issues Proclamation Declaring Temporary County Seat of Oklahoma's 77th County

Oklahoma City, Okla., Sept. 12.-The city of Randlett, Jefferson township, county of Cotton, and not Walter, whose people were responsible for the creation of Oklahoma's seventy-seventh county, is the temporary seat of government for the new county organization.

For, upsetting all forecasts as to the probable location of the temporary county seat, Governor Lee Cruce ignored the claims of Walter on the new county honor and named Randlett instead.

The governor's reason for selecting Randlett was his belief that a majority vote of the people should decide where the seat of government should be located. Under the law for the creation of new counties and the es tablishment of county seats, he pointed out, if the temporary county seat is located anywhere within six and ne-half miles of the geographical enter of the county, it would require majority of sixty per cent to renove it. In other words, had Goveror Cruce named Walter as the temporary seat of government, as long s it could hold forty-one per cent of the people in favor of that place or permanent county seat, it would old the county records. The people of Randlett agree not to enter that own as a candidate for permanent county seat, but even if they forget that agreement, its location outside the six and one-half miles limit will give every other town in the county an equal chance and permit a majority vote of the people to decide where they shall transact their county business.

The matter of the temporary county seat was to have been decided within five days after the governor proclaimed Cotton county as a separately existing organization, but when the question came up, a delegation of Randlett citizens appeared with a petition signed by 800 voters of the new county asking that the temporary seat of government be located there. Walter had no petition at all and asked for a continuance: It was held-over until today.

When the matter was again presented today, a delegation of a dozen Randlett men was present with petitions which they claimed bore the signatures of 1,100 voters. A score of Walter men were also present, carrying the petitions of 1600 voters, they said. The two petitions, if carrying genuine signatures, represented 3,700 voters of the new county when, in the recent county division election, only 2,604 votes were cast for and against ounty division

But Governor Cruce did not consider the petitions of either aspirant, he told a newspaper reporter yesterday

"Its easy enough to get signers to ooking at was the right of the people to select their permanent seat of govmil I had named Walter, the present law would give them a twenty per cent advantage over other candidates and I believe that a majority vote should decide where the couffry seat should be locate.d" ...

The governor's selection of Rand lett at the temporary seat of govern ment raises in the minds of Cotton county people a decided vision of the New Jerusalem," an ideal county seat located in the exact geographical center of the new county-a town yet to be established but whose lots when the town is opened, will be sold for the nurpose of paving the expenses of starting the new county up in busi-

The people of Randlett have agreed not to enter their town as a candidate for permanent county seat and it is understood that Temple and Devol have entered a like agreementall pledged to the New Jerusalem idea for beating Walter.

The geographical center of the county is in the northwest corner of Cache township, about six miles from Walter, ten or twelve miles from Temple, fifteen from Randlett and nearly twenty from Devol. . The establishment of a county seat there, they figure, would practically kill the town of Walter while at the same time giving the remaining towns of the county an equal chance to grow as commercial centers.
