HABEAS CORPUS **APPLICATION**

SNEED'S ATTORNEYS INSTITUTED PROCEEDINGS TO SECURE RE-LEASE OF THEIR CLIENT

HEARING ON SEPTEMBER 23

Sensational Facts are Expected at that Time-Sneed Himself May Make Statement

By Associated Press.
Amarillo, Texas, Sept. 18.—Application for a writ' of habeas corpus in the case of J. B. Sneed was filed this forenoon. Hearing was set for Sept. POTTERY PLANT NOW 23 at 2:30 p. m. It was believed early today that an agreement as to the amount of bail could be reached be tween counsel, but after consultation this idea was abandoned.

The habeas corpus proceedings makes certain the development of sensational facts, probably including a statement by Sneed himself.

The grand jury asked the court to recess until Monday to await further investigation by the police of the alleged accomplice feature of the

Sneed Indicted.

Amarillo, Texas, Sept. 18.-J. B. Sneed was indicted late Tuesday af ternoon by the grand jury of the Forty-Seventh District Court, after two days of investigation on a charge of murder of Al G. Boyce Jr., in Am arillo Saturday. The indictment was couched in the usual technical terms and signed by the foreman of the

There was no excitement attendant upon the entry of the grand jury into the court room, but friends and attorneys on both sides of the case were present at the time or soon af ter. Following the presentation of the indictment, a warrant was issued based upon the true bill by the grand jury and with this a second technical arrest was made of Sneed.

The warrant was read to him in the jail, as the first one based on complaint had been. The prisoner heard the reading of the warrant and acknowledged himself under arrest in the same passive and matter of fact manner that characterized his actions throughout the entire affair. Friends and attorneys were present at the time of the reading as they have been for the greater part of the day. Habeas corpus proceedings are

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expected. District Attorney Henry S. Bishop left early yesterday afternoon for Vernon, where he is a witness in a case transferred from this court, leaving the matter of habeas corpus in the hands of Senator D. W. Odell of Cleburne and W. P. McLean of Fort Worth. Jury will continue its investigation of the case to trace the mysterious persons who are said to have been seen in the cottage. It has been stated by the officers of the court that there will doubtless be a definite determination upon this point not later than tonight, for numbers of witnesses have testified that there were two men in the cottage and in the room previously mentioned.

There is a persistent rumor that an agreement may be reached with reference to amount of bond, but attor neys will make no definite statement with regard to this phase of the situation. Relatives and friends of both the dead man and the prisoner linger in Amarillo, and it is stated that none of them are likely to go until the matter of ball shall have been settled one way or another. It is now said definite that the trial of Sneed in this case can not be reached during the present term of court, which means at the shortest a postponement until the early part of January. There seems every reason to believe that the case will be tried in Amarillo.

PHOTOGRAPHS OF LETTERS MADE

DALLAS PHOTOGRAPHERS FOUND WHO MADE PHOTOGRAPHS OF LETTER TO MRS. SNEED

DECLARED ARE IMPORTANT

Letter May Show Cause That Led Sneed to Slav Boyce-Sneed Is Indicted

Dallas, Texas, Sept. 18.—That the photograph which will play an important part in the latest Sneed-Boyce tragedy were made in Dallas, was learned here this morning.

Two Elm street photographers made the pictures. One of them was the picture of an enevlope addressed to Mrs. Sneed and the other was the photograph of a letter supposed to have come in the envelope.

That two photographers were used fund. was due to the fact that the photographer who made the picture of the letter was in such a hurry that the picture was not much of a success The picture made by the photographer of the envelope, however, was all that could be desired. Harper & Company made the picture of the letter. Neither member of this firm would state positively that the letter which they photographed was the one written to Mrs. Sneed.

George R. Weatherington, who pho tographed the envelope, remembers distinctly that it was addressed to Mrs. Lena Sneed, but he does not remember the date line of the envelope and says that what attracted his attention more than anything else was that it was addressed to her at 4523 Reiger avenue which is close to his own home.

It is said that the letter photographed was one from Al Boyce to Mrs. Sneed, and were found by J. B. Sneed. This, it is claimed, was the direct cause of the tragedy at Amarillo Sat-

Harper & Company admitted that the picture which their firm made was not much of a success. This was due to the fact that they were given only a few minutes in which to com-

Storm Was Worst near Ferris and Wilmer Where Buildings Were Blown Down

Waxahachie, Texas, Sept. 18.—A hail and wind storm did several hundred thousand dollars damage to crops and buildings in the eastern part of Ellis county last night. The storm was worst near Ferris and Wilmer. Cotton was stripped literally from the plants in a patch four miles wide. Several houses were blown down and smoke stacks and gins at Ferris and at India were blown over

The Christian church at Ferris was blown six feet off its blocks. The sheds of the Maloney Lumber Company were unroofed. 'Sheds of the Star Brick Company were wrecked. Many chimneys and trees were destroyed.

Near Ferris this morning hall stones were found banked three feet deep around the houses. The full extent of damage at Wilmer has not been learned.

DENOUNCED BY MARSHALL

Standpatter and Progressive Alike Responsible For That System of Government

"It rarely happens that a man voting a ticket gives his unqualified support to every plank of the platform. It is only a blind and dear woman who unreservedly declares her hus band perfect. A woman, neither blind nor dear, may so declare, but what she really means is that he is comparatively perfect, that he is bet-

"I hazard the assertion that fust now the three things which you most desire to have eliminated are the boss in politics, the high cost of living, and special privileges.

"Suppose you regard the grievance of the boss as the most vital. How does he become vital save as the agent of special privilege? What good will avail to fight a few little bosses and stand by the big boss of bosses, who himself, stands upon a platform of special privilege? The Progressive candidate for president boasts of being a destroyer of bosses just as the sailor in the "Yarn of the Nancy rades. He ate them all that he might sing:

'Oh, I am a cook and captain bold And the mate of the Nancy Brig. And a bo' sun-tite and a midshipmit And the crew of the captain's gig.' "What solution of the boss and trust systems does either the regular or progressive offer? None. Each is going to get rid of special privilege by making it legal. NOTHER MONTH WILL SEE COM-PLETION OF FEDERAL BUILD-ING HERE

HANDSOME STRUCTURE

n Interesting Feature Are the Ingenious Hiding Places For the Inspectors

Wichita Falls folks will be getting heir mail from the new postoffice by November 1, according to present indications. The interior of the building is now being finished and the end of another month will see the postal

force installed in the new quarters. The government keeps up to the minute in its buildings and Wichita Falls' new structure will have several modern features. These will include rest rooms for the employes, shower baths, space and equipment for parcels post, and other equipment. Probably the most interesting feature of the building is the arrangement by which the postoffice inspector may, from an ingenious hiding place, watch the clerks and employes ed an elaborate system of protection at work. Without his presence inthe building being known, the inspector can, by means of ladders, peep holes and small passages extending almost to every part of the building, keep an eye on the employes without

players. No tickets will be sent out detection. The government adopts this plan of spionage, not because cases of disnonesty on the part of postoffice employes are at all common, but simply as a check against dishonest practices. Every large postoffice in the

country has this arrangement. The main entrance will be on the Ohio avenue side, where one pass through massive iron gates. To the left is Postmaster Bacon's office, upon which it is said a sign will be placed 'Tell your troubles to me." In front are the general delivery windows, the money order window, the information window and the postal savings bank

window. On the Ninth street side there will be the lock boxes, a whole thousand of them, or three hundred more than the present building affords. At the end of the row are the stamp and registry windows and a large window where the parcels post business will e handled. It was at first planne to have the stamp window up in front but it was deemed best to have it close to the parcels post window and alsoat some point where it would not interfere with the line which is usually standing in front of the general

delivery window. The various windows and the lock boxes enclose the work room which is 44 by 73 feet, much larger than the present quarters. There are two large vaults in this room, one in front by the money order window, the other in the rear by the stamp department. The whole is excellently lighted the celling being almost entirely glass. A room for the assistant postmaster is provided on the first floor, with

toilet rooms and other accessories. The building is to be heated by the hot water system, the boiler being in a room at the rear of thebuilding.

Gas will be used for fuel. On his recent trip to the East, Postmaster Bacon stopped at Washington and asked for a number of changes in the interior arrangements of the building, which were granted by the department. These changes were made necessary on account of the parcels post and also made possible a more convenient arrangement

for the clerks and public. The upper floor of the building will be occupied by bath rooms, store room, rest room for employes, inspector's room, railway postal clerks room

Baltimore, Md., Sept. 18 .- On Babe, a cute little monkey that grimaces at visitors at the Biological Laboratory of the Johns Hopkins unversity, rests the responsibility of determining whether his race is, or is not, related to the human tribe.

There has hardly been an hour! since he came into this world severalweeks ago that he has not been under the close surveliance of learned scientists. In the effort to forge Babe into the missing link between the ape and man, Dr. John E. Watson, director of the psychological laboratory, is the moving spirit, and it is under his direction that all the experiments are being made.

Before Babe drew his first breath suit their convenience. of life in the laboratory his parents have been watched for months. They 103 tfc

But Babe is being trained in human ways, and presently when it is feasible to take him from the care of his mother, it is planned to make his schooling still more elaborate. MAN, LIKE ADAM, BLAMES HIS DOWNFALL ON FEMALE OF THE SPECIES

KILLED WIFE AND FRIEND

am Going to Hell By the Light of Her Eyes. But Want Her to Be Happy," Says Murderer

Shreveport, La., Sept. 18 .- "The woman tempted me," said Adam, and the 6,000-year-old defense of infatuated man is once more the plea of A Watson, self-confessed murderer of his own wife and of his business partner and friend, C. C. Bailey. This double crime, the first committed with poison and the second with an ax, was instigated from the first by Mrs. Eva Bailey, he declares, to be free to marry, when he made himself a widower and her a widow. The fatal frenzy of passion which

sprang up at a touch of the hands

between a married man and the wife of his friend had the most unromantic elements. Its scene was set in rough lumber camps. Watson, a man of middle age, is father of grown children. Mrs. Bailey, though only 27 years old, has the harsh and grim visage of one whose girlhood was spent as field laborer. Her dark eyes are herce and bold, her lips clinch in a straight line, and her cheeks seem to have the metallic hardness of bronze. Yet for this woman the mature Watson was possessed by such mania of attachment that to win her he could without emotion polsor his wife and crush his friend's head with an ax. "I am traveling to held by the light of her eyes," he melodramatically exclaimed.

The darkness of the twofold crime is illumined vividly by gleams which might have come from bedlam. There is a delirum of passion in Watson's confession, although almost in the same breath he accuses Mrs. Bailey as the prime plotter of the murder ous conspiracy. Such contradictions savoring of the inconsistencies of hysteria are found between the sen tences: "I love her better than I do my life, or I would not have killed Bailey," and "she asked me to destroy Bafley some way;" between "I hope Mrs. Bailey will gain freedom, find a good man and live happy," and "she

put strychnine in the sugar for him.' Fittingly enough it was the shricks of an insane woman confined in the Shreveport jail that broke down the iron nerve which Watson maintained or two days after hi sarrest.

During this time he had insisted hat Bailey was slain by a negro bur glar who entered the shack at Metcalf 10 miles southwest of Shrevepor where the two men were sleeping alone on the night of Sept. 2. Wat son showed a bureau drawer which had been forced open as if for the purpose of theft. He himself gave the alarm by firing a shotgun, and rode into Shreveport in an automobile with Bailey's unconscious form upon his knees. Bailey died without regain ing sensibility. Watson was arrested when rumors of the liason between himself and Mrs. Bailey reached the authorities. They admitted that the evidence against the prisoner was in sufficient to gain a conviction. His collapse came without warning

The sheriff, hoping to move him into self-betrayal, had told him that Mrs Bailey was under arrest, although she had not yet been apprehended. Suddenly there rang upon his ear the screams and moans of the mac woman in a cell on the floor above His fears informed him falsely that the howling creature was Mrs. Bail ey, and that her mind had been shat tered by the detection of her guilt In a frenzy of surrender and despair he penciled with unhesitating rapid ity the following confession, which for all its grammatical faults, dis plays a naivete of passion so nearly boyish, set side by side with the re lation of deeds so flendish that the

ordinary in criminal annals: "Gentlemen-I desire to die and want to die, and intended to die with a lie on my lips, for I feel like bell is my home anyway, but as the only one I love has broke down I will tell the whole thing, but ask that she go free, for I love her better than I do my life, or I would not have killed Mr. Balley. 



Undermining of Winchester Cathedral Stopped by Cement.

For Many Years the Historic Building Has Been Cracking, Beiging and Bettling, Threatening to Coliapse Completely.

London,—After a period of eight centuries, Winchester cathedral now rests on a solid and immovable foundation, saved from threatened ruin. Almost every day in the last few years the movements of a diver in regulation dress have been watched with curious interest as he entered or emerged from the water beneath the founda-tions of the cathedral. He was at work helping to save from ruin one of England's noblest historic buildings, and the successful issue of the undertaking has been celebrated by a thanksgiving service in the cathedral.

For several years the dean and chapter of Winchester had been watching ominous signs, such as cracks, bulgings and settlements, sure harbingers of a collapse of the cathedral. From the interior daylight could be seen through the cracks; the latter grew ever wider and wider. The walls on the south side and the Norman tran-septs, unequaled for their majestic simplicity, were riven in all directions,

The massive masonry of the Norman builders had from the beginning proved too ponderous for the watery, compressible soil which forms the

The first hole dug into the foundations revealed the cause of the whole trouble—water—and acting on expert advice, holes were dug in sections through the top soil and chalk and far through the peat. Then it was the work of the diver in his usual diving dress to enter the hole, remove further layers of peat so as to allow the water to rise into the cavity, and then to lay a flooring of cement to prevent the water from sinking back into the gravel. After the imprisoned water had been removed by pumping the cavity was filled up with brickwork in cement. This extended from the floor laid by



the diver up to the solid stonework of the cathedral, showing like a roof of rock overhead.

ing carried on, patiently and thoroughly, seven anxlous years, the cracks in the walls, vaultings and arches of the fabric were welded by the injection of liquid Portland cement from a squirting machine, a process known as grouting, capable of being so manipulated as to fill either a shallow crack or a rent through the thick-

ness of a massive wall. Every crevice is now being repaired. every flaw and displacement remedied, every trace of instability in the foundations removed, and the cathedral seems to stand as solidly as the strongest building in the kingdom.

MAN'S SIGHT IS RESTORED

Fall Against Door Gives George Morgan Hope for Complete Recovery.

Wilmington, Del.—Becoming totally blind fourteen weeks ago, George M. Morgan Jr., aged twenty-three years, 1351 East Thirteenth street, had his sight restored to him through an accident. About eleven years ago Morgan was struck in one eye with a stone a small boy had thrown at a freight car. His sight was badly affected and last September he went to St. Joseph's hospital in Baltimore to have his eye treated. While sitting THE NEW COMPANY in his boarding house fourteen weeks ago, he suddenly became totally blind without any warning whatever.

He came to this city to visit his parents on June 29, and he tripped over a rug and fell, his forehead strikng a door-jamb with much force. When he arose he found that he could see the daylight and later develop-ments showed that he could see betfer than before he went to the hos-

pital last yar. He intends to return to the hospital to continue the treatment, al-though the physicians told him they did not think he ever would be able to see again. His mother was at-market at the time of the accident and could not believe her son's glad declaration when she returned until he told her the color of her hat and dress and described other things in


