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FSA Clarifies Delinquent Status For Farm by Shawn wade
In an effort to avoid producer confusion and inconvenience, the USDA Farm Service Agency has clarified rules that determine when ered delinquent and how that status affects their ability are considin various FSA program. in various FSA programs.
"Prompting the Agency's action was the concern that the term delinquent" has multiple definitions as it applies to various FSA programs and could inadvertently create problems for producers.
Plains Cotton Growers has worked closely with FSA personnel Texas and Washington and with the National Cotton Council to

## lain the clarification.

The FSA notice, LP-1979, specifies that producers are not consid-
ered delinquent until 90 days after the due date on a loan made to them through the FSA farm loan program.
FSA's clarification insures High Plains producers who are waiting to have their 2004 crop ginned will not be deemed ineligible to receive farm program benefits, such as the ability to use the marketing loan program, even though they might have been unable
to pay off an FSA loan by the scheduled due date.
