SOUTH LEADING IN COTTON FROST THROUGHOUT SOUTH LEADING IN COTTON MANUFACTURING FOR FIRST TIME

Report Showing Supply and Distribu. tion of Cotton August 31, Issued Today

Washington, D. C., Sept. 26 .- The feature of the census bureau's report issued today on the supply of cotton for the cotton year of 1912 which ended August 31 was the indication of the south's growth in the cotton spinning industry. The amount of cotton used there was for the first time in the history of the industry greater than that used in all other states in any one year and the number of active spindles operated in creased almost half a million over the number operated last year.

The supply and distribution of coton in the United States in running bales for the cotton year of 1912 which ended August 31, 1912 with omparisons for previous years as announced in the annual report of the census bureau was:

Supply-The total supply of cotton or the cotton year of 1912 was 17, 673,219 bales compared with 13,873,-423 bales in 1911 and 12,188,021 bales in 1910.

Of this quantity the ginnings dur ing the year amounted to 16,667,978 bales compared with 12,384,248 bales in 1911, and 10,350,978 bales in 1910; the stocks held at the beginning of the year were 1.375,031 bales compared with 1.040,040 bales in 1911 and 1,483,585 bales in 1910.

The net imports amounted to 229, 276 bales compared with 231,191 bales Distribution-The total distribution of the above supply was as follows:

The amount of cotton consumed in the United States during the year was 5,367,671 bales compared with 4,704,978 bales in 1911 and 4,798,953 ls also being enlisted. bales in 1910. Of this amount the ed with 2,328,487 bales in 1911 and 2292.333 bales in 1910 and the quan tity consumed in all other states was 2,655,094 bales compared with 2,-376,491 bales in 1911 and 2,506,620

bales in 1910. The exports of cotton during the year amounted to 10,681,758 bales compared with 7,781,414 bales in 1911

and 6,339,028 bales in 1910. Stocks of cotton on hand August 31 amounted to 1,623,865 bales compared with 1,375,031 bales in 1911

and 1,040,040 in 1910. Of the stocks on hand manufacturers in cotton growing states held 241,704 bales compared with 101,114 bales in 1911 and 121,349 bales in 1910 and manufacturers in all other states held 629,589 bales compared arillo and \$10 since he arrived here. with 441.077 bales in A911 and 5,411,

883 in 1910. Independent warehouses in cotton growing states on August 31 held bales in 1911 and 155,871 bales in 1910 other states held 108,925 bales com-150,937 bales in 1910.

Cotton heid on August 31 in other places is estimated at 198,092 bales compared with 400,000 bales in 1911 and 200,000 bales in 1910.

The number of active spindles in the United States during the year was 30,312,730 compared with 29,522,597 spindles in 1911, and 28, 266,062 spindles in 1910.

Of this number those operated in cotton growing states during the year was 11,585,839 spindles compared with 11,084,623 spindles operated in those states in 1911 and 17,772,750 spindles in 1910.

These statistics are in running bales including linters except for foreign cotton which has been reduced to evuivalent 500 pound bales.

Statistics of cotton consumed, spindles and stocks held at mills and warehouses shown in this report were collected by canvasses of the mills and of the warehouses, but the stocks in 1912 shown under the classification elsewhere" were arrived at by deduction, this quantity being the difference between the total supply and the sum of the quantities exported, consumed and that held by manufac turers and warehousemen.

ROOSEVELT HITS STATES RIGHTS

CITES CONTROL OF FLOOD WA-TERS OF MISSISSIPPI AS EX-AMPLE OF INEFFECTIVENESS

HE SPEAKS AT MEMPHIS

Forgets Failure of Own Administration in Effort to Discredit Democrats

By Associated Press.

Memphis, Tenn., Sept. 26.—Theodore Roosevelt declared in a speech here today before the Interstate Levee convention that proper control of the water of the Mississippi basin is a national and not a state problem. The former president cited the disastrous floods last spring as an awful lesson and asserted that pros pects of relief are no brighter than they have been before.

"This," he said, "was true in spite of the fact that Congress was in session five months after the beginning of the last flood disaster and that the House which originates appropriation bills was in control of Democrats, mainly southern men, during all that time, and yet not one measure of permanent relief or lasting help was enacted in your behalf. As long as the habit of doing things piece-meal, sometimes known as the state rights doctrine, stands in the way, nothing effective will be done.

"Take Louislana, for instance. Although the great drainage ditch of the Mississippi flows right through Louisiana, the drainage of Louisiana herself does not flow into this ditch, lions to keep the drainage of other states off her fertile rice, cotton and vegetable plantations. She even maintains a great levee line wholly within the State of Arkansas as a necessary link in her protection. Yet she has no control over the States where the floods form. Only the federal government has such control."

AT WORK ON PLANS

Project is one That will Mean Great Thing to Farmers Along The · Fertile Valley

Consummation of the long-contemplated Wichita river dam project is at hand within the near future, according to information received today. St. Douis and local capital is interested in the plan and it is understood that work is to be started early

in 1913. This project has been under consideration for several years and while it has always been considered feasible and practicable, it was only recently that serious - attention was paid to it. While plans are as yet anannounced, it is known that the plan is to dam the river at some point near this city in such a way as to provide a storage reservoir for the storm and flood waters of the stream, this water to be available

poses. The water which flows down the Wichita river usually is said to be unsuitable for irrigation, but the new plan is to store the flood waters which will not contain those elements that render the river water unfit for irrigation purposes.



It is expected therefore, that the attorney general and his assistants will be much in evidence for





ENGLISH SYMPATHY FOR

The sentiment in England against America during the Revolutionary war was not unanimous by any means. If a popular vote had, been taken it is likely that a majority would have been found favoring the American side. On June 24. 1775, the lord-mayor and aldermen of London adopted an "Address, Remonstrance and Petition" to the king, expressing their abhorrence of the tyrannical measures pursued against their fellow-subjects in America, and asking him to dismiss his ministers and counsellors who were responsible for such an unrighteous war. Being notified of this, the king signified his willingness to receive the petition at his next leves, or public reception. The ford-mayor. and aldermen refused to present it except when he was sitting on his throne. 'He replied that he would receive any kind of a petition, but he must be the judge as to where. Both sides were stubborn, and the petition was


