




By the results of today-s play in the American League, Washington finished in second place by a seven point margin over the Athletics, last year's worlds champions. In the National League a still clos-

today by District Attorney Miller. According to Ortie McManigal, lockin was as bold as were the Mc-Namaras in causing explosions against employers of non-union labor and was an "inventor" of the alarm clock scheme by which the Los Angeles Times building was blown up some time after the bomb had been lighted and J. B. McNamara had escaped.

Mr. Miller's statements caused a sensation. All the other defendants ooked toward Hockin who sat in their midst, burying his head in a newspaper. Next to Frank M. Ryan, president of the Iron Workers' Union, Hockin had been the most prominent,

of the defendants. Long before the Los Angeles Times uilding was blown up, Mr. Miller delared a quarrel occurred between Mc-Manigal, Hockin and James B. Mc-Namara over the fixed price which was to be paid for dynamiting jobs,

and McManigal threatened to expose the others. 'McManigal said "I've a notion to quit the business and give it away." asserted District Attorney Miller.
