



On the first column will be the Democratic ticket headed by the Democratic presidential electors. The ticket of the Progressive party comes next; then the Republican, Prohibition. Socialist and Independent ticket, with one column with only the title or names of the offices on it there being blank spaces left for the writing in of the names of candidates At the bottom of the tickets will be the amendments to be voted for o against. If the law in Texas was like it is in many states, it would require the publication of the ballot few days in advance of the election in one or more newspapers in each coun ty of the State, in order to acquain the voler how to make out his ballot. But there is no such law, and as a result there will be many who will go to the polls to vote on election day who will not know whether they have marked their ballot correctly or not This is one more serious defect in the Terrell election law that should be remedied at the first opportunity.

SCIENTIFIC RATE MAKING

Those newspapers and individual critics of the State Insurance Board fire lighting department and comply of the Record very shortsighted. If we remember correctly the Wichita Falls Times was among those who criticised the new law because fire insurance rates were raised in that city. Any one familiar with conditions in Wichita Falls knows that fire risks there are nctoriously hazardous because of the large number of rooming houses, sa loons and restaurnats. Naturally where such enditions obtain, property owners shuld expect to pay a highe rate of insurance because of the great er risk involved. This is not intende as a criticism or knock upon our sie ter city but we refer to it only for purposes of illustration. What is true of Wichita aFils is true of many othe of Texas. And the individuals who have been heard to denounce the rating board were almost invariably kicking because their rates had been raised, or because they had been enjoy ing a low rate extended as a favor for some reason or other from the insur ance company carrying the risk.

In a former editorial on the subject the Record made the statement that the Board is to the insurance business just what the Railroad Commission of Texas is to the transportation busi ness, and it is manifestly just as sub versive business ethics to permit special rates to favored customers by insurance companies as it would be to permit the granting of rebates to fav ored shippers by railroads, thus giv-

There is little if any thing to the contention the Record makes that the reason for raising the rates in Wichita Falls is attribut able to so many saloons and board ing houses. There has never been day since Wichita Falls was an or ganized city that the city has not had as many saloon and rooming house (population considered) as there ar at present, and yet the rates for firnsurance contine to go up. In. fac. here are blocks right in the busines. section with not a saloon in them and that have no greater number c rooming houses than for any-previous time. Yet under the key_rate law, fire insurance has been raised and in the face of the fact that the city government has taxed itsel thousands of dellars in equipping it: and the law which created it and de ing with other regulations suggested fined its powers were in the opinion by fire insurance companies, with the problise that when suggested regula tions were complied with the fire in surance rates would be materially lowered. But we only get anothe: raise, and the Times has about con cluded the present law was made (whether intentionally or hot) for the purpose of giving to the insurance companies all the latitude they desir
