## Hoop La! The Circus Will Be Here Tomorrow

Hoop La! The Barnum and Balle circus will be here tomorrow, overtopping in magnitude, in splendor, in novelty, in fun and in breath taking feats and all of its famous achievements of the past.

Twenty acres of tents, a parade three miles long, a 110 cage menagerie, 700 horses and ponies, a gorgeous spectacle employing more than 1000 persons, the Japanese Mikado, the Japanese champions, May Wirth equestrienne par excellence, the pride of the world's acrobats, gymnasts, aerialists and equilibrist Clowns? Yes, dozens of them!

The circus will arrive in eighty five double length railroad cars early tomorrow. The young boy and the old boy will be at the railroad yard to meet it and witness the picture scene of detrainment, and the march of man and beast to the show grounds. Four long trains are required to transport the big canvas-institution. The first, bearing the preliminary essentials to the encampment, is expected by daybreak. The other will not be far behind.

The first thing on the circus program will be the parade tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock, passing over the main business streets. It will be some two miles in length and show as perhaps nothing else could, the tremendous resources of the Barnum circus. There will be a generous display of open cages and a long string of elephants and camels will pick their way gingerly by. The wardrobe is colorful and all new and the pageant will be well worth while. Over 50 horses will be in line ranging from the lean-limbed thoroughbreds to sturdy Normans and Percherons. The performances are at 2 and 8 o'clock, doors being opened at 1 and 7 o'clock.

The program is almost entirely new and presents names and faces largely new to America. The show opens with a pantomimic spectacle entitled "Cleopatra," based upon the story of Antony and Cleopatra. Over 1000 people appear in the production and a large ballet is presented, trained by Ottokar Bartik, of the Metropolitan Opera House. The costumes, properties and impediments are historically correct, and the scenic invention carries the audience back to ancient Alexandria. Over 2000 costumes are utilized and the resources of the circus in horses, camels, elephants and other animals, proper to the story, find ample expression in the most elaborate production ever given under canvas. The music has been especially arranged by Faltis Efendi, late bandmaster to the Khedive of Egypt from compositions by Verdi, Gounod, Saint-Saens, Goldmark and others. The wordless play is carried out in a series of mighty stage pictures and the episode that inspired the genius of Shakespeare and that had its tragic denouement ten years later in the suicide of the great Roman and the sensational death of Cleopatra is thrillingly told by means of great ensembles, fetes and terpsichorean accompaniments. After the spectacle comes the circus, proper. The elephants are the first item on the long bill. All winter long they have been taking post graduate courses at winter

or quartets developing new tricks. Chief among these is the baseball game, introducing Koko, the only elephant spit ball pitcher, in or out of activity. The game is a laughable affair, especially the trumpet-whispered consultation between the battery and the batsman lumbering slide for the home plate. The Berne brothers, Switzerland's strongest men, and Kate Landwin, the female Hercules, are also new features. The latter is a most attractive woman and vice president of the "circus women's equal suffrage club." The Berne brothers have a startling finish to their performance. One of the brothers fastens a tugs to his arms, the tugs leading back to a wagonload of men. A noose is placed about his neck and attached to tugs upon a harnessed elephant. As the elephant starts to pull, the man stiffens his neck and drags along the wagon filled with thirty men. The Mikado's royal troupe of athletes are an aggregation of Japanese quite different from any Japs heretofore seen. The wrestlers are wild looking folk, all built on the lines of a grand jano, reinforced by the superstructure of the Lusitania, and the way they slam one another around in their wrestling pleasantries makes the tugs tremble. The Jul Jitsu experts—three men and two women—resemble, physically and cleaner limbed, and given an interesting exposition of their art, for such it is considered by the Japanese. Miss Fay Wirth of the Australian Wirth family, is another name to conjure with on this year's program. Here is a miss of 18 years whom the circus folk have no hesitancy in proclaiming as the most wonderful rider of the day. She turns forward and backward somersaults upon her horse, with an ease and grace which is the envy and admiration of her male colleagues in equitation. She is a veritable child of the circus having been born on the "lot" with a small traveling circus conducted by her relatives in Australia. But the circus has other riders—all of class and distinction, including the Davenport, Bradna and Derick, Stella Wirth, the Seabert Sisters, Charles Sleekist and the Ducanderters. The trained animal numbers are in great variety. Once it was enough to have one baboon ride a bicycle around on the stage. Now the circus has two riding tandem. Then there are Winston's seals, trained geese, porcine actors, dogs, monkeys, and what-not. The acrobatic, aerial and novelty numbers are given by the aristocrats of the circus world, presenting such names as the Florences, Gorgetta, the Fortuni trio, the Les Jardy's, the Hontos and many others.

Nor should La Belle Victoria remain unmentioned. She is one of the unquestioned hits of the show in an amazing wire performance. Of course there are clowns—50 of them—the circus couldn't keep house without them, and they indulge in all sorts of foolery, from kicking Roosevelt's hat around the ring to burlesquing the suffragettes. The zoo is larger than ever and has a baby giraffe as a star feature. All day tomorrow tickets may be bought at Fred Harrington's, 709 Ohio avenue at no advance in price.

### Ball of Fire From Sky Furnishes Money for Education

Kansas City, Oct. 14.—How a black stone that fell from the skies will bring a college education to a penniless Texas boy was related at the Union Station today by E. W. Patterson of Acme, Texas, who passed through on his way to Chicago, where he will enroll as a freshman in the University of Chicago.

Patterson has been working on a ranch twenty miles west of Acme. He was graduated from Fort Worth high school three years ago, but owing to sickness he had been unable to save any money to continue his studies. On the evening of September 2, while pumping water for the stock, he saw a brilliant meteor fall, apparently a little way out on the prairie. After a search he found it.

Patterson wrote to the Field Museum about it and they sent experts to examine the stone. Subsequently it was purchased by the museum authorities for \$500. Upon receipt of the check Patterson left for Chicago. He will enroll at once.

## BUGSCUFFLE BUDGET

Editor Daily Times.

Since you were kind enough to publish my other letter I venture to write again—especially as I have some good live "dope" as Trav Sakes calls it, for publication. Since my former writing we have had something doing here in Bugscuffle sure enough. The thing of first importance was a reception given in the honor of Slob Stiggins, who had just returned from the supreme council of the "Ancient and Honorable Order of Oriental Skunks," which held its annual session this year at "Muddig" down in Hunt county, this state. Slob was there and there elected "Exalted and Pastel Grand Snark" of the order; and news of which honor having reached Bugscuffle before the mail had brought Slob in, the whole town turned out to recognize and endorse the promotion. The Bugscuffle band, one of the best in all the land, was on hand to make the music and the procession was led by Col. Jim Jaw-smith who, when we had all returned to the school house (the place where the reception was to be held), delivered one of the most tender and touching and towering orations that was ever heard in this neck of the woods. The Weekly Bug had a full report of the festivities next day—the editor having held the forms open for that special purpose. From this report I subjoin the following excerpt which will give the reader some idea of the way Bugscuffle does things when she has a mind to it:

"The return of our fellow townsman, Mr. Slob Stiggins, Esq., from the Grand Council of the Ancient and Honorable Order of the Oriental Skunks was signalled by the most enthusiastic demonstration of popular regard that has ever been awarded to any of our people since Adam was a small boy. Men, women and children, an hour or more before the time for the mail hack—which wore

"The Conquering Hero" arrived, formed in procession in front of Squire Yukes' store. Col. Jim Jaw-smith was unanimously chosen as marshal of the day; and it was a joy to all his friends and an occasion of jealousy to all his enemies (if he has any) to see him prancing up and down the lines, mounted upon old man's Seet's mare, with hat cocked and a large red sash about him. To add a little dash of sentiment to the scene, the young colt of the mare upon which he rode, ran up and down following its mother, with wild neighing which was really pathetic. Frequently the poor brute mother would cast an anxious backward look at her wobbly offspring and express her maternal feelings in such loud peighings as almost to drown the dulcet notes of the laboring band. Miss Tibby Tut, our expression teacher in the school here, felt so inspired by the incident that she handed the editor the following stanzas for publication:

"Let proud ambition mount the royal throne;  
Let prostrate nations hail him as their own;  
Let hoary wisdom scan the ancient page,  
Or wild-eyed revel rant and roar and rage;  
Beyond it all sweet sentiment holds sway,  
And marks for human feet a better way.  
Yea, e'en among the brutes we see its power,  
The neighing colt and the answering mare,  
Appeal to all hearts even in this hour  
Enthralls the spirit and confines it there!"

When the procession had broken up and all the people had entered the school house, mirable dictu! there upon a table reaching clear across the

room was one of the most delicious repasts it has ever been our good fortune to assist in passing into an eclipse. Menu cards and souvenir poses of "touch-me-nots" and "sweet-williams" were provided for each plate and in the middle of the table was the biggest pumpkin ever raised in this country, brim full of roasted peanuts, the products of Mr. Bunker's farm just east of town about two miles. The menu cards were prepared by Prof. Von Bungs, principal of our school, assisted by Prof. Casikowski who has charge of the conservatory department of our great educational institution. But here is the menu: (1) chicken supese; (2) turæpo-saladaris; (3) cornibus ponabus ala famibus; (4) bolidieridus hamabus, (frigidus); bolidieridus cabbagibus; (6) hogis jolice; (7) coofeannus hotibus; (8) peacherina piabus.

There were other items, but these were the main dishes. Too much can not be said for our ladies who, led by Mrs. Yukes and Mrs. Ponder, were responsible for this elegant banquet. There was a lemonade punch bowl presided over by Misses Mandy Yukes, Sis Ponder, Beulah Bunker and Winifred Wunks.

It certainly was a great time. Several young gentlemen and fair ladies from Wichita Falls were present and they expressed themselves as never having seen anything just like it. Miss Hulda Seets and Miss Sis Ponder are said to be engaged to two young dry goods clerks in Wichita Falls. There is going to be something more doing around here before long.

The next thing of importance that has happened among us lately was the organization of a Chamber of Commerce. The first to mention this matter to our citizens were old Bro. Bugle and Squire Yukes. They told our people that "every town which was worth the mention was using the Chamber of Commerce as an instrument through and by which the united efforts of the community might avail."

The upshot of the matter was that a mass meeting of the citizens was called the whole thing thoroughly gone over and an organization of "the Bugscuffle Chamber of Commerce" with Slob Stiggins as general secretary and with the following directors: Daniel Yukes, J. Jawsmith, Lonza Peller, Jeremiah Bugle, Jed Ponder, Fred VonBungs, Cy Kettle, Dutch Bunker, Hiram Seets, William Wunk and Dave Stofer.

Fourteen dollars were subscribed at the time of the organization to finance the concern, and the outlook is hopeful. Col. Jawsmith was so excited over the prospect that being called on for a speech he declared that, "in view of the mighty possibilities wrapped up in this organization the most arduous and topofical aspirations that ever flamed in the breast of the hu-

man species was now burning, blazing and boiling in the hearts of our expectant and hilarious population." Col. Jim is nothing if not eloquent—at least that is what our people think about it. ### INDUSTRIAL NOTES.

Columbus—There were over 400 acres of land planted to Columbus long staple cotton in Colorado county this season. The yield was close to a bale per acre and the price averaged 17 1/2 cents per pound.

Port Lavaca—Lavaca county has suffered very little with insect pests this year, and the yield per acre of all crops increased over the previous season. Under government methods the production of corn on demonstration farms was increased from nine to sixteen bushels per acre.

Flatonla—F. Broomer, a farmer near here planted his corn in wide rows this season and raised cow peas between the rows. He harvested large crops of both products, the yields exceeding those of last year by over 10 per cent.

College Station—There are 275 boys and girls clubs with a total enrollment of 14,000 members in Texas. These clubs raise farm products under government instructions and \$30,000 in prizes were offered this year for best specimens.

Waco—Over \$60,000 will be expended in farm demonstration work in West Texas this year. The Federal government appropriated \$27,000 and the balance was set aside by the county commissioners courts.

Jefferson—At a meeting of the prominent citizens of this city, a commercial club was organized and the following officers were elected—D. L. Wright, president; W. J. Serberry, vice president. The committee in charge has raised enough funds to secure the employment of a secretary and one will be selected at an early date.

Brownsville—Brownsville is now paving twelve blocks with creosoted wood blocks. Eleven blocks have been paved so far this year.

Austin—A franchise has been granted to a number of East Texas capitalists for the construction of an interurban to connect Austin and Lockhart. Actual construction must start within six months, according to the franchise but it is expected that work will start at once.

Austin—The city council has just closed a contract with the Texas Bitulithic Company for nearly \$100,000 worth of street paving. It is expected that the paving expenditure for the next twelve months will amount to \$500,000.

Waco—Postal receipts in this city show a large increase for September over the corresponding month last year, while the gain for the quarter ending September 30th is 15 per cent. During September the receipts were \$12,782.72 as compared with \$10,778.03 for the same month last year. For the period ending September 30th, \$36,132.63 same period last year \$30,342.00.

Plains—The Yoakum County Commercial Club was recently organized in this city. The following officers were elected: J. T. Gainer, president; J. G. Stanford, secretary, and Sam Bigger, assistant secretary.

San Antonio—The bond election recently held in Medina county, precinct No. 4, for the issuance of \$40,000 worth of good roads bonds, carried by a majority of 2 to 1. This amount will be sufficient to improve every road in that precinct needing attention.

New Potato Disease.  
A serious canker disease is reported to have developed in the potato crop of Great Britain and Continental Europe, which is not only affecting the farmhands on which potatoes are grown, but is also decidedly injurious to the health of the consumers of affected potatoes. The disease is characterized by nodule excrescences, which are often larger than the potato itself. Boiling does not destroy the injurious properties. It is known that a potato canker has found its way into Newfoundland with potatoes imported from Europe, but no such disease has yet appeared in Canada, nor, so far as known, in the United States.

Wichita Falls, Texas, Oct. 14, 1912.



Two thousand dollars for the Wilson fund was raised in two hours time in Dallas today. That is a good showing for the Democrats of that city. If all other towns, cities and villages in the state could make just half as good showing as that, Texas alone could pay the expenses of the National Democratic campaign.

The Electric Weekly Times is to be issued daily. Here's hoping the enterprising publishers have not made the mistake so common to newspaper men—that of getting out a daily on a patronage that is only about equal to keep going a first-class weekly. But Electric is a growing little city and if her enterprise and push is of that quality that can stand the strain, a daily paper can be made a success. The new enterprise has the best wishes of this paper.

Wichita Falls is to have two more new church structures to take the place of the buildings now in use that should have been abandoned years ago. The Times is glad to note that these two congregations—the First Presbyterian and the Christian church—have finally determined to make these improvements. Good substantial church buildings add much to the appearance of a city, and it is safe to say that these two new churches will be in keeping with the progress of Wichita Falls.

The ballots to be voted on November 5th will be by far the largest ever before used at an election in Texas. It will require a sheet of paper 17x22 inches to carry all of the seven tickets of the seven different political parties. On the first column will be the Democratic ticket headed by the Democratic presidential electors. The ticket of the Progressive party comes next; then the Republican, Prohibition, Socialist and Independent ticket, with one column with only the title or names of the offices on it, there being blank spaces left for the writing in of the names of candidates. At the bottom of the tickets will be the amendments to be voted for or against. If the law in Texas was like it is in many states, it would require the publication of the ballot a few days in advance of the election in one or more newspapers in each county of the State, in order to acquaint the voter how to make out his ballot. But there is no such law, and as a result there will be many who will go to the polls to vote on election day who will not know whether they have marked their ballot correctly or not. This is one more serious defect in the Terrell election law that should be remedied at the first opportunity.

### SCIENTIFIC RATE MAKING

Those newspapers and individual critics of the State Insurance Board and the law which created it and defined its powers were in the opinion of the Record very shortsighted. If we remember correctly the Wichita Falls Times was among those who criticized the new law because fire insurance rates were raised in that city. Any one familiar with conditions in Wichita Falls knows that fire risks there are notoriously hazardous because of the large number of rooming houses, saloons and restaurants. Naturally where such conditions obtain, property owners should expect to pay a higher rate of insurance because of the greater risk involved. This is not intended as a criticism or knock upon our fair city but we refer to it only for purposes of illustration. What is true of Wichita Falls is true of many other cities of Texas. And the individuals who have been heard to denounce the raising of rates were almost invariably kidding because their rates had been raised, or because they had been enjoying a low rate extended as a favor for some reason or other from the insurance company carrying the risk.

In a former editorial on the subject the Record made the statement that the Board is to the insurance business just what the Railroad Commission of Texas is to the transportation business and it is manifestly just as conservative business ethics to permit special rates to favored customers by insurance companies as it would be to permit the granting of rebates to favored shippers by railroads, thus giv-

ing an unfair advantage over less favored competitors. It should also be borne in mind that those who favor ways go to the big shipper or the big insurer, and in the case of insurance the small home owner paid an excessive rate in order that the man with a large amount of business could enjoy a low rate. Under the new law a town is rated and each risk is rated, the rate being determined in both instances by the hazard, and the Board's rate cannot be deviated from, doing away with rate juggling on the part of agents. When a risk is rated the hazard and protection from fire determine the rate. Thus, a rate is high or low in proportion to whether it is a bad or good risk and if a business man insists on keeping empty boxes or trash about his place he must pay for the privilege. But his rate is reduced as he diminishes the danger of fire by removing combustibles.

This is what the Record means by scientific rate-making—that is, let the condition of each risk determine its own rate. There is no justice in lumping risks, and applying an average rate to all. This system is a modified form was formerly used in making rates and under it there was no incentive to diminish the danger of fire so far as rates were concerned. Under the new system it rests with each individual town and property owner what kind of insurance rates they wish to pay.

There is another point in the present system quite as important as rate-making though impossible to compute in dollars and cents, and that is conservation. Fire above all else is waste, and one of the best results of the scientific rate-making is that it encourages and teaches us to conserve property by teaching methods of fire prevention. The Board has taken an important step in this direction by offering a reduction of one per cent in the key rate of every town "for teaching in all public schools, the principles of fire insurance methods of fire prevention from some standard and reliable text book or work on the subject." We teach our boys and girls how to conserve water, how to conserve moisture in the soil and the value of eliminating waste industry. Why not also teach them fire prevention as a matter of economy? Statistics show that a great majority of fires are preventible.

A recent bulletin of the Board announces that towns will be granted reductions in key rates based upon good records, and this will be of inestimable value as an incentive for towns and cities to employ ever-zealous in preventing and extinguishing fires. The Board became effective Sept. 20, and dates back over a period of three calendar years. It is believed that under it Vernon will be able to secure a reduction in her key rate. The figures are being prepared and will be forwarded to the Board as soon as possible.

The Record would also like to see the suggestion about teaching principles of fire insurance and fire prevention put into effect in our city schools. The reduction of one per cent in the key rate would be well worth the trouble.

The above is clipped from the Vernon Record, edited by Mr. J. Ray and it reads very nice. The Times however, knows whereof it speak when it makes the assertion that all this talk and agitation of "scientific rate-making," doesn't mean anything except this: the present fire insurance law is a too one-sided law, and give to the insurance companies entirely too many excuses to increase fire insurance rates. There is little if anything to the contention the Record makes that the reason for raising the rates in Wichita Falls is attributable to so many saloons and boarding houses. There has never been a day since Wichita Falls was an organized city that the city has not had as many saloons and rooming houses (population considered) as there are at present, and yet the rates for fire insurance continue to go up. In fact there are blocks right in the business section, with not a saloon in them and that have no greater number of rooming houses than for any previous time. Yet under the key rate law, fire insurance has been raised and in the face of the fact that the city government has taxed itself thousands of dollars in equipping its fire-fighting departments and complying with other regulations suggested by fire insurance companies, with the provision that when suggested regulations were complied with the fire insurance rates would be materially lowered. But we only get another raise, and the Times has about concluded the present law was made (whether intentionally or not) for the purpose of giving to the insurance companies all the latitude they desired in which to revise the rates, and in Wichita Falls they have neglected no opportunity in using that advantage.

For this reason the Times endorses heartily the plank in the Democratic platform adopted at San Antonio for the repeal of that one-sided fire insurance law, and it believes this will be done at the meeting of the next legislature.

As to what effect this will have the Times does not know. Neither does it care. Conditions could not possibly be made much worse, and even if they are, it cannot then be charged that the people of Texas themselves shall longer be placed in the attitude of being wholly responsible for the enactment of a law that gives to the insurance companies a free hand to demand the payment of unreasonable and unjust fire insurance rates, or comply with their un-

reasonable and unfair regulations in order to get a rate that is just and reasonable. Repeat the law, and if necessary, make another that will be just to both the fire insurance companies and those who pay the insurance.

## THE SHAM OF IT

When the ever charming Viola o' Shakespeare's fine comedy received the challenge to a duel the mischievous Sir Toby Belch, after long persuasion, induced Sir Andrew Aguecheek to send her deceived by her girl into thinking her of the masculine gender, she said: "I am one that but rather go with—sir—priest than sir knight." As a public man it looks like Col. Roosevelt goes with a saint or sir-boss as the time and place require. Enrolled with him is Mr. Clifford Pinchot, who, all of us are, the most of mankind are agreed, is made of extra good clay, so far as concerns his patriotism. Enthusiastic, he is sir saint at Roosevelt's Armageddon; battling for the Lord. Now there is Bill Flinn. He, too, is a soldier of Armageddon—Roosevelt's Armageddon. Now, it is not conceivable that Pinchot would march through Coventry with Bill Flinn; but Roosevelt is delighted with his Pittsburgh boss and has declared him to be thoroughly reformed and completely regenerated in every particular. You see, Flinn expended of his own money \$99,384.15 to secure the Pennsylvania delegation in the regular republican convention at Chicago last summer for Roosevelt. This patriotic act has made him as pure a politician as is stout a "Christian soldier" at Armageddon as the best of 'em.

Nor does Theodore Roosevelt have any respect for the accepted obligations of truthful speech—a God-given virtue. In Missouri, at Joplin, he curled this mendacity at his audience: "If you would know what boss domination did for the people of Baltimore, think for a moment of what happened to Champ Clark. The bosses didn't want him nominated. They wanted another candidate, and they got him by overriding the vote of the people. It was as willful a disregard of the voters as was evidenced in the republican convention in Chicago. The nomination at Baltimore belonged to Mr. Clark, but the bosses handed it over to Mr. Wilson."

Under oath before the United States senate committee Mr. Flinn made a "prexy witness." Ages ago good men were admonished that he would have a coup with the devil should have a long ladle. This Mr. Flinn undertook to play the game of politics with Matt Quay. Whether his ladle was long or short, he boasts that he gold bricked the greatest of the bosses. He admitted having written an agreement in January, 1896, under which Sen. Quay, J. O. Brown and himself proposed to divide the federal lion's share in Pennsylvania, but he did not sign it or intend to sign the pact. All he was after was to ally Senator Quay's opposition to the republican candidate for mayor of Pittsburgh, Lord Sandwich with the most odious character of his time. Do you know he earned his infamy? When he was running against Taft for the republican nomination for president, a few months later, he everywhere denounced Taft or his efforts to secure Canadian reciprocity. When he was president of the United States he insisted on appointment of negroes to office in the cotton states; but he got the abolition in his noogie that he had a chance to carry one or more of those states, and he proclaims that he is not only opposed to southern negroes holding office, but he is opposed to their voting at all!

And that is not all Wilson knows. He knows one way and a very good way to advantage American women to reduce the tariff so that American women can buy sewing machines as cheap as they are sold to alien women; but Roosevelt, and the Washington Times say we can not get along without a protective tariff, and so say the corporations that make sewing machines. Hence the American woman is taxed \$12 every time she buys a sewing machine. Wilson knows another way to benefit American women is to take the tariff of spool cotton so that the poor seamstress may buy each spool for a cent and a half less than she now pays. ANOTHER ESCAPED CONVICT RECAPTURED

(Continued from Page 1)

escaped one of the most desperate is named Richardson. He was serving a life term for murder and was regarded as the worst man in the penitentiary. So far as known two men were killed yesterday. They were Charles Dressner, a barber and Anton Tazo, leader of the convicts. Last June fire partially destroyed the broom factory at the penitentiary. The convicts made no effort to escape, but went to the aid of the prison guards and saved the greater part of the building and supplies. Bravery on the part of some of the convicts resulted in commutation of the sentences of eight of them, and one was paroled and another pardoned. On Wednesday, October 2 a negro was lynched by a mob of convicts after he had been lodged in the penitentiary to save him from a throng of citizens, gathered about the county jail. The negro had attacked an aged woman.

The prison authorities have not been able to learn the names of the lynchers, the convicts having threatened to kill the first man who "squealed." A battle raged early last night in the state penitentiary. Locked inside the walls, with hundreds of mutinous prisoners, a few guards fought desperately to restore order and prevent a wholesale jail delivery. Camped outside the walls was a force of citizens, heavily armed, ready to drive back the convicts if they murdered the remaining guards and made a rush through the gates. Shouts and occasional shots told of desperate fighting within the walls and it was rumored that several guards and convicts were killed. Another battle was in progress at the same time in the hills south of Rawlins between a posse of citizens and from twenty to forty escaped prisoners. Two men were killed in the streets of Rawlins, one was desperately wounded and two convicts were recaptured, following the escape of ten to thirty prisoners yesterday afternoon.

The town was in a panic. Frantic telegrams were sent to Governor Carey, now at Sheridan, imploring him to send state troops to protect the citizens. Townspeople barricaded themselves in their homes last night, or heavily armed, patrolled the streets. The outbreak was the second within twenty-four hours. About 3 p. m. Saturday afternoon twenty prisoners escaped and nine were recaptured. A party of desperate life termers overpowered the keeper of the cell-house, took his keys and released their comrades from their cells. Every prisoner willing to risk a battle with the guards made a rush for the gates. A moment later the citizens of the town heard a fusillade of shots inside the walls. A bedlam of shouts and yells echoed from the prison. A few seconds later more than a dozen men dashed down the main street, armed with guns and knives. Holding the few citizens on the street at bay with revolvers, they charged into a livery barn, holding up the proprietor and hastily throwing saddles and bridles on the horses.

A huge negro with a revolver, was left as guard on the outside. Charles Strossner, a barber, had heard the commotion and came down the street with a shot gun. The negro shot him through the head, killing him instantly. At the sound of the shot the convicts swarmed from the barn, some with stolen horses and some afoot. A Mexican wantonly stabbed the proprietor in the face, severely wounding him, and a few seconds later paid for the deed with his life. Hugh Rogner, a deputy sheriff, shot him twice, killing him almost instantly. Leaving their dying comrades, the convicts made a dash for the rocky hills south of the town. A party of penitentiary guards followed in close pursuit, and before the bewildered citizens had had time to form a posse pursuers and fugitives had disappeared among the hills.
