

Board extends superintendent contract

The Friona ISD board of trustees met in regular session Thursday January 20.

Following the hearing of the audit report, the board approved Texas Association of School Board policy updates, received a report on utility cost history, approved the annual Academic Excellence Indicator System report, approved campus goals and objectives submitted by the four campus committees, and set a date for the annual board training.

In other business the board received a report from Superintendent Jim Parker on the Black The board heard the district audit report Community School site and authorized Parker to m Donna West, CPA. The board conducted their annual superintendent evaluation and offered a contract extension to Superintendent Jim Parker through the 2007-08 school year. Parker has been in education for 37 years and in the Friona school system almost 24 years. His first year in Friona was the 1981-82 school year

The Parmer County Junior Livestock Show premium sale raised a total of \$80,125 for area 4-H and FFA youngsters. The sale, held Saturday at the Friona Community Center, auctioned off a total of 145 animals out of 266 animals that were registered in Thursday's 58th annual Parmer County Junior Livestock Show

There were 23 goats entered in four classes. Lazbuddie FFA swept this category with Ryan Mason exhibiting the Grand Champion and Jordan Mason showing the Reserve Grand Champion. Kaleigh Jo White, Parmer County 4-H, won junior showmanship and Alisha Wauson, Farwell FFA, was the senior showmanship champion. A total of 164 entries in 30


classes made up the barrow competition. Danielle Cockerham, Parmer County 4-H, had the top hog, winning Grand Champion with her 230-pound york. Dan Patterson, also Parmer County 4-H, grabbed Reserve Grand Champion with a 232-pound cross. Senior showmanship champion in the barrow competition was Kayla Parham, Lazbuddie FFA. Junior showmanship champ went to Caleb Christian, Parmer County

In the lamb contest there were 68 entries in 11 classes. The Grand Champion was shown by Austin Mason of Lazbuddie FFA, Kolten Morris, also Lazbuddie FFA, won Reserve Grand Champion. In the lamb showmanship contest, Ashton Mason, Lazbuddie FFA, was junior champ; Logan Mason, Lazbuddie FFA, won intermediate champ, and Kelby Mon-roe, Friona FFA, was awarded senior showmanship honors.

To round out the show, 11 steers entered in four classes. Brittany Berend's 1250-pound Exotic was named Grand Champion. Brittany represents Friona FFA. Jason Berend, also Friona FFA, garnered Reserve Grand Champion steer with his 1300pound English entry. Junior showmanship champ was Logan Mason, Lazbuddie FFA and the Senior showmanship champ steer was shown by Kelby

At the premium sale, Austin Mason's Grand Champion lamb was bought by Lowe's Supermarket for \$1,600; Berend's Grand Champion steer was sold to TexZona Custom Cattle Feeders for \$2,500; Farwell Banking Center was high bidder on Ryan Mason's Grand Champion goat at \$400; and the Legends Buyers Club bought Danielle Cockerham's Grand Champion barrow with a winning bid of \$1,500.

Black Community school site for sale

The Friona school board has a decision to make concerning the Black Community school site at FM1172 and Highway 60. The FISD board recently held discussions related to the disposition of the site. According to officials the structure is an eyesore and safety hazard and was the topic of a discussion by the board last year.

Representatives of Burlington Northern Santa Fe (BNSF) railroad have inquired about the possibility of purchasing the site, or an easement, to allow for the relocation of existing railroad signal controls at the grade crossing.

In researching the purchase, BNSF officials found the original

documents at the county courthouse dated September 7 detailing the sale of the building and improvements. The building is located on approximately 4 acres and was sold to the Black Community Social and Study Club. The purchase price was \$10. Trustees listed for the Study Club at the time of the 1953 purchase were Mrs. Emma Elmore, Mrs. Mildred Barnett, and Mrs. Maxine Price

The document specified that "whenever such property shall cease to be used for religious or social community activities" it would revert to the grantor which was the Friona ISD. School district officials said it appears the district now has the responsibility for the property. No final decisions have been made by the school board

Interested parties are encouraged to contact Superintendent Jim Parker at the FISD Central Office or call 250-2747. "It was noted that the long term ownership and maintenance of the property by the school district would not be in the best interest of taxpavers," Parker said.

The school board will entertain offers from anyone who might have a sentimental attachment to the property or a material use for the acreage with the understanding that there are existing easement and right of way considerations. Parker said the structure ture will need to be removed and discussions are continuing with

That's the big question for Friona folks this week brand new Hereford Wal-Mart opened for business Wednesday morning. The Supercenter will be open from 7 a.m. to 11 p.m. daily After some hurrah, live radio coverage, speeches, and a ribbon cutting they let the first customers in at 8 a.m. Wednesday, January 26. It was announced that on this same day 42 other Wal-Mart Supercenters opened around the country. That is amazing.

My mother Hannah and her friend Martha were there bright and early. I haven't heard from them so I guess they are having a good time. They said they didn't need to buy anything they just wanted to go in and look around. As though they had never seen what a Wal-Mart looks like.

Folks in Friona have a minor dilemma now. Do we keep going to the Wal-Mart in Clovis (about 35 miles) or switch to the Hereford one (about 20 miles)? I haven't been to the Hereford Wal-Mart. My mother has. She and Martha sat out on the parking lot and watched them build it. I quizzed her about the layout of the store and from what I can determine it is the opposite floor plan from Clovis.

(The following article appeared in the Douglas, Arizona, Daily Dispatch, written by Xavier Zaragoza. Robert Patton is a 1981 graduate of Friona High School and is the son-inlaw of James and Doris Dobbs of Summerfield.)

When Robert Patton started working as a correction officer in Fort Grant at the age of 21, he never thought that one day he would become a warden.

But as he rose through the system he eventually took administrative positions. Yet even then, when he had become deputy warden in 2002, he had thoughts about retiring.

But then a great opportunity came, one that he could not turn

Today, Patton, 41, is the warden at the Arizona State Prison, complex Douglas.

Looking back at his career path, he had enjoyed every mo-

"I can't imagine doing anything else," he said.

But what he does imagine, and has been thinking about for a long time, is how to make a larger impact on the community

He wants his staff to be leads and more visible members of the Douglas community. In fact, many correctional officers are outstanding members of the community but are often overlooked.

But if one looks around town, they will see a visible yet subtle evidence of community outreach from the correctional system here.

"I'm really proud of the inmate labor program and what it has done for Douglas," he said.

On any given day a crew of inmates can be seen throughout Douglas working on a variety of city projects, ranging from street repairs, clean-up details, to constructing major facilities like the Aquatic Center or the Visitor's Center, all of which display fine craftsmanship.

In his role as warden he is looking to expand this outreach by continuing the programs that currently exist and by creating others that include volunteerism and community involvement. When he thinks about the future, he thinks about all the pos-

sibilities "I'm just excited to be here in Douglas," he said.

Patton and his family will be living at the warden's residence at the prison complex.

Patton is married to Renee and they have three children: Sara, 22; Amber, 20; and Josh,

Sara and Josh were graduates of Valley Union High in Elfrida. Patton is from Safford.

Patton began his career as a corrections officer in 1985 in Fort Grant. He went from correctional officer I to correctional officer II and was promoted to sergeant. He was in Florence and worked on death row as a correctional sergeant.

He was promoted to Lieutenant and then was promoted to Captain, in Douglas, and was here from 1996 to 2000. By then he wanted to work at the administrative level. In 2000, he became an associate deputy war-den and went back to the Safford complex. There, he then became

deputy warden. In Aril 2004, he became deputy warden of operations in Buckeye and in October, was offered the wardenship at Douglas



Check out your local public library

When Andrew Carnegie embarked on his philanthropic effort to improve the quality of life for all Americans, he did not set up clinics or soup kitchens. He invested in libraries, reasoning that we must feed people's minds as well as their bodies. Since books are the stored knowledge, art, and experience of mankind, libraries are a treasury of humanity. The accumulated wealth of human experience is freely available to anyone, rich or poor, who makes the effort to use these facilities.

Following his philosophy, Carnegie provided grants to various

Texas communities which helped construct thirty-two public library buildings in communities ranging in size from the booming city of Dallas to the small mining town of Pittsburg.

Since that time, public libraries have continued as a unique public service institution in our democracy. In Texas alone, we have 560 public libraries. They are free to all citizens, and serve every age group from toddler to senior citizen. They unlock the world for young and old through books, computers, audio-visual resources, and important databases such as TexShare, which is a statewide consortium of academic libraries, public libraries, and libraries of clinical medicine administered by the Texas State Library and Archives Commission. It shares staff expertise and library resources while it pursues joint purchasing agreements for information services to lower costs for its members.

I am a proud ally of our state public library system because I personally gained so m much from libraries. As a member of the Senate Appropriations Committee, I supported modernization opportunities for public libraries through the Museum and Library Services Act. This extended authorization of support for library services and technology through FY 2009. These grants help library systems install advanced technology. I also support measures to provide teacher education, library and media specialist as well as preschool and teacher aid certification to individuals so they may better use these advances in the classroom or instructional process.

Public library funding in the United States is a unique combination of local, state, and federal efforts. At the local level, public library service is shaped by the community. Money is allocated by city councils, library districts, or by county commissioners courts. States add supplemental funding designed to foster library cooperation through the sharing of books and materials between libraries


The federal role is to help extend the access of libraries across the country and the world through unique information technology networks. Through direct grants to state library agencies, federal funds promote, stimulate and support library innovation.

Public libraries form a remarkable cooperative system. If you consider that the average price of a hardback book is approximately \$30, and that Texas public libraries circulate over 90 million items per year, that adds up to more than \$2.7 billion in annual transactions. The value of the knowledge exchanged in the course of those transactions is incalculable.

Texas public libraries also serve as cultural havens for their

communities. They are places for children to learn and develop reading skills. From preschool reading activities to grade school, children benefit from use of the local public library. Teen-agers use public libraries to help with school work and enrich their lives. Adults use public libraries to enjoy a good book, get books on tape, or to learn "how to" do any number of things, such as fix their car or succeed in business. Senior citizens are the new pioneers in the preservation of family histories through study of their family heritage. Public library genealogy collections and TexShare databases aid this important effort. Citizens of all age levels also use their libraries as public meeting places to discuss local issues. The public library is an integral part of community

Like you, I have used public libraries to enrich my life, to learn, and to succeed in my work. When I was in elementary school, I read every biography in the library. They gave me inspiration, which is with me to this day. We can all support our local public libraries in many ways...through volunteering, contributing to their resources, or using the facilities. It is an effort worth making.



The cost of underpaying Texas teachers

I recently released my spe-cial report, *The Cost of Under-paying Texas Teachers*, which showed Texas loses \$13.3 billion each year by underpaying teachers. I am calling on the Legislature to approve a \$3,000 pay raise now for Texas teachers, to institute a competitive, automatic pay increase every two years, and to pay bonuses to all teachers whose low per-

forming schools improve. Texas ranks 33rd in these United States in teachers' salaries. We can and must do better. Nearly 37,000 Texas teachers leave the classroom each year taking their skills to better-paying jobs or simply quitting. To ensure our state's economic prosperity, we must requalified and experienced teachers who are fully certified, well paid and dedicated to a lifelong career with our most precious resource, our children.

Tragically, as many as 50,000 students drop out of Texas schools every year. These dropouts cost our Texas economy \$11.4 billion every year. Add incarceration and welfare costs of dropouts to the costs of

teacher training and recruiting and other state and federal ex-penses, and the annual price tag jumps to \$13.3 billion.

My report showed turnover is highest where teacher pay is lowest. I would rather spend \$1 billion today investing in our future by giving teachers this much-deserved pay raise, than continue paying for failed policies of the past - \$13.3 billion year after year after year.

The return on our invest-

ment: keeping good teachers, fewer low-performing schools, economy for the state of Texas: between now and then. RC.)

As a former public school teacher and a former school board president, but most importantly as a momma and a grandmomma, my goal is to drive more of every education dollar directly into the classroom with the students and the teachers, where it belongs. To-day, our Texas teachers are underpaid and underappreciated. Texas is great, but we can do better.

State records 16 months of positive sales tax growth

Texas Comptroller Carole 4.8 percent in 2007.' Keeton Strayhorn announced that the state collected \$1.35 billion in sales tax revenue in Friday, February 11.

"Our state's great economic engine is improving. We have experienced 16 months of positive sales tax growth," Strayhorn said. "In my biennial revenue estimate, delivered to the 79th Legislature, I predict sales tax revenues will in-crease 4.1 percent in fiscal year 2005, 3.6 percent in 2006, and

The Comptroller's next sales tax allocation will be made on

Parmer County's January 2005 payment totaled \$30,567 broken down as Bovina \$4,733; Farwell \$6,598; and Friona \$19,236. In January 2004, the tax payment total was \$31,029.

Comparing January 2004 to January 2005 tax receipts, Bovina is up 7.35%, Farwell is up 18.16%, and Friona is down -8.55%.





THE CHIEF'S CORNER

Violations of city ordinances/illegal dumping

Lately we have received complaints of persons throwing large items of trash in the alleys by the dumpsters. One complaint was regarding the 1300 block of Maple/Walnut alley, where there was an old TV, mattress, and other goods, that were too large for the dumpster. These items were left on the ground by the dumpster. Such actions are not only a violation of the city ordinances of the City of Friona, but it is a violation of the Health and Safety Code

City Ordinance 13.303: Disposal of Large or Bulky Items: Accumulations of brick, broken concrete, lumber, ashes, clinkers, cinder, dirt, plaster, sand, gravel, automobile frames, dead trees, and other bulky, heavy materials, shall be disposed of at the expense of the owner or under directions of the City Manager.

Sec. 13.304: Placement of Garbage Items on Streets and Alleys Prohibited: The placing of kitchen garbage, trash or rubbish, or any article, thing, or material, in any street or alley within the city limits is prohibited.

Sec. 13.305: The disposal of kitchen garbage, trash or rubbish of any kind within the city limits, except at designated places, is prohibited

Aside from being issued a citation for violation of a city ordinance, you can also be charged anywhere from a Class C Misdemeanor to a State Jail Felony, for Illegal Dumping: Class C Misdemeanor - When the items dumped weigh 5 pounds or less; Class B Misdemeanor - When the items weigh more than 5 pounds, but less than 500 pounds; Class A Misdemeanor - When the items weigh 500 $\,$ pounds, but less than 1000 pounds; State Jail Felony - When items dumped weigh 1000 pounds or more

Officers of the Friona Police Department will be monitoring for any violations of the city ordinances or illegal dumping. To avoid being issued citations for violation of the city ordinances or being charged with a criminal offense for illegal dumping, take your large items to the disposal site behind the city barn. If you contact city hall during the workweek, they will have a city employee meet you there to dispose of large items. There is a minimal fee to do this, depending on how large your items are, however, it is better to pay this fee than to have a criminal offense charge filed against you. I encourage the citizens of Friona to call the police department if you witness anyone illegally dumping trash inside the city limits of our

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
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

The Longhorns rolled over the Chiefs in a final 76-39 win.




that could add to the "just for fun" atmosphere of the day.
