WOMEN AT THE POLLS IN COMING ELECTION

Washington, D. C., Oct. 24 .- in the general election a week from Tueshy women will vote in six states. California, Washington, Idaho, Coic-rano, Wyoming and Utah, a fact which campaign managers of the various arties have taken into consideration: While the Progressive party was the only one of the three leading political organizations to give its official stamp. of approval to the equal suffrage novement, the Republican and Demos ratic leaders have shown their apreclation of the importance of that ovement by enlisting the services of women workers with an eye to the realt in the six states in which wonen have been granted the full rightsof the franchise. These six states have a total representation in the lectoral college of 38 votes, divided is follows: California 12, Colorado Idaho 4, Utah 4, Washington 7, Wyon ming 3.

According to the last census California has a total of 671,386 women eligible to vote. For the other five states the figures are as follows: Colo cado, 213,425; Utah, 85,729; Washingon, 277,727; IdnhoJ 269,818; Wyoming, 28,840. That the choice of a president and

vice president of the United States in the coming election may depend upon the votes of the women in the six states named is easily within the range of possibilities. To prove the truth of this statement it is but need sary to cite the fact that six presi dents of the United States were elect ed by a smaller number of votes than those which woman suffrage states will control in the next electoral col

Statistics show that Presidents Jeierson, Adams, John Quincy Adams, Taylor, Hayes and Cleveland wer lected by a majority of thirty-seven rotes or less. In 1796 John Adams defeated Thomas Jefferson by two otes. In 1800 Thomas Jefferson and Aaron Burr each received 173 votes. The choice then devolved upon the ouse of representatives, with the resalt that Jefferson was elected. In 1824 none of the candidates for president received enough electoral otes to elect, and the choice again devolved upon the house of representatives, when John Quincy Adams was chosen. In 1840 Zachary Taylor defeated Lewis Cass by just thirty-six votes. In 1876 Rutherford B. Hayes defeated. Samuel J. Tilden by one vote, and in 1884 Grover Cleveland defeated James G. Blaine by thirty


