The Roller lease to the Guffey company, mention of which was made yesterday, covers a total of about 5500 acres and drilling is to start in thirty days. The 5500 acres is to be divided into tracts of approximately 500 acres each and when it begins drilling on one of these tracts the Guffey is to pay \$50 per acre for that tract alone. If oil is found in as large quantities as 100 barrels per day, General Roller is to receive \$150 per acre to be paid out of the oil produced; the lease provides for one-sixth royalty. Should no oil be found on the first tract developed, it is to be optional with the Guffey whether it begins drilling on another tract within thirty days or abandons the lease. Each of the 500 acre tracts is considered separately in the lease.

The Guffey's No. 10 on the Miller will be drilled in shortly and has indications for a good well.

More Wells Near Vernon.
R. D. Scott, who is in charge of the White well and other oil properties north of town, stated to a Record representative yesterday that his company would at once sink two wells and re-open the Covert well.

Work on the Covert well will be started next week and drilling in the new holes will be started as soon as the necessary derricks and machinery can be placed on the ground. Mr. Scott stated that he had not yet decided where the new wells would be drilled, but that he expected to locate them more convenient to water than the White well, it having been necessary to haul water for this project.

When drilling in the White well was suspended last Thursday because the bailer got hung in the casing oil of good quality was being brought up at every trip. Since then the drillers have been busy trying to get the bailer out.

Mr. Scott and those associated with him are confident that the White well will be a paying proposition as soon as it can be gotten in shape to work.—Vernon Record.

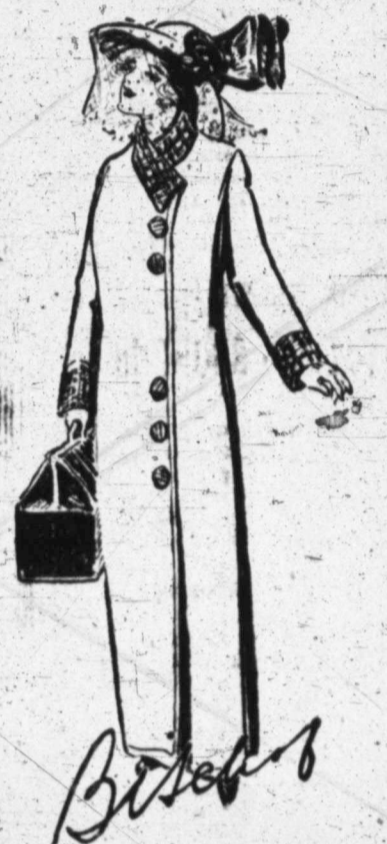

EXPECTS 15 CENT COTTON IN SPRING

(Continued From Page One)

of the anti-trust law, owing to the fact that they hold cotton for the expressed purpose of running the market up, by limiting the supply so that spinners will be compelled to pay the price necessary to bring the product on the market.

"This makes the price of the manufactured product cost the consumer more, without the benefit of profits going where it belongs, to the producer of the raw material, but instead the broker is the man who reaps the harvest.

"The Farmers' union plan of holding cotton—contemplates entirely another purpose. We hold our product, in order that there will not be an over-supply thrust upon the market, and that it may be supplied as the demand justifies.

"Under the warehouse plan of the Farmers' union, each man is privileged to sell whenever he pleases to do so, or hold his cotton until he gets his price. The organization has no voice in his placing his cotton on the market, but at the same time makes it possible for him to hold it as long as he desires to do so, by enabling him to procure a loan on it at a low rate of interest, in the event he needs money to meet his demands before the market goes to where he cares to sell. Or, if he does not need the money our local warehouse system provides him with a desirable place to store his cotton as long as he desires to hold it.

"Many of our farmers made a mistake by selling their cotton early in the season. This was done mainly by those who were not able to hold and at the same time did not care to pay the 6 per cent on the money to be had as a loan on the cotton, when handled through our warehouses.

"The mistake made in early selling is very evident, taking as a basis for consideration the market conditions of last year. In August, 1911, cotton sold at 12 1/4 cents, dropping to 9 cents in October as a result of the reaction caused by the early marketing. In the spring of 1912 the price again went up, reaching as the highest point 13 1/2 cents.

"This year, the August market was 11 5/8 cents at the time most of the crop was marketed, and dropped to the present price, 11 cents for middling, which is 2 cents above the October price last year. Taking into consideration the extent to which prices have held up as compared with 1911, an confident that those who hold till next spring will realize 15 cents, which would well justify them to pay the 6 per cent on money, if necessary to enable them to hold.

"A further reason in connection with these comparative figures, for expecting cotton to go even higher next spring than last, is in the fact that the total crop will not exceed that of last year. While it is true that the foreign crop is heavier, the American crop is about 1,000,000 bales short of last year, taking the country in its entirety."

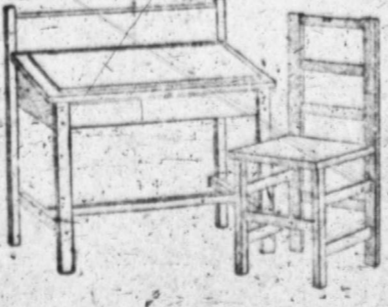

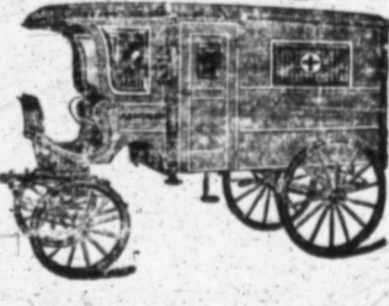

WOMEN AT THE POLLS IN COMING ELECTION

Washington, D. C., Oct. 24.—In the general election a week from Tuesday women will vote in six states, California, Washington, Idaho, Colorado, Wyoming and Utah, a fact which campaign managers of the various parties have taken into consideration. While the Progressive party was the only one of the three leading political organizations to give its official stamp of approval to the equal suffrage movement, the Republican and Democratic leaders have shown their appreciation of the importance of that movement by enlisting the services of women workers with an eye to the result in the six states in which women have been granted the full rights of the franchise. These six states have a total representation in the electoral college of 88 votes, divided as follows: California 12, Colorado 7, Idaho 4, Utah 4, Washington 7, Wyoming 3.

According to the last census California has a total of 671,386 women eligible to vote. For the other five states the figures are as follows: Colorado, 213,425; Utah, 85,729; Washington, 277,277; Idaho, 269,818; Wyoming, 28,840.

That the choice of a president and vice president of the United States in the coming election may depend upon the votes of the women in the six states named is easily within the range of possibilities. To prove the truth of this statement it is but necessary to cite the fact that six presidents of the United States were elected by a smaller number of votes than those which woman suffrage states will control in the next electoral college.

Statistics show that Presidents Jefferson, Adams, John Quincy Adams, Taylor, Hayes and Cleveland were elected by a majority of thirty-seven votes or less. In 1796 John Adams defeated Thomas Jefferson by two votes. In 1800 Thomas Jefferson and Aaron Burr each received 173 votes. The choice then devolved upon the house of representatives, with the result that Jefferson was elected.

In 1824 none of the candidates for president received enough electoral votes to elect, and the choice again devolved upon the house of representatives, when John Quincy Adams was chosen. In 1849 Zachary Taylor defeated Lewis Cass by just thirty-six votes. In 1876 Rutherford B. Hayes defeated Samuel J. Tilden by one vote, and in 1884 Grover Cleveland defeated James G. Blaine by thirty-seven votes.

In addition to the six states in which women have been given the right to vote for president there are numerous states in which they have the rights of limited suffrage. In fact, there are in the United States today only nineteen states which have no form of suffrage for women, and even in some of those states there are cities in which women have the right to vote for school officials and on tax matters. The nineteen states are Nevada, Texas, Missouri, Arkansas, Mississippi, Indiana, Kentucky, Tennessee, Alabama, Florida, Georgia, South Carolina, North Carolina, Virginia, Maryland, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island and Maine.

Kentucky already has felt the entering wedge and before the presidential election in 1912 it is very likely that half a dozen or more states will have adopted woman suffrage in addition to the six now on the roll. In the election two weeks from today the voters of Oregon, Kansas, Michigan, Wisconsin and Arizona will vote on the adoption of constitutional amendments granting the full rights of suffrage to women. The equal suffrage leaders are confident that out of these five states some are bound to slip through in spite of all the opponents can do, and a good many thousand voters of the "weaker" sex will be added to the present million and a quarter after November 5.

So far the equal suffrage cause has scored its greatest victories in the far West. No state in the East or South has yet granted to women the full suffrage rights. In Ohio, where a vote on the matter was taken this summer, the cause was defeated. It is believed, and not without reason, that the result in the Buckeye state will influence the vote soon to be taken in Michigan and Wisconsin. In Wisconsin the suffragists are fighting hard and have strong hopes of success. It is generally conceded, however, that Kansas is more likely to adopt the amendment than is any of the other states in which the matter is to be voted on next month.

The woman suffrage movement has made less of an impression on the old South, so far as practical results are concerned, than on any other section of the country. But even here the agitation is beginning to be felt, and it is not improbable that the suffragists will include Louisiana, Georgia and one or two others in the list of "campaign states" within another year or two.

CONFERENCE ON CHILD WELFARE AT HOUSTON.

Wichita Falls Mothers and Teachers Clubs will send delegates to the fourth annual Child Welfare Conference at Houston, Nov. 13-16.

On the first day of the conference the executive board of the state organization will hold a meeting and plans for the next year's work will be outlined. On the same day the nominating, resolutions and constitution and by-laws committees will transact business.

The Hotel Bender has been chosen as headquarters and the state officers and some of the members of the executive committee and other state committees will be quartered there.

The regular convention will open on the evening of November 13 and there will be an address of welcome by the mayor of Houston, the superintendent of public schools, Mrs. Trealey K. Ewing (president of the Houston Parent-Teachers' Association), and men and women prominent in club and private life. The regular business sessions will begin on the morning of November 14 and continue through until the evening of November 15.

The special theme of the entire convention will be "Physical Welfare of the Child" and laws relating to them. It will be remembered that the Texas Congress of Mothers is responsible for the bill introduced before the last legislature asking for the abolition of the common drinking cup, and as a result of the movement the state passed a law prohibiting the use of public drinking cups on all trains in the state. While the law is not altogether what the mothers desired, still it is a step in the right direction, and they feel encouraged and believe that before long a law prohibiting the public drinking cup in public schools, public meeting places, stores, etc., will be enacted.

Many nobles from different parts of the United States will be in attendance at this convention. Some will attend to be able to know what the state organization is attempting to do for child life; others will be there to participate in the program. Chief among the latter will be Dr. B. V. O'Shea, head of the department of education, Wisconsin University, and a noted lecturer and writer. Among others who will attract much attention and add luster to the program appear the names of William Hard of the editorial staff of the Delinquent and Mrs. Frederick Schoff of Philadelphia, president of the National Congress of Mothers.

It is probable that the problem regarding particularly the labor of children in the home and factory will be discussed by the entire convention. The mothers of the state feel that the labor laws governing child life are already inadequate and in many sections of the state no effort is made toward their enforcement. Under the latter head much attention

and time will be given to the discussion of dangers surrounding the messenger, and newspaper boys of the street, and it is quite possible that measures to safeguard this "child of the street" will be passed by the mothers.

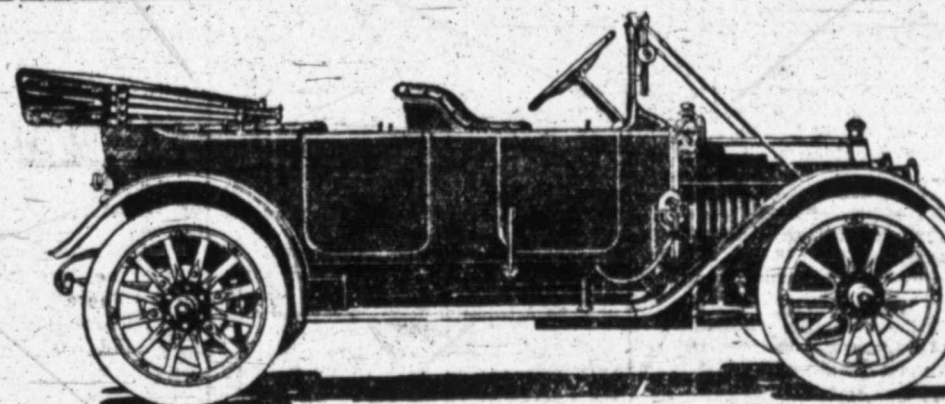

The Balkan Trouble

(El Paso Times)

At first hand the Balkan situation appears the most complicated affair imaginable, yet there is bound up in it more of the past and future history of the world than any other trouble which confronts statesmen.

People read so much about brigands and massacres, Bulgarians and Albanians, and one thing and another, that they forget that these things are merely the smallest details and only indirectly have a bearing on the great problem which the Balkans present. It is a case of not being able to see the wood for the trees.

It must be remembered in the first place that the Balkans have been a battleground for centuries. Constantinople fell into the hands of the Turks just thirty-nine years before the discovery of America. It was an event scarcely less epoch making than the voyage of Columbus.

For four hundred years after that the Turks were trying to break into Europe through the Balkans and the Christian powers were trying to keep them out. Time and again the Turks got as far as Buda-Pesth in Hungary and Vienna in Austria, only to be driven back. Today Austria is well pleased to maintain her present territory and manage her own complicated affairs in peace, while the Turk has degenerated until he is no longer to be feared by any great European power.

In between Austria and Turkey, however, there has been left a mixed population which in many respects is little changed from what it was 400 years ago. The Albanians are little if any more civilized than American red Indians. Their only form of government is tribal and the only authority they recognize is that of their own chiefs.

The Sultan keeps a certain amount of authority over them by paying them occasional tribute and by taking advantage of their own differences. Some of the Albanians are Mohammedans and others are Roman Catholics while the Macedonians and Bulgarians are Greek Catholics.

Up to the present crisis the trouble in the Balkans has always been really a game of checkers behind the scenes between England and Russia. Recent politics in Europe has tended to bring England and Russia closer together on some questions and perhaps this year's difficulty is not a row between them.

England fought the Crimean war to keep Russia out of Turkey and in 1878, when Russia had an army almost within sight of Constantinople and could easily have taken it, it was a British fleet on its way to the Bosphorus which made Russia pull back and submit to the decision of the Berlin conference. One of the things which the conference decided was that Russia should be allowed to bring no warships through the Bosphorus from the Black Sea to the Mediterranean.

The Black Sea is a Russian lake but to Russia it is like owning a bottle when another man owns the cork, which he refuses to draw. England through the Turk, holds the cork of the Black Sea, and Russia might have the finest navy in the world there, but she could not get it out to make any use of it.

England's object in insisting upon this rule was to keep Russia out of the Mediterranean and consequently away from the Suez canal and the route to India. The British Empire is strung out around the world in a broken line, but it is perfectly secure so long as Russia does not drive a wedge through this line in any part.

It is this big fact which makes a little riot in the Balkans of such enormous importance and keeps every prime minister in Europe awake nights thinking about it. Russia is all the time intriguing with the small tribes and petty sovereigns

of the Balkan peninsula with the general idea of making the situation so intolerable that the other powers will support her in most any measure which would get the Turks out of Europe.

This constant stirring up of trouble by Russia has served to keep the people of Bulgaria, Serbia, Greece, Montenegro and the Christian provinces of Turkey in Europe at the boiling pitch all the time. Four hundred years of constant, unpeppable cruelty by the Turks on the Balkan Christian people has instilled into the latter a fanatical hatred of the Moslems that is positively a frenzy.

All this has made it possible for the little rulers to build up large standing armies, well equipped, well officered and well drilled. King Ferdinand of Bulgaria has the largest and of recent years it has been his ambition to build up an empire in Southeastern Europe, with himself as ruler, much as Emperor William is ruler over the states and kingdoms of Germany.

Serbia also has ambitions. The Montenegrin monarch, long a prince, has recently become a king. Greece, although not too strong, feels that if Turkey is to be sliced up she should have a piece.

The present situation arose out of the Albanian rebellion of a year or two ago which Turkey put down with characteristic barbarism. Many Albanian rebels crossed into Montenegro and the Turks followed. This aroused the King of Montenegro, who threatened war.

Just at this point Turkish mobs attacked and killed a large number of Bulgarian residents of Turkey. Then barbarites of Turkish soldiers in Macedonia became noised abroad.

Thus the whole Balkan group of nations were aroused and the situation has become more strained every week.

If war bursts over the Balkans you will find that the following are the chief contributing causes. These on the surface, at least.

First—Bulgaria, Serbia and Greece will insist that they are going to war solely to force reform in Macedonia, old Serbia, Albania and other Christian provinces of Turkey and thus relieve their suffering brethren who live in the dominion of the sultan.

Second—The rulers of Bulgaria, Serbia and Greece are ambitious to enlarge their kingdoms by dividing Turkey in Europe among themselves.

Third—The intrigues of Russia and possibly other powers.

Fourth—A popular demand for war. Such a serious undertaking as war with Turkey would not be possible but for the inborn hatred toward the Turk of all the people, high and low, of the Balkan kingdoms who would not, if they could, forget centuries of unpeppable cruelty at the hands of the Moslems.

This fourth reason is, perhaps, the most important. The Turk is all the time stirring up this hatred and animosity by his treatment of the Christian people with his borders. And if he is ever beaten—driven from Europe—these subject people will have a large part in his undoing.

The most troublesome of them are the Macedonians and the Albanians. The Macedonians are not a distinct nationality and there is a good deal of dispute as to just who they are. In Sofia they tell you that they are all Bulgarians and in Athens they tell you they are all Greeks. The truth seems to be that the farmers and peasants generally are Bulgarians, while the merchants, traders and people in the towns are for the most part Greek. Then in Salonika there are 80,000 Jews who try to keep out of the trouble altogether.

The Bulgarians and Macedonians of Bulgarian stock are practically slaves and speak a sort of Russian.

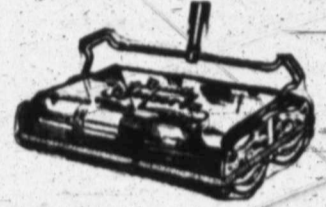

They are a strong, vigorous looking race who have very little history and believe that the future has great things for them.

The Greek Macedonians are troubled by having too much history. They will tell you that Macedonia ought to belong to Greece because Alexander the Great was a Macedonian. But the Bulgarians answer that all this is ancient history and that the graveyards do not vote. Could they have an election, they say, the ballots would show that most of the people of Macedonia are of Bulgarian nationality.

The Albanians are proud of the fact that they are the oldest race in Europe. There were Albanians in Albania before there were Greeks in Athens, and the Albanian language shows traces of a more ancient origin than Greek.

The Turks never really conquered them, but after fighting for 200 years persuaded many of them to accept Mohammedanism in return for which they were granted the privilege of keeping up their old tribal

form of government, of practically paying no taxes and of not being obliged to send conscripts to the Turkish army.

Every Albanian is a traveling arsenal of guns, pistols and knives. He

is usually at vendetta with someone and usually dies with boots on. The Turks are a good deal afraid of them and never enter their country if they can help it.

Just north of Albania are about a

million Servians in a district called Old Serbia, who are still under Turkish rule. While both Greeks and Bulgarians are trying to get Macedonia, Serbia is maneuvering all the time to try to get Old Serbia.
