

AMERICA'S FIRST LAWYER

B. A. W. MACY.

About 1641 Thomas Lechford came over from England and set up for the practice of law in Boston. He made a failure of it, partly for want of clients, but mainly because the governor and magistrates violently opposed him. They had no use for lawyers, believing themselves perfectly competent to handly all controversies that might arise in the colony. The Puritan fathers in England held lawyers in abhorrence. John Rogers, the famous Puritan preacher of London, spoke of "the incretible wickedness of that profession, and their guiltiness of all manner of sins which the mation lies under." This being the opinion of the Puritan leaders in England, no wonder the brethren in Boston determined to exclude them. Up to the time of the Revolutionary war lawyers were generally looked upon in this country as Asuited to good society. Though e failed in the legal profession. Lechford wrote a good book, which he called "Plain Dealing:

-THE-615 8th St. NEW WAYS OF COOKING LAMB MARRIAGE RITES IN ARMENIA

Many Prefer, for a Change, to Have the Meat Taste Like Vension -Some Recipes.

Pull off all the skin from a leg of lamb; put it in an earthen dish and pour over it a quart of sour milk (well beaten). Add some sliced onion, a slice of lemon, six pepper corns, one bay leaf and some salt. Leave the meat in the dish from five to eight days and turn it once a day. Then wash off the milk and lard the meat with strips of bacon. In roasting pan put remnants of the bacon, a piece of butter and some rinds of pumpernickel or rye bread, a little onion and sliced carrot. Roast one hour; while roasting add a cup of sour cream.

Another Way.-Take off all the fat and skin from a leg of lamb and lard it with strips of bacon, on which some pepper has been put. Put the meat in an earthen dish and add some onion, two bay leaves, some carrots and some peppers; then pour over it a quart of white vinegar and turn daily for four days. Without washing, put the meat in the roasting pan and brown in butter. Roast one hour. gradually adding some of the vinegar

in which the meat has been pickled. A Simpler Way .- Skin a leg of lamb and take off all the fat. Soak a napkin in vinegar and leave it around the meat for three days, taking care that the cloth never gets dry. It is best to put fresh vinegar on every day. The fourth day lard the meat and let it remain in buttermilk one day. Then dry off and fry in butter. Add some sweet cream to the gravy.

To Restore Color Bleached by Acid.

When color on a fabric has been accidentally or otherwise destroyed by acid, ammonia is applied to neutralize or counteract the effect of the acid, after which an application of chloroform will in almost all cases restore the original color. The application of ammonia is common, but that of chloreform is not so well known. In the case of your fine state-colored serge skirt discolored by using strong oxalic acid to remove fruit stains. touch the spots lightly, using, if possible, a fine brush, or a bit of cotton pad on the plain end of a match. Have the pad almost dry and see that it affects every part of the stained place, then apply the chloroform in the same way. Afterward press the injured portion under a cloth using a cool iron and your skirt will be nice-

Put the butter and milk into a pan, add the tomatees and chilles, cook for a few minutes and mix a well-beaten egg with it. Then cook until the mixture is the thickness of buttered 'eggs Serve on slices of buttered toast and sprinkle fried bread crumbs on the

Filling. Dissolve one square of bitter chocoate, grated, in a dish placed in boilng water. Whip the whites of two eggs o a stiff froth. Pour a half cupful boilng water over one cupful of granuated sugar and cook until it spins fine hreads. Turn the melted sugar slowy into the beaten eggs and whip unil the mixture is cool. Add the melted hocolate and whip until a smooth, frothy cream, then whip in a half teapoonful of vanilla. This will be suffielent for the top and filling of the

Creamed Eggs-Mushrooms. Cook two tablespoons of chopped nushrooms and one tablespoon of chopped onion in one tablespoon of butter for five minutes, taking care not to let it brown. Then stir in one ta blespoon of flour and add slowly onehalf pint of hot, white stock; pepper and salt to taste, and let wok gently for four minutes. Take six hard-bolled eggs and cut the whites of three into rings; chop the remaining three whites and cut into quarters: Mix the chopper whites and yolks with the sauce; turn into a platter and garnish with the rings.

Canned Cucumbers. CURIOUS BITS OF HISTORY

AMERICA'S FIRST LAWYER.

B. A. W. MACY. About 1641 Thomas Lechford came over from England and set up for the practice of law in Boston. He made a failure of it, partly for want of clients, but mainly because the governor and magistrates violently opposed him. They had no uses for lawyers, believing themselves perfectly competent to handly all controversies that might arise in the colony. The Puritan fathers in England held lawyers in abhorrence. John Rogers, the famous Puritan preacher of London, spoke of "the incredible wickedness of that profession, and their guiltiness of all manner of sins which the nation lies under." This being the opinion of the Puritan leaders in England, no wonder the brethren in Boston determined to exclude them. Up to the time of the Revolutionary war lawyers were generally looked upon in this country as unsuited to good society. Though he failed in the legal profession, Lechford wrote a good book, which he called "Plain Dealing; Or, News from New England."



NEW WAYS OF COOKING LAMB MARRIAGE RITES IN ARMENIA

Country.

Pull off all the skin from a leg of amb; put it in an earthen dish and pour over it a quart of sour milk (well beaten). Add some sliced onion, a slice of lemon, six pepper corns, one bay leaf and some salt. Leave the meat in the dish from five to eight days and turn it once a day. Then wash off the milk and lard the meat with strips of bacon. In roasting pan ut remnants of the bacon, a piece of outter and some rinds of pumpernickel or rye bread, a little onion and sliced carrot. Roast one hour; while roasting add a cup of sour cream.

Another Way .- Take off all the fat and skin from a leg of lamb and lard it with strips of bacon, on which some pepper has been put. Put the meat in an earthen dish and add some onlon, two bay leaves, some carrots and some peppers; then pour over it quart of white vinegar and turn daily for four days. Without washing, put the meat in the roasting pan and brown in butter. Roast one hour. gradually adding some of the vinegar

in which the meat has been pickled. A Simpler Way.—Skin a leg of lamb and take off all the fat. Soak a napkin in vinegar and leave it around the meat for three days, taking care that the cloth never gets dry. It is best to put fresh vinegar on every day. The fourth day lard the meat and let it remain in buttermilk one day. Then dry off and fry in butter. Add some sweet cream to the gravy.

To Restore Color Bleached by Acid. When color on a fabric has been ac-cidentally or otherwise destroyed by acid, ammonia is applied to neutralize or counteract the effect of the acid, after which an application of chloroform will in almost all cases restore the original color. The application of ammonia is common, but that of chloroform is not so well known. In the ease of your fine slate-colored serge skirt discolored by using strong oxalic acid to remove fruit stains. touch the spots lightly, using, if possible, a fine brush, or a bit of cotton pad on the plain end of a match. Have the pad almost dry and see that it affects every part of the stained place, then apply the chloroform in the same way. Afterward press the injured portion under a cloth using a cool fron and your skirt will be nice-

Two Dainty Salads.

A good salad is made by covering crisp hearts of lettuce with chopped olives and sticed red Spanish peppers. On top put shredded cucumber marinated in French dressing and garnish

Creamed Eggs-Mushrooms. Cook two tablespoons of chopped mushrooms and one tablespoon of chopped onion in one tablespoon of butter for five minutes, taking care not to let it brown. Then stir in one tablespoon of flour and add slowly onehalf pint of hot, white stock; pepper and salt to taste, and let cook gently for four minutes. Take six hard-bolled eggs and cut the whites of three into rings; chop the remaining three whites and cut into quarters. Mix the chopper whites and yolks with the sauce; turn into a platter and garnish

Canned Cucumbers. Put green cucumbers in salt water over night; put vinegar, not too strong, n a granite kettle, with mixed spices let come to a boil; drop in the cu cumbers; let them come to a bolling point: fill glass jars that have been well heated, to a two-quart can, put in one tablespoonful of granulated sugar; then-pour over them the hot vinegar, and seal; these are as crisp and tender as when fresh picked.

Little Tale of the First Days of

der the System in the New York Post Office Described by H. G. Pearson.

By E. J. EDWARDS.

"It was in the New York city postoffice, in 18-, that the first attempt was made to establish in this country genuine civil service. The attempt was purely voluntary, in the sense that it was not commanded by law. But we thought that, if civil service could be shown to be entirely feasible in so large an office as that of New York, it would be found feasible in every department of the government." said the late Henry G. Pearson, who was postmaster of New York under Garfield, Arthur and Cleveland. Mr. Pearson was assistant postmaster at the time Postmaster Thomas L. James established civil service in the New York post office, and the scope and plan of the system were worked out by Mr. Pearson.

"At first, we met with a good many embarrassments," Mr. Pearson continued, "but all of them were overcome with no great difficulty, except ing one. That, in fact, was finally overcome by ignoring it. It had its very humorous side, and I think that in the entire history of civil service there is not to be found another incident so deliciously funny as was this, "One day not long after the service had been established, there entered the room which had been set apart for the civil service examiners, a very jolly-faced German, blue-eyed, blondewhiskered, and of powerful physique. As he entered he said cheerily: This is the place where they send me,

"He was told to take a seat for a few moments, and wait until our medical examiner could be called in. He waited patiently, I should say for 20 minutes. Then the medical examiner came in and, beckoning to the waiting German, led the way to a place which had been partitioned off by means of a portiere. The doctor said to the German, 'Now you must take off your clothes.' The German replied, I take off my clothes already, bey?" and the doctor said it was necessary, since he would have to submit to a physical examination.

"The German obeyed and stood perfectly nude before the doctor. He submitted patiently and cheerfully to the thumping of his chest; to the taking of his pulse, and to the test of his lung capacity, and, in fact, went through a very thorough physical examination. Then the doctor told him to put on his clothes and go out into the main room and wait for further examination. The doctor also told the German that he was one of the best physical specimens he had ever examined, adding that if he passed as well in other lines as he had the physical examination, there was no doubt about his success.

"The German, after he was dressed, went out into the main room took his seat, still waiting patiently. One of the examiners came in after a while and said to him: I want you to make out an application.'

"'Vell,' replied the German, 'after do that, do I get my letter?" He handed the examiner a card. It was the customary notification card telling him that a registered letter awaited him

"Vell, be said again, 'ven do I get my letter?' "The examiner was very quick with

him. He carefully and solemnly read

the card. "Well,' he said at last, 'you have now passed the examination proper'y. If you step into the next room and present this card, you will get your letter. And do you know," continued Mr. Pearson, "that man, who had been stripped, punched and pummelled by a doctor, enduring the torture of a physical examination with perfect patience because he thought it was a part of the regulations that were necessary in the New York post office before a registered letter could be handed out, went away perfectly happy, came back in a few moments. thrust his head in at the door and said. 
