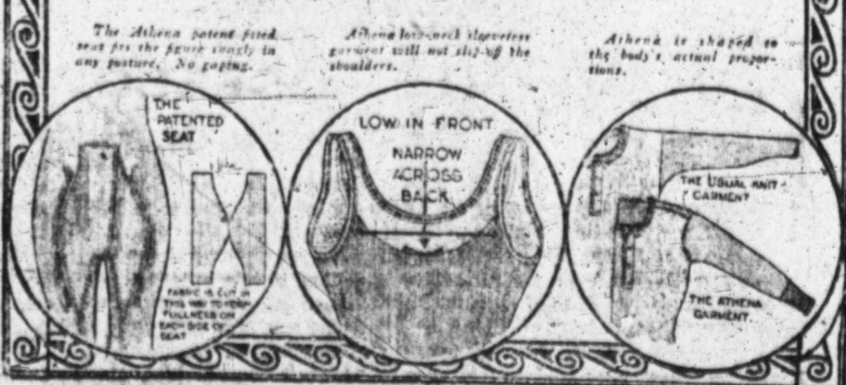

When Roeser came to the end of his career and went into bankruptcy few persons who were familiar with his career were surprised. One by one he had sold outright his best producing properties and his income began to dwindle.

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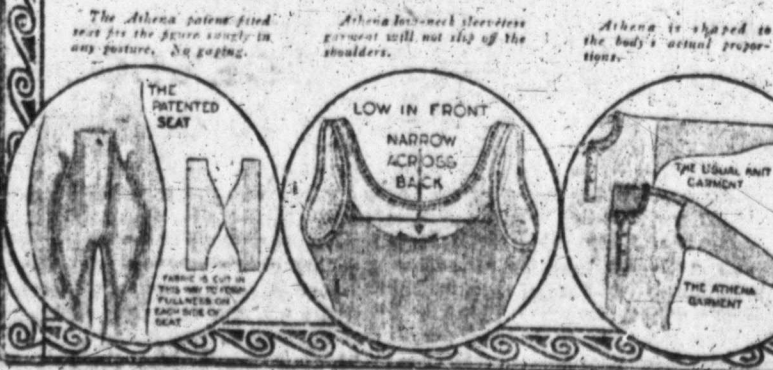

Spaulding, Caliga.

The man who is disengaged in politics will bear watching in business transactions. Those who voted in the July primaries took a pledge upon themselves to support the Democratic ticket from top to bottom.

For the love of the party, every Democrat should vote next Tuesday. Wilson should not only receive a majority of the electoral vote, but a majority of the popular vote, and if every man who is a Democrat will vote, he will get both.

If you want the State of Texas to be more generous to the old Confederate soldiers and their widows, then bear in mind when you mark your ballot next Tuesday, the 5th, to draw a black pencil mark through the last line at the very bottom of the ballot, which reads: "Against the amendment to section 51, Article 3, of the Constitution, relating to increase of Confederate pensions."

The ballot to be voted next Tuesday is printed on a sheet of paper 17x22 inches, about the same size of a page of the Times. It contains the nominees of seven political parties, each party ticket occupying a column to itself. On the first column is the Democratic ticket, second, Progressives; third, Republican; fourth, Prohibition; fifth, Socialist; sixth, Socialist Labor; seventh, Independent. The later has no names of candidates printed on it. To vote that ticket the voter must write in the names of the candidates he wishes to vote for. All the other tickets have the names of their nominees printed on them, except in cases where the nominations have been made, and if the voter desires to complete the ticket by writing in the names of the candidates in spaces left for that purpose, he has the right to do so. The Democratic ticket has but two blank spaces left on it, and that is for the office of County Surveyor and Public Weigher. No nominations were made for those two offices. At the bottom of the ballot come the four amendments to the Constitution to be voted on. The voter also must bear in mind to draw black pencil marks through all the tickets except the one he is voting, otherwise it cannot be counted.

KEEP SCISSORS IN KITCHEN

Innumerable Ways in Which They May Be of Far Greater Service Than the Knife.

A pair of scissors in the kitchen are of invaluable assistance—not the lamp scissors or the dull pair that is black with age, nor the garden pair, nor yet those with the missing points, but a new, sharp, shiny pair that will cut. It is a difficult matter, for instance, to remove the white pith from grape fruit with a knife; one digs and jabs, and finally cuts out the offending center and, incidentally, makes a hole in the fruit through which the juice drips onto the plate. Not so with the scissors. A snip, a pull, and there it is without trouble or mutilation.

And bacon! How few women can slice off the slippery rind, while with scissors every morsel can be quickly pared away without a vestige of waste. In cutting off the legs of a lobster, in breaking open the claws and cutting through the tail, the scissors will do the work uncomplainingly without the aid of the hammer and ice pick.

In preparing vegetables they are incomparable. Try them in cutting the roots from spinach, trimming rusty lettuce leaves, shaping flowers of cauliflower, and cutting up asparagus. Dice up the pineapple with them, cut up the meat and fish for salads, remove the veins from shrimps, use them for the fish fins and save your fingers.

Hamburg Steak and Potato.
 Take a pound of cold boiled potatoes, pour on them a wine glass of hot milk or water, add a big lump of dripping, cold bacon fat or butter, mash to a pulp; then beat up with a fork until quite light; take three-quarters of a pound of hamburger steak, make into small cakes, sprinkle a little finely chopped onion on top of each cake. Mash the potato pulp into thick consistency and spread over the hamburger cakes. Place in a hot oven and cook in a hot oven.

If you want the State of Texas to be more generous to the old Confederate soldiers and their widows, then bear in mind when you mark your ballot next Tuesday, the 5th, to draw a black pencil mark through the last line at the very bottom of the ballot, which reads: "Against the amendment to section 51, article 3, of the Constitution, relating to increase of Confederate pensions."

The ballot to be voted next Tuesday is printed on a sheet of paper 17x22 inches, about the same size of a page of the Times. It contains the nominees of seven political parties, each party ticket occupying a column to itself. On the first column is the Democratic ticket, second, Progressives; third, Republican; fourth, Prohibition; fifth, Socialist; sixth, Socialist Labor; seventh, Independent. The later has no names of candidates printed on it. To vote that ticket the voter must write in the names of the candidates he wishes to vote for. All the other tickets have the names of their nominees printed on them, except in cases where the nominations have been made, and if the voter desires to complete the ticket by writing in the names of the candidates in spaces left for that purpose, he has the right to do so. The Democratic ticket has but two blank spaces left on it, and that is for the office of County Surveyor and Public Weigher. No nominations were made for those two offices. At the bottom of the ballot come the four amendments to the Constitution to be voted on. The voter also must bear in mind to draw black pencil marks through all the tickets except the one he is voting, otherwise it cannot be counted.

KEEP SCISSORS IN KITCHEN

Innumerable Ways in Which They May Be of Far Greater Service Than the Knife.

A pair of scissors in the kitchen are of invaluable assistance—not the lamp scissors or the dull pair that is black with age, nor the garden pair, nor yet those with the missing points, but a new, sharp, shiny pair that will cut. It is a difficult matter, for instance, to remove the white pith from grape fruit with a knife; one digs and lobs, and finally cut-out the offending center and, incidentally, makes a hole in the fruit through which the juice drips onto the plate. Not so with the scissors. A snip, a pull, and there it is without trouble or mutilation.

And bacon! How few women can slice off the slippery rind, while with scissors every morsel can be quickly pared away without a vestige of waste. In cutting off the legs of a lobster, in breaking open the claws and cutting through the tail, the scissors will do the work uncomplainingly without the aid of the hammer and ice pick.

In preparing vegetables they are incomparable. Try them in cutting the roots from spinach, trimming rusty lettuce leaves, shaping flowers of cauliflower, and cutting up asparagus. Dice up the pineapple with them, cut up the meat and fish for salads, remove the veins from shrimps, use them for the fish fins and save your fingers.

Hamburg Steak and Potato.

Take a pound of cold boiled potatoes, pour on them a wine glass of hot milk or water, add a big lump of dripping, cold bacon fat or butter, mash to a pulp, then beat up with a fork until quite light; take three-quarters of a pound of hamburger steak, make into small cakes, sprinkle a little finely chopped onion on top of each cake. Make the potato pulp into thick, potato-cakes and add to each of the hamburger-cakes one each of these well-crowded cakes. Cook and broil 15-20 cook in a hot oven for 25 minutes.

Bain's Cakes.

Wash the brains thoroughly, first in cold and afterward in hot water; remove the skin fibers and then boil the brains with a little salt for two or three minutes. Take them up and beat them in a basin with some very finely chopped parsley, sifted sage, salt, mace, cayenne pepper, well beaten yolk of an egg and a gill of cream. Drop them in small cakes into frying pan; fry them in butter a light brown color. A little flour and grated lemon peel are sometimes added.

Cherry Vinegar.

Pour one and one-half pints of vinegar over two quarts of red cherries, let stand three days, then strain. Measure and to each pint of liquid add one pint of sugar, boil twenty minutes and bottle. Dilute with ice water when serving.

NO REPORT FROM THE "DUSSELDORF"
