## VALIANT RESISTANCE BY CHOLERA SCOURGED TURKS

### FIRST BULGARIAN ATTACK ON TURKISH FORTIFICATIONS HAS FAILED

### ATTACK IS STOPPED

Bulgarian Unable to Make Impression on the Turkish Position

50,000 Turks Surrender.

 Belgrade, Nov. 18.—The Turkish fortress of Monastir surrendered this afternoon to the Serbian troops. Fifty thousand Turkish soldiers and three generals laid down their arms.

 London, Nov. 18.—The first Bulgarian attack on the Turkish line of fortifications defending Constantinople at Tchatalja, has failed. The whole of the Bulgarian army was engaged. Every available man was moved to the front from the Bulgarian reinforcement, investing Adrianople, where they were relieved by Serbian troops.

The Bulgarians with all their artillery began their advance on the fortifications Saturday and continued the bombardment throughout Sunday. They, however, found the Turkish position so strong they could make no impression on them, and for the present the attempt has been given up.

The Turks seem to have renewed strength.

The following report of yesterday's battle appeared in the morning papers: The great battle between the Bulgarians and Turks is on all along the line of the Tchatalja fortifications. Nasta Pasha, the Turkish commander in chief, sends the following dispatch tonight:

"The battle which commenced this morning with an attack by Bulgarian infantry, lasted until one hour after sunset. The enemy, who advanced chiefly facing our right wing and our center, was repulsed by our infantry and artillery fire. Three Bulgarian batteries were destroyed."

All through the day the sound of the heavy guns was heard in Constantinople. It ceased only with darkness. The firing along the entire line was evidently preparatory to an infantry attack.

The Turkish batteries replied vigorously. The Turkish ships in the Sea of Marmora shelled the Bulgarian positions. Undoubtedly the fleet in the Black Sea also took part in the engagement, though details from that point are lacking.

In the afternoon the wind shifted and it seemed for a time as though the battle had ended, but again the booming was heard, and the movement of troops could be observed not far from the very gates to the capital. A detachment of several thousand from the Tchatalja lines was replaced by fresh troops, who had been held in reserve near the city.

The refugees behind the lines began breaking camp early in the day, and moved back toward Constantinople. The Greek villagers, who heretofore had remained admirably indifferent to events, prepared to desert their homes. While calm prevails, there was a deadly tension in the knowledge that the fate of the capital, the Turkish army and those who waited anxiously in Constantinople, was at stake.

Several members of the legations and other foreign residents witnessed the artillery duel, which they describe as magnificent, on the sea of Marmora, and the shelling from height to height across Blyuk Chekmedye lake and over the plains to-

ward the north. The flashes of the guns on both sides were visible to observers over miles of low country. Within the city every military precaution was taken. Pickets were posted at various points and patrols guarded the streets. The ambassadors held a meeting at the foreign ministry with the commanders of the Ottoman gendarmerie and devised measures for the safety of foreigners.

It was decided that detachments for the protection of foreign institutions will be landed at dawn tomorrow. They will remain concealed in the buildings and will only co-operate with the local Turkish forces should assistance be required.

The Austrian ambassador, Marquis De Pallavicini, notified the port of his determination, but emphasized the friendly character of the measures undertaken, explaining that they were in the interests of the safety of foreign subjects and institutions.

The sanitary board, at a meeting today, urged that steps be taken to prevent the armies now facing each other at Tchatalja from entering the capital, owing to the cholera epidemic. The resolution to that effect was proposed by the British delegate.

Several foreign officers who visited the lines Thursday and Friday report the situation as hopeless. The trenches are only partly dug. A huge pile of barbed wire is stacked near the endangered northern wing, never having been put to use. The troops for the most part are unable to work because cholera infected soldiers are keeping watch in the earthworks.

**Frightful Conditions Among Turkish Troops.**  
 Berlin, Nov. 16.—The liveliest imagination would not be able to depict the frightful conditions existing among the Turkish troops at Hemekeul on the line of Tchatalja, according to Major Swenger, the war correspondent of the Tagblatt. He says thousands of dead and dying lie along the road. Men with stretchers are engaged day and night gathering the dead for burial and the wounded for the hospital, he continues.

"Wherever I looked I saw the distorted faces and stiffened hands of the wounded stretched forward appealing for help. The nearer I approached the railroad station, the sadder grew the picture.

"The railroad station is a field full of dead. I saw in one car ten men, five of whom were living and the other five dead. Their faces still expressed the horrible agonies they had passed through."

"I walked among piles of corpses and among masses of groaning sick men who would soon find relief in death.

"A train about the start was overcrowded with cholera stricken men. Many of those in the cars died soon after they got on board.

"According to authentic information, the deaths from cholera number five thousand daily, along the line of Tchatalja."

According to another dispatch from Kustendje, Roumania, whence it had been sent by wireless to the Tagblatt says a thousand cholera cases and two hundred deaths occurred today among the Turkish reserves at San Stefano, where the sick and dead line indiscriminately in the street.

## CANAL OPENING MAY BE EARLIER

### FIRST SHIP WILL PROBABLY GO THROUGH UNCLE SAM'S BIG DITCH NEXT SUMMER

### PROGRESS SATISFACTORY

Notwithstanding Handicap of Big Slides Canal Will Be Finished Ahead of Time

 Washington, D. C., Nov. 18.—Sometime next summer or fall, no exact date being specified, a vessel will pass from the Atlantic to the Pacific across what is now the Isthmus of Panama, which consequently must disappear from the world's geography and by the same human agency, the Western Hemisphere will be divided into two continents. The vessel will not be the Oregon nor any other famous ship, but will be one of the many small water craft in daily use by the canal builders; and probably the only passengers will be Col. Geo. W. Goethals, and the staff of American Engineers, who for the past eight years have been carrying on the greatest engineering work the world has ever seen. It will be later than that, anywhere from six months to a year, perhaps, before the formal opening of the waterway will take place and a naval fleet headed by the famous old Oregon, will pass through into the Western Ocean and the Canal may be fairly said to be open to trade.

These facts are not of official record as yet; the date of January 1, 1915, still stands for the opening predicted by Col. Goethals. But that the opening will be anticipated to a great extent has been promised by the Canal builders in unofficial statements, and now comes a clear indication of their purpose to advance the opening date, in the annual report of the Canal Commission, just published. It is disclosed while the completion of the great locks by January 1st next will not be possible, owing to contract delays, within six months thereafter the channel will be finished, while to insure the safe passage of the locks, the contractor has been called upon to finish the gates in one flight first, so that if the rest of the work is in condition passage of ship can be permitted without waiting for the completion of the other flights. This statement will be understood, when it is known that the great locks being built in duplicate; side by side, not only to add to the capacity of the canal but to insure its continuance in operation in case of a serious accident to a ship in one of the locks.

The report shows a most satisfactory state of progress of the whole great work, though in view of the fact that it is dated September 10th last, the figures regarding excavation; placing of concrete, erection of dams and locks and subsidiary works are not as recent as those contained in the regular monthly reports. ## MERIDIAN ROAD MAN PRAISES WICHITA FALLS

### Wishes There Were Similar Bunches in Other Towns Along the Route

A letter from the secretary of the Meridian road association to D. P. Talley of this city pays high tribute to the energy of this city in getting on the route and asks for continued action on this city's part. The letter was from John C. Nicholson to Mr. Talley who is chairman for this county. In part it follows:

"Dear Sir: I have yours of the 8th and the newspaper clippings you sent me and I want to congratulate you on the action taken at Waco, and I hope you have pinned your faith to officers who will push the Texas division of the Meridian road to a reality in the near future. Mr. E. L. Brown, a banker of Chester, Neb., writes me as follows:

"After a very pleasing trip of eight days, going to El Reno and Oklahoma City and then doubling back home over the same routing, I am feeling very enthusiastic over the future of the Meridian road in connection with the Chisholm trail. I am more and more convinced that it is the beginning of something that will grow amazingly during the next five years and that we hardly dare prophesy the extent of its development."

"I think more and more of Wichita Falls and Wichita Falls people every day and I wish we had a similar bunch of people at other places on the line. I hope you can extend your influence both north and south of you to the end that the Meridian road will be a good road across Southern Oklahoma and Northern Texas."

## FIVE ESCAPE FROM THE CITY JAIL

### They Pried Out Bars and Climbed Onto Adjoining Structure, Thence To the Ground

There were twenty cases on the docket for the Monday "morning after" but when the officers had rounded up the bunch from the cells there was a shortage of five. Fifteen there was a remorseful and sad-eyed, but five had followed the lead of the Arab in the poem and "silently stolen away."

Investigation showed that they had pried out the bars in a cell window on the second floor of the jail and climbed out on the framework of the Voss-Stout building in process of construction. From there it was easy to reach the ground and the five were gone.

While the city jail is not so easy to get out of that it is possible to dig one's way to liberty with a tea spoon, as happened in the Fort Worth jail, it is apparently nearly as easy of access as it is of ingress, which last is fairly easy. This is the second recent escape from the jail and sterner measures may be found necessary.

## NO WOMEN IN THE COURT ROOM

### ENTIRE ABSENCE OF GENTLER SEX MARKED OPENING OF TESTIMONY IN SNEED TRIAL

### UNDERTAKER ON THE STAND

Fred P. Mueller First Witness—Sneed Studies Jurors' Faces With Interest

Fort Worth, Texas, Nov. 18.—Every seat in the court room where John Beal-Sneed is on trial for the second time, charged with the murder of Captain Al G. Boyce was filled long before court was called to order at 10 o'clock, but not a woman was present.

The same relatives of Sneed and Capt. Boyce who have attended the court during the selection of the jury, were present this morning. Sneed sat in his accustomed place behind his counsel. Will Boyce, son of Capt. Boyce was with the county attorney and the special prosecutors. Lynn Boyce, the picturesque West Texas cowboy and another son of Capt. Boyce paced the floor until court opened, then he took a seat at the press table facing Sneed.

Sneed pleaded "not guilty" emphasizing the word "not." Sneed seemed to study the faces of the jury with new interest. The first witness sworn was Fred P. Mueller, an undertaker, who testified relative to the disposition of Capt. Boyce's body after he was shot.

For the first time since his eventful trip to Amarillo that ended in the killing of Al G. Boyce Jr., Sept. 14, John Beal Sneed visited his family yesterday in Calvert. Both Mrs. Sneed and their two little girls are living with relatives in that city.

It was Sneed's first day of relaxation since the killing of young Boyce. He was confined for nearly two months in the county jail at Amarillo and was released only last Sunday at noon, after the judgment of "no bail" made in the district court at the Panhandle city had been set aside by the higher courts.

The morning following his release, his second trial for the killing of Al G. Boyce Sr., in the lobby of the Metropolitan hotel, Jan. 13, 1912, was begun, and during the week's tedious work of examining witnesses, he has been constantly on hand. The jury was completed Saturday afternoon and a day—a whole day—of real relaxation was permitted him.

Accompanied by his brother, Marvin Sneed who lives at Calvert, he left for that city Saturday night, returning late Sunday night.

Joe Sneed, another brother, who has been in Fort Worth since the second trial for the killing of the young Boyce began, was reticent regarding the trip. Further than to say it was made for the purpose of visiting the family, he would say nothing.

## PRESIDENT ELECT REACHES BERMUDA

### Steamer Carrying His Party Arrives At Island This Morning—Wilson Feeling Fine

New York, Nov. 18.—A cable message to the Quebec Steamship Company's offices here announces the arrival of the steamer Bermudian with Governor Wilson and party aboard at Hamilton, Bermuda at 8:30 o'clock this morning.

The first stage of the President-elect vacation ended when he reached Hamilton, Gov. Wilson has been favored by fair weather and he has thoroughly enjoyed his stay at sea. After a long nap in his cabin Sunday afternoon, the President-elect spent most of the evening with his friends, telling stories.

Mrs. Wilson who was feeling the strain of the campaign has spent most of her time since the steamer sailed in her state room. She sent word that she was not sea sick but tired.

Welcome For Wilson at Hamilton.  
 Hamilton, Bermuda, Nov. 18.—When Governor Wilson and party arrived here, Alderman Black, representing the city of Hamilton, invited Mr. Wilson and his party to accompany him to Hamilton, where an address of welcome was to be represented. Large crowds of people lined the streets and wharves awaiting the arrival of the President-elect—and all public and private buildings were decorated with flags and bunting.

## WORTHAM WILL DELIVER ELKS' MEMORIAL ADDRESS

### Fort Worth Editor Accepts Invitation of Local Lodge—Service Will Be Held December 1st.

The local lodge of Elks is making preparations for its annual Memorial day services, which will be held at the Wichita Theatre on Sunday, December 1. L. J. Wortham, of Fort Worth, will deliver the memorial address, while the eulogy of Judge S. M. Foster, the only member of the order who has died during the year, will be by some local attorney.

There will be a number of musical features, including quartette and solo vocal numbers, and several instrumental selections. The first Sunday in December of each year is observed by Elks throughout the country as Memorial day.

Since the lodge was organized here, three of its members have died. They were Dr. R. Robertson, Joe O'Donohue and Judge S. M. Foster.

POLL OF LEGISLATORS ON SENATORSHIP.  
 Galveston, Texas, Nov. 18.—It is stated here upon seemingly reliable authority that a prominent State official who is very close to Gov. Colquitt has been commissioned to make a poll of the members-elect of the Thirty-Third Legislature to ascertain their attitude toward the appointment of Col. R. M. Johnston of Houston to succeed to the unexpired term of Senator J. W. Bailey, in the event of the latter's resignation, which has been forecast. Gov. Colquitt has stated that should Senator Bailey resign he would immediately name Col. Johnston for the place, at the same time saying he did not know Senator Bailey's intention. Some of Col. Johnston's friends, at the same time, are willing for him to accept the honor without assurance that the Legislature would elect him upon its convening. Should Senator Bailey resign before the assembling of the Legislature on the second Tuesday in January, it would devolve upon the Governor to fill the vacancy by appointment, but the appointment would hold good only until the meeting of the Legislature, which body would then be required to fill the place by electing some one to serve until March 4, at which time the regular term, to which Hon. Morris Sheppard has been chosen will begin.

If it be true that this poll is being taken, and the authority for the statement is such as to leave little doubt as to its accuracy it seems that there is ground for the rumors as to Senator Bailey's intention to resign.

WANTS OFFICE DISCONTINUED TO KEEP DEMOCRAT OUT.  
 Chickasha, Okla., Nov. 18.—There is one postoffice in Oklahoma that no Democrat ever will fill. T. W. Nunn, postmaster at Lucile, and owner of the town of Lucile, since the election of Woodrow Wilson has resigned his office and asked that the postoffice at that place be discontinued. Nunn, who is a staunch Republican, says he does not want to be succeeded by a Democrat, and rather than have such a thing happen, he will have the postoffice discontinued.

## GIRLS' SLAYER STILL LIVING

### WITH BULLET HOLES THROUGH HIS LUNG STERLING WHITE CANNOT LIVE LONG

### RING ON HER FINGER

Roused the Breeding Passions of Young Man and He Blotted Out Life of Sweetheart

Although he has two bullet holes through his lung within an inch of his heart, Sterling White, the slayer of his sweetheart, Beulah Lee, was still alive this morning at Byers, where he was taken following the shooting Saturday night. Doctors say his wounds are fatal and his death is expected within the next twenty-four hours. He has been told he cannot live and wants to die. He realizes what he has done and has asked for the prayers of his friends.

White regained consciousness a short time after he was picked up by those who found him lying in a field about 200 yards from the Webb house where he shot Miss Lee. Sunday morning he told friends at his bedside he had never had the thought of the girl out of his mind since the date set for their marriage, August 11th, which was postponed by Miss Lee, who believed her duty to her father demanded that she remain with him.

White said he had often thought of killing the girl and himself and that this thought became more persistent as time went by. He said he had planned to kill her sometime when he found her alone but that when he saw another ring had replaced the one he had given her there before the other guests at the party something in him crashed and he had no knowledge what happened afterward.

The funeral of his victim was held in the cemetery at Byers Sunday afternoon and was attended by a large crowd of people who had known and admired the pretty young woman whose life was sacrificed in duty. The funeral sermon was delivered by Rev. H. F. Jones, pastor of the Baptist church at Byers.

The girl was the oldest child of the family and was like a mother to the younger children. Her father is overwhelmed with grief at her death.

## THANKSGIVING SERMON BY REV. M'FADDEN

### Union Services Will Be Held at First M. E. Church, Corner Seventh and Lamar

The pastors of the city have begun arrangements for the union services on Thanksgiving morning and it has been decided to hold them at the M. E. Church, corner Seventh and Lamar. Rev. C. L. McFadden, pastor of the Central Presbyterian Church, will preach the Thanksgiving sermon and special musical and other features will be provided. All the congregations are expected to participate in the services.

In connection with the Thanksgiving services, steps will be taken at the meeting to put the united charities of the city on a solid financial basis, so that the suffering and distress which every city finds among its poor in cold weather will be alleviated. It is hoped to raise sufficient funds to provide for the needy through the winter season.

## WIFE'S THIRST LANDS COUPLE IN JAIL

### Search For Bottle of Beer on Sunday—Results in Vagrancy Charge—Man Still in Jail

An overpowering thirst for beer on the part of his wife got a traveling man into trouble yesterday. His wife wanted a bottle of beer and wanted it bad and so they went together to that part of the city that knows no Sunday. There both were arrested for vagrancy and this morning in the city court the man was fined \$25 and the woman released on her own recognisance.

The man had \$20 in his possession, but instead of applying it on his fine, he gave it to his wife and went to his cell. He will probably appeal the case. The woman is decidedly pretty and both she and the man have the appearance of respectability.

While it is no secret that beer might be obtained on Sunday in that part of the city in question, this is the first case on record where a man took his wife there in search of a drink.

## Brownwood and Gainesville Tie for Clean Town Prize

Dallas, Texas, Nov. 18.—The scores in Texas "cleanest town" contest resulted in a tie between towns of the first, second and third classes, according to a statement by Dr. M. M. Carrick, who has the work in charge and a re-inspection will be necessary to determine the winners of the prizes offered. Brownwood and Gainesville led for the first prize of \$500; this class includes towns of from 4,000 to 10,000 population. Ballinger, Gonzales and New Braunfels have an even score for the second prize of \$300, which includes the towns of from 2,000 and 4,000 population. Hico, Hubbard City, McGregor and Memphis led for the \$200 prize. The re-inspection will begin at once being by Dr. Carrick, who leaves Dallas tomorrow.

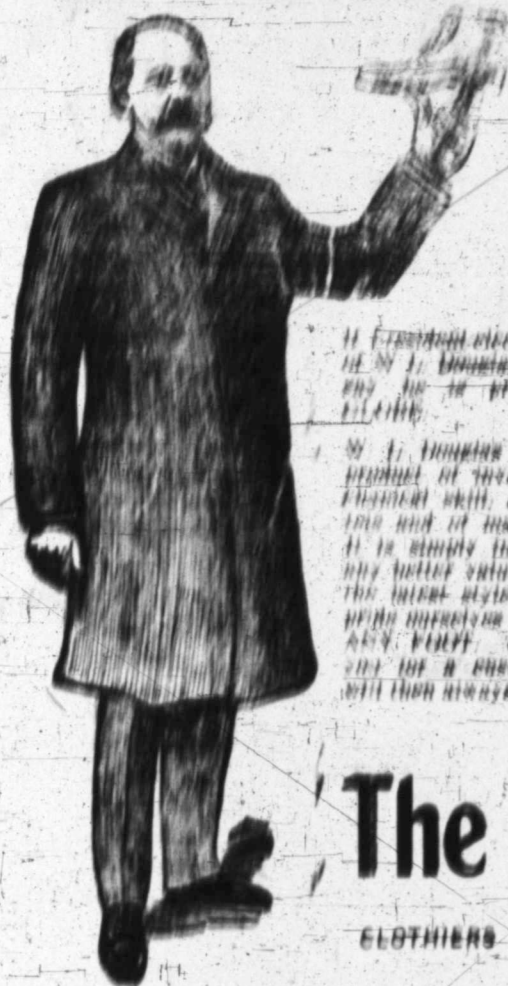
## Generally Fair Weather Forecasted

Washington, Nov. 18.—Indications are that the prevailing fair weather will continue during the week over the central, southern and extreme western portions of the country; with a tendency toward somewhat higher temperatures by Tuesday, according to the weather bureau's weekly bulletin.

Rains or snows will set in early over the North Pacific States and the far Northwest, and continue during much of the week, the bulletin predicts, "and extending westward over the northern portion of the country, reaching the upper lake region about the middle of the week, and then the eastern districts toward the end of the week. #### Developments Expected at Petrolia.

Petrolia, Texas, Nov. 18.—After several months of comparative dullness the Petrolia field promises some interesting developments next week.

Chief interest is centered in Elve Rivers No. 1 on the Campbell lease northwest of Petrolia. Drilling has been stopped in this well so that preparations can be made to drill into the sand. Byers No. 7, more than a mile away, is the nearest producing well. The formation is said to be the same in the Elve Rivers well as in Byers No. 7. Slade No. 1 on the Elliott is now down about 800 feet and is progressing nicely.

The Producers Company is getting ready to start its Byers No. 11, 300 feet east of Byers No. 7 and 200 feet north of Developers No. 1.

The Developers Company is ready to offset Byers No. 11. R. C. Sanders will put down their well.

The Big Pasture Oil and Gas Company had a fishing job the first part of the week, having lost its tools in the well. These were recovered Tuesday, however, and drilling has been resumed. The company is now at a depth of 1,450 feet with indications that are very encouraging. The well is cased the entire depth and work is expected to proceed expeditiously.—Frederick Leader.

Work of repairing the boiler at the Northwest Electric Company's well on the Finley lease, has been completed and drilling has been resumed. Traces of oil are reported to have been found at a depth of between 900 and 1,000 feet, indicating that the company is very likely on the road to a good strike. The company's extensive lease holdings will place it in an admirable position if it should bring in a well. The company resumed drilling several days ago at a depth of 950 feet, and is now working in a promising looking shale.—Frederick Leader.

#### Disclaim Standard Affiliation.

Austin, Texas, Nov. 18.—President John Sealey and Attorneys E. D. Cavin of Galveston and George C. Greer of Beaumont filed with Attorney General Wathall more records and further asserted to him that the Magnolia Petroleum Company is no way connected with the Standard Oil Company or its interests. The conference was an extended one.

Mr. Sealey has been indicted by a federal grand jury at Dallas, for an alleged violation of the Sherman anti-trust act. The Magnolia Petroleum Company purchased the interests of the old Security Oil Company and other properties after their anti-trust suit. In the recent New York case the Magnolia Petroleum Company was brought into prominence with regard to the handling of its securities.

Mr. Wathall received evidence from the New York hearing. He was refused the evidence on which the Dallas federal indictments were returned. He has several times been told by officials of the Magnolia Petroleum Company that they have in no way offended the trust laws.

An Austin firm is said to have gotten from the district clerk the papers in the old Security Oil Company case, in which the state collected penalties and imposed an "ouster." The fact that this record is being delved into would indicate that a suit may be forthcoming very shortly.

#### FIRE CUTS MOTION PICTURE THEATRE THIS MORNING.

### CANAL OPENING MAY BE EARLIER

(Continued From Page One)

these slides, and that is to dig them out as they occur, though some help is gained by terracing the upper banks. That is because the geological formation changes so frequently and suddenly that no other effective treatment has been found. So unstable is the earth that the material in one part of the cut begins to move on an inclination as low as 1 on 7, owing to the mass of stratified rock sliding over a layer of lignite. One slide now in motion, near the bridge of Culebra covers an area of 63 acres, from which 2,710,000 yards have already been removed, leaving 1,300,000 still to be handled.

Then there is another little slide of no less than 50 acres on the opposite side of the canal. The result of these earth movements, which are quite exceptional in engineering practice, has been to leave the canal in its deepest portions, with very flat slopes. The encouraging feature of the heavy work at that point found in the statement in the report "that none of the slides which occurred during the year would have interfered with the passage of ships had the canal been in operation."

Already the appropriations made by Congress for the canal have run into big figures, the total up to June 30 last being \$293,561,468, and since that date there have been additional appropriations, exclusive of those for fortifications, amounting to \$28,960,000, making the great total of \$322,521,468. On June 30 of all these appropriations, the engineers had expended 69 per cent of the total estimated cost of the canal.

Of even greater interest from an engineering point of view, than the vast but commonplace work of excavation in Culebra cut, was the work of constructing the great locks at Gatun, and Miraflores, and Pedro Miguel, for there many novel problems have been solved, and lock machinery constructed of special designs of a magnitude never before heard of. For instance, so big are the valves at the side of the locks that a test showed that it required a pull of over ten tons on the stem to operate these valves. All this work is done electrically, and here again the engineers were confronted with new difficulties. Owing to the peculiar climatic conditions on the Isthmus, with tropical heat and extreme humidity, and the deteriorating effect of these conditions on the insulation of electrical machinery, the ordinary insulation proved unreliable and the engineers found it necessary to make a great number of experiments, no less than 16 sample motors being pitted against one another. It was an awful test for dynamo and motor builders to have their machines required to operate for a period of ten days in a building filled with steam at a temperature of 50 degrees centigrade and having the motor cases filled with water for five hours at 30 degrees. But finally the American motor builders responded and suitable apparatus is being installed.

These electric motors under tests, are now swinging the great gates of the canal, each weighing very many tons and as tall and broad as a great sky scraping building in the remarkable time of one minute and forty eight seconds. Incidentally it appears that to make these gates, the iron workers must drive and head 5,570,000 rivets. The pivots of these great locks are being made of a special grade of steel and bronze, not only for strength, but to protect them against corrosion, a very necessary precaution in view of the fact that they will always be submerged in sea water after the canal is open. To guard against galvanic action, zinc rings are also placed on the bronze bushings.

To supply the power to operate the gates and sluice valves in the locks, and furnish current for the electric locomotives, which are to tow the steamships through the locks, a great hydro-electric station is being erected adjacent to the spillway in Gatun dam. There are three 2,250 kilowatt water turbines, and three 2,000 kilowatt generators with suitable exciters and other auxiliaries. There will be enough available water from the storage in Lake Gatun to warrant the installation of 6,000 kilowatts, though in the dry season it will be necessary to draw upon the storage. Altogether it is figured that for this electric work seven per cent of the minimum water system of the canal will be required. A part of the electricity is to be used for lighting the line of the canal. There will be concrete lamp-posts 100 feet apart throughout the entire length of each lock wall. Altogether 7,000 lamps will be installed at the locks.

Outside of the canal proper, the report shows that work has been going on rapidly in preparing harbors for the shelter of ships at each end of the waterway. The work of fortification has also been progressing well, nearly half a million yards of concrete having been placed in the mortar pits and gun emplacements during the last year. The sanitation of the Isthmus also has been maintained at the high level set by Col. William G. Georges, the chief sanitary officer, from the beginning.

### STATE DID A BUSINESS OF \$36,092,194.

By Associated Press. Austin, Texas, Nov. 18.—According to State Treasurer J. M. Edwards' annual report for the fiscal year the State did a business amounting to \$36,092,194, having on hand in cash September 1, 1911, \$647,467; receiving and transferring during the year \$18,119,072; disbursing and transferring \$17,973,122, and having on hand in cash the first of this fiscal year \$793,417.

The value of the permanent school fund is placed at \$70,926,455, including \$1,172,817 of railroad bonds held by the supreme court of the United States to be invalid, thus reducing the total valuation to \$69,753,638.

Treasurer Edwards says that the State ad valorem tax rate is not sufficient to meet the general revenue demands and suggests that the law be amended to provide for deficiencies. Unsold school land belonging to the general revenue amounts to \$1,636,176 and the value of school bonds held is \$1,702,311. Assets of the State with the exception of \$793,417 in cash and \$149,844 in the bank guaranty fund are in bonds and total \$24,715,785.

### LAWTON CONTRACTS FOR RINGLING'S ROAD

Believed There Proposed Line From Ardmore Is In Reality a Frisco

Each with an outlet to the Pacific ocean. The contract was finally agreed to by the Chamber of Commerce bids the city of Lawton to the payment of a cash bonus of \$50,000, together with a ten mile right of way out of the city to cost not more than \$5,000, providing the Ringling road does not use other tracks out of the city more than a distance of six miles. If the Rock Island tracks are used for a greater distance than six miles, the bonus will be cut to \$20,000.

This belief is given additional color from the fact that the prospective builder went from here to Duncan to secure a contract with that town. But there is a question of right of way between Ardmore and Waurika—once owned by the Frisco, which may have to be settled before the definite route of the road is finally settled.

The best pasturage in many years is afforded by the growing wheat which in most fields has gotten a splendid start with the prospect that it will furnish pasture all winter. Barn yards all over the country are stacked full of maize, alfalfa, corn and sorghum and stock of all kinds are sleek and fat. While the wheat average may be less than in some former years, still there is a large average so that farmers are watching the season in good shape and are looking forward to the next year with more enthusiasm than for a long time.

Several months ago the city council adopted an ordinance providing for the removal of the street cars from the streets with their wagons, while waiting for passengers. Penalties were provided to be imposed against the drivers if they stood elsewhere. The drivers have been trying to comply with the ordinance but often they find the space specified for their stands occupied with automobiles. It was probably a weak point in the ordinance that it did not impose a penalty against automobile owners for leaving their automobiles standing on the street set apart for the draymen. However, council has for the other fellow ought to make this necessary.

As regards the distribution of the Federal office, the Times, being a Democratic newspaper, wants to see a Democrat substituted for every Republican now holding office just as soon as it can be done legally and fairly. The Republicans have been in power now for sixteen years, and during that time they were entitled to hold the office and have held them. For doing so they cannot be criticized. It was their right to hold them, and they were not at all slow to stand on their rights. It is not likely that any Republican now holding federal office will be removed before the expiration of his term, provided he is making good, but the Times does not believe that in any instance a Republican officer should be permitted to hold over under a Democratic administration for a greater length of time than the Democrat whom the Republican succeeded, held over under a Republican administration. That may or may not be the view of this matter that President Wilson will take, but it is the fair and just way of dealing with a political matter of that nature, and Democracy has always stood for fairness and justice, and a square deal all around. Doubtless there will be cases where duties will be fixed or changed in such a way as to make it appear that the Republican officeholder is entitled to serve under a Democratic administration for a greater length of time than he, or some other Republican who succeeded a Democrat, served under the administration of Mr. McKinley, who was the Republican president that succeeded Mr. Cleveland. In such cases as that, if there should be any, the Democrats effected will be perfectly justifiable in petitioning for the removal of the Republican and the appointment of a Democrat to succeed him. Democrats, as a rule, only want what is coming to them, and that is the matter, and they will have never reason to expect under a Democratic administration.

In this issue of the Times will be seen a notice to the effect that there will be introduced in the next legislative session a bill to permit the M. & T. Railway Company of Texas to lease certain other lines of railroad in the State of Texas now owned by the following: The Wichita Falls Railway Company, the Wichita Falls & Wellington Railway Co., the Wichita Falls & Southern Railway Co., and the Wichita Falls and Northwestern Railway Co. of Texas. The M. & T. Railway Company of Texas at the present time has a lease on the Wichita Falls and Henrietta Ry. Co. The purpose of this law will be to permit it to lease the other three little Wichita Falls lines in the State of Texas. In the opinion of the Times, this bill is in the interest of the public welfare of the State and should meet with favorable action by the legislature. Speaking for Wichita Falls, the M. & T. Railway Co. has always been its friend. The automobile factory and the two glass factories were made possible for Wichita Falls by reason
