Life was back to normal for the 13-year-old Berend who only days before had wowed the crowd at Ft. Worth's Southwestern Exposition and Livestock Show

The Friona FFA member exhibited the Grand Champion steer in the junior steer show the prestigious Ft. Worth event. Brittany and her 1,314 pound steer Rupert shattered the previous record for a grand champion, going for \$151,000 at the Saturday sale. The price was \$18,500 higher than the previous sale record set last year. According to the Ft. Worth Star-Telegram, just nine years ago the grand champion sold for \$55,000.

Brittany told the Star-Telegram she was calm in the sale arena but the hard part was saying goodbye to Rupert. Her mother Sandra Berend said, "We go through this every year but this one is special. He would been special if he had finished dead last "

Brittany's younger brother Jason also had a shorthorn in the show. He placed fourth, made the sale, and brought \$4.50 a pound according to dad Roddy. Kelby Monroe of Friona also had a lamb that made the Ft. Worth sale.

The show judge, Scott Schaake, told the Star-Telegram that picking Rupert as the winwas as easy as picking his wife. "There has never been a perfect steer," he said, "But he's as close as any I've ever seen."

Rupert, named after the TV Survivor show personality, was one of 1,409 steers shown which makes the result all the more remarkable.

Roddy Berend loves the story of how Rupert came to live with the Berends. A little over a year ago the Berend family took some of their calves over to Hereford to get them trimmed. Roddy spotted a big

calf "the minute we drove in," he said. "Sandra knew I had my eye on this calf but she kept telling me to not even think about buying it.'

Roddy said the attraction to the big calf was too much and he bought it anyway. The calf was Rupert, who turned into a good investment, a fact that he reminded good-naturedly Sandra of this weekend in Ft.

Worth. The show halter used on Rupert is being retired by the Berends. "He was the only steer we used the show halter on so we are retiring it in his honor," Roddy said.

Brittany also won the Parmer County Junior Livestock Show steer grand champion but with a different steer which the family plans to take to the Houston Livestock Show later

Leading the list are these top three Hi-Pro Friona employees: Lazaro Herrera who has been with the company since 1979 and has an incredible 8,950 safe days worked (24.4 years). Raymond Spencer, with Hi-Pro since 1983, has logged 7,700 safe days worked (21.1 years) and Joe Santellana, employed in 1975, has worked 7,500 safe

Inside we put our names on a list. They said it would be about 20 minutes. It took about 15 minutes before they seated us at one of those IHOP booths designed for six people.

Our server (can't say waiter anymore) was Patrick. He was a nice clean-cut guy around 50 years-old. Mother wondered out loud why an

IHOP. He was efficient and polite and took our order which promptly got bogged down somewhere in the kitchen. When you are waiting on something minutes turn into hours. I think we must have waited 30 minutes. Others were waiting too as all the servers made the rounds of the tables giving order updates. There was plenty of coffee in the blue IHOP pot to keep us company. The eggs and pancakes were okay. IHOP is not a gourmet joint. I tried eggs benedict which should be ordered only in a fancy restaurant that knows how to prepare them.

So we did what we set out to do. We accomplished the IHOP goal and decided that next time we venture over on a Sunday morning for breakfast we'll head back the buildings on this page. to Kripple Creek.

The second thing I ac-

complished might not even be a goal. I'll have to ask Father Ed if wanting a material object and finally buying it is a goal or just fulfilling a greedy, materialistic desire. Either way, I have had my eye on a new camera lens for a long time. Last Friday I acquired it. Goal two done.

Hertner's Camera Store is on 6th Street in downtown Amarillo. It is a good, professional camera place. If you are serious about cameras and equipment and developing you should go there. I've bought a lot of stuff from them including my Nikon D100 digital SLR camera. If you want to run into the mall and buy a camera, do that. If you want to know something about the camera when you buy, try

# Iraq's elections show hope for democracy

There is little that people living in Iraq have not seen in the 5,500 years that have elapsed since the world's first literate society, Sumeria, arose on the banks of the Tigris and Euphrates rivers. But recently, the long-suffering people of this nation experienced something new – they voted in free elections.
"Now I feel that Saddam is really gone," Fatima Ibrahim told

MSNBC after casting her ballot in Irbil, in the Kurdish northern region. She was a young bride of 14 and only married three months when her husband, father, and brother were rounded up by Saddam Hussein's police and have never been seen again

This woman and millions of her fellow Iraqis refused to be intimidated by terrorist threats and went to the polls. In an election widely hailed as fair and free, over 60 percent of the Iraqi people turned out. Even Sunni Iraqis ignored called by their religious leaders to boycott the election and voted in higher than expected numbers. The election is for 13 provincial councils and the new 275seat National Assembly, which will draft a new constitution.

Neighboring Jordan watched the elections with great interest King Abdullah II offered congratulations and said the successful election proved the Iraqi people are "stronger than the extremist groups trying to destabilize Iraq".

As President Bush noted in his stirring inaugural speech, "The survival of liberty in our land increasingly depends on the success of liberty in other lands. The best hope for peace in our world is the expansion of freedom in the world."

Unfortunately, while the Iraqi people have begun their pursuit of democracy, they still face thugs who desperately want to deny this new nation freedom. Jihadists allied to Al Oaeda and remnants of the brutal regime of Saddam Hussein are trying to regain power.

We should not let the horror of these tactics obscure an important point: the terrorists fear what an Iraqi democracy would mean for their cause. The Jihadists and Baathists fear history will sweep them aside, and they are doing all they can to block the spread of

Abu Musab Al Zarqawi, the Jordanian who has publicly declared allegiance to Osama Bin Laden, and is considered the architect of attacks on U.S. and Iraqi forces, has said as much. "We have declared a fierce war on this evil principle of democracy and those who follow this wrong ideology. Anyone who tries to help set up this system is part of it."

Further, Osama Bin Laden himself, in a recent Al-Jazeera-distrib-

uted tape, urged Iraqis not to participate in the election.

The important thing to keep in mind is that the Iraqi people demonstrated in impressive numbers that, however difficult the path may be, this election was a key step toward complete self-rule and the establishment of a democratic system of government.

We should remember our own past, when, after the conclusion of the Revolutionary War, our nation was torn by, Shay's Rebellion and, later, the Whiskey Rebellion. These challenges to the new republic led some to doubt the survival of the American experiment.

The path has occasionally been rocky since then. marched, suffered ridicule, and were sometimes jailed as they sought the right to vote in the early part of the 20th Century. Only 40 years igo, African American leaders risked their lives to secure the same liberties others already enjoyed during the struggle for civil rights.

While our progress has been difficult at times, our democratic republic has not only survived; it has prospered. Today we are a beacon of hope and freedom for the world, proving that democracy is not achieved overnight. Although it sometimes seems fractious and divisive, it still provides the best form of government man has

We must bear those lessons in mind as we support the democratic process in Iraq. It may not be perfect, but it is an important step in the right direction. Recently, our nation saw a touching demonstration of the Iraqi's appreciation of our sacrifices during President George W. Bush's State of the Union Address. Safia Taleb al-Suhail, leader of the Iraqi Women's Political Council, hugged and comforted Janet Norwood of Pflugerville, Texas, whose son was killed in Iraq while serving with the Marines

By seeing this struggle through, we will deliver a devastating blow to the terrorists and a resounding victory of freedom. I want our friends in Iraq who value liberty to know that we Texans do not abandon our friends when things get difficult. Our country must remain a reliable friend of freedom

# Bush budget reduces farm aid

President Bush will propose cutting farmers' federal payments and other agriculture supports by more than a halfbillion dollars next year, a plan already drawing warnings from

Producers would see payments drop by five percent, a senior administration official said Friday. The ceiling on those payments, \$360,000 annually, would drop to \$250,000, said the official, who spoke on condition of anonymity because the budget won't be released until

The administration's goal is

to cut the deficit, projected to rise to \$427 billion this year, in half by 2009. Farm programs would be cut by at least \$587 million next year and \$5.7 billion over 10 years.

Payments to farmers and aid to them had been projected to drop from \$24.06 billion this year to \$19.64 billion in 2006, but Bush's pro-posal would push spending down to \$19.05 billion.

Two-thirds of the savings would come from the reduction in direct payments to crop and dairy producers.

Bush also will ask Congress

in the budget to close loop-holes that have let large farming operations collect subsidies well above the limit.

Congress is open to cutting farm spending if Bush proposes government-wide budget cuts, Senate Agriculture Committee Chairman Saxby Chambliss said

"But if they try to single out the farm bill, then we're going to have one heck of a fight," Chambliss, R-GA, told report-

In reaction to the proposed ag cuts, Roger Haldenby, Plains

2002 farm program was written to last through 2007. It has provided stability and allowed unprecedented growth in farm income and spending. Our farmers have made long-range decisions based on this contract and to renege on it now would be unwise and unfair.'

U.S. Rep. Randy Neugebauer, R-Lubbock, a member of the House Agriculture Committee, is taking a wait-and-see ap-proach to the reported pro-

"He's going to wait until the budget comes out, and he sees it for himself, to make any judgment or any reaction," spokesman Josh Noland. "He will keep in mind the importance of keeping the farm programs strong and doing what he can to make sure the agriculture budget is treated the same way as all the other

The administration official outlined cuts in subsidy programs that are part of the 2002 farm bill, but would not discuss fate of other Agriculture Department programs, such as food stamps and the Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants and Children, or WIC.

The administration also prooses some limits on availability of marketing assistance loans and changes in the crop

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# Neugebauer backs sales tax deductibility Congressman Randy Neugebauer announced their receipts or by looking up an average amount

burden on Texas families.

Neugebauer is a co-sponsor of the Permanent Sales Tax Deduction Act of 2005 (H.R. 519) written by fellow Texas Congressman Kevin Brady (TX-8). Brady's bill gives Texas taxpayers the permanent option of deducting state local sales taxes form their federal income tax

'The issue here is fairness," Neugebauer said. "For too long Texans have been penalized because they do not pay a state income tax. This bill should solve the problem once and for all by giving them the same option taxpayers I other states have benefited from for years.

In 2004, Neugebauer stood along side Brady and bipartisan delegation of representatives that successfully passed legislation to allow sales tax deduction for 2004 and 2005. This group of legislators is once again teaming up to make the

sales tax deduction permanent. Under this legislation, Texas families will be able to deduct their actual sales taxes by saving

that he is backing legislation to ease the tax from their income and family size on a table provided by the Internal Revenue Service (IRS). According to these IRS tables, a family of four in Texas with an income between \$30,000 and \$40,000 would have a sales tax deduction of \$730, plus any local taxes paid, and sales taxes paid on large purchases such as homes and

"In addition to putting money back in the pocket of Texas taxpayers, this bill will also create jobs and boost the economy," Neugebauer said. "Across the board, this bill is common sense legislation

The Texas State Comptroller's Office estimates that the tax savings could generate as many as 21,000 new jobs and lead to as much as \$819 million in new investments in the Lone

The Permanent Sales Tax Deduction Act of has also garnered support from the National Governor's Association, the National Conference of State Legislatures, and the National Taxpayers Union.

Friends of the Library Book Review "The Man Who Listens to Horses" By MONTY ROBERTS Introduction by Lawrence Scanlan Teena Hughs, reviewer

If you love animals, especially horses, and don't ever likely see one treated cruelly, this is a book for you. If you want to re an American "rags to riches" story, this book is for you. If you want to read about someone who was physically and emotion abused by his father from a very early age, and broke the cycle abuse with his own family and horses, this is a book for you you want to read about an honest man, one willing to go to a rather than lie, then you will enjoy reading about Monty Rober If you want to see how a man taught to train horses one wagoes out and discovers a more kind and gentle way of break horses, just by learning their language, then The Man W. Listens to Horses is definitely the book for you.

Monty Roberts was raised by an abusive father who believ that his way of breaking horses was "the only way". Monty not like the cruelty to horses that he witnessed at the hands his father, and he believed there was a better way to be horses. Monty's determination, patience, and willingness to lea the language of horses led him to a career in breaking a training horses that baffles many unless they have seen it do Monty's way of breaking horses and his many successes m not have brought him praise from his father, but it brought h praise from, and a friendship with, the Queen of England worldwide acclaim in breaking, training and establishing a ge applied to human relationships and in the business world deali with people.

Based on some of the terminology used in The Man W Listens to Horses, you can tell that Monty Roberts is defining not a Texan. However, a person with even the slightest known edge of horses can understand what Monty is trying to explanation He goes into great detail trying to help the reader understa everything he has learned about the language of horses and h to break and train them in a much faster, kinder, more gentle a compassionate way. The 34-page introduction and first chap may read a little slow, but it is smooth reading thereafter.

It is well worth the time and effort to read The Man W Listens to Horses. Reading about the life and times of Mor Roberts is at times very emotional, but the sharing of his ways breaking and training horses is valuable to anyone wishing learn the trade. J.C. died on Friday, February 4, 2005, at Cochran Memorial Hospital in Morton. He was born on February 18, 1930 in


Wilbarger County, Texas.



Although cardiovascular disease is often believed to primarily or both eyes affect men and older people, it is also a major killer of women and people in the prime of life. February is American Heart

Month, and this year the American Heart Association hopes to bring more awareness to the fact that cardiovascular disease is the No. 1 killer of American women. In fact, in 2001, more women than men died of cardiovascular disease in Texàs, according to the Texas Department of Health. And sudden cardiac death in women ages 35 to 44 has increased more than 20 percent in the last decade

Cardiovascular disease refers to a group of diseases including heart disease, stroke and conges tive heart failure. Heart attack and stroke are caused in part by narrowed or blocked arteries resulting in decreased blood supply to the heart and brain. Several factors increase the risk of heart and stroke. Some are changeable, and others, including age, heredity and gender, are

Some of the changeable risk factors for heart disease and stroke include high blood cholesterol, high blood pressure, cigarette smoking, physical inactivity, obesity or being overweight, and diabetes.

So how can we improve our cardiovascular health and wellness? An important step is beginning a daily physical activity such as walking. A 30-minute walk five days a week provides adequate activity to keep the heart healthy. Eating a healthy diet that is low in saturated fat and that includes five or more servings of fruits and vegetables daily is another key step. Also helpful is getting regular checkups that include monitoring weight, blood pressure, and cholesterol. Smokers should kick the habit.

It is imperative to know the warning signs of heart attack or stroke. Signs of heart attack in-

Shortness of breath Cold sweat, nausea or

lightheadedness Signs of stroke may include:

Numbness/weakness of face, arm or leg, especially on one side of the body

# PUBLIC NOTICE BY PARMER COUNTY:

Chapter 258 of the Texas Transportation Code ("Chapter ') authorizes a county to clarify the existence of a public right of access over certain roads, and the county's authority to spend public money to maintain such roads, because of ongstanding maintenance of the road by the county and other authorized legal theories. The proposed county road map will be available to the public during regular business hours at the following location: Office of the County llerk, Parmer County Courthouse, 401 Third Street, Farwell Texas 79325.

Any person asserting a private right, title, or interest in a road in which the County has claimed the existence of a public interest may protest the County's claim by attending the public meeting described below, or by filing a written protest with the Judge at any time before the public meeting, as described in Chapter 258.

The Commissioners Court of Parmer County will hold a public meeting at the following date, time and location, for the purpose of allowing any person asserting a private right, title, or interest in a road in which the County has claimed the existence of a public interest to protest the County's claim under Chapter 258: February 14, 2005, at 11:00 a.m., in the County Courtroom, Parmer County Courthouse, 401 Third Street, Farwell, Texas 79325

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# My Life Story

By HELEN POTTS

Every month, a resident of Prairie Acres Nursing Home or -Friona Heritage Estates, writes a story about his/her life's history for the home's newsletter, "The Prairie Times", for print-Ing in this issue. This month we feature Helen Potts.

File In June 1906, Charles Schlenker (my father) came to Texas on a V-Home Seekers Excursion train from Des Moines, Iowa, where he had promised his wife, Amelia (my mother) that he would not buy banything. He did anyway. For \$5.00 an acre, he bought 1/2 section 1966 land and went back to Iowa to get his family. He told my mother it was the best land he had ever seen and there were no rocks to farm around. So, in December of that year, Charles, Amelia, and nine children moved to Texas.

When they arrived at their new home, they realized there were no schools or churches. About the only neighbors they had were the F.L. Spring family, who lived between them and Bovina. Dad and Mr. Spring began to organize what is now Parmer County, before that it was attached to Deaf Smith County. After that, a school was formed in the Rhea Community and church was also held in these facilities.

Two more children were added after the move. I was the last in 1912. Charles barely provided for his family with four consecutive years of drought and having a hard time making crops the Iowa way. He took a job carpentering nine miles from home for \$1.00 a day. Finally, the money ran out and he went to the bank in Bovina to borrow money to move his family back to Iowa. Instead, the banker loaned him the money to buy cattle and sent him back to Rhea. He raised cattle, and at the same time, began to buy hogs from families stretching from Grady, New Mexico to Springlake, Texas, and ship them to Kansas City. Before that, there was no market. The neighbors had to eat what they raised. He continued with this way of life until he died from a sudden

A year prior to Papa's passing, I married Cordie Potts, who worked for my father. He and Mama became partners in managing the farm. As time passed, he purchased the home place and farmed until his death in 1996. During that time, he was ½ owner in the Ford dealership and served on the Rhea school board, before serving 18 years on the Friona board. I spent most of my life cooking, canning, sewing, raising three children (Marilyn, Larry, and Jay), and helping my older sister Louisa with Girl Scouts. It wasn't a lavish life, but it was a good one.

I was fortunate enough to live 92 years in the exact spot where

was born. I really knew my way around that place. As I look back now, a lot of good things have come to pass through technology and science, but the price is much more than many people realize. It seems that a family's innocence, happiness, and love for one another, have in many cases been sacrificed for a better car, a more exciting life, or the faster way to cook dinner. If had it all to do over again, I wouldn't give up what I had living in a large, rural family, with no electricity or running water, for all the pleasures that modern living has to offer. After all is said and done, wealth comes down to good memories, good family, and a

The type of tears you produce, their quantity, and coverage over the corneal surface determines, in large part, how comfortable your eyes feel. When eye doctors suspect a problem, they depend upon some simple tests. The tear film break-up time (B.U.T.) test measures how quickly the tear film evaporates. This occurs rapidly when the mucin layer of your tear film is deficient. Schirmer's test allows the doctor to measure the amount of tears your eyes produce. This is done by folding a small strip of absorbent paper into the lower lift and measuring how much of the paper; is moistened the lower lid and measuring how much of the paper is moistened over time. Special dyes, such as rose bengal, may also be used to highlight tear irregularities. In stubborn cases, tear composition may even be determined by a lab so the doctor can treat the

By providing the most accurate information possible they are playing an important role in the development of U.S. agricultural policy. All information provided by survey participants is kept strictly confidential by the USDA National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS).

"Reliable, accurate descriptions of the current economic health of Texas farms and ranches are crucial, especially when policymakers, farm organizations, analysts, local USDA agents, news media, farm suppliers, lenders and others make decisions that affect growers, said Robin Roarke, Texas Agricultural Statistics Service State Director.

Collecting the best possible information during this year's survey is especially important since the information will be used by agriculture industry representative organizations and legislators when the effort to renew the 2002 Farm Bill gets underway later in 2005

Producers selected to participate in the survey will be mailed an ARM Survey questionnaire or be visited by an interviewer who will help complete the report at the producer's convenience.
