## BURRELL OATES PAYS PENALTY

"I CAN'T CONFESS TO A LIE, I AM INNOCENT," WERE NEGRO'S LAST WORDS

### HANGED THIS AFTERNOON

Oates Baptized in Jail Bath Tub a Few Hours Before He Died—Game To the Last

Waxahachie, Tex., Nov. 29.—Burrell Oates was hanged this afternoon. The drop fell at 12:38 and he was pronounced dead at 12:50. He died game. There was a smile on his lips as the black hood was pulled down over his features. He said to the last that he was innocent.

Waxahachie, Texas, Nov. 29.—"I am ready to die if it is God's will. God's will be done, not mine. For eight years I have fought as hard as I knew how against the injustice of this thing, and I cannot save it off any longer. I am innocent. I was not concerned in any way in the killing of Mr. Aronoff. I have tried a few times since I have been in jail to dislike some people, but I just could not do it."

Three hours before his execution for the murder of Sol Aronoff in Dallas, November 29, 1904, Burrell Oates stood in his cell and spoke of his coming fate. With all his smiles, his yellow skin was pale. He had just finished talking to Rev. A. C. Parker of the Waxahachie Christian Church and his last words to the minister were, "I can't confess to a lie: I am innocent."

## NEW RATING BOOK HAS BEEN COMPILED

Merchants Credit Guide Ready For Printer—Will Contain 6,000 Names.

The new rating book of the Retail Merchants' Association has been compiled and will be printed in December, so as to be ready for issuance by the first of the year. Secretary John Thomas of the association has been at work on it for some time, and announces that it will include six thousand names, or about half of the estimated population of this city.

## ANNOUNCEMENT OF EXPOSITION STAMPS

Will Be Placed On Sale January 1—In 1, 2, 5 and 10 Cent Denominations

Official notice has been received by Postmaster Bacon that the special Canal Exposition stamps, issued in connection with the San Francisco exposition in 1915, will be placed on sale in Wichita Falls January 1, 1913. The stamps will not be sold in substitution for the regular postage stamps, but will be issued to persons requesting them and will be valid on all mail matter upon which the usual postage stamps of like denomination is valid.

The stamps will be of 1, 2, 5 and 10 cent denominations. They will be in shape, or slightly less than an inch in length and about one and three-quarter inches in breadth.

The stamps of 1 cent denominations will be green, bearing in the center a bust portrait of Balboa, discoverer of the Pacific Ocean. Palms and a view of the ocean occupy the background at each side of the bust and below it the words, "Balboa, 1513."

The 2-cent stamps will be red, bearing in the center a picture of the Gatun locks, through one gate of which is entering a merchant vessel, and out of the other emerging a battleship. Appropriate treatment is used in filling in the sides and background.

The color of the 5-cent stamps will be blue. The central picture will represent the Golden Gate of San Francisco showing the party of discoverers looking out across the bay.

The background shows on one side the setting sun and on the other, a steamship and a sailing vessel on the bay.

The 10-cent stamps are yellow and refer to the San Francisco exposition showing the date, 1915, and appropriate engraving. The department has ordered the stamps put on sale for all desiring to purchase and use them January 1, to continue until and through the period of the 1915 exposition.

## MOBILIZING ARMY AGAINST AUSTRIA

REICHPPOST SAYS SERVIAN RECRUITS CALLED OUT AND SUPPLIES REQUISITIONED

### A SERVIAN TCHATALJA

is Being Formed at Nish Where 120,000 Men Are Being Garrisoned

Vienna, Nov. 29.—The assertion that Serbia is mobilizing against Austria-Hungary is made today by the Reichspost. The entrenched positions near the town of Semendira, on the Danube, have been occupied by Serbian troops of the Danube division. The Serbian recruits belong to the contingent due to be called out in 1913 and 1914 have been called out by the Serbian war office, and Christian prisoners among the Turkish troops captured are being induced to serve in the Serbian army.

The weapons captured from the Turks are being hurriedly prepared in the great Serbian arsenal, where also ammunition is being manufactured in large quantities.

Cattle and cereals are being requisitioned by the Serbian war office and taken to Nish, which the Reichspost says they will be formed into a Servian Tchatalja, or last line of defense.

The garrison of the entrenched camp there is being rapidly raised to 120,000 men. Recent visits exchanged between the Austria-Hungarian foreign minister and the Egyptian prince, Ahmed Fued, who is an Albanian by descent, are regarded as indications that the prince is a serious candidate for the Albanian throne.

### Two Divisions Turkish Reserves Surrender.

Sofia, Nov. 29.—Two entire divisions of Turkish reserves surrendered today to the Bulgarian troops near the village of Marhamli, between the ports of Veceaghatch and Demotica, according to an announcement made by the official news agency here.

### Lines About Adrianople Draw Tighter Daily.

Sofia, Nov. 29.—The lines of investment drawn by Bulgarian troops around the beleaguered Turkish stronghold of Adrianople, are being tightened day by day. The attackers' trenches have now approached within 1100 yards of the city itself, and the foreign consuls have hoisted flags over their offices so as to prevent the Bulgarians firing shells in their direction.

According to one report from Adrianople, the original Turkish garrison had been reduced by losses during the desperate sortie and by disease to less than half its strength at the beginning of the siege.

### Turks Attempt Sorties Daily.

London, Nov. 29.—A Belgrade dispatch says the first Servian wounded have arrived there from Adrianople. Among them is an officer who tells interesting details of the siege. He says that during the three weeks since the arrival of the Servians before Adrianople, not a single day has passed without the Turks attempting sorties, but always retreating with great losses.

## RUSSIAN TREATY TO WILSON ADMINISTRATION

President Taft Does Not Intend To Make Any Agreement to Supplement Abrogated Treaty

Washington, Nov. 29.—The Taft administration, it was made known today, does not intend to make any agreement to supplement the treaty with Russia which expires January 1. The question of a new treaty and the subject of the treatment of American Jews traveling in Russia, which raised such a storm all over the United States last spring, will be one of the heritages that President Taft will leave to Mr. Wilson.

## PATRICK FREE MAN

"TOO HAPPY TO TALK"

New York, Nov. 29.—Albert T. Patrick walked out of Sing Sing yesterday afternoon a free man. He was too overcome and too happy to say much.

"I am too happy to say anything," was the pardoned man's only comment as he was escorted to the railroad station to take the 4 o'clock train for this city.

Just before leaving the prison and when he was changing his convict suit for a well-fitting suit of black, in answer to a question put to him by one of the deputy keepers, he said, "The fight's only started."

This was taken to mean by those who overheard the remark that Patrick intends to fight for the estate left him by William Marsh Rice, for whose death he spent more than ten years behind the walls of Sing Sing prison and narrowly escaped suffering the death penalty in the electric chair.

It was the error of a railway mail clerk, who dropped the Ossining mail off the train at Peekskill early yesterday by mistake, that held Patrick in the prison until late yesterday afternoon. When the mail was opened in Peekskill and it was discovered Patrick's pardon was in the consignment it was put on the next train for Ossining, arriving there at twelve minutes past 3 o'clock.

The postmaster of Ossining hurried to the prison with the pardon. After John S. Kennedy, the warden, read the document he transferred it to Mr. Connaughton, the principal keeper, who in turn read the pardon to Patrick.

"You are a free man now," said the principal keeper, as the two men shook hands. Patrick seemed overwhelmed when he heard these words.

There was no member of the Patrick family at the prison to escort the pardoned man to New York. Mrs. Patrick had telephoned Mr. Kennedy from her home in this city to tell her husband she was waiting Thanksgiving dinner for him.

Patrick had held aloof from association with the other prisoners during the service of his sentence, but at the same time has helped many of them with his legal knowledge.

After he has established his innocence—and he says he can do it now that he is free—he intends to devote himself to aiding unfortunates who have been sent to prison.

The first step he will take in this work will be to have set aside the disbarment proceedings which now stand against him.

"I expected a pardon," he said. "It is only justice. Now that I am free, I can show everybody that I am innocent of the charge upon which I was convicted. It has been a long fight, but I have never feared the outcome. After establishing my innocence I shall immediately seek reinstatement to the bar."

## CHILD WOULD SHIELD FATHER

DURING ARRAIGNMENT BY ATTORNEY SNEED'S DAUGHTER THREW ARMS ABOUT FATHER

### ARGUMENT IN PROGRESS

Georgia Bell Sneed, Aged Six, Unable To Stand Attack Upon Her Father

Fort Worth, Texas, Nov. 29.—J. B. Sneed's two little girls, Leonora, aged 11 and Georgia Bell, aged 6, were in the court room for the first time during the second trial today when arguments began. Relatives of both Sneed and Captain A. G. Boyce Sr., with whose murder Sneed is charged, crowded the enclosure within the railing.

As the relatives came in, one by one, former friends of the other family looked on in silence. There was never a word of recognition, although before the tragedy that has cost the two families so dearly, there would have been warm hand clasps and kisses.

Sitting directly behind County Attorney Baskin and the five prosecutors was Mrs. A. G. Boyce Sr., widow of the man Beal Sneed killed. In this group also sat Will and Henry Boyce. Sneed's little children sat beside him. No sooner had J. Y. Cummings begun his denunciation of Sneed than the little six-year-old Georgia Bell burst into tears. She was led out of the court room. Sneed sat with bowed head while Cummings shouted the declaration that a verdict of manslaughter could not save him. Leonora unable to grasp the meaning of the attorney's bitter words, studied the troubled face of her father; then she impulsively threw her little bare arms about his neck, pressed his face to hers and kissed him.

Among the outsiders who will be in attendance are J. E. Pearson of Fannin county, J. A. McDaniel of Cooke county and J. L. Armstrong of Kyle, state organizer and lecturer. The meetings will be held at the Farmers' Union hall.

## PROGRESS ON RINGLING ROAD PROJECT REPORTED

The new railroad which J. S. Ringling is planning to build in Southwest Oklahoma and which is said to have Wichita Falls as an objective point, is to be completed into Lawton within one year. The following dispatch from Lawton was printed recently in the St. Louis Globe-Democrat:

"By unanimous vote the members of the Lawton Chamber of Commerce adopted the contract previously agreed upon between its Railroad Committee and John Ringling, the millionaire circus man, for construction of a railroad from Ardmore to Lawton. The contract provides that the road is to be completed between Ardmore and Lawton by December 31, 1913. If the track of no other road is used for a distance of more than six miles, Lawton will pay a bonus of \$50,000, give terminals 1 nthe city and ten miles of right-of-way. If other lines are used for more than six miles the bonus is to be reduced to \$20,000.

"Mr. Ringling was present in person to take charge of the negotiations coming in his private car. J. L. Hammon, the original promoter of the Ardmore, Duncan and Lawton line, is associated with Mr. Ringling in his project, and says that Ringling is not a railroad builder. As evidence that he intends to build at once, and do it ahead of the other company, it is agreed that if the Robertson interests build a line from Ardmore to Lawton ahead of the Ringling road, no bonus is to be paid to Ringling, but he is to be given terminals just east of those already set aside for the Robertson road."

The order is directed at the Oklahoma Pipe Line Company, Standard Oil Company of New Jersey, Uncle Sam Oil Company of Kansas, Prairie Oil and Gas Company, Standard Oil Company of Louisiana, Ohio Oil Company, Tidewater Pipe Company, Limited, Producers and Refiners Oil Company, Limited, United States Pipe Line Company, the Pure Oil Pipe Line Company and the National Pipe Line Company.

Mr. Sharp's home was at Houston and the funeral will take place there Sunday afternoon. Mr. and Mrs. Frank Cullinan, Clint Wood and E. H. 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## LOST BONDS WORTH \$140,000 FOUND

Kansas City, Nov. 29.—Bonds having a face value of \$140,000, together with checks and a small amount of coupons which disappeared here June 5, when two registered mail sacks were stolen between the postoffice and railway stations here, were found today on the city dump by three laborers.

The bonds were Waco Texas city paper, which at the time they disappeared were being shipped by the Commerce Trust Company of this city to the Guarantee Trust Company of New York City. They were insured by an English concern for the full amount \$140,000, which was paid two weeks after their disappearance.

## RECOGNIZED MAN WITH FUNNY FACE

FOURTEEN YEAR OLD GIRL IDENTIFIES TWO MEN SEEN ON SCENE OF EXPLOSION

### THEY CARRIED A BOX

George Anderson and Peter J. Smith of Cleveland Were Two Picked Out

Indianapolis, Nov. 29.—As the youngest witness yet to testify, Miss Cleo Beard, aged 14, picked out from the forty-five defendants at the "dynamite conspiracy" trial today, two men whom she said she saw shortly before an explosion at North Randall, Ohio, on March 26, 1911. In that explosion an ore conveyor was blown up.

"The little witness, dressed in pink, climbed the high witness chair and looking toward the accused bomb-plotter, told her story. She said that with her sister she was going along a lonely road toward her home at North Randall. She said:

"It was just before dark. On the road we met the men who were carrying a box between them. The men were coming toward Randall from the direction of Cleveland. One of them had a funny face."

District Attorney Miller said, "A funny-face? Do you see them in the court room?"

Miss Beard replied pointing at George Anderson of Cleveland, a defendant, "yes, that's him. He is the one that carried the box. And there is another one," she added, pointing to Peter J. Smith of Cleveland.

## FRANK HICKEY CONFESSES TO BOY'S MURDER.

Buffalo, N. Y., Nov. 29.—J. Frank Hickey today made a full confession of the murder on October 12, 1911 of Joseph Josephs, a seven-year-old boy of Lackawanna, and of Michael Kruch, the New York newsboy on December 12, 1902.

The confession was made to District Attorney Dudley. The entire story has been reduced to a formal statement and has been signed by Hickey.

Hickey attributed his crimes to the excessive use of liquor. When drunk he said, he had an irresistible mania for killing boys. He denied he had committed other similar crimes. He said he was repentant and expects to pay the penalty.

## HODGES WILL BE NEXT GOVERNOR OF KANSAS.

An Easy Way to Stretch Shoes. To ease a tight boot or shoe take a pair of shears—the longer the better—wrap the blades with cloth and insert the handles into the toe of the shoe; then spread apart the blades. That will, of course, spread the handles at the same time. If the shoe presses hard in one particular spot place the round handle of the shears at the point of pressure; if it is desired to loosen the shoe simply from toe to instep turn the oval handle toward the side to be stretched. The stretching is made easier if the shoe is first moistened with alcohol. It does not injure the leather.—Youth's Companion.

### Texas-Oklahoma Notes

An American bald eagle, measuring 8 feet from tip to tip, is now on exhibition in front of the Bowle Drug Co., on Smythe street. The eagle was brought here by Curg Brown last Tuesday morning. It will be remembered that last week Curg and Steve Huff of Dallas, went to Dickens county on a hunting trip. While there enjoying the sport they learned last Friday morning that two eagles were frequently seen hovering around, at or near the Pitchfork ranch in Dickens county. So they started out in quest of the birds. About ten miles from the ranch they came to a mountain where they discovered a cave. With torch in hand, and crawling on their hands and knees they entered the cave. On the inside they espied the two eagles feasting on a jack rabbit. After corraling the birds and getting considerably scratched up from their claws, Curg and Steve report having had a fine specimen of the American eagle. Curg and Steve report having had a good time on their trip, and also report plenty of game in that section of the country.—Bowie Cross-Timbers.

The cotton crop of Wilbarger county is a grand total of 21,425 which with

the number of bales produced in the county and ginned in Hardeman and Foard, according to our estimate will bring the total to date to \$3,225. We estimate there will yet be about 5,000 bales to gin, bringing the total for the season up to 28,000 or better.—Vernon Record.

A strata of rich glass sand has been struck right here in the business part of Bowie. The strata lies 8 feet beneath the surface and is 3 feet thick. The strike was made by Henry Peden, the Smythe street barber, while digging a cesspool in the rear of his shop. Secretary Williams has a jar of the sand at the Chamber of Commerce, and says it is even a better grade than was shown at the Dallas Fair by our people and that the sample was pronounced very fine.—Bowie Cross-Timbers.

Crosbyton scored another vital point in the contest for the county seat of Crosbyton yesterday, when an opinion, signed by Chief Justice Huff, was handed down in the Court of Civil Appeals, affirming the judgment of the lower court. The law allows a specified time in which motion for rehearing may be filed. Should this period elapse before the necessary action is taken, the final chapter in this interesting litigation will doubtless have been written. The case which was appealed to the Court of Civil Appeals was reversed and rendered during the last term. Questions were then certified to the Supreme Court of Texas, which handed down an opinion reversing and remanding the case.

Peculiar features, centering about the exact central part of the county, made the contest an unusual one, and presented technical points for consideration of the higher courts. The citizens of Crosby county by a heavy vote decided that the seat of the county should be removed to Crosbyton from Emma, and the contest, which has been keenly waged, grew out of that result.—Clarendon Chronicle.

**Mid-Continent Prices Advanced.**  
Independence, Kan., Nov. 29.—The Prairie Oil & Gas Company announced an advance in the price of Mid-continent oil of three cents a barrel this morning, making the current price now seventy-six cents. The other purchasing companies at once met the advance.

This makes an increase of twenty-six cents a barrel since the first of the present year. The first advance was made January 2, and it has been going up two and three cents at a time during the year, but more rapidly during the past few months. There had been three advances of five cents each in Eastern oil since the last increase was made in this field and there was a general conclusion that a few cents would be tacked on before this week closed. There is a pretty strong conviction that this oil will go to 85 or 90 cents before the advance stops.

Carl Buerbaum of Dallas, is in the city. Mr. Buerbaum is here to look after his interests in the oil field, having land near the Horchelt place where the new well has come in. Mr. Buerbaum drilled two holes southeast of this well. Good showings

were found in both wells but it was not then believed the sands would pay. Later developments indicate that there may yet be something doing in that territory.

### CUERO'S "TURKEY TROT."

Besides getting a great deal of valuable advertising for itself and the surrounding country, the enterprising little city of Cuero, has given by its unique celebration this week an illustration of the importance of poultry-raising in Texas which is calculated to benefit the entire State.

Turkey raisers received for their sales last year the very important sum of \$71,400, a pretty good income from a business which can be conducted in connection with every farm without detracting from the crop demands. The turkeys sold in Cuero last year averaged eleven pounds each in weight and brought 10 cents a pound on foot. Cuero shipped thirty-two cars of dressed and frozen turkeys, aggregating 704,000 pounds, and the result has been one of which the citizens of that section have a right to be proud.

But the lesson that is taught is of State-wide importance, because what can be done around Cuero can be done in almost any section of Texas, and the example, which has been set should not be overlooked by farmers and others in other parts of the State. If Cuero shipped thirty-two carloads last year, one hundred Texas towns should ship one hundred times thirty-two carloads, or 32,000 carloads, worth 10 cents a pound, aggregating \$704,000.

There is a market for many more turkeys than Texas is likely to produce soon, so there need be no fear of overproduction. On the contrary, the more turkeys raised, the more popular they will be, consequently

Every four years this happens. No sooner is a President elected than from all sides come suggestions of names. Political directories are searched for material. Every day brings new faces upon the screen of "possibilities." Without any reference whatsoever to the policies of the newly elected President, often with out regard for geographical considerations and with little thought for the National political problems, secretaries are made in quantities. This is a pleasant diversion for everybody concerned. It entertains the one who does it, flatters the people who are mentioned and it does not embarrass the newly chosen executive. If one would keep track of the names proposed for the nine different Cabinet positions the list would probably include every person of the least prominence in Congress, every local leader of more than parochial position, a good many financiers with Democratic leanings and a sprinkling of "an gels" both State and National in their givings.

In a way this enterprise is helpful to the President-to-be, for it gives him the benefit of the wide range of proposals, for which he is in no way responsible, and enables him to study public sentiment through the responses given to these suggestions. Governor Wilson will do well to keep "clippings" of all the publications bearing upon the Cabinet question. He will find them mighty interesting reading later when he has finally made his combination and sees what might have happened.—Washington Star.

#### Reciprocity.

We are going along with our prospective tariff policy, but with some interests being averse to opening wider trade with other countries, we witness the defeat of Canadian reciprocity. We have surrounded our selves with what is freely admitted a source of protection that has immensely developed our industries, but in the course of enacting protective tariffs, some interests are over-protected. But this is very nice so long as other nations by these protective carriers do not throw out our trade. Other nations have protection as well as do we, and the tendency is to increase the schedules against us with every change. This naturally must reduce our exports.

Germany, Japan and other countries are to increase their protection

and the best way we can meet this is to do as President McKinley in the last address he made, advised. He told his countrymen that the time had come to open wider the gates and that the day of tariff restriction had passed. Our reciprocity treaties must be enlarged, or sooner or later, very possibly sooner, the country will sincerely wish it had followed this advice of President McKinley and Blaine. These masters of protection perceived our protective reciprocity treaties, or our trade will suffer.—Racine Journal-News.

#### He is a Big Man.

In the phrase of the streets, "you've got to hand it to Taft" for the manner in which he has borne defeat—this in spite of the fact that the phrases of the street have too seldom been employed in praise of this excellent man.

Within the limits of one day's telegraphic records we find that the President has delivered an optimistic and thoughtful address to the Daughters of the Confederacy, assembled in Washington; that he has announced his wish to entertain President-elect Wilson and Mrs. Wilson before his retirement from the White House, and that he is getting ready for a visit to New York, where he will appear in places as unlike one another as the city college and an orphan asylum.

There is something big about a man who refuses to sulk after he has been roughly handled. The quality evinced is one that all kinds and conditions of men recognize and appreciate. In only a distinctly unessential way has the President—been defeated.—St. Louis Times.

#### Patient With Mexico.

Official records compiled at Washington show that within the last year no fewer than twenty-three persons have been killed or wounded on the American side of the international boundary, by shots fired from Mexican fighting between government and rebel forces. This fact ought to be given the widest possible publicity throughout Latin-America. It might bring proud and sensitive nations conscious of their weakness and of the overwhelming power of their sister republic in the north, to a surer sense than they have ever had of Uncle Sam's patience, and forbearance.

If this country had one-tenth part of the greed for territory or the spirit of aggression which South American states have often charged against it, it could never have abstained from seizing such an opportunity as Mexico has afforded for invasion and conquest. It is safe to say that no other great power in the world would have avoided the use of force throughout a year in which more than a score of its citizens were hit by bullets fired by soldiers of a weak neighboring state.

—Some day South America, Central America, the West Indies and Mexico itself will give the United States due credit for remarkable self-control and freedom from aggressive ambition.—Cleveland Leader.

#### And the Cat Came Back.

Old Bill Flinn of Pittsburg, whose \$200,000 expenditure of "messengers" was such a factor in carrying the Pennsylvania direct primaries for Theodore Roosevelt, is reported to have quit standing at Armageddon and to be negotiating for his own and his "Washington" party's return to the Republican ranks.

The decent Republicans of the country at large had hoped that their night party was rid of this young tomcat of Pennsylvania politics, whose Pittsburg city contract odors are so pungent as to be offensive even in Pennsylvania, but whom Mr. Roosevelt embraced without even winking his nose.

However, the cat has come back and is scratching at the door, and owing to the peculiarities of Pennsylvania politics, there is too much reason to fear that the decent Republicanism of the Nation may again be affronted by the spectacle of Old Bill in the high seats of the Pennsylv

vania organization—Chicago Inter-Ocean.

#### The Rise of a Party.

Those who persist in making Cabinets for Mr. Wilson can hardly be blamed, for nothing is easier. Not for a generation at least has the Democratic party had so much available material of a high order. Four years ago such a Cabinet as may now be chosen would have been impossible.

If he were so disposed the new President could find a Cabinet of commanding ability among the Democratic Governors. He could find a Cabinet in the House of Representatives or in the Senate that would compare favorably with any of its predecessors. He could find a Cabinet of distinguished character among Democrats now in private life who have gained credit for themselves in many ways.

From this large number of able and devoted men he would have no difficulty in selecting three or four Cabinets if they were needed.—New York World.

Port Worth, Texas, Nov. 29.—Proper methods to increase the efficiency of Texas' rural schools and thereby multiply the efficiency of the State's entire school system, formed the basis of practically all the discussions during the meeting of the Texas State Teachers' Association, Friday morning.
