DERR AND EARLY WIN FROM CITY

JUDGE PEREMPTORILY INSTRUCTS JURY TO RETURN VERDICT FOR PLAINTIFF

THE CITY MAY APPEAL

Amount Awarded Sanitary Sewer Contractor Was \$5980—Issues Not Submitted to Jury

A telegram received by The Times this afternoon says that a verdict for the plaintiff was returned in the Federal district court this morning in the suit of Derr and Early vs. the City of Wichita Falls.

The case has been on trial for several days and the judge refused to submit the issues to the jury peremptorily instructing the jury to return a verdict for the plaintiff in the above amount.

City Attorney Bonner and Attorneys J. T. Montgomery and J. H. Burwise Jr. will advise the city council to appeal from the decision.

The suit grew out of a contract for the installing of the sanitary sewer system, the contractors for which were Derr and Early. In the final settlement the city refused to pay the amount claimed by Derr and Early. Suit was brought with the result stated above.

IMPEACHMENT TRIAL OPENED TODAY

of might become a litigant before his court. They declared that no attempt was made to get the property for less than its full value.

Another prominent charge was that Judge Archibald undertook for a consideration to assist George M. Watson an attorney of Seranton, Pa., to settle a reparation suit brought by the Marion Coal Company against the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroad company, and to sell for C. G. Boland and W. P. Boland, a large portion of the stock of the Marion Coal Company to the railroad.

In response to every charge attorney says for Judge Archibald replied that the acts charged did not constitute an impeachable offense, or a high crime or misdemeanor, as defined in the constitution.

Each of the impeachment trials in American history has, in turn, been the sensation of the period in which it occurred. The first case was that of William Blount, a U. S. Senator from Tennessee, who was in the year 1798 tried on a charge of conspiring with certain British officers to steal part of Louisiana from Spain for the benefit of England.

Next came Judge John Pickens of New Hampshire who was tried for drunkenness and profanity during the year 1803 and was convicted and removed. In the year 1804 Samuel Chase, one of the Associate Justices of the U. S. Supreme Court, was tried on charges of irregularities growing out of the conduct of a trial but was acquitted.

Next came Judge West H. Humphreys of Tennessee, who was impeached and removed from office, his offense being that he entered the service of the Confederacy without resigning or vacating his office. Soon after the Civil War came our most sensational impeachment trial, that of President Andrew Johnson, who became Chief Magistrate by reason of the assassination of Abraham Lincoln.

The charges against Johnson were largely the outgrowth of his attempt to remove Edwin M. Stanton as Secretary of War regardless of the wishes of the Senate. After a stormy trial Johnson was acquitted, but by the narrowest margin.

Next came Judge Charles Swaine of Florida, which took place in 1904 and resulted in an acquittal. Judge Swaine, it may be remembered, was tried on twelve charges (only one less than Judge Archibald), of corruption and incompetency.

President-elect Wilson has extended an invitation to Mr. Bryan to meet and confer with him on certain important matters on his return from the Bermudas. Now watch and see what effect that is going to have on the fellows who have persistently contended that the relations between Mr. Wilson and Mr. Bryan were not at all pleasant.

Now that President Taft has issued an order placing about 36,000 fourth-class postmasters under the civil service law, for no purpose other than to keep that many Republicans in the service of the government permanently without examination or test as to efficiency, are there any Democrats who would censure President-elect Wilson should he, upon taking his office, revoke the order of President Taft and declare all the 36,000 postmasterships vacant? This is a political matter, purely, if the Democratic party expects to retain control it can hardly expect to succeed by playing into the hands of the Republican party.

Thanksgiving is now a thing of the past, and Christmas is the next event to claim the attention of the Christmas shoppers. Nearly every paper in the state is urging early Christmas shopping, but in looking through advertising columns of most of these papers it is a noticeable fact that but few stores that make a specialty of carrying Christmas goods, are advertising to any great extent. Therefore it is almost useless for these papers to urge early Christmas shopping unless the merchants are prepared to receive them. At least three weeks should be given to the shopper to pick out what they want. Of course, there are a great number of the shoppers who could not be induced to make purchases early, but there are also quite as many who would do it if the opportunity was given.

ABOUT PERNICIOUS PARTISANS.

President Taft is displaying more spirit than has been his wont. The summary dismissal of two marshals in Texas for "pernicious political activity" in behalf of Cecil Lyon, former Republican chairman and chief Bull Moose, might be called spunky. No doubt these gentlemen were active; whether their activity was "pernicious" depends largely upon the point of view. There were many Republican officeholders in Texas equally active in opposition to Lyon and in behalf of his successful rival, Mr. MacGregor.

"A jeat's proserpity lies in the ear of him who hears it," and political activity appears to be pernicious in the mind of him who suffers by it, though commendably patriotic in the view of him who profits by it.

Partisanship is always offensive in the other fellow. There's lot of human nature in the loftiest character, and there's more or less hypocrisy in much that poses as political virtue.

It is to be hoped that the Democrats of the senate will summon the courage and can muster the strength to defeat the confirmation of these appointments until after the 4th of March.

The quarrel between Republicans and Progressives ought not to keep good Democrats out of positions to which they are entitled. The public service may require the removal of these two offending Republican marshals; it will not suffer by the substitution of Democratic marshals when the Democratic party comes into its own.

GRAND JURY BEGINS ITS DELIBERATIONS

Judge Martin Calls Attention to Conditions in This City and at Electra

The grand jury began its deliberations yesterday afternoon at 3:30 following the delivery of the charge by District Judge Martin. The jurors are in session today and are apparently very busy.

Judge Martin's charge covered the usual subjects which a district judge is required to instruct the grand jury upon. Of special interest was his reference to liquor sales at Electra. It will be recalled that the last grand jury made investigation of conditions in the oil city and reported upon them rather sharply, criticising the citizenship of Electra for its attitude on the matter. Judge Martin reminded the grand jurors of the work of their predecessors on this point, and explained the law at some length, urging the jury to delve deeply into the situation.

Another feature of the charge was the reference to the "reservation" conditions in Wichita Falls, and Judge Martin urged the jurors to go after the owners of the property that may be found in use for improper purposes, saying the owner of the property is just as guilty, morally and legally, as any inmate. The acts of the peace officers in this connection, in making arrests and in endeavoring to put an end to practices, were also laid before the jury for investigation.

J. P. Jones was appointed foreman of the grand jury, which at once retired and began its work.

"All good citizens," said Judge Martin, discussing enforcement of the liquor laws, "however widely they may differ as to the wisdom of permitting or prohibiting the sale of intoxicating liquors, agree that when its sale has been prohibited, the law should be enforced and the violators brought to justice."

Although a number of cases await the attention of the grand jury this term, they are mostly of a comparatively minor nature. There are no murder cases bound over this term.

TALK TO FARMERS

would always be an agricultural state. As evidence of the change in sentiment, he cited the fact that the Commercial Secretaries Association had recently offered to co-operate with the Union in "spreading the gospel."

Mr. Townsend then presented Mr. Wilson, introducing him as one of the foremost figures in the country in the Union work.

Mr. Wilson said he would go away able to tell everyone that he had found in this section farmers who knew how to do things, and with determination and good leadership, had really accomplished something.

The speaker said he was not one of those who patted farmers on the back and told them they were the best fellows in the world.

"That's not so," he said, "there are sorry farmers and good ones. They're no better than the average and no worse. Sometimes, when I see how they work against their own interests, I think they're worse."

Farmers' ownership of gins was a necessity to the farmers' welfare, Mr. Wilson said, in connection with the solution of the marketing problem, for which the Union was organized. The abuses and disadvantages under the old regime, Mr. Wilson said, had brought home the necessity for action.

B. F. Yoakum's expression, "It's too far from the farm-to-the-table" was quoted by the speaker, who said a Union purpose was to reduce the distance. Since the farmers had tackled the matter, many others had come with remedies and solutions, but he believed the Farmers Union should undertake the work itself.

"No marketing system can be satisfactory that isn't controlled by the man between the plow handles," Mr. Wilson said.

He then discussed the warehouse plan telling how it was started in Mississippi some years ago. Pres. Barrett of the National Union, he said, had investigated every plan proposed, without success. Finally the Mississippi plan had been adopted, being recommended for the handling of cotton, tobacco and grain. The system had been investigated carefully by the Union officials and finally adopted. Texas had gotten into line on the plan, he said.

Answering the claim that prices are subject to supply and demand alone, the speaker cited a brand of snuff which he said had always sold for 25 cents a bottle. Regardless of the supply of tobacco or the demand for snuff, he said, the price was always the same. The manufacturer stored their product in their warehouse, and waited, the speaker said; that was the way for the farmer to do; hold his product until there was a demand for it and then sell at his price.

"I believe it can be organized and handled and for the betterment of the world," said Mr. Wilson, "and when the farmers has succeeded in stabilizing the price of cotton, he will have established the business of the world."

"The farmer is the only man who is to blame for the conditions as they are; it isn't the banker or the speculator or the railroad man. Formerly the farmer didn't know how to help himself and he blamed everybody else. He was to blame himself."

Mr. Wilson related experiences to show that when there was a demand the producer fixed a price; when there was no demand, and a surplus, the buyer fixed the price. In times like these, he continued, the speculator was the farmer's friend, providing the market for cotton when the spinner didn't want it. No system for marketing could succeed that didn't take care of the man who had debts to pay. The system must have the confidence of the big farmer and help the little farmer, Mr. Wilson said.

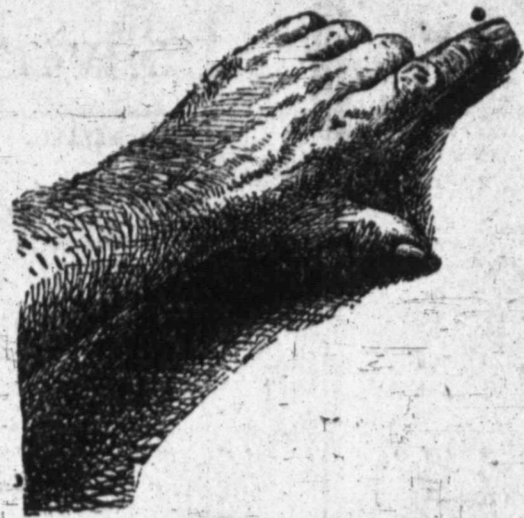
"It's up to the farmer," declared Mr. Wilson, "if he doesn't see the value and doesn't handle it, somebody else will."

Elimination of waste and unnecessary expense was one great advantage of the system, continued the speaker. That was the secret of the Standard Oil company's success. He discussed the poor methods of ginning still in vogue in the South, saying the South was far behind Egyptian ginners in this regard. Gin compression, he said, would be the eventual plan; it would save \$6 per bale—\$25,000,000 for Texas. He discussed the feature of some length. 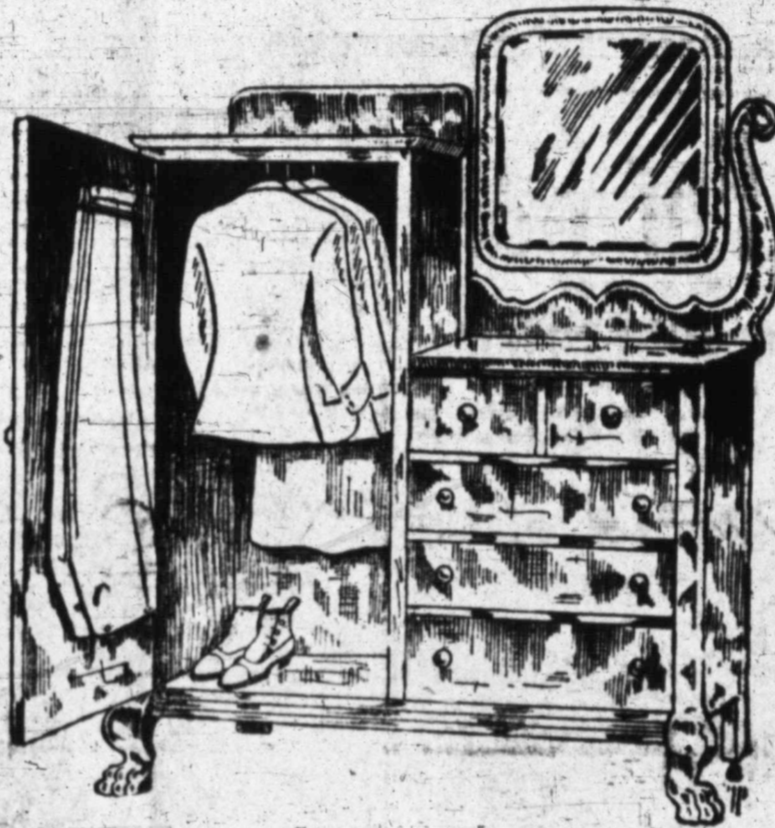

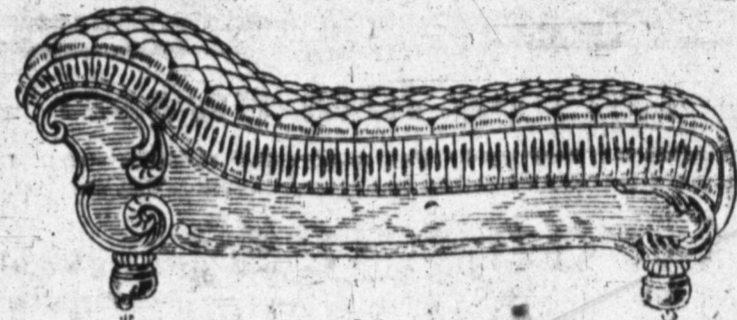

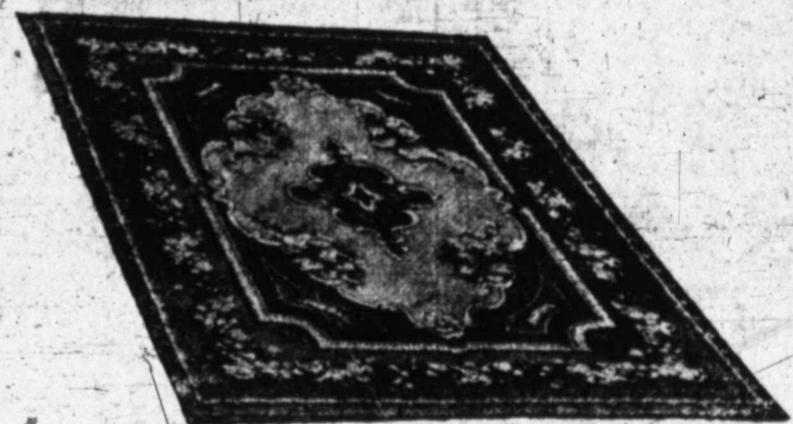

middlemen was on purpose of the system, Mr. Wilson said.

"The reason the spinner has not dealt directly with you is because he can't. And he never can. You have not got enough cotton. Each mill has its specific need, of one specific grade and staple. No one man can do it; no one warehouse can do it." He told how this had been attempted and had failed; one reason was that small warehouse associations had no rating and could not guarantee contracts.

"The question is, who will be your middleman? Our system says you will be your own middleman and the middleman's profits will go back to you."

Warehousing, financing and marketing were the three steps. He went into the details at some length, showing how the plan operated.

"The chance to make money on it is there. If you don't do it, somebody else will. We've been doing a millionaire's business on a pauper's peace."

Lawton Man Says Bonus Contract Signed and Guaranteed—Duncan Also Signed.

W. C. Doak, one of the prominent business men of Lawton, was in Ardmore this morning and in conversation with a number of our representative citizens gave out the statement that everything at the Lawton end of the line had been signed up with John Ringling in the matter of the building of the Ardmore, Duncan & Lawton railway.

The city of Lawton, through her legal representatives has signed a contract with John Ringling in which it is agreed to give a bonus of \$50,000 for the building of the road. "This I know to be a fact," Mr. Doak said, "because I am a member of the guaranty bond association which has been a party to this agreement. I also positively know that Mr. Ringling has agreed to accept the bonus which the city of Duncan has agreed to give the enterprise."

Coming from the source which it does, this information settles the question of the early building of the line and it also settles that the road will

be built practically along the old Jackson survey via Duncan. It is said to be an open secret that John Ringling signed the agreement with the Ardmore people some weeks ago. This being the case and everything being signed up it will be but the matter of a short time until actual work will be commenced on the road. As the road will traverse a section where the grades will all be very light there will be no heavy work in the way of contractors and it is thought by those who are on the inside that the road will be completed well within the time limit heretofore agreed upon.

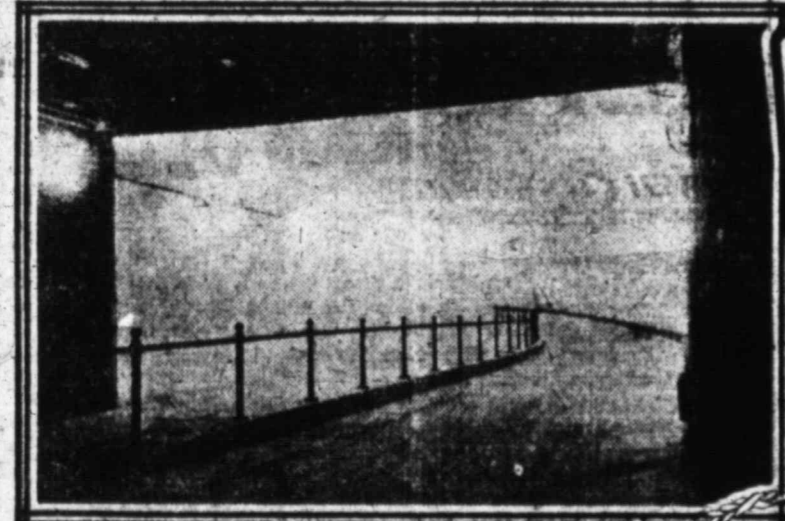

Congress Comes Back to an Improved Capitol



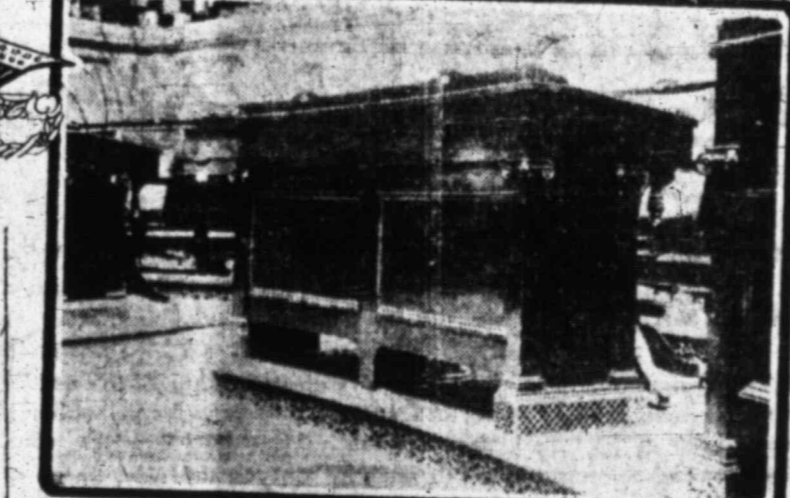
The Subway Connecting the Capitol with the Office Buildings of the Senate and House.

ONCE more the law-makers of the United States are assembling at the seat of government to take up their legislative labors and once more they come back to an improved as well as a renovated Capitol. If there is any structure in our broad land that is maintained in perfect repair, "well kept up" in every sense of the term, it is the great white-domed building on Capitol Hill at Washington. Uncle Sam is never bothered by any shortage of cash for such betterment of our legislative factory. It is proverbial that whatever may be their economies in running the general government the Senators and Representatives never stint themselves with reference to those things which make for their comfort and convenience at the Capitol. As evidence of this policy it need only be cited that the Congressmen have in recent years appropriated money for more "improvements" at the Capitol than it has been possible to carry out in the time available. And this brings us naturally to one odd feature of the house-cleaning and improvement work at the Capitol. Some years ago it was the practice to carry on repair work and new construction at the Capitol at all times, but a stop was put to this when there was an accident in connection with some repair work in the Hall of the House of Representatives that cost the life of a prominent Member. Thereafter, decreed Congress, all labor of this kind must be performed during the recess between sessions. Now this annual Congressional recess naturally varies greatly in different years. Ordinarily every other year is a "long session" and every other year is a "short session" but sometimes this program is upset by a special session and then again, where as it may be necessary for a short session to end on the 4th of March, there is no similar limit to the continuance of a long session. Well as it happens, 1912 was the year for a long session but few persons anticipated that it would be quite so lengthy a sitting as it eventually

proved. Congress did not finally close up shop until along in the "dog days" and this long drawn talkfest seriously interfered with the plans which had been made for "sprucing up" the Capitol building during the recess. About all that there was opportunity for were minor improvements and ordinary repairs. However when the reader is told that in a little more than three months there have been completed exactly 981 tasks he will conclude that there have been lively jobs of late in and about the largest building of its kind in the world. It is essential to include, as was done in the foregoing sentence, the Capitol grounds, as well as the building, for not a little of the recent work has been done in the beautiful park that surrounds our national law factory—a park which Congress is spending millions of dollars to enlarge and improve. The last severe winter left its scars on the United States Capitol grounds as it did elsewhere in the country and the most unwelcome outcome was the loss of a number of the stately trees that have won the admiration of visitors to Washington in years gone by. To repair the havoc the Capitol officials have been planting a large number of young trees and in order that these newcomers may in after years possess added interest for the people of the nation there has been followed the custom of having as many of the new trees as possible personally planted by prominent men. Thus the late Vice-President Sherman planted a tree; so did Speaker Champ Clark, Senator Lodge and Senator Wetmore and a number of the leading men of the two branches of the national legislature. Meanwhile the officers have bestirred themselves as never before to save such forest monarchs as the Capitol grounds now boasts. The trees have been carefully sprayed at frequent intervals to discourage the insect pests and "tree doctors" have been engaged at considerable expense to practice their arts in an effort to arrest decay. Of course the Capitol building has had its annual "bath" on the eve of the return of its distinguished tenants. This cleansing of the vast white marble pile by means of clear water hauled against it with a great force is a formidable task. Two or three fire engines and a considerable force of firemen to direct the streams arranged for days at a time on this odd chore. Of the actual improvements made during the past quarter of a year at the Capitol some of the most important—important at least from the standpoint of the Congressmen themselves—have had to do with the Senate and House restaurants and the attached kitchens. It is not to be expected that men drawing \$7,500 a year from Uncle Sam and with an unlimited "expense account" as regards their working quarters will be parsimonious when it comes to looking after the wants of the "inner man." However there is another factor in this particular situation never suspected by any person not on the "inside" at the Capitol. Whisper the secret, though, the Capitol restaurants never pay as a business proposition. The presiding officers of the Senate and House respectively duly delegate each year some person to operate the Capitol restaurants but such have been the misfortune of one caterer after another that there is no longer any scramble for a position which is all honor and very little profit. You see mine host of a Capitol cafe has a very limited period of activity each day. The Congressmen are never there for breakfast, nor for that matter is the general public that is also permitted to patronize these restaurants, but in rooms apart from those reserved for the distinguished patrons. Similarly there is no trade for the evening meal except on rare occasions. All the trade of these unique eating places comes in the form of a rush at the noon hour. Well, the upshot of the matter is that for all

that Congress makes all sorts of concessions such as free rent, free light and free heat, these Capitol restaurants are anything but a gold mine for the managers and the only way in which it is possible to attract caterers to the positions is to provide all possible conveniences—hence these latest improvements. The present improvements include the provision of an additional dining room at the Senate restaurant where as the House of Representatives restaurant has been completely remodeled with an increase of space and accommodations. A newly installed "steam table" at the House restaurant will keep piping hot the favorite dishes of our epicurean Congressmen and on the Senate side there are some new fixtures, put in especially for the benefit of Mrs. Murphy, the Senate's famous official "pie baker," who turns out each day not less than fifty pies of the kind that omelet used to make. Newly installed in the Congressional restaurants also are two refrigerating machines of 4-ton capacity each. Another nook which will not be recognized by the Congressmen when they reassemble in the House barber-shop. Oh yes, indeed, gentle reader, there is a barber shop in the sacred precincts of the United States Capitol.

out Congress hung around Washington all last summer. This refrigerating system, it may be explained, is planned to cool the fresh air as it is admitted to the Capitol so that our lawmakers will not suffer so severely when they remain in Washington during the summer as they felt obliged to do this year. The Capitol is already provided with an elaborate system for forcing fresh air into the big building by means of powerful fans and there are even facilities for "washing" this air so that it will be free from impurities, but means of cooling the precious ozone has heretofore been lacking. To supply this defect Congress has appropriated the sum of \$70,000. It seems likely that a perfect refrigerating system will cost even more than that but the lawmakers are not going to balk at expense and have instructed the Superintendent of the big building to go ahead and secure for them the boon of cool air if it can be had at any reasonable price. Decidedly the most important of the changes—when it comes to real novelty—is a freak underground railway which has been provided for conveying United States Senators and their friends back and forth between the Capitol and the Senate Office building, located some two blocks away. Ever since the Senate and House Office buildings were completed several years ago, they have been connected with the Capitol by electric lighted tunnels. The Congressmen have walked back and forth through their "tube" but the venerable Senators have been conveyed in unique, electric automobiles, specially built for this subterranean speedway. Unfortunately these motor cars have not proven entirely satisfactory. They broke down sometimes at moments inopportune for the dignity of the Senators and they have been expensive to maintain. Now there is being substituted for these motor cars what is known as a "monorail line"—a very picturesque transportation scheme whereby a car capable of holding twelve of our weightiest Senators is suspended from a rail—hunc like said ole bass on a horse—and whisked along at a lively gait making the round trip between the Senate Building and the Capitol in a very few minutes.

A correspondent sends us the material for a dinner given by the Archbishop of York in 1468: Three hundred quarters of wheat, 330 tons of ale, 104 tons of wine, 1 pipe of spiced wine, 80 fat oxen, 6 wild bulls, 1,004 sheep, 3,000 hogs, 300 calves, 3,000 geese, 8,000 capons, 300 pigs, 100 peacocks, 200 cranes, 200 kids, 2,000 chickens, 4,000 pigeons, 4,000 rabbits, 204 bittern, 4,000 ducks, 400 herons, 200 pheasants, 500 partridges, 4,000 woodcocks, 400 plovers, 100 curlews, 100 quails, 100 egrets, 200 roes, 400 hares, 5,000 venison pasties, 5,000 dishes of jelly, 5,000 custards, 300 pies, 300 breads, 8 seals, 4 porpoises and 400 tarts. There were 1,000 servants, 60 cooks and 515 scullions. Our correspondent informs us that his authority does not state in what circumstances the dinner was given, or how many guests assembled. Possibly some reader may be able to throw light on the subject.—London Globe.
