IN MESSAGE TO CONGRESS TAFT SAYS RECOMMENDATIONS FROM HIM ARE USELESS

MESSAGE

Will Be Last General Message From Him-Opposes Autonomy for Philippines

By Associated Press.
Washington, Dec. 6.—Presiden Taft will make no further effort to have Congress reduce the tariff. In a "general" message to Congress submitted today, the President clear ly indicated his intention-of leaving further tariff revision to Mr. Wilson and the Congress just elected.

"Now that a new Congress has been elected on a platform of tariff for revenue only rather than a protective tariff and is to revise the tariff on that basis," the President said, "it is needless for me to occupy the time of Congress with arguments or recommendations in favor of a protective tariff."

This message, the second submitted by the President since the present session began, will be his last of a general character. It dealt with every department of the government except the State Department, recommended much of the legislation which Mr. Taft previously had urged upon the attention of Congress and took up and discussed at length sev eral subjects comparatively new.

Mr. Taft came out strongly against independence for the Philippines proposed, he said, in a bill now before Congress. He deprecated the new policy of one battleship a year instead of two; and indorsed again the sheme of currency reform proposed by the National Monetary Commis-

He declared that no radical change in the Sherman anti-trust law was needed, and praised the Supreme vice exhibited his device to the alder- Court for its recently announced men, but the council decided that it changes in rules of equity procedure. 



ing 75c and 85c per pound for shelled nuts, when they can get the unshelled nuts for perhaps a third of the same price.

While it is true that you won't get three times as many muts in the shelled nuts as you would in the unshelled, nevertheless counting the time that it takes to shell even almonds or walnuts to say nothing of pecans and the loss of nut meats where you do the shelling yourself you will find enough difference in favor of the shelled nuts to warrant their use almost exclusively especially for cooking and also for table use. A pound or two unshelled kept in the house for winter evenings around the fire when cracking nuts is half of the evening sport is all well and good but for general use, (and nuts should form a larger part of the regular menus than they do) shelled nuts will be more economical.

DEEP AND EARLY PLOWING URGED BY BURKHALTER

H. P. Burkhaster, demonstration igent in Wilbarger county, is urging the farmers of that section to plow heir corn and cotton ground early and deep. He Bays:

"The time has come when farnier should get busy breaking their land or next year's crop. And when say break, I don't mean to skim alons wo and a half or three inches deep out go down at least seven inches Nine inches would be better.

"This applies more particularly to ight land, as the loose sandy land will blow badly if plowed in this way and it usually produces fairly wel without breaking at all before plant ng time. But from any observation in the county this year, I am full convinced that the tight land is as reductive, if not more so, than the sandy land if properly handled. When ight land is turned up deep in the 'all or early in winter and exposed to he freezes and all the winter rain: allowed to principle the carth and by seld there for the use of the cro when dry weather comes, much bet er results will be obtained that where nothing is done to the fand til planting time.

"Another advantage in deep break ng is that on flat land that does no frain well the surplus water in time of excessive rain sinks into the eart and the surface dries more quicklend planting can be started muc varlier than could be


"Cotton picking will tie very early this year and I hope the farmers will avail themselves of the opportunity to break their hand carly and thereby destroy many destructive insects and store all the mbisture that falls through the winter for the use of the growing crop next summer. Early breaking also afford a fine seed bed, which is very essential to thrifty plant growth and which is not to be had where breaking is put off till just before plant

ing time.
