COUNTY TEACHERS MEETING OPENED

MAYOR BELL WELCOMED PEDA-GOGUES AT OPENING SESSION AT HIGH SCHOOL

™PROF. CORDER CHAIRMAN

Election of Officers First Business-Miss Denny Secretary and J. M. Perkins Reporter

With every part of the county represented, the Wichita County Teach ers' Institute began a five days' ses sion this morning at the high school. Organization was completed soon after convening and the teacher; plunged at once into the technical matters that will constitute the greater part of their work here.

County Superintendent R. M. Johnson called the institute to order and introduced Dr. J. W Hill who invoked divine blessing upon the proceedings. Mrs. G. H. Carpenter then sang one of Gounod's serenades, in her asual charming way. The address of welcome, by Major J. M. Bell followed. Dr. Bell said that to merely welcome the teachers would be a stereotyped formality, and that he wanted to talk to them about, other things Referring to the pride of Wichita Falls' citizens in their city, he urged the teochers to look around the city and investigate it and learn about it and get acquainted with it.

Next to doctors. Dr. Bell continued. teachers were the hardest worked and poorest paid of the professions Just as a physician, he said, could back and remember cases where he had saved lives, and take pride in his work, so should teachers be able to correct the mental and moral defects of children and start them anew, and find joy in it. He discussed the work of the teacher, saying that, with many children to handle, the teacher was often without the cooperation and assitsance of parents and neighbors. He mentioned the higher duty of the teacher to the community and the nation in shaping young lives, and closed with a renew-

al of the welcome. Prof. Corder of Electra responded to the address of welcome. expressing appreciation of Dr. Bell's greeting and saying a word in praise

Wichita Falls' progress. Election of officers followed, Prof. Corder being chosen assistant chairman, Miss Gertrude Denny, secretary and Prof. J. M. Perkins, reporter. The program for the morning began. Superintendent Johnson outlining the work before the Institute. This was followed by the lesson for the morning. This was followed by the taking up of the study of the text book "School Room Essentials," which will form the basis of the study of the Institute while it is in session here.

Watch cigar, cigarette and pipe smokers. Do not permit them to light up inside buildings. Do not make the slightest change in electrical wiring without consulting electrical

Warnings for the home-Every year in America many children are burned to death by fire from Chris mas candles. Do not decorate your Christmas tree with paper, cotton or any other inflammable material. Do not use cotton to reprement snow. If you must have snow se asbestos fibre.

Do not leave matches within reach of children at ho'lday time. Candles are meant to be light ed, and if the children can wel matches they will experiment with

BALKAN PEACE CONFERENCE OPEN

PLENIPOTENTIARIES WELCOMED BY SIR EDWARD GRAY AT ST. JAMES PALACE

ONLY SHORT SESSION

Was Held This Morning-Allies Wil Demand Conculsion of Peace This Week

By Associated Press. London, Dec. 16.—Delegates of Bulgaria, Servia, Montenegro and Greece assembled at noon today in the pic ture gallery of St. James, to meet the Turkish envoys in the momentous conference which is to decide whether there is to be peace or a continuation of the war in the Balkans.

The plenipotentiaries were welcom ed by Sir Edward Gray, British for eign minister. His address was brief, but full of sympathy and good wishes

for the success of the gathering. The chief of each delegation cor dially acknowledged the welcome and the sentiment expressed by Sir Edward Gray, who was unanimously elected to the honorary presidency of the conference. The negotiators sat for only an hour and a half, and then adjourned for luncheon. Immediate ly after luncheon, the peace delegates adjourned until 11 o'clock tomorrow.

The delegates of the Balkan states, efore entering, declared that within before entering, declared that within this week, either Turkey will find a way to surrender Adrianople, or the war will be resumed. The principal conditions of peace demanded by the allies comprise the immediate surrender of the Turkish fortresses of Scrutari, Adrianople and Janina.

"Mr. and Mrs. George J. Gould announce the engagement of their sister, Miss Helen Miller Gould, to Fin lev J Shepard of St Louis"

Asked whether he desired to say anything additional concerning the engagement, Mr. Gould remarked that "there will be nothing more ex cept that this engagement is most pleasing to Mrs. Gould and myself. Mr. Shepard long has been prom inently identified with railroad and financial affairs in the West. He is at present assistant to the president of the Missouri Pacific Railroad, with

headquarters in St. Louis. Upon the death of her father, Jay Gould, in 1892. Helen Gould, then 24 years old, inherited a fortune of about \$10,000,000. It has been esti mated that by investment she has trebled this fortune, and at the same time devoted fully half of her time to benefactions, which brought her into prominence.

She began her benefactions during the Spanish war, when she gave time and several hundred thousand dollars to the relief of sick and wounded officers, for which she received the thanks of Congress. In 1899 she led a woman's movement for the unseating of Brigham H. Roberts, Congressman from Utah, as a demonstration against polygamy; later she became devoted to the interests of railroad employes and toward the establish ment of the Railroad Young Men's Christian Association, and she gave her personal attention and upward of \$1,000,000. Several railroad Y. M. C A. buildings, others for naval men and several for the Young Women's Christian Association have been erected in cities' throughout the Unit

ed States through her generosity One of the unique reforms of her charity has been the personal receptions she has given to hundreds of city waifs and self-supporting women at her estate near Tarrytown, N. Y. which includes a great playground especially fitted up for these parties. She has never been attracted by so-

London, Dec. 16 .- The British government has proposed to the governent of the United States that a British battleship should convey the body of late American Ambassador Whitelaw Reid to his native land.

Premier Asquith, in announcing the decision of the government formally in the House of Commons today, paid a grateful tribute to/the diplomat's memory. It has been arranged to hold a memorial service for the late ambassador in Westminister Abbey at noon on Friday.

Whitelaw Reid, the American ambassador to Great Britain since 1905. died at his London residence. Dor chester house, shortly after noon yesterday from pulmonary oedema. The end was quite peaceful. Mrs. Reid and their daughter, Mrs. John Hu bert Ward, were at the bedside.

The ambassador had been uncon scious since 9 o'clock in the morning and at intervals during the previous twenty-four hours had been slightly delirious as a result of the administering of drugs to induce sleep.

SAFETY FIRST AS HOME IN FLORAL HEIGHTS PARAMOUNT RULE

INTERSTATE COMMERCE COMMIS SION OFFERS SUGGESTION TO AMERICAN RAILROADS

8,215 DERAILMENTS

10,585 Persons Killed and 180,123 Hurt On Steam Roads in Twelve Months

Washington, Dec. 16.- "Safety first" is the paramount rule of train operation suggested by the Interstate Commerce Commission in its twenty sixth annual report submitted today to Congress. Discussion of disasters on American railroads during the last year constitutes an important fea ture of the report.

Figures given show that of the total of 8,215 derailments during the year, 1,877 were caused by defects of roadway and 3,847 were due to defec tive equipment. This indicates an increase over the previous year of 652 in the derailments due to bad roadway, and 1,023 due to bad equip

The investigation by the Commis sion itself of railroad accidents in volving loss of life, the report says "has proceeded far enough to indirate the need of more effective measures than thus far have been taken to se ure safety of railroad travel." While the previous suggestions of the Commission as to the adoption by the railroads of all steel, or steel under frame, cars are being adopted as rap idly as conditions will permit and the danger from the use of unsound cars CORN IS MOST VALUABLE is gradualy disappearing, the serious dangers of defective roadway and the use of unsound rails still remain, as a result of which derailments are vikely at any time to occur. Concern ing its investigations, the Commis-

sion says: "Of the 31 derailments investigated 14 were either directly or indirectly caused by bad track. In 5 of these • 14 cases the derailments would prob-· ably have been avoided had existing • speed restrictions been observed; but made yesterday afternoon at the 🗣 dent Taft today announced 🗣 in all the remaining cases no ade residence of Mr. and Mrs. George 🔷 through Secretary Hilles that 🗣 quate—speed restrictions—were—in force, and in 3 cases the track condi + tions were so obviously unsafe that derailments were likely to occur ever at low speed. In one serious derailment an examination of the track in the vicinity of the accident disclosed 906 rotten ties within a distance o 147 rail lengths. Under many of the rails there were as many as 11 had ties, and under each of 2 rails there were 12 ties so badly decayed and broken as to be totally unfit for ser vice. In many of these ties the spikes were so loose that they were easily removed by hand, the wood having no longer any holding power. The track in the vicinity of this ac cident was poorly ballasted and was unsafe for the passage of trains at ordinary speed. This derailment oc curred on straight track while the train was running about 30 miles per-

The report says that "the most disquisting and perplexing feature in the problem of accident prevention is the large proportion of train accidents caused by dereliction of duty by the employes involved. The Commission believes that as a rule there are no men that have a keener appreciation of their responsibilities than railroad trainmen and enginemen," and yet it is pointed out that 63 per cent of the whole number of accidents investigat ed were caused by mistakes on the part of employes.

"There is a disposition in some quarters," continues the report, "to charge these lamentable errors to failure of discipline and to hold 'employes wholy responsible for such failure. This is a superfictal view which contains no promise of effective remedy.

"A remarkable increase in the speed and weight of trains within re cent years and the crowding of tracks and terminals caused by the move ment of an enormously enlarged vol ume of traffic, have greatly increased the duties and responsibilities o train service employes and multiplied the chances of error on their part Notwithtsanding these added duties and responsibilities which the condi tions of modern railroading have imposed upon employes the methods of discipline and regulations calculated to insure safety in train operation have remained practically unchang-

"To prevent railroad collisions adequate measures must be taken, first, to reduce the chances of human error to a minimum and second to

PARATIAL VICTORY FOR GOVERNMEN

Washington, Dec. 16.—The government won a partial victory in its prosecution of the hard coal tast when the supreme court today heid that the so-called sixty-five per cencontract between the hard coal roads and coal operators was illegal, sustained the government's former vic tory over the Temple Coal & Iron Company, but declined to sustain the charges of general conspiracy among the hard coal roads.

Five separate conspiracies were charged by the government in its suits begun in 1907. The Philadelphia & Reading, Lehigh Valley, Delaware, Lackawanna & Western, Erie. Central Railroad of New Jersey, and New York, Susquehanna & Western Railroads, with their nine subsidiary coal companies, including the Temple concern, were attacked, with 43 of the largest operators. In December, 1910, the government lost all of its contentions in the lower courts, except dissolution of the Temple Com pany, the stock of which was owned by the railroads to balk independents outside of the combination. That the "combine" monopolized

production, transportation and sale was alleged. Another alleged conspiracy was the "65 per cent con tracts" with independent operatorsto buy that proportion of their output. Merger of the New York, Sus quehanna & Western and Erie Railroads in 1899 by stock manipulation was another alleged conspiracy. Pur chase by the Reading road of the Central Railroad of New Jersey in 1901, destroying competition, was The Erie road was also alleged. also charged with buying up the 1899 to prevent competition.

The pipe line of the Wichita Gas Company sprang a leak on the outskirts of the city, and the power plant was notified to switch to the other company, the North Texas The latter concern's regulator at the power plant was not working, and the power plant found itself unable to get gas from either company, necessitating a shut down. The street lights went out all over town, and the city was plunged into darkness save where the patrons of the new company lived, or where gas was used for lighting Candles were hastily pressed into service downtown and the drug stores, hotels and other concerns were forced to do business by that 'kind of light. Street car service was also stopped and Wichita Falls for one hour was as completely minus public facilities as if she had only one-tenth her present population.

At about 7:25, after the service had been a negligible quantity for an hour, the gas pressure was resumed at the plant and the lights were again turned on, in time for church services. It was an experience that not many enjoyed and had it occurred on a week day, would have resulted in still more inconvenience.

Petrolia Operations.

Prospects were never brighter in the Petrolia oil and gas field than at the present time and it is the opin ion of old timers that the beginning of the real oil boom has just arrived and inside of 60 days everything will be going at a lively gait in the field.

The packer in the Cheeves-Turner Oil and Gas Company, Elliott No. 1 has been causing considerable trouble, and it has been impossible to make a thorough test of this well but it is the opinion of the driller. Dan Scott, that it is good for at least 30-barrels and will probably be place ed in the 50 barrel class when it is placed on the pump. The company has made another location 400 fee south of this well:







DENISON DECIDES TO BUILD RED RIVER BRIDGE

(Denison Herald)

Denison is going to build a bridge over Red River in the immediate future. This much, and more, was decided Thursday night when more than tweaty of the stockholders of the new Red River Bridge Company met in the Denison Chamber of Comnerce rooms and determined to erect a modern steel bridge across Red River at the site of the one which washed aawy five years ago. The new structure is to be erected with which she has become interested as 1 view of accomodating wagons, antomobiles, pedestrians, and an interarban line. Barring unforeseen de ays, work will begin within a few veeks, and the bridge should be comoleted and open not later than Sent 1913.

In addition to placing Denison lu firect communication with a good portion of Southern Oklahoma, it, will nean that Denison will be on the creat Canada to the Gulf Highway and that an interurban line to the worth will follow in a short time ater its completion. That the Strick and interests are desirous of enterng the Oklahoma field, is well known Vhile J. F. Strickland has made no ontract to use the new bridge, he ias thought enough of the proposiion to suggest to the new company hat the bridge be constructed with he idea of carrying electric ears: viso, he has had the plans for the roposed bridge submitted to his hief engineers, and their recommenlations have been embodied in the lans which have practically been greed upon. Already Mr. Strickland nd his associates have acquired the wnership of fifty-eight acres of land n the Oklhaoma bank of Red River. ust east of the north end of the new ridge, and will erect thereon one of out. Mr. Strickland expects to sup-oly power, light and heat. Denison and several other nearby towns, in iddition to operating an electric apply power to any company which night build an interurban across Red liver and infimated that he would ater buy the line. At present, Duant, Okla., is mentioned as the

orthern terminus of this line. The new company, which will robably be incorporated within a ew weeks, is to have a capital stock of \$50,000, all of which has been ubscribed. The bridge is to consist of three spans, two of which will be 188 feet in length, each, and one to e 100 feet. The bridge will be more han twenty feet in the clear, that ars may be operated over it. It is suite probable that it will be sixteen eet wide, with the inteurban tracks n the center. Cars and vehicles vill use the same passageway, the later being protested from the forme y a series 'of block stuants and vatchman. It will be sufficiently gide for two wagons to pass. It has een shown in many instances that team and electrical roads are operted successfully in conjunction with vagon bridges, there being very litle, if any, delay to either in cross-The matter of constructing one or two aprons for the sole accommoation of vehicles and automobiles is
