POSTAL CLERKS

Parcels Post Will Clause Heay Mails | CONGRESS MAY PAY FOR and Much Confusion For Awhile

Railway postal clerks will be required to double on runs or be ready to be called out on the road at any time it may be necessary to call them to assist in handling heavy mail, caused by the parcel post service. The new service will begin January 1, and according to an order received by the clerks in Wichita Falls they must be ready at all times to be called out as they were during the holidays.

This means that the men will be doubled out on runs to assist in handling the heavy mail and will not receive extra pay for the extra amount of work done. The following order was received here:

Beginning with January 1, 1913, parel post matter, which will be included in the mails beginning that date, will doubtless add materially to the bulk, weight and number of pieces of mail handled. The limit of weight is eleven pounds. The size of any package is limited to a maximum of seventy-two inches combined length and girth. Until the service has accommodated itself to the handling of the new business, clerks will hold themselves in readiness for any emergency service, same as during the holiday season. The popularity and success of this branch of the service will depend a great extent on the individual efforts of the clerks and the manner in which the rules governing are carried out. The greatest possible care and attention handling parcel post matter uld be given with a view to avoiding damage and to expedite delivery

The earnest co-operation of all clerks is requested with the end in view of handling this business in a satisfactory manner.

SULLIVAN'S TERRITORY TO BE ENLARGED

Reported That Whitesboro-Wichita Falls Branch of Katy to Be Added to His Supervision

An extension of the authority and territory of R. J. Sullivan, superintendent of the Wichita Falls Route is to be made shortly, according to unofficial advices received here. It is understood that Mr. Sullivan will be more than 100,000 Turkish refugees in charge of the Katy's properties from Whitesboro west to this city, in addition to the Wichita Falls & Northwestern and Wichita Falls & Southern of which he is already superin-

The extension of the territory under Mr. Sulivan's supervision 'will probably result in the addition of several employes to the Katy's force here and will materially increase the importance of Wichita Falls as division headquarters for the Katy.

The change is made incident to the discontinuance of the Greenville headquarters of the Katy, whereby the present superintendent's department at Greenville is consolidated with that at Denison, increasing the responsibilities of A. S. Johnson, superintendent at the latter point. To equalize the superintendent's duties, the Whitesboro-Wichita Falls branch of the Katy is, according to the unofficial report, to be placed under Mr. Sullivan's control. Mr. Sullivan is out of the city today and no confirmation of the report could be obtained at the local offices.

CONFISCATED COTTON.

Washington, Dec. 27.-Judging by the inquiries which members of Congress are receiving there is much misunderstanding of the Watkins bill passed last week by the House of Representatives relative to the amendment if the judiciary code, as it pertains to cotton claims of residents in Southern States.

The Watkins bill does not in any way refer to the omnibus or to the usual war claim. It has reference only to claims for cotton seized by federal troops subsequent to June 1, 1865, and sold by agents of the treasury department and the proceeds turned into the treasury, where more than \$5,000,000 is now being held to be distributed among the representatives of the owners of the seized

or abandoned cotton. When these claims were submitted to the court of claims it was held that a showing of loyalty must be made on the part of the claimant. This could not be made, as the property was seized in the South from those who had been opposed to the

The Watkins bill removed the obligation of showing loyalty and if it passes the senate will pave the way to a distribution of money which the government does not claim and is really anxious to turn back to the rightful owners if the legal tangle can be unraveled.

HORRIBLE CRUELTIES

Terrible Torture Resorted to By Savage Band Enroute to Own Village

Sidney, N. S. W., Dec. 27.—News of the massacre of men, women and children, composing virtually the entire population of native village on SANTA CLAUS HAD the Island Patua, has been received at Hortmosey, New Guinea, according to a message received today

The massacre took place while na tives were passing through it en route to their own settlement. They attacked the village, resorting to terrible cruelty.

"Yesterday he was sick and "dopey" and remained in bed all day. Today, when he awoke, the past two days were a perfect blank in his mind and he thought it was Christmas day. His disappointment was keen when he learned he would have to wait 363 days to celebrate Christmas.






