BISHOP MCINTYRE PREACHES SUNDAY AT THE FIRST M. E. CHURCH

DEDICATION OF MISSION

First Services are Conducted in Factory District—Interesting Sermons are Heard

Easter Sunday was a red letter day for the regular Methodist Episcopal folks of Wichita Falls. Rev. J. E. Coe, pastor of the First M. E. Church had been making arrangements for several weeks and Bishop Robert McIntyre resident bishop of the combined Oklahoma and Texas conference was on hand to render important services. The first church had an indebtedness which it was desired to wipe out and this was undertaken at the morning service preceding the sermon by the bishop. The most remarkable feature of the service was that between \$3000 and \$4000 was raised in the incredible short time of seven minutes and the bishop declared that he had never found a place where the raising of money was so easy. The opening prayer was made by Rev. W. T. Euster, superintendent of the Fort Worth district. Rev. S. T. Lancaster, pastor at Friberg read the scripture, Rev. J. E. Coe, pastor of the church gave an explanation of the religious situation and the bishop proceeded to the topic of his sermon which was appropriate to the occasion, being on the resurrection of Christ. It was an eloquent, convincing and touching appeal to the higher instincts of the soul, and the immortal nature of man. Many said as they went out "that was the greatest sermon ever heard in the First Church and the greatest day ever known here in church circles." In the afternoon the new Mission chapel was dedicated at the factory district. This chapel and its work has been placed upon such a basis and is to be managed by such a broad policy that people of all denominations and of no church home whatever can find a place to enjoy the Christian religion and takes in part in Christian work without the least hindrance to anything denominational, as this is coming to be the basis upon which all really large and successful mission work is being conducted in various cities of the nation and the public is supporting this kind of broad and generous and unsectarian work. The bishop was pleased to see a work of this kind established in this city. The chapel was dedicated after a beautiful sermon by the bishop after more money than was actually needed had been raised in just nine minutes of time by the worshippers. A vote of thanks was tendered Mr. Kemp for his donation of the Mission site. In the evening Bishop McIntyre preached another of his noted sermons on "The Saints in Caesars Household." He left early this morning for his home in Oklahoma City. The membership of the church, the local pastors and the district superintendent, express themselves as delighted with the services rendered by the bishop and the more than successful results which indicate the spiritual condition of this work in Wichita Falls. Special music was furnished by the choir and by the church male quartette composed of Bachman, Carey, Hunter and Anderson. The Mission in the factory district is a large frame structure 28x40 and was erected at a cost of about \$1900. It has a seating capacity of 150. Sunday school will be held there every afternoon at 3 o'clock and preaching at 7:30 by Rev. J. E. Coe.

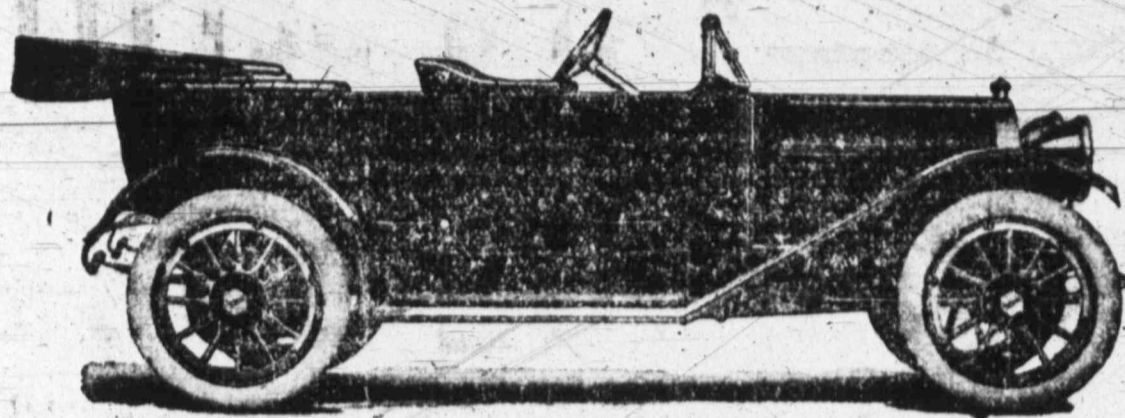

## COLORADO-TEXAS AUTO TOUR ROUTE

AMARILLO ASKS THIS CITY'S CO-OPERATION IN SECURING HIGHWAY

### OTHER TOWNS ARE ACTIVE

Route as First Planned Does Not Include This City But Change May be Made

Co-operation between Amarillo and Wichita Falls in having automobile touring highways routed along the Fort Worth & Denver is urged by Secretary Seth B. Holman of the Amarillo Chamber of Commerce, in a letter to D. P. Talley of this city. The particular route in which the two cities are interested is the Texas-Colorado Springs highway, which it is proposed to locate by way of Amarillo and Wichita Falls and Fort Worth.

In his letter Mr. Holman sets forth that other routes are being urged and that it will take combined effort of both Wichita Falls and Amarillo to get results. In his letter to Mr. Talley, he says:

"Dear Sir: I have a copy of your circular letter addressed to the secretary of the Colorado Springs Chamber of Commerce, regarding the proposed Colorado-Gulf auto route and have read it with a great deal of interest.

"We have been working on this matter for sometime. As we understand the first proposition from Colorado Springs, the route south had been determined as far as Amarillo, but there was some indecision about it from Amarillo south. Meanwhile I received requests for aid in pulling the road their way from Plainview and Post City and San Angelo on one side, and from Fort Worth, Mineral Wells and Weatherford on the other side. Up to this time we have remained neutral, with only one object in view that of securing the best route south of Amarillo.

"From the tone of your letter, however, I infer that you lean toward the Chisholm Trail route through Kansas and Oklahoma, although willing to consider the Denver route south from here if the towns along that route will get busy and fix up their roads acceptably. Now you can readily see Amarillo's position. We are neutral as between the San Angelo and Denver routes, but will fight our attempt to carry it around us through Kansas and Oklahoma. We much prefer to work with Wichita Falls, if you will abandon this Chisholm Trail idea and pull for the Denver route. On that basis our auto men will work with yours in stirring up interest down the Denver and getting that route in shape. If that is not practicable, then of course we will try to organize the Plainview, Post City and San Angelo people and so after that route hard.

"I believe in hitting right straight from the shoulder in such matters, and am trying to be as frank with you as possible. In short, we want to work with you as far as possible. I have found that in this kind of work all it takes is deploring what you want to do and then taking your coat off and doing it. I believe that if both Wichita Falls and Amarillo decide to work together to get that Denver route fixed up they can do it by going at it systematically. We both need the tourist trade. I can see no sane reason why we should not both have it. Are you with us? If so, outlining a plan for a campaign down the Denver route and Amarillo will do her part. I am sending a copy of this letter to my friend, A. W. Reel, secretary of the Memphis Commercial Club, one of the most effective clubs in Texas today, asking him to take up the matter in Hall county, see his commissioners, investigate the Red River crossing and see what enthusiasm he can stir up in his section for better auto-roads, etc. I sincerely hope you will accept this letter in the frank spirit in which it is written and that Amarillo and the Best Bull City in Texas can get together on this matter that is but one of a number that could be utilized for the betterment of all Northwest Texas and the entire Panhandle."

## NEW WAYS OF SPELLING OLD WORDS SUGGESTED

Simplified Spelling Board Issues Several Changes To Make Words Easier

New York, March 24.—The simplified spelling board issued Sunday its fourth list of words to appear in the new fashioned orthograph. Approximately 1,000 words are shortened or changed in spelling.

"In considering these new spellings," the board says in announcing the new list, "do not be too much influenced by the odd appearance of the word. Any change must look odd at first. Consider rather whether the change will bring a real gain if the public should accept it."

Some of the changes are dropping the silent h in such words as chaos and chameleon, dropping the final k in words like hammock, changing heart and hearth to hart and harth, dropping the silent e in money and similar words, substituting laf for laugh and coff for cough, omitting the g in gnat, gnome and similar words; substituting nee for knee and nicknac for knickknack, and dropping the

k in similar words; changing praed to pranat, and other words ending with need to nest.

The word touch is spelled tuch, serious is changed to serinus, blow is spelled blo, below is changed to bello, forced to forst, phantom to fantom, handsome to handsum, boss to bos, glue to glu, and wretch to retch.

Each of these instances typifies a rule and is followed by a long list of words to which it applies.

Andrew Carnegie, Theodore Roosevelt and a score of other noted men are included in the list of the board's members.

### LOWER COURT SCORED FOR LIGHT SENTENCE.

Oklahoma City, March 24.—J. C. McKnight, county judge of Custer county, is given a good scoring in an opinion of Judge Henry Eufman, in dismissing the appeal of W. M. Caudill, convicted of violation of the prohibition law, instructing the lower court to correct the judgment. The court merely assessed a fine against Caudill but omitted the jail sentence, as provided by the statute. The court holds that a court in passing sentences under the prohibition law must also prescribe the jail sentence, as provided by law.

## COLD WAVE PREDICTED, NOT YET IN EVIDENCE

Although the weather bureau has forecasted freezing temperatures for North Texas tonight with fair and colder weather tomorrow, the expected cold wave had not put in its appearance early this afternoon. At 1 o'clock the mercury had risen above the 75 mark here and practically the same conditions were reported from all points along the Fort Worth & Denver north to Texline.

After an Easter day of high gales and blinding dust Monday opened fair and warm and men were seen wearing straw hats this afternoon for the first time this season.

The high wind yesterday did no damage here as far as reported.

Fruit and truck growers are hoping that the reported cold wave has been sidetracked as a freeze now would cause great damage to the fruit crops which so far are believed to have escaped serious damage. The truck men, however, will take no more chances than they have to and will protect all the tender vegetation they can tonight.

## WHEAT IN MIDDLE WEST IS DECLARED PROMISING

St. Louis, March 24.—Reports received here by wire from six of the largest wheat producing States of the Middle West show the plant is in a very promising condition. In Nebraska and Oklahoma the condition is perfect. Secretary of Agriculture Coburn says winter wheat in Kansas was never in a better condition for a bumper crop, but adds, "I am not making a prophecy."

T. C. Wilson of the Missouri Agricultural Board declares the crop is in excellent condition. Indiana expects a bumper crop, if no setback is experienced. In Illinois the condition is not as good as in ebruary, but is showing an well.

There is plenty of moisture in the ground and the season has been propitious and if nothing happens the crop should be a large one, says Secretary Coburn of Kansas. "The same conditions to a great extent prevail all over Kansas, the wheat in every section being in fine shape."

Reports received by the Grain Dealers' Association at Topeka and by farm papers give the same condition prevailing in every section of the State.

Secretary Wilson of Missouri says: "I believe wheat was never in better condition at this time of the year in Missouri. Such a cold snap as we have had might prove damaging in years when there has been wet fall and a rank, sappy growth of wheat, but not in a year like this."

This serum is known as the Flexner cure for that disease, and is the same, as the Times understands, as was used at Dallas about one year ago by the celebrated New York physician the newspapers had so much praise for. He has given orders to discontinue the use of the serum, after having thoroughly tested it out, and satisfying himself that it's use killed more than it cured.
