OMAHA SWEPT BY STORM AND FIRE; CYCLONE SUNDAY IN MIDDLE WEST

CITY MAY BE TWO HUNDRED

Fifty Reported Killed In Terre Haute. Other Places Visited Telegraph Wires Down

Omaha, chief city of Nebraska, storm wrecked and fire swept. was so effectually cut off from the remainder of the world this afternoon that only meager estimates of the death list and damage from the tornado could be obtained.

Brief dispatches forced through devious routes, indicated that between 100 and 300 persons perished and hundreds of others were injured. Special trains and troops are rushing to the scene. Early last evening a series of gales of varying intensity began sweeping through the Missouri Valley and Middle West, leaving ruin in their past. At least six states sustained heavy damage.

Terre Haute, Indiana, reports a death list which may reach fifty." Towns in Iowa, Illinois, Kansas and Missouri were affected. Wire communication with Omaha was broken shortly after 6 o'clock last night.

Fire Adds To Horrors of Night

By Associated Press.

Omaha, Nebraska, March 24.—Omaha and vicinity were swept by two distinct wind storms late yesterday of cyclonic intensity which spread death and destruction in their wake.

Fire which broke out added to the horrors. At 8 o'clock this morning the best available figures placed the number of dead between 100 and 200, with not less than 100 seriously injured, and probably 300 or more seriously hurt.

All fires have been put out. During the night, fifty alarms were turned in.

The tornado swept through Omaha shortly after 6 o'clock yes- By Associated Press. terday afternoon cutting a patch four to six blocks wide and eight miles long, causing appalling loss of life and immense property destruction. Hundreds of buildings were destroyed.

The property damage will reach hundreds of thousands. The tornado swept in from the Southwest and swerved to the northeast portion of the city. Its principal damage was done in a section two blocks long.

Firemen were thable to respond to all of the alarms which followed the fire and many houses were allowed to burn to the ground. In addition to the two blocgs totally destroyed thirty or forty blocks in the residence section were badly damaged. Trains arriving in the city about 6 o'clock last night were stopped at the suburbs to take on dead bodies and many injured who were thus brought to gity hospitals. Among the villages destroyed in the suburbs are Benson, Dundee, Florence and Bemis Park, the latter one of the city's prettiest residence sections.

The Webster street telephone exchange, with more than a score of girls, was torn to pieces and several of the girls killed outright. The Illinois Central bridge over the Missouri river was destroyed. All wires went down except a single railroad wire into Lincoln which was not available for press reports.

Semi-hysterical persons who got out of Omaha on early trains spread reports that the deaths might reach about a thousand. Ralston, southwest of Omaha, was razed to the ground and twenty or more people were killed there. East Omaha reported heavy damage but no lives lost. The Council Bluff death list totalled fourteen at noon today.

The heaviest loss of life was in the vicinity of South Lake and from there to East Sixteenth and Dinney streets. This was all in the residence section. Entire blocks of homes were picked up and dashed into a shapeless mass. Street cars were hurled from the tracks and demolished.

A pictrue show at 24th and Lake street was destroyed while fifty persons were inside. Ten dead and eight injured were recovered from its ruins last night and it is not known how many more may be in the debris.

The fate of Bemis Park was pitiful, inasmuch as the fire department could give it no assistance and nearly everything not blown down was burned up. Among the show places of the city damaged was the Joslin Castle, whose roof was torn off.



OTHER TOWNS ARE ACTIVI

Route as First Planned Does Not I clude This City But Change May be Made

Co-operation between Amarillo and Wichita Falls in having automobile ouring highways routed along the Fort Worth & Denyer is urged by Secretayr Seth B. Holman of the Amarillo Chamber of Commerce, in a letter to D. P. Talley of this city. The particular route in which the two cities are interested is the Texas-Colorado Springs highway, which it is proposed to locate by way of Amarillo and Wichita Falls and Fort Worth.

In his letter Mr. Holman sets forth that other routes are being orged and that it will take sombined effort of both Wichita Falls and Am. arillo to get results. In his letter to Mr. Talley, he says:

"Dear Sir: I have a copy of you pircular letter addressed to the sec retary of the Colorado Springs Cham ber of Commerce, regarding the pro josed Colorado-Gulf auto route and 'tave read it with a great deal of in rerest.

"We have been working on this natter for sometime. As we under tand the first proposition from Colo ado Springs, the route south had een determined as far as Amarillo at there was some indecision about from Amarillo south. Meanwhile I eceived requests for aid in-pulling the road their way from Plainview and Post City and Sn Angelo on one ide, and from Fort Worth, Mineral Wells and Weatherford on the other and. Up to this time we have re nained neutral, with only one object view that, of securing the best oute south of Amairllo.

"From the tenor of your letter lowever, I infer that you lean toward he Chisholm Trail route through Cansas and Oklahoma, although will ng to consider the Denver route outh from here if the towns a'ong fat route will get busy and fix up heir roads acceptably. Now you can eadily see Amarillo's position. We tre neutral as between the San Anelo and Dehver routes, but will fight ny attempt to carry it around us brough Kansas and Oklahomas We such prefer to work with Wichita falls, if you will abandon this Chisolm Trail idea and pull for the Dener route. On that basis our auto aen will work with yours in stirring ip interest down the Denver and jetting that route in shape. If that s not practicable, then of course we vill try to organize the Plainviewost City and San Angelo people and

so after that route hard. "I believe in hitting right straight rom the shoulder in such matters ind am trying to be as frank with you as possible. In short, we want have found that in this kind of work all it takes is declaring what you vant to do and then taking your coat off and doing it. I believe that it oth Wichita Falls and Amarillo de ide to work together to get that Den er route fixed up they can do it b joing at it systematically. We both seed the tourist traver. I can see no ane reason why we should not both have it. Are you with us? If so, out ine a plan for a campaign down the Denver route and Amarillo will do her part. 




